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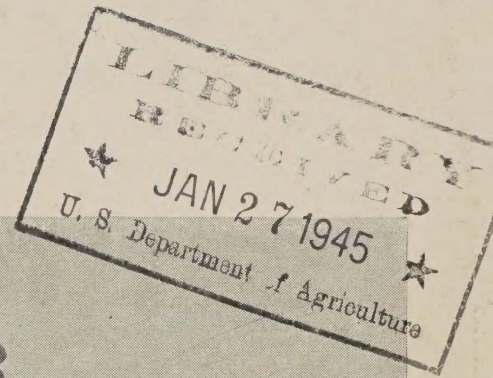

EROSIONET is a strong, economical, open-mesh fabric made of tightly twisted waterproof paper twine. When placed over any seeded surface, its ¼-inch square mesh forms millions of tiny dams which catch and hold your seed and sod firmly in place. Thus, damaging "washouts" from heavy rains are effectively checked without cutting off the sunlight. 45 inches wide.

ABRONIA, Umbellata (Tender Perennial). Clusters of deep rose colored blossoms rise from trailing mats of deep green crispy leaves. Very drought resistant. Valued in the rock garden. Of easy culture, seed may be sown outdoors in spring or early summer. Germination 10 days. Pkt. 10c.

ACHILLEA, The Pearl (Perennial). An easily grown plant, about 2 ft. high, bearing clusters of white flowers. Excellent for cutting. Does well in partial shade. Blooms from June to September. Sow seed from May to September. Germination 7 to 12 days. Pkt. 15c.

ACONITUM, Napellus Blue (Perennial). Stately spikes of showy helmet-shaped flowers. The plants resemble Delphiniums in form and bloom during July and August. Sow seed in winter or very early spring. These are seeds that need cold rather than heat to germinate. Germination 2 to 4 weeks. Pkt. 10c.

ACROCLINIUM (Everlasting Flowers) (Annual). Pretty little daisy-like flowers. Rose, pink and white. For winter bouquets they should be cut before they become fully expanded. Seed sown outdoors in good garden soil, after the ground is warm, will bloom in six to eight weeks. One foot high. Germination 7 to 12 days. Mixed. Pkt. 10c; 1/16 oz. 35c.

AGERATUM (Floss Flower) (Annual). A most satisfactory plant for bedding or edging. Very easily grown. Blooms freely all summer, stands drought. Seed may be sown indoors early or in open ground after frost and until June. Transplant or thin out so plants are six inches apart. Germination 7 to 14 days.

Blue Cap. Very dwarf 4 inches, deep blue, free flowering. Pkt. 10c; 1/16 oz. 35c.

Blue Ball. Clear blue. Compact plants. 6 inches. Pkt. 10c; 1/16 oz. 35c.

Imperial Dwarf Blue. A choice bedding variety. 10 inches. Pkt. 10c; 1/16 oz. 30c.

Little Blue Star. Plants densely covered with bright blue flowers. Height 5 inches. Pkt. 10c; 1/16 oz. 35c.

AGROSTEMMA, Coronaria (Rose Campion) (Perennial). Beautiful free flowering plants with gray-green foliage and deep crimson flowers. Seed sown early (February or March) will bloom the first year. 2 1/2 feet tall. Germination 12 to 20 days. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 30c.

ALYSSUM, Sweet (Annual). Fragrant flowers are produced in profusion throughout the season. Blooms in six weeks after seed has been sown. Bloom in good garden soil from early spring to midsummer. Thin or transplant four inches apart. Germination 7 to 10 days.

Miniature. An exceedingly dwarf variety. Fragrant white flowers produced in great masses. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

Carpet of Snow. The finest edging variety, producing a rounded mass of pure white flowers. A continuous bloomer. Height 4 inches. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

Little Gem. A dwarf graceful plant, with tiny fragrant white flowers. 4 inches. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

Lilac Queen. Delicate lilac flowers, especially attractive in autumn. 6 inches. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

Violet Queen. Plants dwarf, compact. Free flowering, fragrant. Color deep violet. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

Saxatile (Basket of Gold) (Perennial). The golden yellow flowers, completely cover the compact plants in early spring. Height 9 inches. Sow seed in early spring, transplant when large enough to bloom. Seed germinates in 20 to 30 days. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

AMARANTHUS (Annual). Beautifully colored foliage plants that succeed best in sunny rather dry locations. Sow seed in open after the ground is warm. Seed germination in 14 days.

