

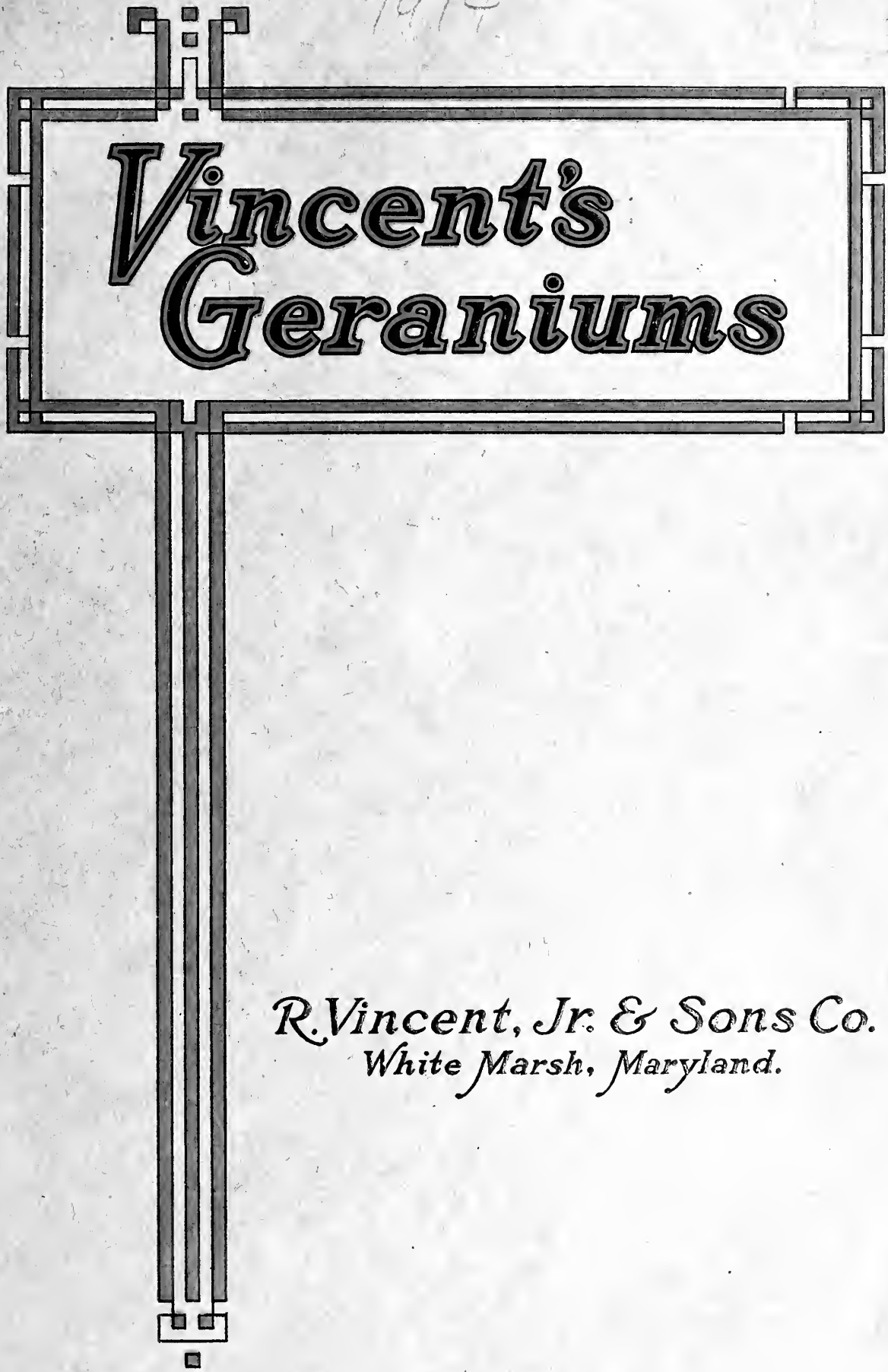
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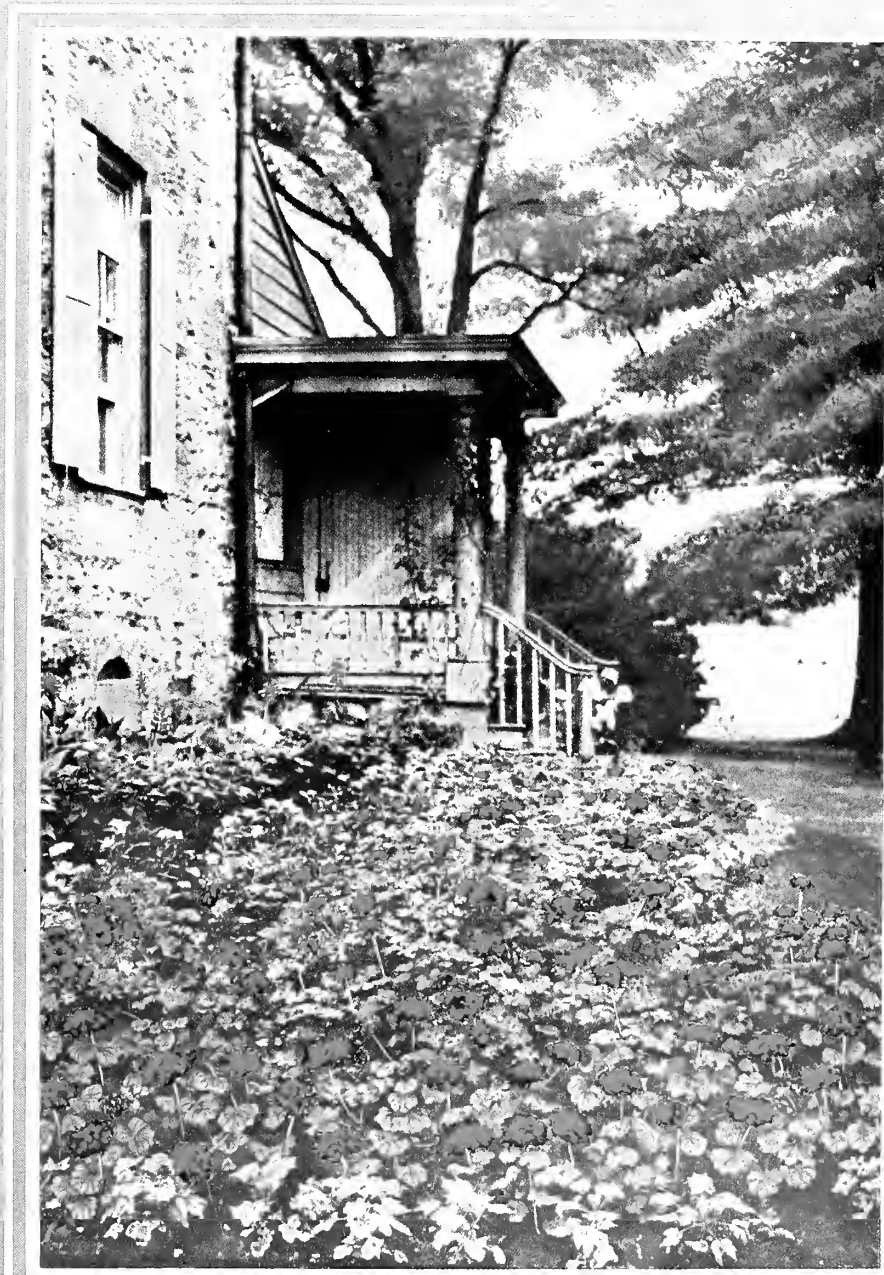

