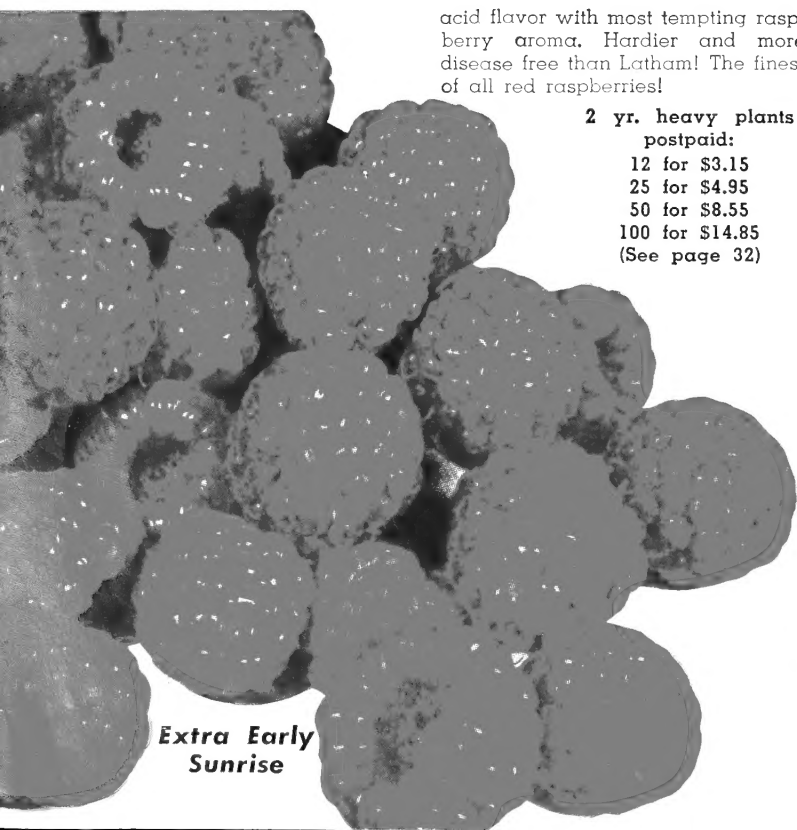

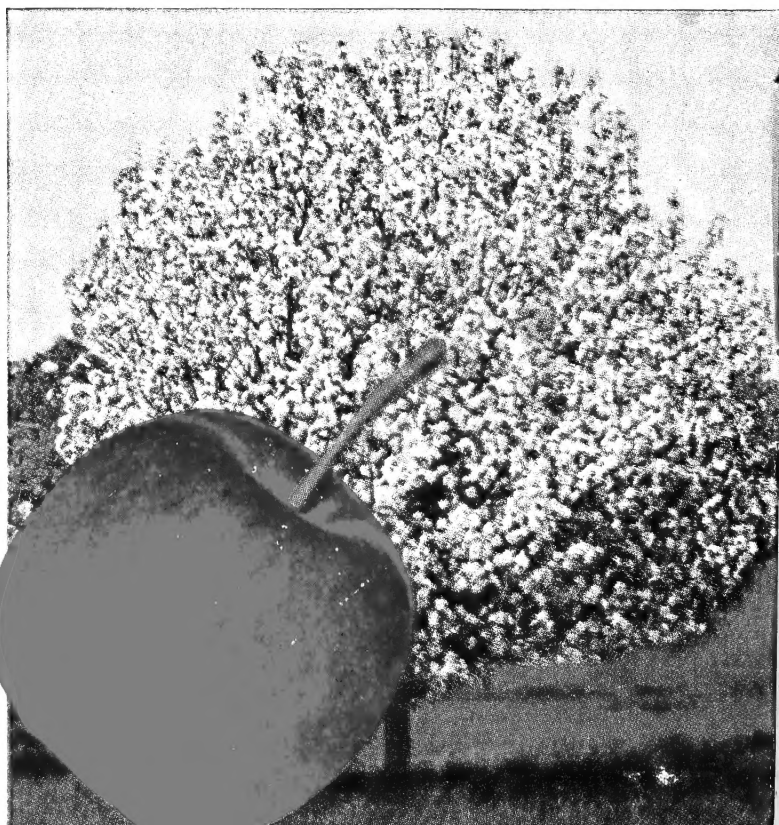

IMPORTANT RULES IN SELECTING YOUR HYBRID SEED CORN

- If two Hybrids are equal in genetic potentiality for yield, and one is later than the other, the later maturing variety will produce greater yield. Select varieties which utilize the full season for your zone, and still mature safely. (See map, page 69).
- All grades of a Hybrid Variety possess the same inherited power to produce high yields, regardless of kernel size or shape. Iowa and Wis. Experiment Station Tests show no difference in yield between flat, small flats, and round grades. The grade you buy should depend on the per acre cost of seed.
- Plant only first generation Hybrid Seed for ripe grain or silage. U. S. D. A. and the Wis. Station tests show losses in yield of about 25% when using advanced generation seed.
- To obtain the desired stand, plant 20% to 25% more kernels than the expected number of mature plants—to compensate for losses through diseases, animals, cultivation. It will prove a wise investment.
- The Minnesota Experiment Station says, "Seed of different Hybrids cannot be readily distinguished by appearance, therefore, purchase seed from only reliable sources."