Tricolor (Joseph's Coat). Brilliant scarlet, yellow and green foliage. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

Choice Mixed. Variegated and solid colors. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 30c.

ANCHUSA, Italica (Dropmore) Perennial). Does best in well drained situation and prefers partial shade. Flowers of deep gentian blue produced on drooping sprays from May to July. Easily grown in ordinary garden soil. Seed sown in midsummer will bloom the following season. Germination 18 to 24 days.
Mixed. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

ANEMONE, Japonica (Windflower) (Perennial). A glorious flower in late summer and fall. Long stemmed blossoms of white, flesh tinted cream, pink and rose. Sow seed in late fall or very early spring, cover lightly with fine sand. Keep well watered in dry weather. Blooms from August to October. Height 2 ft. Germination 6 weeks.
Mixed. Pkt. 15c.

ANTHEMIS, Tinctoria (Hardy Marguerite) (Perennial). Golden daisy-like flowers and fern-like foliage. Seed sown early will bloom the first season. Will thrive in most any soil. Give full sunlight. Bloom from June to frost. Germination 10 days.
Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 35c.

ANTIRRHINUM (Snapdragon) (Half-hardy perennial). Used as annuals. Used for bedding and make excellent cut flowers. Snapdragons thrive in any good garden soil. Seed may be sown outdoors in late fall or early spring. For early blooms, sow indoors and transplant to sunny position as soon as ground is warm. Germination 7 to 12 days.

Maximum (Giant Flowering) (Rust Resistant). Large flowers, closely placed on the spike. Height 3 ft.

AQUILEGIA (Columbine) (Perennial). The Aquilegias are among the most beautiful and popular of hardy plants. Germination of seed a little slow and uneven, taking from 12 to 60 days. Should be kept moist. Foliage very attractive; good cut flower. Best in partial shade.

Imperial Long Spurred Hybrids. A greatly improved strain. The finest of the long spurred Columbines. Many colors including red, pink, yellow, blue and white shades. The blooms are large, often four inches in diameter. The 3 ft. stems are tall and straight.

Mrs. Scott Elliott's. Long-spurred Hybrids. Many fine color combinations, having extremely long spurs, good stems and large blooms. 2 1/2 to 3 ft.

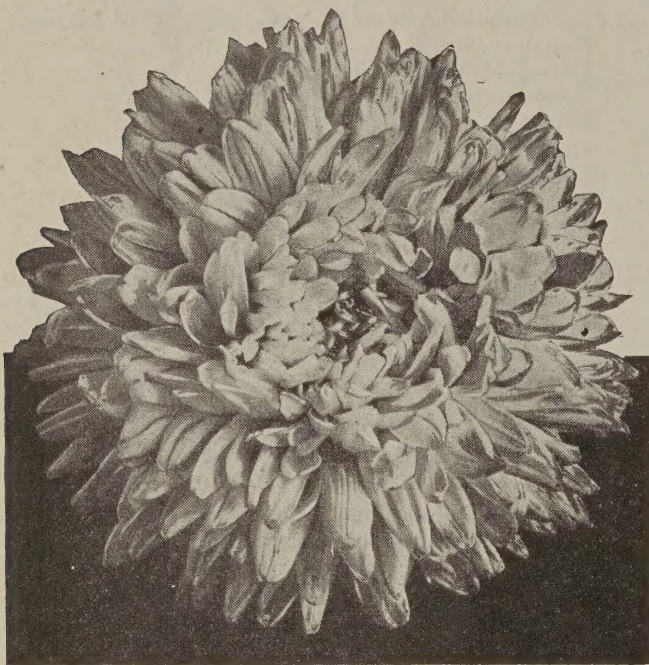
Chrysantha (Golden Columbine). A free flowering Columbine. Bright yellow flowers blooming longer than others.

ARABIS (Rock Cress) (Perennial). Compact plants, covered with white flowers during April and May. Fine for rockery. Sow seed in light soil from May to August and transplant to where they are to bloom in October. Germination 10 days.
Pkt. 10c.

