Pale heliotrope, inside deep violet with blue base. One of the loveliest Darwins. Height 27 inches.

Ellen Willmott (Cottage)

One of the finest May-flowering Tulips. Flowers large, beautifully shaped, soft creamy yellow, deliciously fragrant. Height 30 inches.

Fantasy (Parrot)

The flowers are of unusual and beautiful form, the petals being laciniated, having curious excrescences on the outside. It is not only the rare form of this Tulip or its main color, which is a soft rose-pink; the shadings of the cup are a deep velvety rose color which is more sumptuous than words can tell. They should be left undisturbed for years, and if happy, will soon establish themselves and afford a lovely picture in early spring. All the Bulbocodiums (except Monophyllus) and the Cyclamineus like moisture, and should, therefore, be planted at the foot of the rockery. Bulbocodium monophyllus flourishes in a warm, dry sheltered situation planted in almost pure sand. Triandrus Albus (Angel's Tears) and Juncifolius delight in partial shade and a light, gritty soil, and should be given a well-drained position.

These are the popular Anemone so frequently seen in the florists' shops in the early spring. The flowers are unusually large, with a wide range of rich and brilliant colors.

White Poppy Doz. \$0.85, 100 \$5.75

Large, single white flowers on long stems, resembling a White Poppy.

Babiana (Baboon Flowers)

Stricta, Mixed Shades Doz. \$0.75, 100 \$4.75

Terrestrial Orchid from China and Japan. Easily grown in ordinary garden soil with plenty of moisture. Prefers half shade. Blooms in spring. Hardy under all conditions.

A beautiful small Orchid anyone can grow in the garden or in the house in a small pot filled with ordinary garden soil. Planted in November it will bloom for you early in March. Brodiaea

They are easily naturalized in almost any soil. Plant them about three inches deep and leave them alone. They are especially happy under deciduous trees, in the rock garden, or in rough, gritty soils.

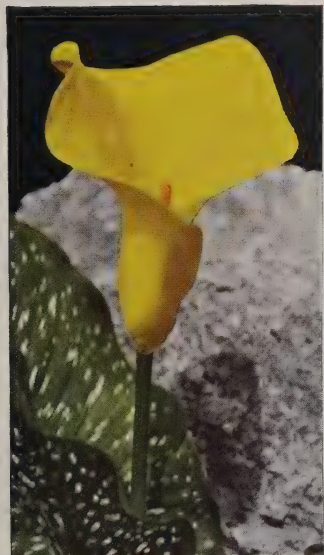

Calochortus - Mariposa Tulips

Until one has seen a good collection of these plants, he has no idea how much Nature can do in the variation of one flower. One to many on a stem, wonderfully marked with eyes and dots and pencillings in rich colors, are characteristics. "Mariposa" is simply the Spanish word for butterfly, and is applied to these Tulips because the eyes and markings are so much like those on a butterfly's wings.

Clavatus Doz. \$2.25, 100 \$14.00
The largest flowered and the stoutest stemmed of all Mariposa Tulips. The blooms, which are shaped like a bowl, are often over 4 inches across, of a deep yellow, and the lower half covered by stiff yellow hairs.

Camassia

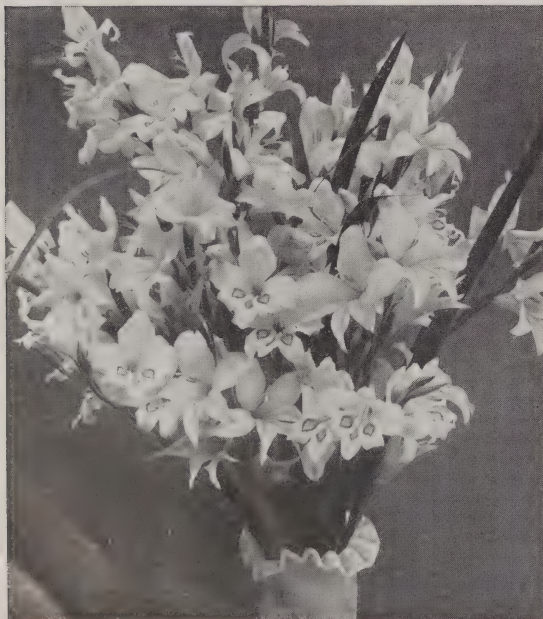
(Hardy)

