

ROSE O' DAY

(Rosemarie Pfitzer x Dream of Beauty) (Seedling No. 1-39) (Early) (Large Formal)

Rose O' Day possesses a new and unusual shade of rosy lavender or medium rose, being several shades more red than Elizabeth the Queen. A deeper throat overlaid by a still deeper line adds richness of color. Opens ten 6" to 6½" florets in a formal, doublerow arrangement, on stems that are noticeably straight as arrows. This stalwart, precision-built giant has excellent habits in every respect, growing 5 feet tall with a 30" flowerhead, and produces plenty of bulblets which germinate well. Produces well from small bulbs and opens well in water, holding its color to the very tip. Few seedlings have given us as much satisfaction as has Rose O' Day. We believe that it is destined to become a great commercial. Champlain View Gardens, Burlington, Vermont, have purchased half the stock and are co-introducing it with us this

MYRTH

(Solveig x Picardy) x (Picardy) (Mid-season) (Medium Decorative) (Formerly known as Priscilla and advertised in the Year Book as Sweet Sue)

Myrth is a concentration of beauty. a happy combination of elegant grace, purity of color and robust vigor. One is immediately entranced with the mellow light pink, which blends into a large creamy throat. An intense frilling adds laciness to the whole. An ideal florist flower making up beautifully in floral pieces. Last summer we noted the lower floret or two were misplaced on about 10% of the spikes, otherwise there were absoluetly no deficiencies of growth. Myrth is precocious, producing tall, willowy spikes, with 20 buds, 5 inch florets and 5 open from small bulbs. Very prolific.



(Picardy x No. 169 (Seedling of Betty Nuthall) (Seedling No. 35-37, also known as Peaches) (Mid-season) (Large Decorative)

China Maid has color appeal, size, and good all-around performance. It is an unusual shade of clear glowing salmon, the color accentuated by a warm yellow throat and midribs. The florets are saucerlike in form, alternate in arrangement and supported by tall, graceful stems. One of the largest in size; as one garden visitor put it, "With florets as big as your hand." SNOWSPRITE

CANDELABRA
(Amrita x Arethusa) (Seedling No. 95-39)
(Early) (Medium Decorative)

Winner of American Home Achievement Medal at the 1943 Iowa State Show. Candelabra instantly charms its admirers with its grace of form and beauty of color. Combined with its beauty are traits that indicate Candelabra will win for itself a place in gladiolus fame. It definitely fills a gap in the uncrowded yellow color class. The beautifully ruffled florets are of a clear lemon yellow with virtually no markings. It opens five or six perfectly placed florets on a flowerhead of 19 buds under average conditions. Physically, the plant is strong and robust, growing to a height of five feet. Happily, it also produces fine healthy bulbs and propagates well.



- ALADDIN (Palmer) (Midseason) Large beautifully ruffled deep salmon with cream blotch. This year Aladdin was very beautiful for us. Oftimes it is inclined to grow short from the ground to the first floret, although it throws a long flowerhead. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (S. 6-.15; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.15.
- ALGONQUIN (Palmer) (Early) One of our favorite bright scarlet commercials. Opens 8 wide open blooms on a straight stem. (L. 2-.20; 10-.65 (M. 2-.15; 10-.50) Bbts. 100-.20.
- AMULET (Palmer) (Early mid-season) Beautifully ruffled medium buff. Very lovely in bouquets. Grows quite short. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- ANNAMAE (Pommert) (Early) Good early pure white comercial. Straight stem and good placement. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 6-.15; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.15.
- ARETHUSA (Fischer) (Early mid-season) Large and consistently tall growing ruffled buff. Very good seed parent. A really fine glad. (L. 10-.50 (M. 10-.35) Bbts. 100-.15.
- ASOKA (Fischer) (Very early) A bright tall red seedling of ours that we are listing because of its earliness. Opens 4 or 5 well placed blooms. Doesn't propagate very fast. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 6-.15; 10-.25) Bbts. 10-.20.
- AUTUMN GOLD (Prestgard) (Late) A very valuable addition to the yellow class. A medium decorative that opens five 5 inch softly ruffled deep golden florets on medium spikes that never crook. Blooms well from smaller sizes. A very good commercial. Mr. E. H. Lins of Cologne, Minn., writes "I've never seen a lovelier yellow than your Autumn Gold. Color, substance, and texture are really good." Does not grow as tall as we would like, but nevertheless, nearly 100% of the spikes are cuttable for the market. Fast propagator. (L. 1-.20; 10-\$1.60) (M. 1-.15; 10-\$1.20) (S. 1-.10; 10-.80) Bbts. 15-.15; 100-.75.
- AVALON (Marshall) (Mid-season) In Avalon we have a combination of vigor, height, color and many open, but an unhappy habit, like New Era, of openners of flowerhead. Nine 5-inch florets blooming on a 25-inch flowerhead would be typical blooming habits of this variety. (L. 1-.20; 10-\$1.60) (M. 1-.15) (S. 1-.10) Bbts. 10-.15; 100-.75.
- BADGER BEAUTY (Krueger) (Mid-season)
 Beautiful lavender with creamy throat. Looks
 promising as a commercial. Stock is scarce.
 (M. 1-.15).
- BARCAROLE (Palmer) (Late mid-season) Heavily ruffled large orange that opens up to 6 well placed blooms. Although it is not always as tall as we would like, it produces a lovely spike. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) Bbts. 100-.15.
- BEACON (Palmer) (Mid-season) One of the very best cut flowers on the market. Opens 8 well placed blooms on tall straight willowy stems. This rose scarlet with a cream throat is as fine for exhibition purposes as commercial. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- BLACK DIAMOND (Gelser) (Early) If you like the dark ones, you will be won by the velvety sheen, rich coloring and ruffling of Black Diamond. I believe this Morocco seedling is the most luxurious of the dark reds. (L. 1-.50; 10-\$4) (M. 1-.35; 10-\$2.80) (S. 1-.20; 10-\$1.60) Bbts. 4-.20; 30-\$1.

