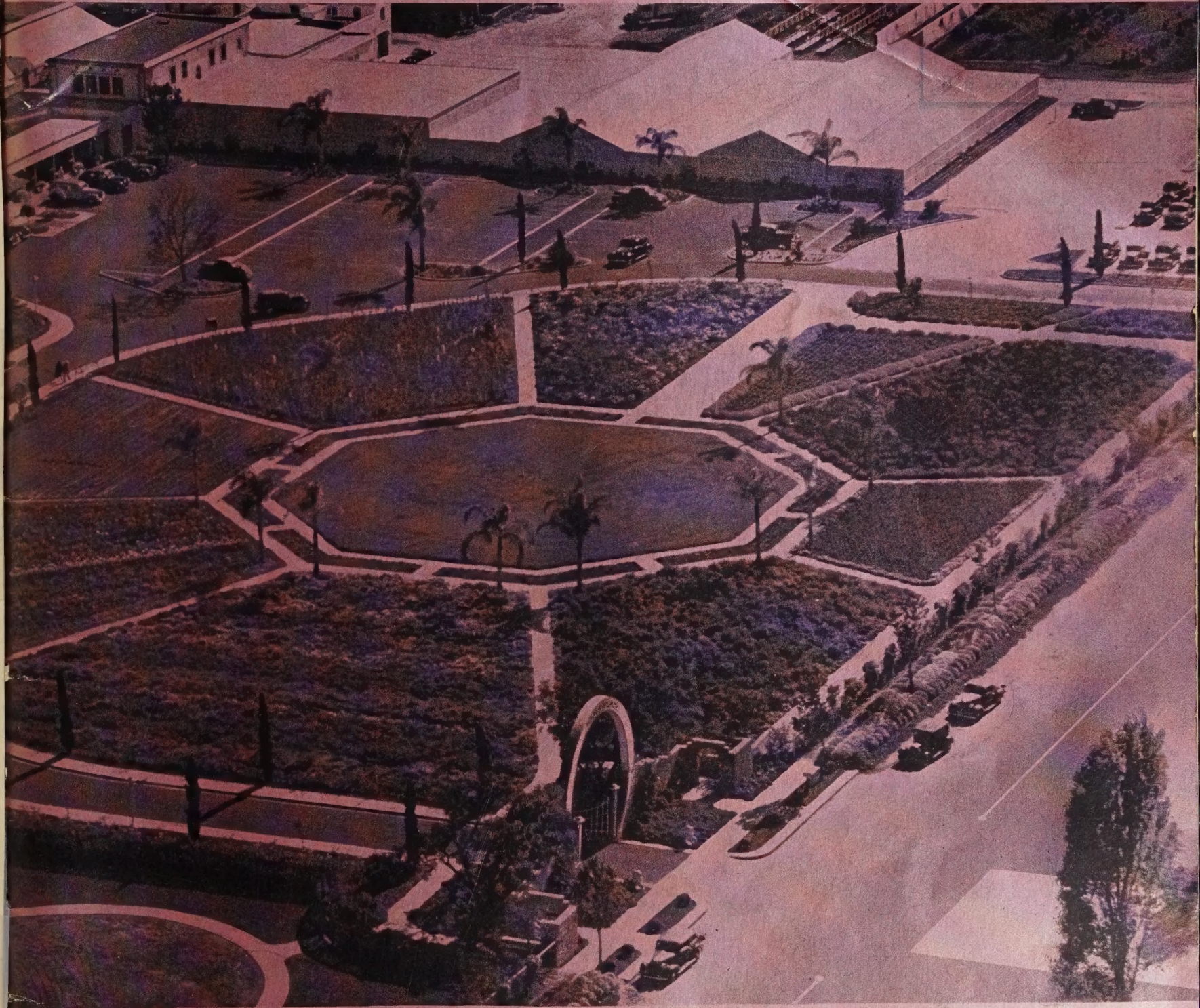

AGERATUM

Sow until August 1st. Blooms in six weeks.

AGERATUM. Floss Flower. Favorite bedding and border plant, blooming nearly the year round. Easily raised from seed either in fall or in spring.

Blue Perfection. 9 inches. The deepest blue bedding variety. **Packet 15c.**

Midget Blue. Very dwarf, with delicate fine foliage. True ageratum blue flowers. Uniformly dwarf and true to color from seed. **Packet 25c.**

ARCTOTIS

Can be planted at any time. Blooms all winter in California.