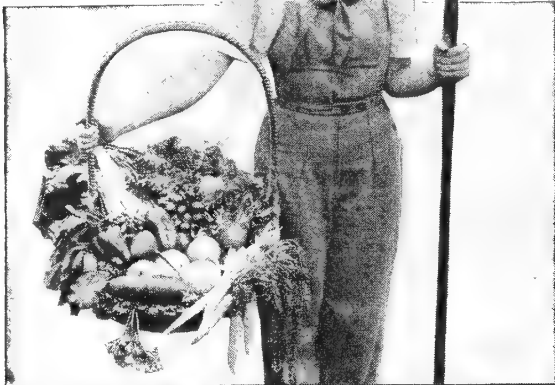


Northern Grown Vegetable Seeds

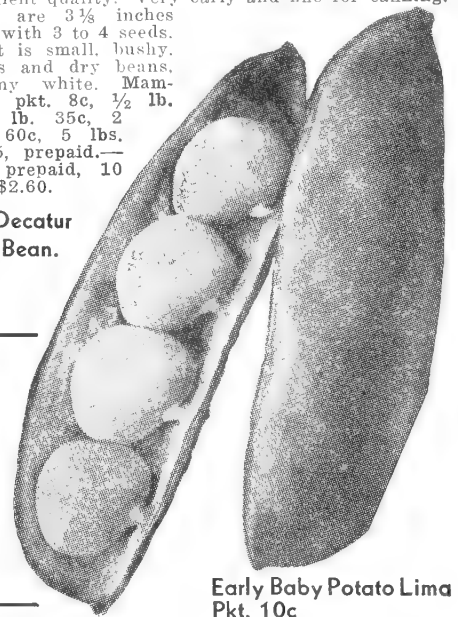

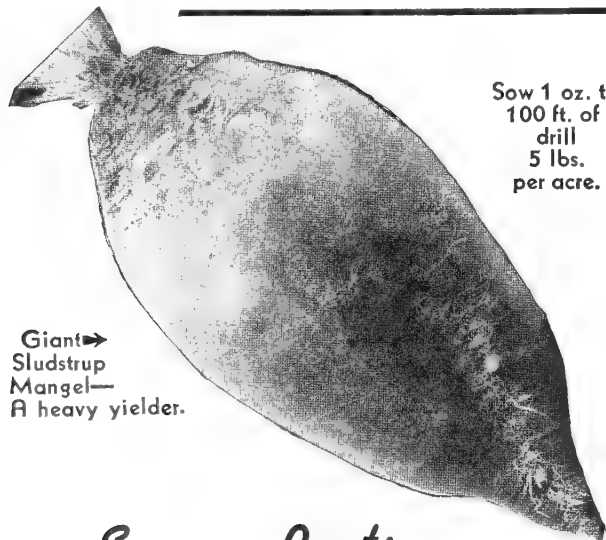

Mangels or Stock Beets

Mangels are the most important of all root crops for feeding livestock. Palatable, easily digested and highly nutritious, both Dairy Farmers and Poultry Raisers find them a valuable winter feed for cattle and poultry. They increase the flow of milk when fed to cattle; they keep hens healthy and stimulate egg production. They should be fed at the rate of 25 lbs. to 100 hens per day, with grain. Mangels are easily stored for winter, in root cellars or outdoor pits.

CULTURE—Sow at corn planting time—in drills 2 to 2½ feet apart, on rich moist land, the seed should be planted an inch deep; on dry and sandy soil it must be planted 1¼ to 1½ inches deep. Thin out to stand 8 inches apart in row.

CULTURE—The same methods that produce good cabbage will grow good cauliflower. The only great difference is that cauliflower heads must be protected from sunlight so as to make sure of the desirable white curd. Gather the tops of the leaves together loosely as soon as the heads begin to form. In shutting off the light, it is important not to cramp the heads.