- BLACK OPAL (Errey) (Mid-season) Magnificent tall deep red. The 9-10 round florets are perfectly placed on a stretchy flower head. One of the best dark reds. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) Bbts. 100-.15.
- BLAZE (Lins) (Mid-season) Commercial light scarlet self. Produces 5 or 6 florets on a straight stem. Mad propagator. Makes a fine cut flower. (L. -.10; 10-.80) (M. 2-.15; 10-.60) (S. 4-.15; 10-.35) Bbts. 50-.30; 100-.50.
- BLUE ADMIRAL (Christ) (Mid-season) Tall dark blue that opens 5 or 6 blooms. One of the best deep blues if it propagated faster. (L. 10-.50)
- BLUE BEAUTY (Pfitzer) (Early) One of the best medium blues. It is a tall, strong grower and produces up to 7 large wide open bloom. (L. 10-.60) (M. 10-.40) (S. 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.20.
- BLUE RUFFLES (Brauer) (Mid-season) This daintily ruffled delicate blue was a most pleasing addition to our garden. We would gladly increase its height if it were possible. The average fancier would be delighted with this pastel blue. (L. 1-40) (M. 1-30).
- who are seeking something unusual should try Bolero. It is a ruffled heavy-textured smoky orange with a deep red blotch. Opens about 6 blooms on a tall, straight stem. (L. 1-.40; 10-\$3.20) (M. 1-.25) Bbts. 5-.15; 10-.25.
- BONNIE BRIAN (Stockton) (Mid-season) Satisfactory as a commercial, but soon wears out to the connoisseur. However, this coppery pink with scarlet throat markings appears to perform differently in various localities. Strong grower. (L. 1-.15; 10-\$1.10) Bbts. 10-
- CAMELLIA (Palmer) (Mid-season) Beauty of form in plain-petaled gladioli probably reaches its peak in this exquisitely rounded and recurved variety. The delicate blush of pink over cream adds exquisiteness of color. The tiny mark of scarlet deep in the throat adds a striking touch of punctuation to this tailored flower. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- CAMROSE (Twomey) (Mid-season) For sheer ethereal beauty this glad of shell pink, shading to cream in the throat was unsurpassed in our field. Other growers report that it often crooks but our spikes were consistently straight. Planting should be arranged so that it doesn't bloom in the heat of the summer. Opens up to 8 well placed blooms. Fine propagator. (L. 1-.10; 10-.80) (M. 2.15; 10-.60) (S. 4-.15; 10-.30) Bbts. 100-.25.
- CANDELABRA (Fischer) (Early) Winner of American Home Medal. Beautifully ruffled light yellow Candelabra is sure to win your whole-hearted admiration. Possesses perfect clarity of color. This medium decorative opens 6 perfectly placed blooms on tall, straight stems. Read the description under 1944 releases. (L. 1-\$2; 10-\$16).
- CAPRI (Fischer) (Late mid-season) This is the huskiest, most prolific glad we grow. It opens five 5 inch ruffled cream blooms on tall stems that never crook. Capri was disappointing this past summer since it lacked clarity of color. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- CARILLON (Palmer) (Early mid-season) Light rose pink with creamy white throat. Produces beautiful blooms when it blooms fairly large bulbs. Averages 6 medium large wide-open blooms on straight stems. (L. 2-.20; 10-.80) (M. 2-.15; 10-.50) (S. 4-.15; 10-.30) Bbts. 100-.25.