NEW ARCTOTIS HYBRIDS

California Flowerland New Hybrids

TRANSVAAL DAISIES. Showy plants, ideal for the border and splendid for cutting, blooming summer and winter. Very large, graceful flowers on long stems, with long narrow petals surrounding the center discs, which are sometimes of contrasting color. All shades of crimson, rose, coral, orange, yellow and cream are included in the color range. For a sunny, well-drained situation, there is no perennial more showy. **Packet of 35 seeds, 25c; 100 seeds, 60c.**

GAZANIA

Sow seed of this perennial any time of year.

HOWARD'S NEW EVERBLOOMING PADRE HYBRIDS

A wonderful new everblooming strain of this showy flower, the result of six years' selection by Mr. Edward A. Howard. Beds of these Gazanias were in bloom constantly for 40 months in the Palisades Park in Santa Monica.

The flowers are twice the size of ordinary Gazanias, and range from cream, buff and yellow shades to deep orange, salmon, rose and maroon, some oddly marked and zoned with olive green, brown or cinnebar red.

Gazanias require an open sunny position with good drainage, plenty of water, and occasional applications of fertilizer, to produce the finest flowers. **Packet 35c.**

LARKSPUR

Sow from July 15th on, for winter and spring bloom.

LARKSPUR. Cockade Type. An improved strain of the base branching Giant Imperial Larkspur, producing a more symmetrical plant, with taller flowering spikes and closer spaced double florets. Showy and beautiful for massing in the garden, and exquisite for cutting.

Camellias are not difficult to grow, succeeding everywhere on the Pacific Coast except in desert and high mountain regions. Plant them as ornamental flowering shrubs in shade or semi-shade, using plenty of leaf mold or peat in the soil.

Do not plant Camellias too deep. Never should the stem be covered deeper than it was in the container or ball in which it was received. With good drainage and plenty of water during the summer, success is assured.

Lovely flowers, to use in bowls, or for corsages, will be produced even on small plants. If you do not have space in your garden, you will find great pleasure in growing Camellias in pots or tubs.

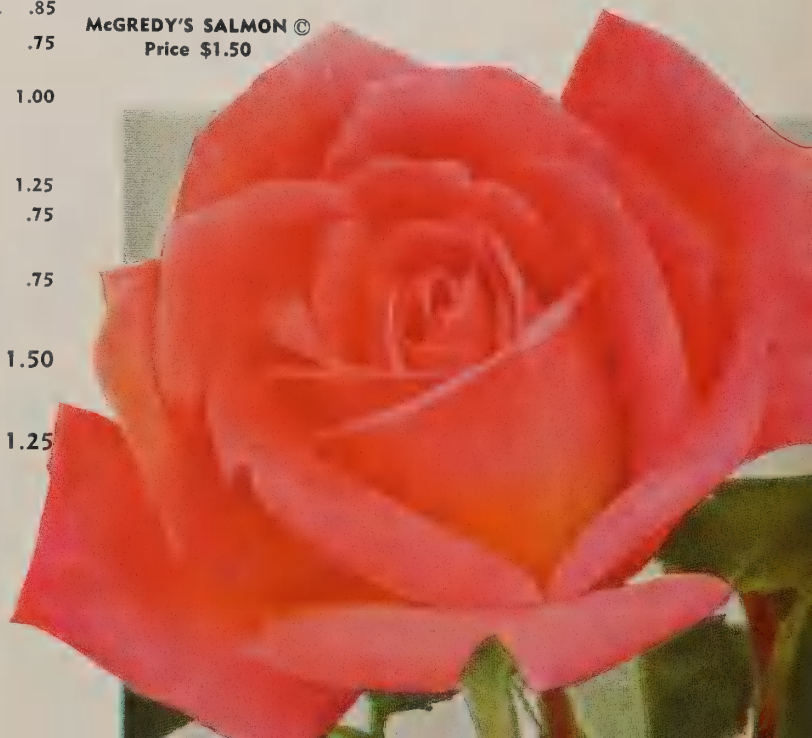

ROSES FOR BEDDING

Roses are to be found in almost every garden, grown for cut flowers, or as specimen plants, but their importance for lovely bedding effect is often overlooked, except in rose gardens of some pretense. There is nothing more continuously pleasing than a solid planting of one variety of rose, for color effect. For this purpose, the plants should be set closer together, not more than 14-20 inches apart. A dense foliage effect is produced, which makes a handsome background for the rich beauty of the blooms.