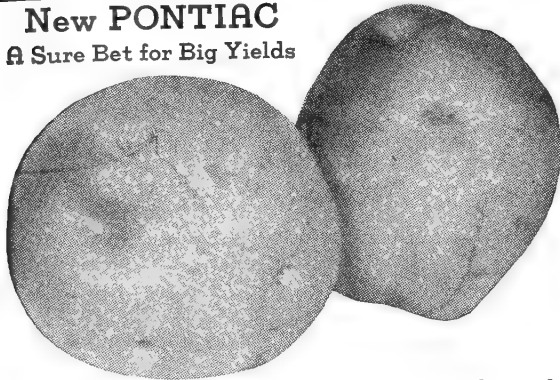


Play Safe With Certified Seed Potatoes

Farmers can be sure of getting a better potato crop, by using Certified Seed, instead of local stocks, that may have run out, according to R. C. Rose, Plant Pathologist at University Farm. Virus diseases, such as spindle tuber, mosaic, yellow dwarf, and leaf roll are often present in table stock or garden crops. Seed used from a bin of these potatoes may carry enough infection to reduce the vigor of the crop the second year. This is what is known as "running out" in seed potatoes.

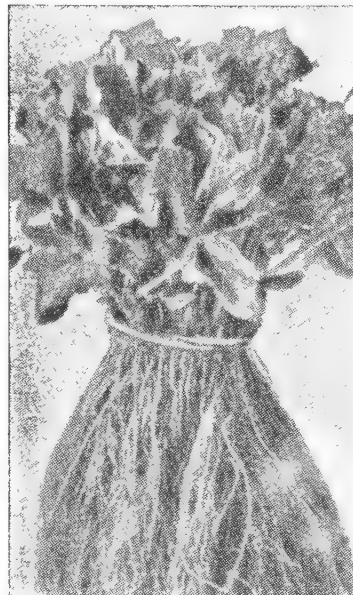

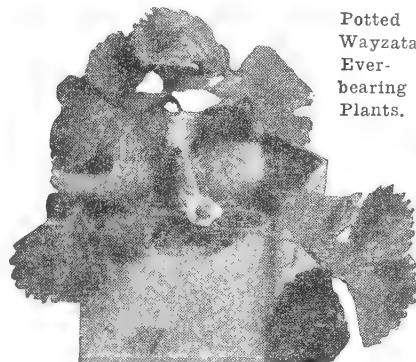

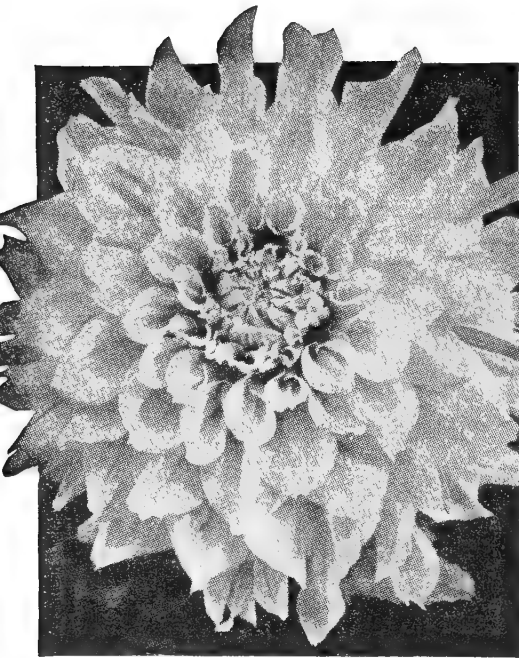

How To Keep Dahlias From Wilting After They Have Been Cut

Dahlias for Bouquets should be cut very early in the morning, disbudded and stripped of lower foliage, put in a pail of water, and set in a cool, dark place for several hours. Then put stems in one inch of hot water (almost boiling) for 2 minutes. Remove, and again place in deep cold water to cool. This treatment will keep blooms fresh.