- CENTENNIAL (Fischer) (Mid-season) We have have had some perfectly marvelous spikes of this soft scarlet stalwart saucer-like giant this year. Opens 5-6 large blooms on a long flower head. Centennial blooms much more beautifully when it is planted early and from large bulbs. Has won high honors at several shows. (L. 1-50; 10-\$3.50) (M. 1-.35; 10-\$2.70) (S. 1-.25; 10-\$2) Bbts. 10-.15; 50-.50.
- CHARMAINE (New) (Early) A cut flower variety which has gained much popularity. The color of rose appears dull when it is planted next to Early Rose; however, there is ample room for both glads. Occasionally the 5 or 6 blooms open on rather short stems. (L. 2-.15; 10-.65) (M. 2-.10; 10-.40) (S. 4-.10; 10-.25) Bbts. 50-.15; 100-.25.
- CHIEF MULTNOMAH (Ellis) (Mid-season) A dark smoky enhanced by a red blotch in the throat. One of our favorite smokie. Tall and very vigorous plants produce 4-6 blooms on lengthy spikes. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 2-.10 10-.40) (S. 4-.10; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.25.
- CHINA MAID (Fischer) (Mid-season) Cne of our introductions this year that has always created a lot of intere t in the seedling patch. Performed admirably in Oregon and at home this year with a generous amount of increase from both places. For full description see 1944 releases. (Any size bulb .50) Bbts. 4-.25.
- CHOCOLATE CREAM (Lins) (Mid-season) Pale chocolate background lighted up with a large sharp cream throat blotch. This unusual novelty was quite short this year which may have been due to the fact that it was planted on a poor spot of land. (L. 1-.20; 10-\$1.60) (M. 1-.15; 10-\$1.20) Bbts. 10-.15.
- COLONIAL MAID (Young) (Mid-season) This tall, prolific pale lavender commercial has won numerous awards at various shows this year. Its 6 or 7 pale lavender blooms are flecked with a deeper lavender. Consistently straight and a vigorous grower. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 6-.15; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.20.
- COMMANDER KOEHL (Pfitzer) (Mid-season) Large blood red, opening 5 six inch florets of triangular form. An old favorite since it is a tall vigorous grower. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.15.
- COONEY LASS (Krueger) (Mid-season) Medium tall clear rosy salmon pink. Good grower and propagator. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3.-15) Bbts. 100-.30.
- CORAL GLOW (Ellis) (Mid-season) Tall strong coral orange. Its one fault is that the flower head is sometimes short. The large brilliantly colored florets are very beautiful. (L. 2-.15; 10-.65) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 6-.15; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.30.
- CORONA (Palmer) (Mid-season) One of the season's most captivating flowers was tall, distinctive Corona. It comes well-named since a corona of light rose pink encircles a creamy throat. Believe it to be one of Palmer's best. Opens 6-8 large, wide-open blooms on a lengthy straight spike. (L. 1-.20) (M. 1-.15) S. 1-.10) Bbts. 20-.15.
- DIANE (Krueger) (Late) A salmon orange which opens 6-7 large blooms. We liked this sturdy cream-throated orange, but Carl reported that it didn't do so well in Oregon. (L. 1-.15; 10-\$1.20) (M. 2-.20) (S. 3-.15) Bbts. 50-.25.