The Floribunda and Polyantha types, mostly low growing, with great clusters of flowers, are ideal for bedding and massing. Besides these, we recommend the following list of Hybrid Tea Roses:

BRUNFELSIA EXIMIA. An even finer shrub than the better known variety Brunfelsia floribunda. The foliage is more luxuriant, soft green, and the plant has a more shapely habit of growth, with larger flowers of deep blue. **1-gallon containers, \$1.00; 5-gal. \$2.00.**

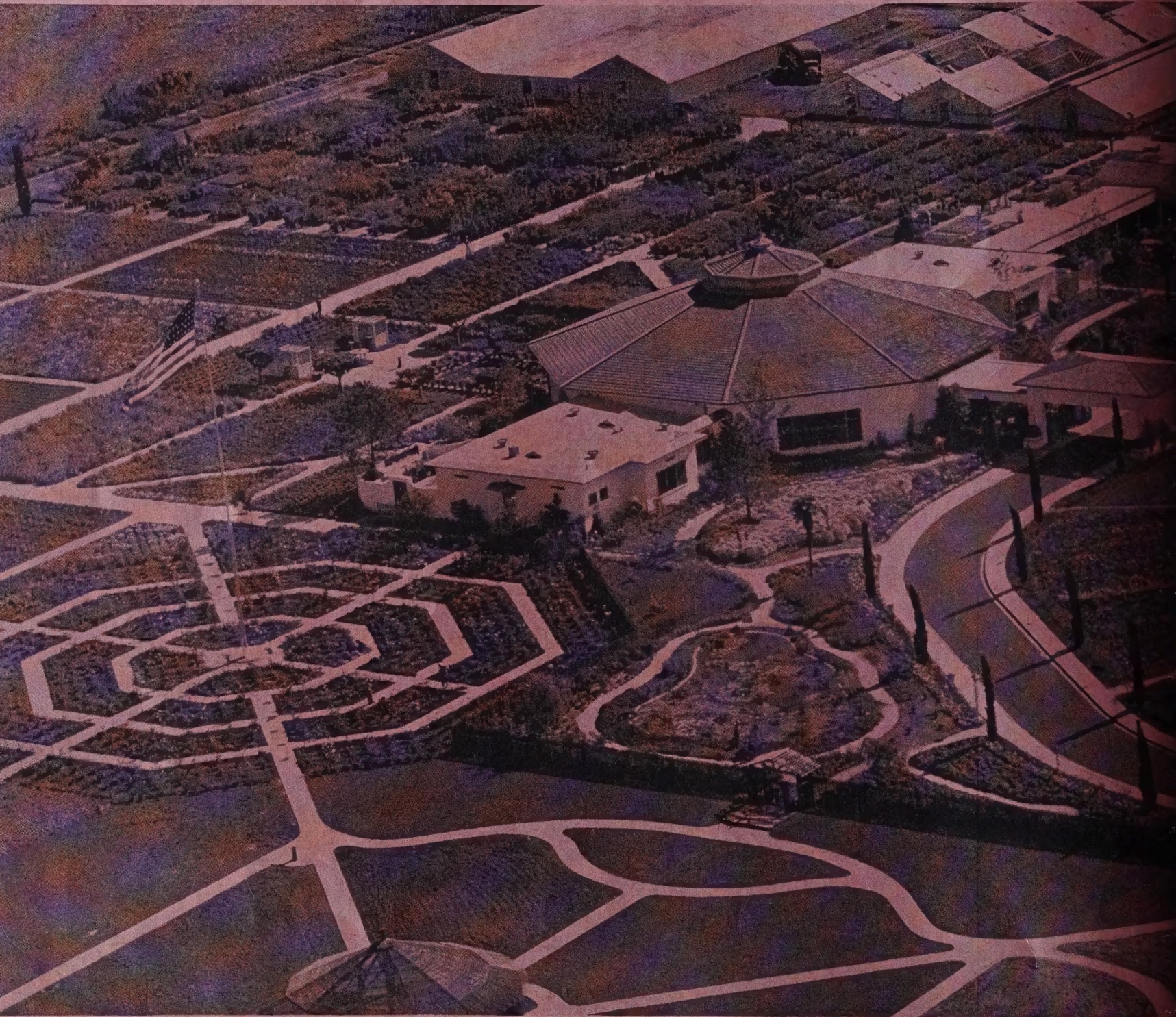