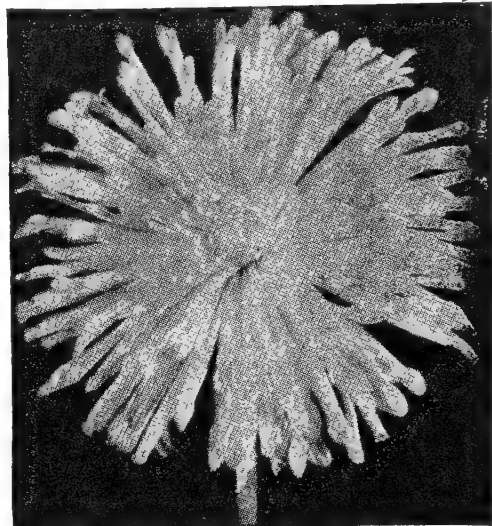

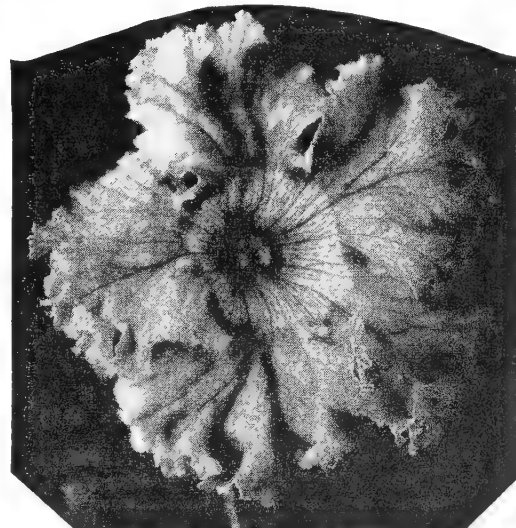

HARDY GRASSES and How to Sow Them



Brome Grass makes a good hay crop or pasture. Valuable on hillsides, ditches or banks to prevent soil washing.

Brome Grass *Bromus Inermis*

Becoming important as a hardy hay and pasture grass and in combination with other grasses. Also called Smooth Brome Grass.

This vigorous, hardy perennial with strong, creeping roots, makes excellent hay and pasture on poor, dry soil or on moist, low ground that is flooded at times. Valuable on hillsides and terraces to keep soil from washing away. It starts early, two or three weeks before other grasses, remains green until November, and stands close cropping.

New Lincoln Brome Grass

Lincoln Brome Grass was introduced in 1942 by Nebraska Experiment Station. Developed from certain old fields, believed to be from seed of Hungarian origin. The oldest fields were traced to seedings made in 1898. Only fields with suitable history and performance were accepted for foundation seed. Lincoln Brome Grass is a large, aggressive, high-yielding grass which forms a good sod. Four to Six Tons of Hay Per Acre

The hay (of high feeding value) is relished by all livestock. One acre will pasture three to four dairy cows from early spring until fall. Close grazing is best, except in fall. For hay, cut when heads first appear. Then feeding value is highest.

This hardy perennial grass will thrive until broken up, and can be easily controlled by plowing. Seedlings and plants are cold resistant. Heads appear early in June and ripen four weeks later. Plants grow four to six feet high with broad, light green leaves. Underground stems rapidly form a tough sod that holds up hay-making machinery.

How To Grow the Crop

Prepare a good seed bed. Fall plowing allows early spring seeding. The seed will germinate in water, but if covered by soil underneath the water, it will not grow until the water is drained off.

Rate of Seeding

Broadcast 6 to 7 lbs. per acre; drilled, 2 to 3 lbs. per acre in 16 to 18-inch rows. Use a packer on peat after seeding.

Sow early in spring so seedlings become established before weeds start. On weedy

land, seed late in June or early July, discing up to this time, to kill weeds. If difficult to get on land in spring, seed in August or October.

Urgent Need for More Soil-Building Crops—Legume Seed Supply Short!

A definite shift from cultivated crops (so vital in the war economy)—to hay and pasture crops, is imminent in the reconversion period ahead. This will require more seed of legumes and grasses—particularly legumes—than were needed during the war years. Since much of our fertile soil was heavily depleted during the war, a tremendous amount of soil building through use of legumes is needed to bring back fertility reserves. According to Government reports, supplies of Alfalfa, Alsike Clover, Sweet Clover, Red Clover and White Clover will not be sufficient to meet domestic requirements. About Hard Seeds:

Hard seeds are live seeds which are slow to absorb moisture and do not sprout within five or six days in a laboratory. There is not much delay in germination of hard alfalfa seeds. After sowing in spring, some germinate in two weeks—others in four, six, or more weeks. Usually all will sprout long before growing season ends. Up to 50% of seeds may be hard without reducing final stand of spring or early summer sown alfalfa, provided over 12 lbs. per acre are seeded. In fact, if properly seeded (not too deep), moderate delays in germination may thicken the stand by the end of season, especially if losses occurred earlier from frost, drought, insects, or other hazards. Thus hard alfalfa seeds have an insurance value, and should not be scarified.

