Attractive at any season of the year with its glossy, healthy foliage, a plant of this desirable species is breath-takingly beautiful in spring when its light red flowers unfold almost before the leaves develop. Of course, the Red Dogwood is not limited to lawn use, as they are ideal for the background of shrub plantings and at their supreme best in woodland settings if you are fortunate enough to have a wooded area on your grounds. A tree for every property, large or small, they have only recently become plentiful enough to be offered at prices within easy reach of the average buyer.

Blooming wood of a free-flowering variety, usually a Hybrid Tea, is top-grafted on a strong $4\frac{1}{2}$ -foot stem of another variety, creating a formal plant with flowers at eye level, producing flowers just as perfect in form and as liberal in quantity as the same variety in conventional bush form. 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

Hardy Perennials

The strongest practical argument in favor of hardy perennials is the fact that, once planted, they continue year after year with no further gardening concern beyond cultivation, cutting, and thinning. In all descriptions, we aim to show normal matured height, blooming period, color and any special quality or utility; so that the reader may easily select and associate varieties to fit any desired purpose.

Planting. Perennials may be planted as early in the spring as the ground is friable, or in autumn before ground is frozen. Large clumps are not necessary nor often desirable; the small divisions or pot-grown stock showing more thrift, vitality and development than the bulkier old roots. Any good soil enriched with fertilizer, dug deep and thoroughly mixed, will be satisfactory. **Winter Protection.** Everything listed in this section is "hardy" but in varying degrees. A light covering of coarse straw, manure or leaves (not over 2 or 3 inches deep) will give protection to all kinds, and insure safety.







HARDY WATER LILIES - NYMPHAEAS

Location. Sunshine and unchilled, undisturbed water are essential. Soil. Should be mellow clay loam, fertilized with one-fourth well-rotted cow manure, about 12 inches deep. Horse and sheep manures are dangerous to use. Of commercial fertilizers, Vigoro is probably as good as any.

Water. Any clean water, not in strong motion, will do; its depth above soil not arbitrary, but 12 inches is best.

Planting. The longer roots should be firmed into the dirt slanting or flat; but set all shapes so that the crown is even with the surface of soil. In case the pull of spreading leaves, or other disturbance loosens the root-hold, poke them back and refirm the soil or further bind them down with stones.

The average space to allow for plants is about 2 feet square. Original propagation is slow; S. & H. Lily roots are two or more years old, and ready to bloom. TREE ROSES


A Tree Rose is not a natural type, but rather a product of the growers' skill. It consists of a strong, single, upright, 4½-foot stem, ton-grafted to one of the free blooming garden varieties. This method of growing Roses is somewhat unusual, but not novel, as it has been practiced for years. They are very effective and add tremendously to any garden picture. French Hybrid Lilacs

Although they are all hybrids of the common Lilac (Syringa vulgaris), the French Hybrids are much more orderly in growth and have been bred and selected for the size and shapeliness of their flower trusses, and are now available in a wide variety of colors. In some of them each tiny floret is a fully double flower with as many as a dozen petals. All the colors shown above can be secured from our list on page 62, as well as many intermediate shades.

From established plants, literally arm-loads of fragrant trusses can be cut each year, and, far from harming them, seems to increase their productiveness for the following season. They need not be grown as isolated plants, since they are ideal for tall backgrounds and do equally well in such locations.

The color is glossy light red developing quite evenly on both upper and lower sides, only slightly changed by holding or canning. Prefers the heavier types of soil. types of soil.

Cotskill (M). A thoroughly tested New York variety, adopted in 17 middle and northern states. It is so productive it needs thinning. Very large fruits; light red from first to last. The quality is excellent

Clermont (E). A new cross between Marshall ermont (E). A new cross between Marshall and Premier; exceptionally well adapted to heavy soil. The very large fruits are regular, glossy, and ship well. Quality is excellent. Not recommended south of Pennsylvania.

Cresco (ME). Between Premier and Dunlap. A cross between the two, it retains the rich color and flavor of Dunlap, with the large size of Premier. Solid red to the center and fruit colors evenly. Adapted to all kinds of soil and able to withstand severe winters and dry summers. Reported free from yellows. Good for canning and shipping.

Dorsett. This new introduction has taken the Atlantic berry growers by storm, and is becoming one of the most popular and respected in the middle west. Its fruiting
season is early and profitably continuous,
yielding bumper crops which bring instant
market acceptance at the very top price.
The berry is uniformly large, full, elongated
with rounded extremity. The color is an
attractive pinkish red, unusual flavor, mild
sub-acid. It does exceptionally well on heavy
soil, and surpasses other varieties for sweet
mess during prolonged rainy season. ness during prolonged rainy season.

It is credited with bearing within 60 days after the normal spring planting; carrying on during the summer, with an immense fall crop, ending only with the first frosts. Sparkling glossy red fruits uniformly large, that carry and keep better than others, due to the tough skin and unusual firmness of its flesh. The flavor is fine. Three crops—big ones—spring, summer and fall. What more can you ask of a strawberry? berry?

bson (M). Strong grower with good roots and abundant foliage, exceedingly produc-tive. Berries extra large, choice flavor, dark glossy red clear through, follows Premier. Gibson

Red Gold. This remarkable new markable new variety originated in the west, is both drought and frost resistant. Ripens earlier than Premier. Extra large brilliant red berries. Flesh tender. A fancy table berry. Plant deep rooting and extra strong. tra strong.

Senator Dunlap (E) Rampant runner, should be restric-ted in production of plants. Fruit of plants. Fruit good size, beautiful bright red, glossy; firm, splendid keeper.

ayzata. (New.) Here is another introduction which is hailed by growers in the great Michigan Strawberry Belt as the best "everbearer" of them all. Would you, too, care to try it out and judge its merits? The berries are large, uniform, dark red and Wayzata. very sweet.

Wm. Belt (M). Vigorous, thrifty, heavy plant, producing large crops under good common matted row culture. Berries extra large, conical, quite uniform in shape, brilliant glossy red.