LAVENDER AND GOLD

- DR. C. HOEG (Hoeg) (Mid-season) Glossy, velvety maroon with a fine line of silvery gray around the edge of each petal. Produces uniformly long spikes and has unusually cleancut round florets. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- DR. F. BENNETT (Diener) (Mid-season) Brilliant, slightly ruffled scarlet with small white spear head in throat. An old favorite commercial. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- DISCOVERY (Baerman) (Early mid-season) It was Carl's fortune to grow Discovery and Ophir, which Elmer Gove is introducing this year, from single seeds, original bulbs, and on for several years, growing them for Ralph Baerman. These sister seedlings were individual and distinct among the hundreds of other seedlings that bloomed each year. With much gratification he watches them come before the public. Both are ruffled light yellows with a contrasting cherry blotch. Discovery has the larger florets and is taller, while Ophir is a deeper yellow with a sharper, more contrasting blotch. The latter is more prolific and a little earlier. With eagerness we shall watch which becomes the most popular. Discovery won a first at the Iowa State Show in 1943. (L. 1-\$1.50; 10-\$10-\$12) (M. 1-\$1; 10-\$8) (S. 1-50) Bbts. 2-.25; 10-\$12.
- DUNA (Palmer) (Mid-season) Exquisite soft flesh pink variety of commercial value. Lovely warm color. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- EARLY ROSE (Jack) (Early) Very popular pleasing shade of medium rose. A florists' and fanciers' favorite. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 6-15; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.20.
- EDITH GRACE (Harder) (Late) This would be a fine glad if its color were always clear. When grown well it is white with a rich wine blotch. Opens about 7 blooms on strong, straight, and tall stems. (L: 1-.15; 10-\$1.10) (M. 1-.10; 10-.80) (S. 3-.15; 10-.40) Bbts. 15-.15; 100-.50.
- EDVARD GRIEG. (Prestgard) (Early) Best "blue" of recent introduction. Color similar to Ave Maria. Tall, opens 7 on a 19 bud spike from medium bulbs. Moderate propagator, but produces very large bulblets which germinate and grow well. (L. 1-.35; 10-\$2.80) (M. 1-.25; 10-\$2) (S. 1-.15) Bbts. 10-.15; 35-.30.
- ELIZABETH THE QUEEN (White) (Mid-season) This variety deserves the popularity thus far received and is destined to be grown for years to come. Beautiful shade of lavender with a darker line. Was inclined to be crowded from the large bulbs grown in Oregon this year. but the placement was perfect here. This lovely distinctive lavender is one of our ten favorite glads. (L. 1-.60; 10-\$4.50) (M. 1-.40) (S. 1-.30) Bbts 10-.50; 100-\$4.
- grown this light pure pink can be magnificent. We have also seen it when it was short and lacked color appeal. Strong husky grower. (L. 2-20; 10-80) (M. 2-.15; 10-.60) (S. 3-.10) Bbts. 10-.10; 100-.50.
- FAIR ANGEL (Hatch) (Early) If glad fanciers could see the glorious blooms we grew of this variety this year, it would be a "must have" on everyone's list. Won the grand championship at the Iowa State Show. Opens 7 or 8 slightly ruffled round white florets perfectly placed on a fine tall stem. Bears all the earmarks of an outstanding commercial. (L. 1-.60) (M. 1-.40) (S. 1-.30) Bbts. 10-.35.

