EVERGREEN TREES and SHRUBS

Broad-leaved Evergreens vary in size from the largest trees to the smallest shrubs; most of these excel in brilliancy and floriferousness, others through their shining berries and foliage.

October to April; pot-grown plants of this class can be planted any time during the year.