There are few bulbous plants that meet climatic or soil conditions better or give a more attractive bloom. They are hardy without protection, and thrive either under ordinary garden conditions or when naturalized in open, moist woods or in not too dense a grassy growth. The flower stems are 2 to 4 feet high with as many as a hundred star-shaped flowers measuring 1½ inches across and flowering in long succession.

Cusicki Doz. \$3.00, 100 \$23.00
This is the giant of the race, about twice as tall and large as the popular Esculenta. Like the others it is excellent for cutting, woodland or garden planting, and survives and increases rapidly in the swampiest of places, as well as in the hardest, driest clay.

The finding of these Crocus in bloom is one of the genuine delights of life. Though we may eventually plant them by the thousands or may have been so long at gardening that little surprises us, yet that first Crocus is a great event.

Colchicum - Meadow Saffron

(Giant Autumn-Flowering Crocus)

Colchicum are autumn-flowering bulbs with large Crocus-like blossoms which appear during the months of September and October, without foliage. They are especially recommended for planting between the taller growing rock plants such as Cerastium, Vinca, Pachysandra, and the various Sedums, where their bold, checkered Crocus-like blossoms are seen to the best advantage. Blooming in September and October when flowers in the rockery are scarce, they are especially valuable. They may also be planted in the open woods or in naturalistic plantings of any sort. The bulbs, if kept indoors, will bloom during September and October in the window without any earth or water and after blooming, the bulbs may be planted in early November outdoors, and will not suffer in the least.

The soil should be a mixture of good loam. The bulbs planted early, say August and September, must be placed outdoors until cold weather sets in; must be regularly watered and kept growing all the time. In November, before frosts appear, the pots should be placed in the window of a cool room.

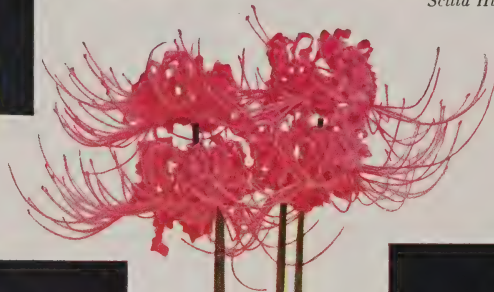

Pallasi (Tataricum) Doz. \$1.75, 100 \$12.00

Grow it in a bowl with pebbles and water or in a pot with some moist earth. A few weeks after planting the flower spikes appear as if by magic. The flowers last for several weeks and are as handsome as orchids. In the South the bulbs may be grown outside where they multiply rapidly. We positively do not guarantee these bulbs to bloom if planted later than September 10th. The bulbs are sent in early August. (Color illustration, page 24.)

Moraea

An interesting group most of which are natives of South Africa, many being new to cultivation. Some are useful for cutting, others for the perennial garden and others still for pot culture and rock gardens. All listed below flower in spring. They show a wide range of colors and vary in height from 6 inches to 3 feet. On most of them the foliage is not important. Same culture as for Freesias.

Glaucoptis (Iris pavonia)

Often called Peacock Iris. Flowers white or light blue with peacock eye at base of outer segments. Stems 10 to 15 inches high. Excellent for cutting, forcing, rock gardens and pots.

Polystachya

Owing to war, Botryoides and Azureum not available this year.

Armeniacum (Heavenly Blue)

Sarniensis (Guernsey Lily)

Ranunculus

Their brilliant lovely globular-shaped flowers are splendid cut flowers and lovely at all times. May be left undisturbed for many years. In the north, tubs may be planted in April and May outdoors and will bloom in July and should be taken up for winter and stored dry until the following season.