VARIEGATED ALFALFA From Old Time Unregistered Northern Fields

Other varieties of Alfalfa could not compete with it for winter hardiness.

Written approval from the county committee must be obtained for each practice to be performed on any individual's farm, prior to the carrying out of such practice (except that practices performed before April 1, 1946, may be approved retroactively by the county committee). See your county committee.

There is much complaint of worn-out soils, weeds and unprofitable crops coming from those who once secured bountiful yields and satisfactory profits when the land was new. It furnishes luxuriant pasture and hay for cattle but is not quite so good for horses.

Sow Red Clover at the rate of 10 lbs. per acre with small grain or flax. Use about one-half or two-thirds of a normal seeding of grain or flax so as not to smother the clover. 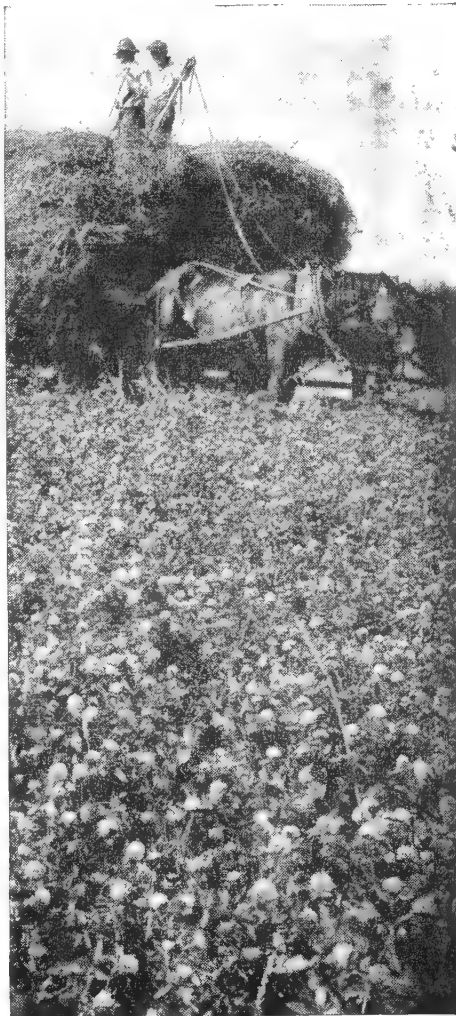
MAMMOTH RED CLOVER

Extremely hardy, and valuable for fertilizing poor soil which is too low and heavy for growing Red Clover. It makes the best permanent hog pastures, seldom freezing out, and produces a large crop of hay, as much as 3 to 5 tons to the acre. Sow 5 to 6 lbs. per acre, with small grain, for plowing under. ALSIKE CLOVER

Alsike Clover has the same soil-building properties as Red Clover, storing nitrogen in the soil, thereby increasing the yields of succeeding grain and corn crops from 25 to 50%. It is a true hardy perennial, with fiber instead of tap roots, and is not injured by thawing and freezing.

Alsike can be sown on soil that is slightly acid or sour, where lime cannot be applied, and where other clover or alfalfa will not grow. It can be sown on heavy, wet, or low soil that sometimes becomes waterlogged, and also endures drought well.

Sweet Clover is a leading crop in the United States. As a biennial legume, it fits in with any crop rotation, besides yielding a very large return of hay and pasture. Sweet Clover may grow one to three feet the first season and may be clipped for hay or pastured lightly if it makes a good growth. During the second year it grows very dense and rapidly and if cut for hay, it should be done early in the season, before the blossoms appear and the stems become woody.

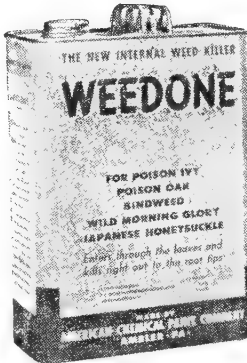

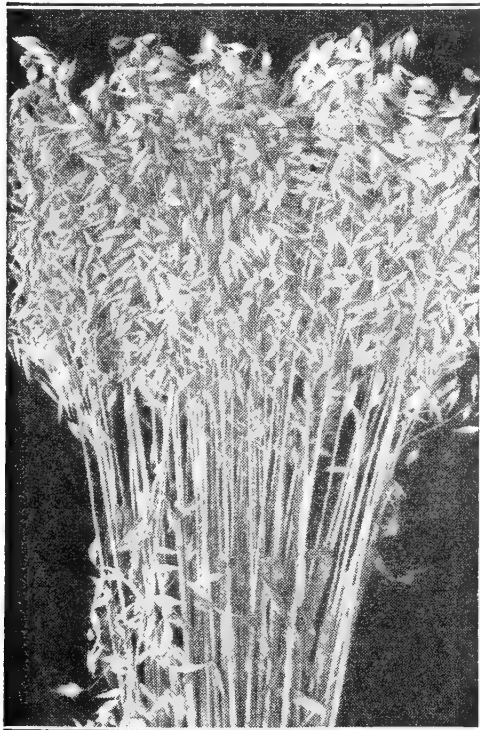

WANTED: More Flax!

