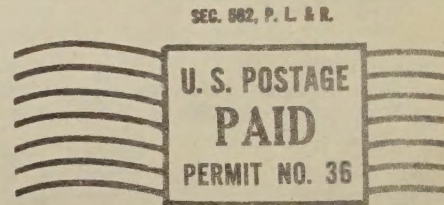

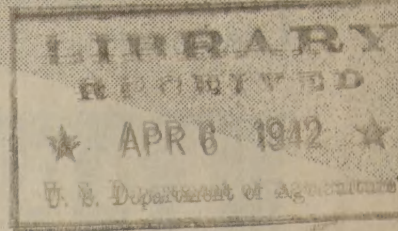

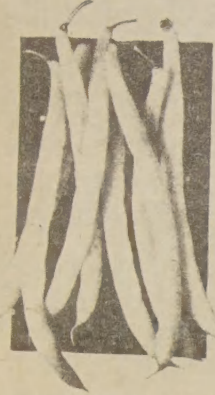

BOUNTFUL—Green bean popular among market gardeners. Flat, absolutely stringless pods. 48 days.

★ BEANS—Dwarf Wax Podded

GOLDEN WAX—RUST PROOF—Very early. Pods are 4 to 4 1/2 inches long, very stout, straight or slightly curved and oval in form; flesh brittle, stringless; color bright yellow, seed white, much mottled brown. 52 days.

BLACK WAX PENCIL POD—Dwarf black seeded. Early, very productive. Pods large, 6 1/2 to 7 inches long, round, nearly straight, strictly stringless, fiberless, fleshy, brittle. Yellow. 56 days.



SURE CROP WAX—Black seed, stringless, hardy, pods flat, 6" long, 53 days.

★ BEANS—Pole or RUNNING

KENTUCKY WONDER—Green podded, climbing, early and productive. Pods 8 to 9 in. long, nearly round, very slender. 65 days.

LIMA BEANS

BURPEE'S BUSH—Pods 4 1/2 to 5 in. long, containing 3 to 4 beans as large as pole sorts, flat and white. 78 days.



BEETS

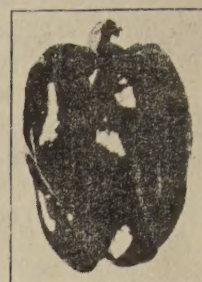

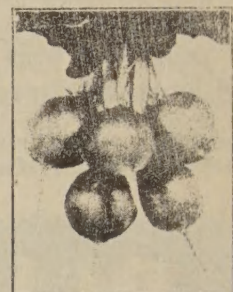

BLUEBERRIES

Blueberries require an acid soil which contains an abundance of peat moss or other partly decayed vegetable matter. If your soil is deficient in this material, a heavy application of peat, rotted sawdust, or other material should be made. Plant 3 to 4 ft. apart in rows 6-8 ft. apart. For proper pollination, plant two or more varieties.

CABOT (Early)—One of the earliest varieties, a good producer, excellent flavor, and a good shipper. Fruit is large, firm, and attractive.

RANOCAS (Mid-Season)—Popular. Ripens about 2 weeks after Cabot. The fruit is large, light blue, firm, and attractive.

RUBEL (Mid-Season to Late)—Tall, well shaped bush, attractive appearance, excellent producer, good quality, slightly tart berry.

JERSEY (Late)—Tall, well shaped bush, attractive appearance, excellent producer. Large, good quality berry.

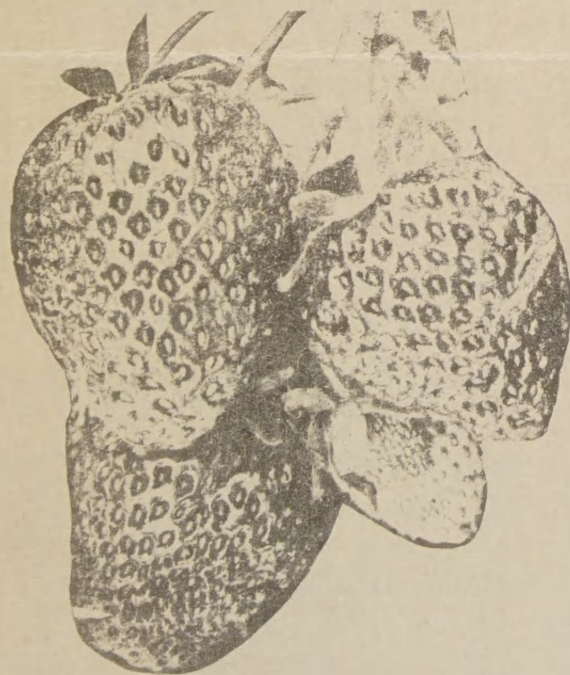
