LLIES are so beautiful, so fragrant, we are likely to think them too fine for the amateur to grow. But many are hardy, thrifty flowers, capable of surviving conditions which would overcome flowers much less beautiful. Grow them in the border in small groups, with background, where their beauty has a suitable setting for its display. They blossom, as a rule, in midsummer, when fine flowers are at a premium.

Outdoor Culture-When planting lilies out-of-doors, see that they have a well drained position, and where they will be shaded from very hot sun. Such places can usually be found around the shrub borders, and in the hardy plant border. Never mix manure in the soil around lilies, but enrich with a standard commercial plant food or with bone meal. Many varietics are termed "stemrooters," that is, they develop roots on the stem up to two or three inches from the ground. These roots are voracious feeders, and on them depend greatly the number and size of flowers. When they appear, the plant should receive a topdressing of good rich soil on which they can feed freely. Spade over the ground thoroughly to a depth of 18 inches before planting lilies. Plant the bulbs 4 to 6 inches deep, depending on their size and the soil, deeper in light soil. Put some sand under and around the bulbs, and after covering protect with six or eight inches of leaves or other litter, which must be removed in late spring.

Indoor Culture-Lilies should be potted immediately upon receipt, if intended for growing in pots or for forcing. In potting use a compost of fibrous loam and sweet decomposed leaf soil, with plenty of coarse sand or a mixture of good peat, loam, and sand, adding to the compost a few pieces of charcoal. See that the pot is well drained. The bulb should be set about half-way down in the pot and barely covered with soil, thus leaving room to top-dress and fill the pot with more soil when stem-roots appear above the bulb. After potting, give a thorough watering and set outside in a cold frame or shady situation, then cover with ashes or long straw. After they have stood from three weeks to a month and thoroughly rooted, bring inside, in a temperature of about $60^{\circ}$; let the plants grow slowly under a bench or some other suitable place until about 6 inches high; then place on top of the bench in full light. An occasional application of liquid cow manure, starting about six weeks before flowering time, will stimulate the plant wonderfully. Thorough rooting is essential.

## Lilium Canadense <br> (Meadow Lily)

In the cc - winter states they should have the protection of a heavy mulch, applied after the ground has frozen and should be planted in a location where spring growth is not unduly stimulated, so they will not get a premature start, and suffer injury from belated frosts.

Bulbs should be dug each year after foliage has turned brown. They should be cured quickly in a dry location, and only the largest bulbs should be replanted for flowering. The smaller bulbs can be grown in a nursery row until they reach flowering size. The increase is rapid and bulbs which are not lifted will crowd and stop flowering.

## Forcing Daffodils

DAFFODILS are excellent subjects for indoor growing in bulb pans in soil or fibre. These require more skill in growing than do Paper White Narcissi. Success depends on the extent to which fine roots are developed before the pots are brought to the light. These

roots develop best when the pots are about fifteen degrees above freezing. A pit in the garden which is protected from surface water, so it will not fill, is an excellent place to store the bulbs. The pots may be covered with leaves, straw, or even with ashes or sand; and brought in after eight weeks, when it is desired to begin forcing them Figure on not less than five months before flowers are produced. After being brought into the house, a temperature of 60 degrees is sufficient until the formation of buds begins, and the best flowers will then be formed in a temperature of 68 degrees. All the light possible should be given after top growth begins. King Alfred is easiest to grow.

## Seeds for Your Victory Garden <br> After the final crops in your Victory garden have been harvested, <br> the ground freezes hard, and they will make a crop much earlier than

but before the ground has frozen, the soil may be prepared and some crops sown for next spring.

Perennial crops may be planted, such as Egyptian or red perennial onions, which grow from "top sets" produced by the plants, which make no seed; and rhubarb roots. These are available early and may be set out whenever ground is ready for them.

Leaf lettuce and spinach may be sown this fall, even in areas where
from spring sown seed. Sow it as nearly as you can judge just before the ground freezes, and cover deeper than in the spring. After the ground freezes mulch the bed to keep the frost in. Remove the mulch when the ground thaws out in the spring.

# Annual Flower Seeds for Fall Sowing 

WHEN you sow seeds of annuals in Fall, cally all hardy annuals will produce stronger, sturdier plants with earlier bloom by this method. Even when spring sowing is desirable, experienced gardeners also sow in fall because they then have a continuous season of bloom. Also, they can sow at their leisure instead of trying to plant everything in a few short weeks. Do not be in too much of a hurry to sow

The ideal time is just before the ground
freezes for the winter. November 15 th is early enough in normal seasons in the vicinity of Chicago and New York. If the ground has been prepared in advance, sowings can also be made during winter thaws

A fine seed bed is desirable. No covering of any kind is needed unless there is danger of washing or from birds, in which case a light, loose covering of evergreen boughs can be used. Plant at half the depth used when sowing seed in spring. Broadcast all small seed.

Varieties preceeded by star are especially recommended for sowing in the fall above your bulbs. They will grow in the spring and blossom after the bulbs have gone. Their shallow roots will not interfere with the bulbs maturing properly; their growth will conceal the bulb foliage after it grows yellow and unsightly
Pansies and Violas must be sown early in September, but should then be protected with straw or glass sash during the winter.