Post-War Need Is Urgent!

According to a Dept. of Agriculture release, flax harvested in 1946 will be supported by acreage payments, or otherwise, at an average level equivalent to \$3.60 a bushel in Minneapolis.

Relaxed building restrictions and released manpower for maintenance and repair work are expected to boost 1947 paint and varnish sales, 45% to 75% above 1939 levels—provided enough linseed oil is available to make the protective coatings. Oil, paint, and building industries are greatly concerned, because paint supplies are the lowest in history—the nation enters this season with virtually no old crop flax seed and little linseed oil. At least 42,000,000 bushels of flax are

needed for crushing in 1947.

Government records show a direct relation between volume of construction and use of linseed oil. For every billion dollars in construction, 80,000,000 lbs. of linseed oil is needed. Thus, 1946 linseed oil demand will be about 640,000,000 lbs. and will increase to about 960,000,000 lbs. by 1950. FLAX SEED (RUST & WILT) RESISTANT

RAPE FOR QUICK PASTURE

Rape is an annual forage plant of great value, profitable in all sections of the country. It can be grown to advantage on land which has already produced an early grain crop, like oats, rye, or winter wheat.

Rape provides excellent pasture for all kinds of livestock, cattle, hogs, and sheep. It can be sown at any time during spring or summer, so a good pasture can be had whenever it is needed. Rape will prepare sheep and hogs for market better and in less time than any other forage plant.

One acre is sufficient to pasture 12 to 15 sheep from six weeks to two months, and is the ideal pasture for weaning lambs. Spring pigs can easily be brought up to 200 lbs. in weight when six months old, if fed on rape. It is a mild succulent feed for cattle, and will not flavor the milk, if the cattle are pastured properly. Stock that is being fed on rape should always have access to salt.

Two pieces of land may be seeded at once, to be used alternately, pasturing one while the other is growing. Do not graze too closely. Rape makes a good fall pasture.

6. Its cheapness; sown broadcast, use 5 or 6 lbs., sown in rows, use only 3 lbs. per acre.

Ideal Flax Combination Crops

Legume—Grass—Flax Combination

As a nurse crop for Alfalfa, Clovers or Grasses, Flax has no equal, because it does not heavily shade the young forage plants and its sturdy stubble affords winter protection. The flax plants' open habit of growth and the presence of legumes and grasses in combination also aid in controlling weeds.

We recommend seeding a normal rate of Alfalfa, Red and Alsike Clover, Sweet Clover, Timothy, or other grasses with approximately one-half a normal seeding of flax per acre, or 14 to 20 lbs., so that the clover and grasses would not be smothered and a good stand secured.

A Clover or Grass Seed attachment to the grain drill may be used, sowing the seed ahead of the drill and covering it lightly with a harrow.

Wheat—Flax Combination

A combination of 15 to 20 lbs. of Flax and 45 lbs. of Seed Wheat per acre sown at the usual wheat seeding time has an advantage over flax alone, particularly in the control of such weeds as lamb's quarters and wild buckwheat. This early seeding which gives the wheat the best chance for development, provides the best conditions for the growth of the flax also.

Yields of 10 bushels of flax and 15 to 20 bushels of wheat are not uncommon, with a combined seeding. When threshed, they are easily separated with an ordinary fanning mill and can be sold at highest market value because the quality of the grain is usually very good. There is less danger of damage to either crop from disease or lodging when grown in combination.

SUDAN GRASS GROWS QUICKLY

One of the best annual forage plants ever introduced, suitable for almost any locality. Sudan Grass thrives best on rich loam, but has been successfully grown on almost every kind of soil, from heavy clay to light sand. Cold, wet soils are not suited to Sudan Grass. Sudan Grass is a sorghum, and an annual, without underground root sprouts. It grows 4 to 5 feet high in drilled seedings, and 5 to 8 feet in cultivated rows.