New Giant Claremont Hybrids

Culture. It is advisable to avoid wind-swept locations and to protect the early bloom buds in case of late spring frosts. The south or east side of a planting of evergreens, shrubs, wall or building, is a very good location for Tree Peonies. Mulching is advisable the first winter after transplanting. Apply mulch of light material after ground is frozen solid. Any good well drained garden soil is satisfactory. Never cut back woody branches.

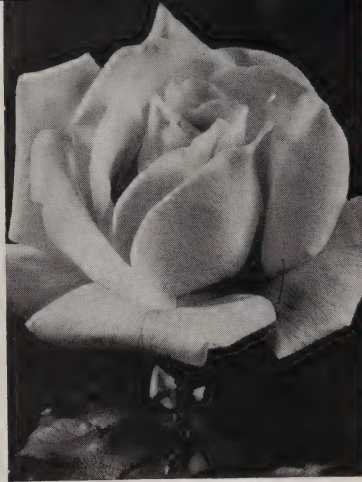

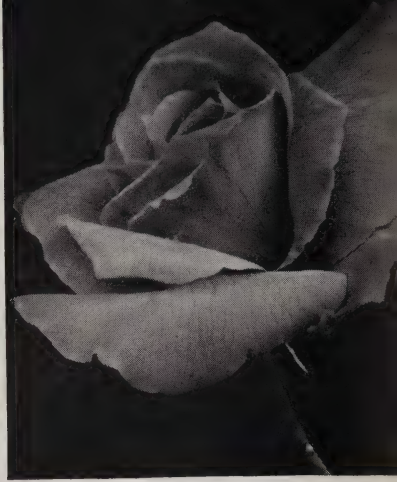

Large-Flowered Cluster Roses

ALSO CALLED FLORIBUNDA ROSES

Floribunda Roses or Cluster Roses are a group of Roses especially produced for mass planting. They are noted for their permanence, continuity of bloom, and ease of culture. Their habit of growth is bushy, and their chief characteristic is sturdiness. The plants are winter-hardy, therefore permanent, and bloom continuously in numerous clusters. Flowers are fairly large, vary from single to full double, and include the entire range of colors of Roses. A distinctive feature is the long-lastingness of the flowers in all weathers. They are best planted closely—about 14 inches apart—in large groups and masses, in beds, so they will blanket the ground. Groups of 3 or 5 of a variety placed in front of the shrub border create a superb color display. They are more effective and just as colorful as tender annuals.

LARGE-FLOWERING CLUSTER ROSES (Polyantha)

Growing 18 to 24 inches high.

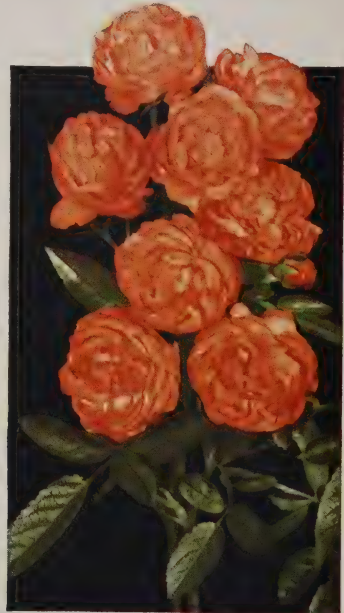

A Message from M. H. Horvath

My interest was early given to the development of better hardy climbing Roses. In 1892 I obtained the first hybrid with the Rosa Wichuraiana of Japan, thus beginning the modern strain of large-flowered hardy climbing Roses. In 1897 I exhibited 14 new varieties at the first show held by the American Rose Society in the famous Eden Musée of New York City. These were seen and admired by many rosarians, with the result that many similar hybrids were made.

The continuous inbreeding in the attempt to get larger size and brighter color into the Wichuraiana strain weakened it to the point where most of the varieties failed in winter hardiness. Naturally there resulted a demand for hardier and more sturdy Roses in varieties which would not require pampering but which, with reasonable care, would live through most winters without loss.