- FLORA FARMER (Quackenbush) (Mid-season)
 Pure pink with cream throat. A fancier's
 flower. Some of our spikes were very beautiful, while others were more ordinary. (L. 215; 10-.65) Bbts. 100-.25.
- FRANCES M. IRWIN (Wilson) (Late mid-season) This glad comes in a color class that is hard to get. An appealing medium rose pink with a darker contrasting blotch. A fine flower in every way with fine long heads, but with us the lower florets start blooming about 10 inches from the ground. Run-away propagator. (L. 1-.30) (M. 1-.20) (S. 1-.15) Bbts. 10-.15; 100-\$1.
- FRECKLES (Fischer) (Mid-season) One can easily see how this glad acquired its name. A sight worth seeing was a large vase of this coppery orange with itts brown "freckles" as exhibited in our living room last summer. Definitely "something different." (L. 1-20; 10-\$1.50) (M. 1-.15; 10-\$1.20) (S. 1-.10; 10-.80) Bbts. 20-.15.
- GARDENIA (Scheer) (Early) Although the glad is not at all similar to the gardenia flower, nevertheless, we liked this cream decorative glad. We have only grown it one year, but it looked promising as a commercial from what we saw of it. Wonderful propagator. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 6-.15) Bbts. 100-.25.
- GLOAMING (Zimmer) (Early) One of the tallest and most perfect cutting varieties we grow. Produces a graceful long ribbon of white throated light purple blooms. Some years its bulbs are subject to disease. (L. 10-.50) S. 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.15.
- GOLDENHEART (Fischer) (Late) Golden yellow blending to a rich light salmon at the edges in an almost picotee effect. It is an unusually vigorous grower. Planting stock accidentially mixed with a small tray of Snowsprite so we are just offering large for sale. If someone wishes to try some medium or small, the usual price will be charged, but ample overcount will be given. (L. 10-.50).
- GOLDSTAUB (Pfitzer) (Early) The first yellow to bloom. Fills the bill as a dependable early yellow commercial. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts 100-.15.
- GRETA GARBO (Pfitzer) (Mid-season) A pleasing color combination of pale apricot or buff pink. Opens 5 or 6 perfectly formed, finely placed flowers on a medium tall stem. Healthy grower and a rapid propagator. (L. 2-20; 10-.80) (M. 2-.15; 10-.50) (S. 3-.10) Bbts. 15-.10; 100-.35.
- HARMONY (Fischer) (Late mid-season) Due to the fact that it was a poor propagator this year, Harmony disappointed us. In the past, it propagated as fast as Autumn Gold, but it took a beating from last year's blight. We are hoping that after several years' good growing, it will produce as many bulblets as it did formerly. Harmony is immaculately beautiful with its five waxy, ruffled 6 inch florets on tall massive spikes. To obtain show table spikes this regal cream should be grown from large bulbs. (L. 1-.20; 10-\$1.50) (M. 1-.15; 10-\$1.20) (S. 1-.10) Bbts. 10-.20; 100-\$1.
- HIGH FINANCE (Wilson) (Late mid-season) Smoky light orange gray with cream throat blotch. Since we haven't seen much of this glad, it is difficult to adequately judge its performance. (L. 1-.35) (M. 1-.20) (S. 1-.15) Bbts. 10-.20; 100-\$1.
- INTERMEZZO (Quackenbush) (Mid-season) This tall, healthy cream lacked clarity of color with us. Good grower. (L. 1-.25; 10-\$2) (M. 1-.15; 10-\$1.20) (S 1-.10; 10-.80) Bbts. 100-.25.

- IRAK (Mitsch) (Late) Identical to Bagdad except that it is gray in color. (L 10-.50) (M, 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- IVORY KEYS (Ellis) (Mid-season) Tall growing large commercial cream with yellow throat. (L. 2-.15; 10-.60) (M. 3-.15) Bbts. 100-.30.



- LEGEND (Fischer) (Mid-season) Tall, fine, and wonderfully delicate. Many spikes photographically perfect in their broad, massive beauty; real show spikes! This warm light pink has a happy trait of producing better flowers from No. 5 bulbs than many varieties do from No. 1's. If you like light pinks, you will surely like this one. - MARGARET BEATON (Twomey) (Early midseason) Rich snowy-white with a tiny spark of vermillion pink deep in the throat. Spikes are tall and free from crooking. Takes its place in the hall of gladiolus fame. (L. 2-.20; 10-.70) (M. 2-.15; 10-.50) (S. 4-.15; 10-.30) Bbts. 100-.20.
- MARGARET FULTON (Ogrodnichek) (Early) Recommended as one of the best all-around glads. Rich salmon cut flower of distinctive clean-cut form. (L. 10-.50- (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.
- MARGUERITE (Pommert) (Mid-season) Attractively ruffled, massive watermelon pink blending to a soft yellow throat. In Oregon it produced the largest flower from a bulblet that Carl has ever seen, a 34" flowerhead, with 17 buds and 4 open. He grew this in his trial patch there. (L. 1-.20; 10-\$1.60) (M. 1-.15) (S. 1-.10) Bbts. 10-.15; 100-\$1.

- MYRNA (Pruitt) (Early mid-season) A ruffled symphony in white. Becoming more popular each year. Good propagator. (L. 2-.15; 10-.65) (M. 3-.15; 10-.40) (S. 5-.15; 10-.25) Bbts. 100-.25.
- MYRTH (Fischer) (Early) This arrangement of color and grace has given us more pleasure than most any other variety we have produced. being an inspiration all summer.  Tall, sturdy pink with gray undertone. Opens

- PURITAN (Baerman) (Mid-season) A pure pink with florets intensely ruffled and of heavy substance. Very beautiful, but it often comes with short flower heads. (L. 10-.50) (M. 10-.35) (S. 10-.20) Bbts. 100-.15.

- RED CHARM (Butt) (Early mid-season) A charm of red, indeed, and a very important variety. Opens a generous number of bright. round, well placed florets on tall, willowy spikes.