DO NOT SOW SUDAN GRASS BEFORE CORN PLANTING TIME. Like corn, it is a warm weather crop.

In favorable seasons, the growing period is long, and several cuttings can be obtained in one season. For hay it is ready to cut in 60 to 75 days, when it is in full head. It continues its growth, and in 40 to 45 days it is ready for another cutting. If Sudan Grass is grown for seed, only one crop can be harvested.

Produces Quality Hay

Sudan Grass is an enormous yielder, producing 3 or 4 tons of hay at the first cutting. The second cutting is lighter, and the hay is much finer. Livestock of all kinds will eat the hay readily.

CULTURE—For a seed crop, sow 15 lbs. per acre, in drills, 15 to 20 inches apart. The crop should be harvested with a grain binder.

For hay, sow at the rate of 20 to 30 lbs. per acre, using a grain drill, and cover from one to one and one-half inches deep. Heavy seeding makes finer quality hay.

The hay crop is harvested with a regular mower, when the Sudan Grass is fully headed out. It can be cut in the morning, and if the sun is bright, it should be raked up in the afternoon of the next day. After bunching, it is placed in cocks, just the same as alfalfa. After it has been thoroughly cured, it is removed from the cocks to the barn, or stacked. Because of the large amount of juice in the stems of Sudan Grass, the leaves cure first and the hay often appears ready to stack, when it is not. Therefore, the only sure way to avoid heating, is to allow Sudan Grass to remain in cocks long enough for the stems to become dry. The leaves are retained well, and if cut at the right stage will make a bright, leafy, sweet hay, of the very best quality.

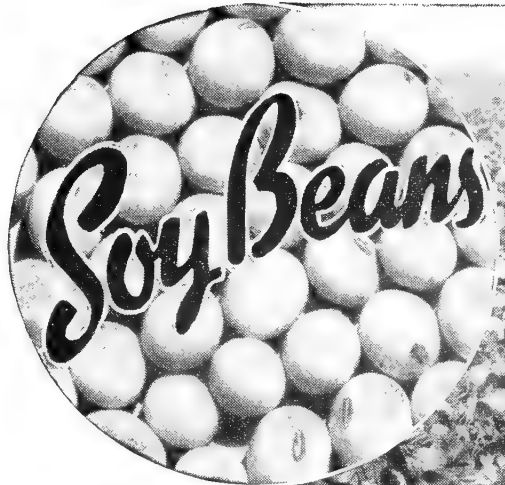
Plant Legumes with Sudan

Sudan Grass grown with legumes, such as soy beans, makes a well-balanced mixture for pasture, ensilage and hay. Sudan Grass grows stiffly erect, with stems strong enough to support the vines and makes harvesting easier, by keeping them off the ground. It hastens curing, by preventing the beans rotting.

Sudan Grass and soy beans, planted together, make a good hog pasture. Sow 25 to 30 lbs. Sudan Grass and the same quantity of soy beans, to the acre, drilling in the seed with a grain drill. For quickest results, sow in rows 18 to 20 inches apart, and cultivate.

How To Grow Good Crops of Soy Beans

CULTURE. Soy Beans require about the same treatment as corn, and will grow on almost any kind of soil, shallow peat or sandy loam, and even ground containing too much alkali for corn. **Do not plant Soy Beans too early, about corn planting time is right.**

Inoculate seed with Nitragin (below) and plant as follows:

1. In ordinary 6 in. rows with a grain drill, using 90 to 120 lbs. of beans per acre.
2. In 12 in. rows, using a grain drill and plugging up every other drill, using 80 to 90 lbs. per acre.
3. In 21 in. rows, using a corn planter with a bean attachment, the planter being set at the regular distance of 42 in. and the rows straddled. Plant about 70 to 75 lbs. of beans per acre.

4. Soy Beans may also be planted in rows 30, 36 and 42 in. apart and cultivated. Plant 35 to 45 lbs. of beans per acre.
5. Soy Beans may also be broadcast, using about 90 to 120 lbs. per acre.

Soy Beans for Seed

The seed crop is quite profitable. The seeds broken or split in threshing can be fed to livestock. For seed, the Soy Beans should be cut with a grain binder, while the dew is still on them, so they will not shatter. They can be threshed without much curing, if the seed is spread out so it cannot sprout in the bins.

Soy Beans may be turned under in the fall, thereby enriching the soil and making it mellow and easily tillable.

