This year marks OUR GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY in Philadelphia. Our founder, Hosea Waterer, came to America from England in 1876 to exhibit Hybrid Rhododendrons and Azaleas at the Centennial Exposition. The plants which he brought to America at that time had been grown in his father's nursery in England, which was then over 150 years old. America appealed to Mr. Waterer and he decided to become an American citizen and set up business as an importer of choice seeds and plants. In 1892 he established his business at 107-109 South Seventh Street, Philadelphia. Later he moved to our present location, 714 Chestnut Street.

Hosea Waterer passed away in 1926. However, his two sons, Anthony and Harry, have maintained the great traditions of their father, upholding his standards of quality and service. From the very beginning, the ideals of Hosea Waterer have been reflected in the outstanding varieties of seeds, bulbs, and plants which he introduced to the American public.

On this great occasion we say thank you to our hosts of friends for their faith in us, and their patronage through the years. We shall do our best to maintain always the standards which have kept this business foremost in American Horticulture.

# AMERICAN AND ENGLISH GROWN BULBS 

THE most popular of the May-Flowering Tulips. Flowers are mostly bowl-shaped, somewhat flaring at the top, with leathery petals of good substance and long-lasting qualities. Their colorrange is practically unlimited, although somewhat deficient in white and yellow. Carefully selected varieties will provide a long succession of bloom, and they unquestionably form the basis for schemes in the garden, supplemented by Cottage and Breeder varieties. They average in height from 2 to $21 / 2$ feet and the stems are usually strong and straight. Fine for any use to which Tulips may be put. Ideal for large beds or borders, or planted in clumps among shrubs and perennials. Also the best type for forcing in the greenhouse or conservatory.
Afterglow. (II.) Rosy apricot-orange, with light tan shading at edges of peta's; inside deep orange, with yellowish base. Very brilliant outdoors, particularly when associated with blue. Height, 26 inches. (Color illustration, page 5.) $\$ 1.25$ per doz.; $\$ 9.00$ per 100; $\$ 85.00$ per 1000.

 COTTAGE TULIPS differ from Darwins chiefly in the shape of the flower, which is more graceful and lily-like in the true Cottage varieties. Some of the most beautiful Tulips in the world belong to this family, and a good many of them strongly resemble the Darwins. This section is particularly rich in good yellow Tulips which are rare in the other classes, and also contains many of the newest and loveliest hybrids.Alaska. (III.) Fine flower of clear bright yellow of an even, soft tone-no other color anywhere. The petals are long and slightly reflexing. A very charming flower of the Lily-flowered type. ## As to Covering Tulips?

It is our earnest conviction that mothing is gained by covering Tulips for the winter. On the contrary much damage can result. The bulbs do not need to be kept warm as they are perfectly hardy and well able to withstand any amount of cold, if planted in well-drained soil. Lack of proper drainage will cause far more trouble than cold. The disadvantage of covering lies in the fact that the mulch affords a perfect haven for field mice which eat the bulbs. Also in a mild winter it forces the bulbs into a premature weak growth which is generally injured by late adverse weather conditions or which causes the bulbs to flower very poorly. Do not cover unless absolutely necessary to protect other plants among which your Tulips may be growing.

## O Vaturalizing Daffodils

When Daffodils are to be naturalized, they should not be planted in regular rows or at even distances apart. The best thing is to carry a basket of bulbs over the ground, spilling them irregularly and planting the bulbs where they fall. It will take several years to achieve the full value of a naturalistic planting, and the Daffodils should be left entirely undisturbed during that period. The foliage should never be cut off, but allowed to ripen and wither away naturally.

If the ground is fairly moist and shady, an interplanting of Mertensia is extremely effective, and Anchusa myosotidiflora is also a very beautiful plant to combine with naturalizing Daffodils.
