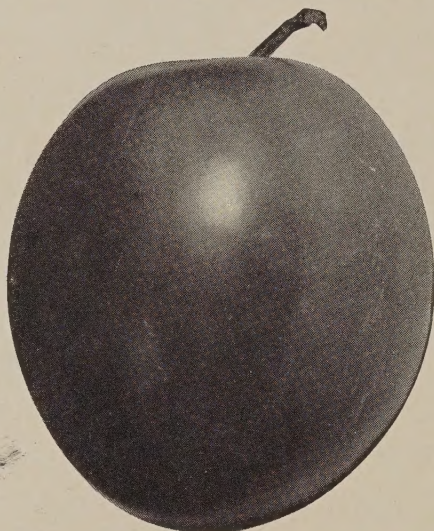

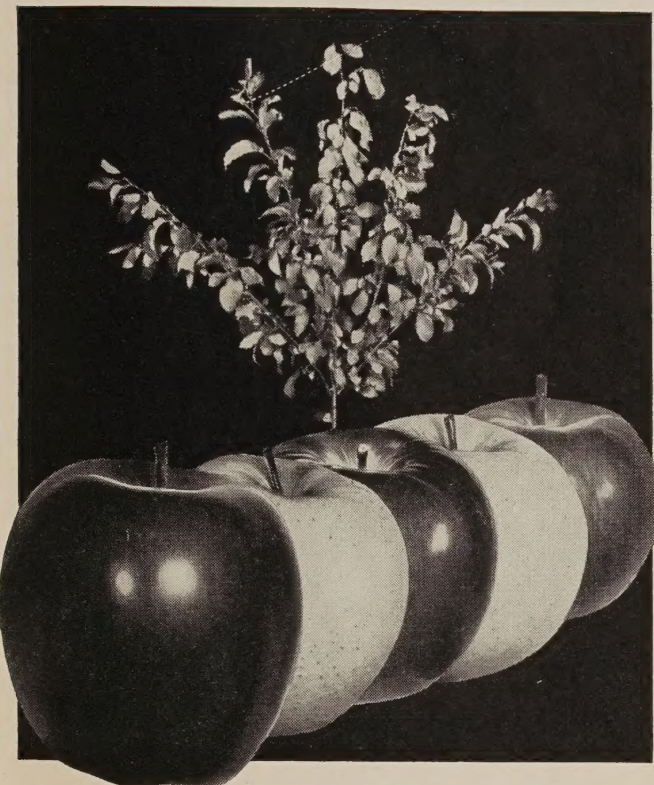

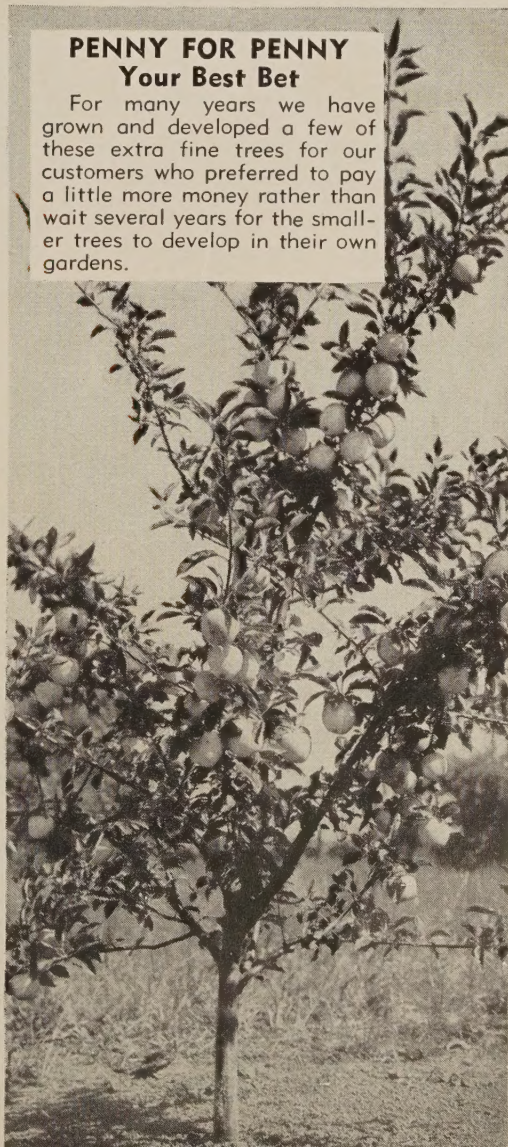

PLANT this FALL!

The Advantages of Fall Planting. Leading Horticulturists, Growers and Nurserymen everywhere recommend it. A few reasons are:

1. Fall-planted trees make root growth during the warm periods of winter.
2. Stock is absolutely dormant in the fall. Sometimes in the spring we get warm weather and buds start before stock can be shipped.
3. Trees planted in the fall become well established before spring and start to grow quicker than spring-planted trees.
4. Flowering shrubs set in the fall bloom profusely the first summer.
5. When you plant in the fall you have the advantage of late fall and early spring rains, which very often do not come after spring planting.

EARLY McINTOSH. For home orchard or commercial use, this is the ideal variety to plant. Tree vigorous grower. It is an annual bearer. Fruit same size, quality and flavor as McIntosh Red. Late August.

LODI. Yellow fruit. Large, vigorous. Mid-August.

MELBA. New. Bright crimson, good size, pleasantly flavored. Early August.

Winter Varieties

CORTLAND. Beautiful red Apple, larger than McIntosh. Matures a month later. Excellent quality, keeps late in winter and can be handled and shipped like the hardiest market varieties. Excellent for culinary purposes. November to March.

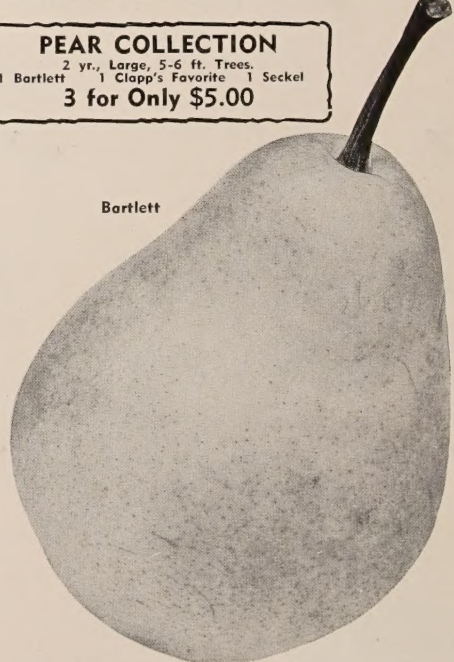

All Evergreens Moss Balled

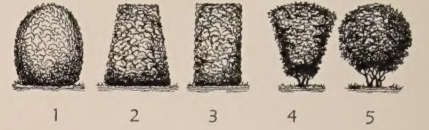
All evergreens are taken up expertly to secure the tender roots, the soil removed, and then the roots dipped in Transplantone and balled and burlapped in wet moss. By this method we are now able to eliminate 50 to 60 pounds of soil, making low cost express shipments possible. This method also insures excellent growth and quicker root action. In planting remove burlap and use peat moss in hole around roots.