ARCTOTIS, Grandis (Blue Eyed Daisy) (Annual). Sow seed in early spring in good garden soil. Thin plants to 10 inches apart. Grows quickly and blooms all summer. White with lilac center. 2 ft. Fine for cutting. Germination 15 to 20 days.
Pkt. 10c; 1/8 oz. 25c.

ARMERIA, Formosa (Sea Pink or Thrift) (Perennial). Sow seed in midsummer or early fall. Armerias are of easiest culture, being hardy and free growers. Compact plants with grass-like foliage and pink clover-like flowers. 12 inches. May and June. Germination 14 to 21 days.
Pkt. 15c; 1/8 oz. 50c.

ASCLEPIAS, Tuberosa (Butterfly Weed) (Perennial). One of the most attractive plants; flowers borne in clusters are gorgeous orange and make graceful bouquets. Easily grown from seed sown in spring in ordinary soil. Transplant in fall to where plants are to bloom. Like full sun. Germination 21 to 30 days.
Pkt. 15c.

ASPARAGUS (Tender Perennial). The ornamental varieties of Asparagus are highly valued for their feathery sprays. Height 2 to 3 ft. Germination 30 to 45 days.

Plumosus Nanus (Lacefern). Bright green.
Pkt. 10c.

Sprengeri (Emerald Fern). Used for window boxes and hanging baskets.
Pkt. 10c.

ASTERS (Annual). Seed should be planted in well drained soil after the danger of frost has passed. Seed germinates in 6 to 8 days. TOBACCO MULCH worked into the soil will help to prevent root aphid.

Queen of the Market (Wilt resistant). Double, well formed flowers with long stems. Fine for cutting. 2 1/2 ft. White, peach blossom, crimson, dark blue, light blue or mixed.
Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 50c.

Crego (Giant Improved). Free flowering compact plant about 2 ft. tall. A midseason variety, filling the season between early and late Asters.
Mixed. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 50c.

American Branching (Wilt resistant). Very free blooming, producing flowers of the broad petal type, slightly incurved and very lasting. Long stems for cutting. 3 ft. Crimson, lavender purple, shell pink, light rose, white or mixed.
Pkt. 15c; 1/8 oz. 50c.

Baby Aster (Pompon). Plants compact, well branched, 8 to 10 in. tall. Flowers 1 1/2 to 2 inches across with short tightly quilled petals. Early bloomer.
Mixed colors. Pkt. 10c; 1/8 oz. 50c.

California Giants. Their immense size, beautiful colors, free flowering habit make them great favorites. 3 ft.
Mixed colors. Pkt. 15c; 1/8 oz. 50c.

Single (China Asters). This strong, vigorous Aster will bloom when all others fail. Single flowers. 2 1/2 in. in diameter with yellow centers. Many colors. 2 ft.
Mixed. Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 30c.

Hardy Aster (Michaelmas Daisy). A free-flowering perennial thriving in good garden soil. 4 ft.
Mixed colors. Pkt. 15c.

Alpinus. Plants 6 to 10 in. high. Blooms are produced in great profusion in late summer and fall.
Mixed. Pkt. 15c.

AUBRIETIA (Rainbow Rock Cress) (Perennial). Large flowering hybrids. Aubrietias are highly recommended for the rock garden or rock wall. Neat, compact plants and a vivid splash of color in April and May. 6 in. Seed should be sown in spring or early summer. Cover lightly with fine sand. Germination 10 to 14 days.
Mixed colors. Pkt. 15c.

BALSAM APPLE (Mormordica) (Annual). An ornamental vine used mostly for its fruit which is deep orange. When ripe fruit opens and shows its brilliant carmine seeds. Fruits used to make salve and cough syrup. Plant seed where they are to grow. 10 ft. Germinates 8 to 12 days.
Pkt. 10c; 1 oz. 75c.

BALSAM (Lady Slipper) (Annual). Beautiful plants with double flowers 2 in. in diameter. Set plants 2 ft. apart in sunny position. Flowers in great profusion all summer. Seed germinates in 8 to 10 days.