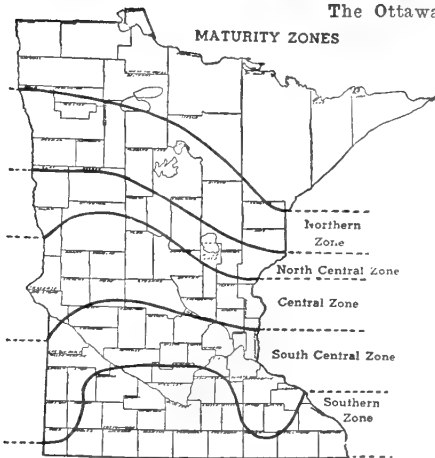

Although many farmers are now growing Millet regularly as a hay crop, it was not until the last few years that its value was fully appreciated as a quick-developing crop. Many find it of great value in case of crop failure of Clover and Timothy, when dry, spring weather cuts short the pasture and meadow grasses, or when there is a cold, wet spring and corn and other early sown crops are drowned out—it is then that Millet is fully appreciated.

Millet may be planted up to July 1 and even later, and still produce a crop of hay or

pasture. Millet hay properly handled has great feeding value and milk-producing qualities. For hay it should be cut as soon as it blooms, before the seed forms, otherwise the hay is apt to be woody. In more southern sections Millet is sown as a catch crop after the grain has been harvested. It produces the best results in warm, rich soil.

Sow broadcast, using about 25 lbs. per acre, covering seed three-quarters of an inch deep. For a seed crop, allow the Millet to ripen fully and harvest with a grain binder.

JAPANESE MILLET—Billion Dollar Grass

One of the best forage crops for feeding all kinds of livestock. High in milk-producing qualities, being rich in protein and fats. Combined with soy beans, as ensilage, it makes an ideal balanced ration (two parts of millet to one of soy beans). Adapted to all sections of the country; it makes more hay than any other millet, and requires less seed. It is the ideal catch crop, and may be sown from May to July.

For hay, cut it just before it blossoms, and cure the same as clover. It also makes good pasture, but the cattle must be accustomed to it gradually.

- 1—It grows 4 to 8 ft. high and produces 5 to 6 tons of hay per acre.
- 2—It is drought-resistant, yet can be grown on wet or poor soil.
- 3—It is cheap to sow, only 20 to 25 pounds of seed per acre being required.
- 4—It is very palatable and is liked by all classes of livestock.

FOXTAIL MILLETS

Sow 15 to 20 pounds per acre.

GERMAN OR GOLDEN—This is one of the best varieties for hay and fodder. It makes rapid, vigorous growth, often yielding 3 to 5 tons of hay per acre, on good rich soil. It grows 4 to 5 feet high, is of rather coarse appearance, and should be cut for hay before it is in full bloom. At this stage, the hay is best, and so tender it can be fed to hogs.

SIBERIAN—We think this the best Millet for dry sections. It is extremely hardy, drought resistant, and about two weeks earlier than Golden Millet. It stools heavily, is very leafy, and yields enormous quantities of fine quality hay. It produces 50 to 70 bushels of seed per acre.

More Profitable than Corn for a Poultry Feed

RED PROSO MILLET—A very popular variety for producing ripe grain or seed, but not a hay millet. Can be seeded after early canning peas are harvested, and still mature a crop easily. Plants are short and medium-early in maturity. Seed hull is reddish-brown. In North Dakota Experiment Station trials, Red Proso was as readily consumed as yellow corn, by laying hens and growing turkeys. In fact, annual egg production per bird, was higher where Red Proso replaced corn.

Canada Yellow Field Peas

Field Peas are better suited to the Northwest than other annual legumes for building up wornout soils. They are usually grown with oats for hay, a combination equal in feeding value to clover hay. They contain more digestible crude protein and fat than alfalfa and corn.

When they are grown with oats, they are threshed together, and easily separated with a fanning mill after threshing, thereby getting two crops from one operation. Sow 2 bushels of oats to 1½ bushels of peas per acre. Drill the peas in 4 inches deep, as early as the ground can be worked. Then, 2 or 3 weeks later, sow the oats, drilling it in the other way. Vetch (Sand or Hairy)

Vetches, either green or as hay, make excellent feed and are also used extensively as cover and green manure crops. They make good hay, ensilage, pasture and green feed and are very valuable as a green fertilizer and as a cover crop in orchards, preventing the washing away of the soil.

Vetch may be sown in the spring at the rate of 60 lbs. per acre, or with a grain crop such as oats, wheat, rye or barley, at the rate of 30 lbs. per acre, and using one-half of the normal rate of small grain. This combination makes excellent forage or hay and also aids in preventing the Vetch from lodging.
