SWEET WILLIAM Homeland. Large trusses of bloom of a most unusual color, dark rich red with a large sharply defined clear white center. Plants sell on sight when in bloom, besides giving splendid cutting material at a time when annuals are not yet in flower. Trade pkt., 50c; $1 / 4$ oz., $\$ 1.00$.



SAPONARIA VACCARIA ROSE. A fine annual for cutting. Sometimes called "Pink Gypsophila." Light graceful sprays of glistening pink flowers produced in greatest profusion. Silver Medal All-America 1943 America is the all-double type, of medium size, carnation-flowered and rose-pink in color, somewhat a reminder of the color of Gladiolus America, which for many years was our most popular Glad. America Petunia is a hybrida nana, an abundant bloomer from early summer to frosts, for bedding and cutting. It is uniform and true 200 seeds, $75 ; 500$ seeds, $\$ 1.75 ; 1000$ seeds, $\$ 3.00$; 164 oz ., $\$ 11.00$.
MARIGOLD, Sunkist. Silver Medal All-America 1943. It is a dwarf, compact, very early, continuous blooming, double French Harmony type. It comes practically true, 6 to 12 inches tall, and the many attractive flowers are to $11 / 2 \mathrm{in}$. across. For bedding, edging and pot-culture. Companion variety for the already popular Butterball. Trade pkt., $35 \mathrm{c} ; 1 / 4 \mathrm{oz} ., 70 \mathrm{c} ;$ oz., $\$ 2.40$. PETUNIA Igloo. Bronze Medal All-America 1943. A new extra compact white Petunia. The chief advantages of this new Petunia are its free blooming habit and its compact and uniform growth. The flowers are medium size, pure white with a slight yellowing in the throat, and are $100 \%$ true. Every flower is just exactly alike. The fact that the plant remains so uniformly compact throughout the entire season (if the soil is not too rich) makes it ideal for borders. Every plant is a perfect mound of white 8 to 10 inches high, reminding one of an Eskimo igloo. Trade pkt., $50 \mathrm{c} ; 1 / 32 \mathrm{oz}$., $\$ 1.00$.
ASTER, Extra Early Giant Crego, Navy Blue. Honorable Mention All-America 1943. First of a new race of large flowered, early Asters. In fact, it seems as early as Queen of the Market class, so should be quite satisfactory also in the South. While not wilt-resistant, it has fair growth, true and uniform 4 inch flowers on 12 to 20 inch branching plants and averaging 10 inch, strong cutting stems. ## LILY FORCING

At the present time there are several kinds of lilies that will take the place of those formerly imported from Japan and used for forcing. These fall into groups both as to the flower and also culture. Creole is a lily that has been grown in the south for a number of years, but only in recent years has enough of it been forced to be able to learn muct about it. Floridiii and Shangri-La are types of Creole lilies requiring the same treatments and having similiar grow th. Croft, Coos, Kenyon Davidson (Early estern, B1), and Ace are from the west coast ment and timing for best results. Howardii is a Harrisii type and requires the ment and timing for best results. Howardif is a Harrisil type and requires the forcing but since it is not a white lily and better varieties are now available, its use is not much recommended at the present time. White Queen is being grown from seed but since it does not have the substance of the other varieties and requires over a year in the greenhouse, we will not discuss it here.

Because the Creole types are grown in the south and have an earlier harvesting season, they are more rapidly grown for early cut flower trade than the western lilies. They have size and substance and can be grown on long heavy stems, and have been in good demand in that work. Naturally by storage treatment they may be held for later planting. They are better grown at a cooler temperature, starting them $50^{\circ}$, then later raising to $55^{\circ}$, which suits them well. They require a little more care during the early stages, as they do not make as strong root growth at the base. Since the older plantings of Creoles were not kept from mosaic, much rogueing has been necessary and all stocks of it on the market may not be properly rogued. Since it spreads rapidly by aphis infestation, all stock should be kept clean and mosaic types kept away from clean types.

The west coast types require the same treatment as Giganteum, preferring 60 degrees except during that period between emergence from the soil and approximately 8 inches high, at which stage buds are normally set. The temperature should be reduced during this period in order to increase the bud count ( $52-55$ degrees). To time them the same rules would apply that do to the gigs, and if necessary to push them, they may be handled the same way with similar
results. results.

We have made many experiments with American grown lilies and have dozens more at the present time. Exact rules cannot be laid down on any of these lilies, but certain rules seem to be evident. All of these American lilies are normally heavy foliaged and good growers, so need plenty of room and light. They need a well drained and well aerated soil and should be planted deep enough so that the feeder roots on the stem wrind develop property. If they have this kind of soil they can stand some fairly nutrient levels after they are growing well, but not during the rooting stage. Avoid a high nitrate soil, particularly greenhouse bench soil that has considerable feed in it. Bud blasting may occur if nutrient levels are not balanced, if soil is not aerated or if high temperature with poor lighting is practiced. They will not root as well at cool temperatures as they will at growing temperatures. Storage treatments should be given, the amount and temperature depending upon the harvesting date, the intended forcing date and the type as well as the size. While considerable work has been done by us on this we are carrying on extensive tests all the time, to further our knowledge on this vital point.

One final statement-we consider American grown bulbs better than any Japanese bulbs that we have had for many years, and we can continue to have them better.