Camellia Flowered. White, scarlet, salmon rose, or mixed.
Pkt. 10c; 1/8 oz. 35c.

BALSAM (Lady Slipper).

Rose Flowered. Mixed.

Pkt. 10c; 1/8 oz. 35c.

Torch (Bush Balsam). Very compact plants, 8 to 10 in. tall. Unlike the taller Balsams, the flowers are carried at tips of stems, making a show of color rather than foliage. Color bright vermilion red.

BAPTISIA, Australis (False Indigo) (Perennial).

Large lupin like spikes of clear deep blue. Foliage very attractive. Blooms in June. 5 ft. Germination 18 to 30 days.

Pkt. 15c; 1/4 oz. 50c.

BELLIS PERENNIS (Double or English Daisy) (Perennial).

Low growing plants bearing large blooms. Its cheerful early bloom has made it a favorite bedding plant. Sow seed in shallow boxes in August. When plants are large enough, transplant into cold frame about 5 in. apart. Cover in cold weather. Transplant to open ground in early spring. Germination 5 to 10 days. Double mixed.

Pkt. 15c.

BOCCONIA CORDATA (Plume Poppy) (Perennial).

A splendid hardy perennial with beautiful foliage and spikes of creamy white flowers. 6 to 8 ft. July. Germination slow, best sown in late fall or very early spring.

Pkt. 10c.

BOLTONIA, Latisquama (Perennial).

A showy plant bearing in profusion, lavender pink daisy-like flowers. Blooms in September and October. An excellent cut flower. Very drought resistant. 3 to 4 ft. Germination 7 to 10 days.

Pkt. 15c.

BRACHYCOME, Iberidifolia (Swan River Daisy) (Annual).

A very graceful annual, 14 in. high, suited to borders and also attractive in pots. Seed may be sown under glass in February or March or in open after ground is warm. Germination 10 to 14 days. Mixed colors of blue, white, rose.

Pkt. 10c; 1/8 oz. 35c.

BROWALLIA, Speciosa Major (Annual).

Brilliant dark blue flowers borne in profusion. Excellent border plants; also used for pot plants. Seed may be sown in open, but for best results seed should be sown indoors early and transplanted to open ground about May 10th. They will bloom until frost. 16 in. Germination 14 days.

Pkt. 25c.

CACALIA (Tassel Flower) (Annual).

A pretty, free flowering plant with red tassel-like flowers. 18 in. Sow seed outdoors after danger of frost. Blooms from June until frost. Germination 10 days.

Pkt. 10c; 1/8 oz. 35c.

CALCEOLARIA (Pouch Plant or Lady Slipper) (Tender Perennial).

Very attractive pot plants. Colors range through yellow, gold, orange, copper, scarlet, crimson with dark spots. Seed may be sown from the end of March to September. Sow in flats or pans in mixture of half peat moss and half sand. Cover seed very lightly with sifted peat. At a temperature between 60 degrees and 75 degrees seed will germinate in 14 to 20 days.

Hybrida Grandiflora. Large flowering, mixed.

Pkt. 25c.

CALENDULA (Pot Marigold).

Superb annuals which are very easily grown from seed. They start to bloom in early summer and continue until frost. Seeds are usually sown where the plants are to bloom, but may be sown indoors and transplanted. Germination 4 to 10 days.

Bodger's Pastel Mixture. A combination of lighter shades of yellow and orange. Dwarf plants, especially adapted for the home garden.

Pkt. 10c; 1/4 oz. 40c.

Chrysantha. 3 to 4 inch flowers. Stems 24 to 30 inches. Buttercup yellow.

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS

Culture: For best results, plant large flowering Dahlias 4 feet apart between the rows, and 3 to 4 feet in the rows. Pompons 2 feet apart each way. Dig holes 6 inches deep, lay roots flat on side (not on end) and cover with fine soil that is free from lumps. If you are planting in clay soil, cover surface over root with one-half inch of sand or ashes to prevent a crust from forming. Dahlias need full sun and free circulation of air for healthy growth and to prevent mildew. Do not plant under trees or near dense shrubbery. It is a safe practice to apply pulverized limestone 5 pounds per 100 square feet, every two or three years and this should be done in fall or winter. In this locality, Dahlias may be planted between May 15th and July 1st. Fertilizer is applied after the soil has been spaded, (pulverized sheep manure) 10 pounds for each 100