Responding to this need, my new Rose originations cover the full range of colors, and many of these new climbing Roses have flowers as large and fine as any existing Hybrid Tea. Further, as Dooryard or Hedge Roses there has resulted a form and shape of plant not hitherto seen. See Mabelle Stearns, page 60. These results were accomplished through painstaking and eventually successful experiments in the introduction of other species strains not previously used.

I am working still further to augment these qualities so that Roses may be wintered over successfully even in the far North.

It has been arranged to have The Wayside Gardens Company introduce and disseminate these new Roses of my origination. Several dozens of new creations are under test, but only those of decided merit will be marketed. The varieties offered this year, each one well worth while in itself, form, I believe, the beginning of a new and most valuable strain of Roses. They will be offered under the designation of "Horvath's Setigera and Xanthina Hybrids."

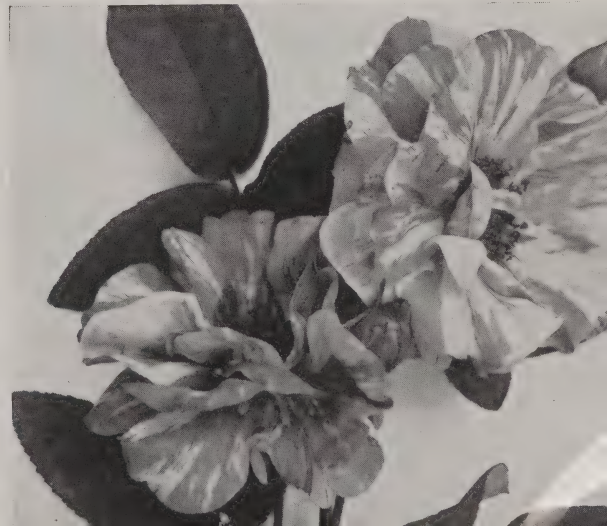

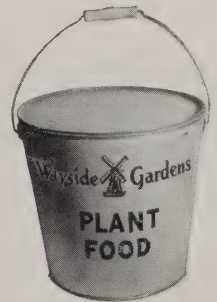

CHRISTMAS ROSE and LENTEN ROSE

There are two distinct types, one, Christmas Rose, flowering in late winter, and the other, Lenten Rose, in spring. Both are valuable for garden decoration because of their flowering during the dull period of the year.

Culture. Require to be grown in a cool, moist, shady position, such as under the shade of trees or among ferns. The ideal soil is a retentive loam, freely mixed with leaf mold and well-rotted manure. As Helleborus are impatient of disturbance at the roots it is advisable to select a position for them where they will not be required to be disturbed for many years. Planting may be done in fall or spring, 12 inches apart. Each autumn add a top dressing of leaf mold and well-rotted manure, and let it lie on the surface. In summer give plenty of water.

NIGER (Strong 3-yr.-old, field-grown plants)

Helleborus Niger is a dwarf growing hardy plant, able to withstand temperatures many degrees below zero. Its palmlike leaves are evergreen and of leathery substance. In December, January and February, depending upon locality where grown, large, single, white, bell-like flowers which last for weeks, are produced regardless of cold or snow.

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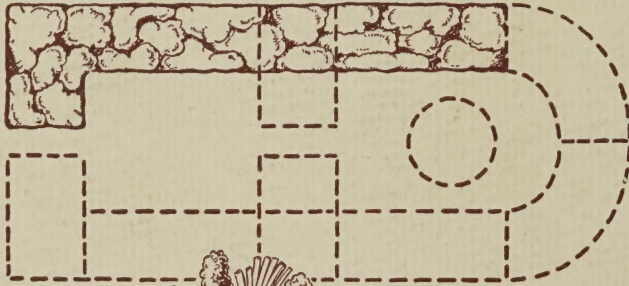