square feet, or it may be applied around plant only, using 1 pound to each plant. A second application of half the above amount should be applied about September 1st. Keep soil well cultivated. By cultivating at least once a week and as soon as ground can be worked after each rain, the weeds will be held in check and a soil mulch formed which will conserve moisture. For control of insects (leaf hoppers, aphids, etc.) spray plants with Red Arrow plant spray once a week. To control mildew and red spider, dust plants with sulphur. When buds appear, there will be 2 or 3 at the end of the stem—all but one should be removed. After the frost has killed the plants, cut off tops. Leave roots in the ground for at least two weeks to ripen, then dig and pack in boxes. Cover with soil and store in basement or frost proof building.

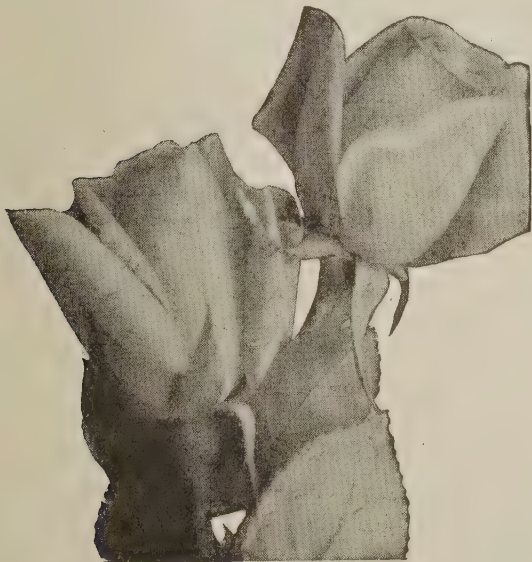

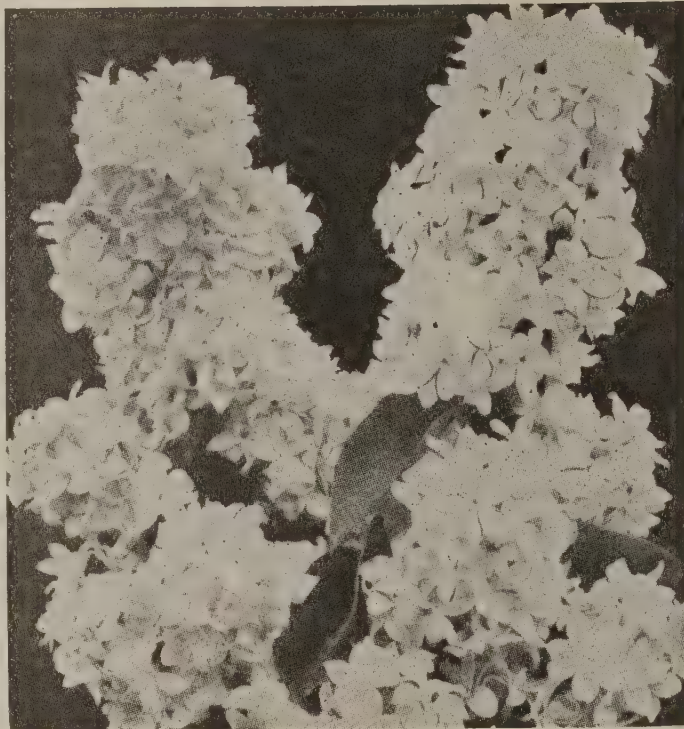

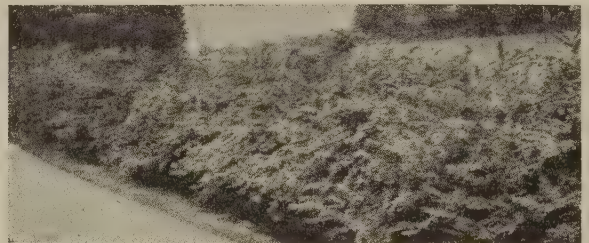

FERTILIZER IS THE PLANTS' FOOD

To obtain successful growth of plants, the soil must contain plant food of the proper kind in available form and in proper amounts. The three principal elements needed are nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

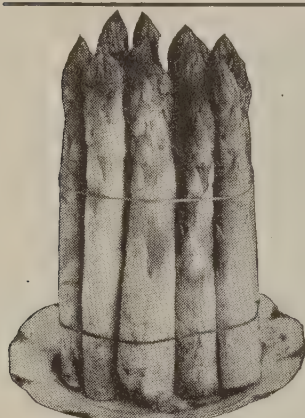
SUGGESTIONS ON PLANTING SHRUBS

The best time to plant shrubbery is early spring, as soon as the ground is dry enough to handle. Any fair garden soil well drained is suitable. Dig a hole that is six inches larger all around than the root system when spread out. Long straggling or broken roots should be cut back.

Loosen soil at bottom of hole, spread roots naturally and set the plant about the same depth as it grew in the nursery, fill in soil and tamp

around the roots, water heavy, and pull loose soil around the plant. The top of the plant should be cut back severely, usually one-third to one-half.

It is not possible to give any specific information as to how far apart to plant shrubbery unless one knows the use for which it is intended, but plants should be given plenty of room. When plants begin to grow give a handful of complete fertilizer.

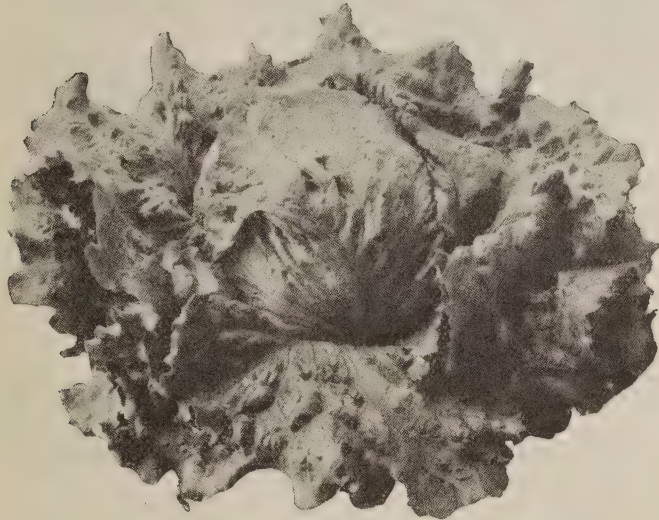

Culture: Any good, well drained, fibrous loam will produce potatoes under right climatic conditions. For early potatoes the soil should be particularly rich.

In the home garden potatoes are planted about 28 inches apart between the rows, 14 inches in the rows. It takes 5 to 8 lbs. (depending on their size and frequency of eyes) to plant 100 feet of row. Cut the potatoes so that each piece has 2 eyes. After cutting spread thinly in dry place for several hours to allow them to callus. Plant in March or early April, about 5 inches deep. It will take three or four weeks to sprout above the ground. Begin cultivation as soon as possible. Clean, frequent cultivation is essential, especially in the early stages. No weeds and a fine mulch should be the rule for the first few weeks. When the plants get large, making it difficult to cultivate, hill up on both sides of row, after which no cultivation will be necessary. Dig after tops have dried.

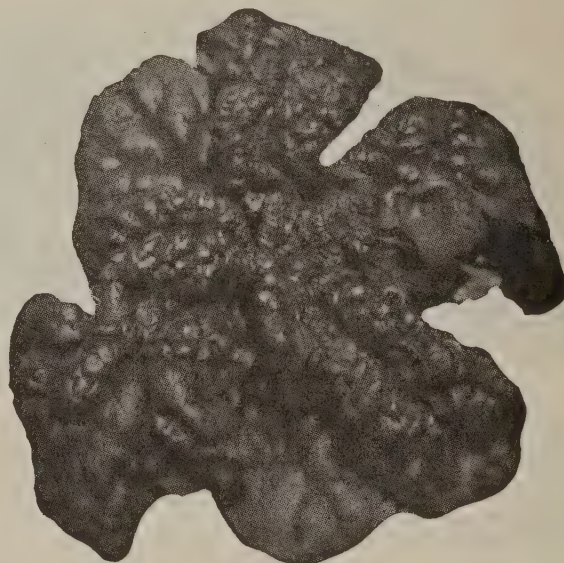

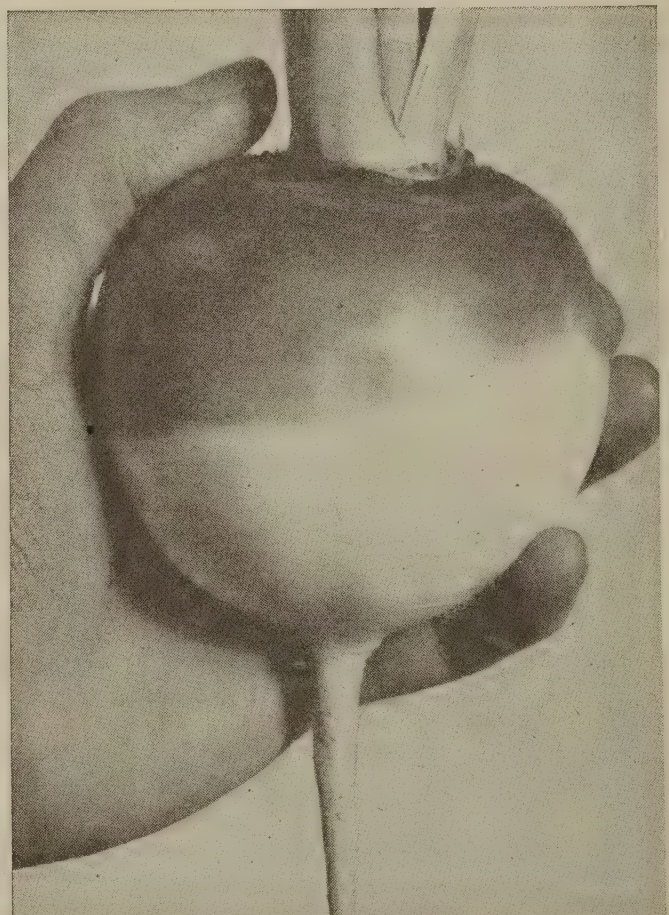

Strawberry Plants and Seeds

Culture: Most any good garden soil can be expected to produce satisfactory crops of strawberries.

The ideal soil is one which is sandy, well drained and well filled with organic matter.

We recommend setting plants in rows three and one half feet apart and eighteen inches in the row.

Set the plant having the bud or crown just at the surface, spread the roots and pack soil firmly with hand, water if possible.

Cultivate as soon as they have started growth after being set out. It is very important at first cultivation to uncover buds of any plant which may have been planted too deep or have been covered after planting.

Frequent cultivation should be given even though weed and grass growth is not a problem. Cultivation makes larger stronger fruiting beds and a better crop of berries.

The blossoms should be removed from newly set plants as soon as they appear. To allow them to set and mature berries involves a drain on the vitality of the plant.

Do not permit the plants to run all over the patch, train them in matted rows 10 to 12 inches wide.

In fall protect with straw mulch put on early before the first hard freeze. Fertilize with pulverized cattle manure in early spring. 1 lb. will fertilize about 10 ft. of row.

Strawberry plants are not in stock, but are sent direct to you from the nursery, ready April, May and October.

Make successive plantings. Store vegetables from the late garden. Many vegetables can be kept for use during winter by proper storage. The desirable stage of maturity varies with the crop. Cabbage, onions, squashes and pumpkins will not keep well unless fully matured. Beets, carrots, parsnips, turnips, salsify, etc. should not be allowed to fully mature as they are likely to become woody. Vegetables can be stored outdoors. A handy way is to sink a box or barrel about half of its depth in the ground, pack soil around outside. Put vegetables in and on top of them, a cover made of burlap bag stuffed with straw. Cover top of box with boards and a piece of roofing paper to keep water out.

The greatest problem confronting lovers of a beautiful lawn is the control of crab grass. Often lawns that are superb in spring and early summer, are taken by crab grass later and turn brown in autumn. - Do not cut your lawn shorter than 1½ inches.
- Water thoroughly. (Do not sprinkle.)
- Produce a thick turf and crab grass will not be found growing there.
- The use of chemicals has proven of great value.