MARYLAND

Ever since we have been in the Geranium business we have endeavored to find a novelty on which we could stake our reputation. In this endeavor we have raised hundreds of seedlings ourselves and discarded innumerable very promising seedlings offered by others, as not possessing the qualities we desired should be in our first novelty. Several years ago we placed in the hands of an expert hybridizer certain stock from which we believed the desired results could be obtained, with instructions that he was to spare neither time nor expense to produce a variety that would embrace, as far as possible, all that was required in a Geranium—color, health, fullness, habit of growth and freedom of bloom. We have no hesitation in claiming that these qualities are all found in our novelty for 1914, the Maryland.



The Maryland is the result of a cross between Alphonse Ricard and La Pilote. In habit of growth it resembles the La Pilote, only much stronger, being more robust, vigorous and branching. The foliage is handsomely marked with a chocolate zone. The individual flowers are magnificent, semi-double, perfectly formed and of grand texture, being profusely produced in enormous trusses. The color is of the most intense, dazzling, fiery red and of marvelous beauty. Words are inadequate to accurately describe the wonderful beauty of the flower and the exquisite finish of the plant.

Maryland is a variety that we introduce to the florist and the great mass of flower lovers with every confidence that it will, with its most pleasing habit and strong constitution, prove satisfactory in every way, and meet every requirement of a first class Geranium.

SCARLET BEDDER

In Scarlet Bedder, introduced by Elmer D. Smith, of Adrian, Michigan, in 1913, we have an ideal scarlet bedding Geranium in every sense of the word. It is an intermediate color between S. A. Nutt and Alphonse Ricard, but being brighter or approaching nearer to scarlet than either of these. It is a short, stocky, sturdy grower, making flower stalks at almost every joint. It is necessary to pinch out the buds to get a good growth in pots. The trusses are of medium size, not quite as large as Nutt,



but any deficiency in size is more than made up in the number produced, as the bed will become literally covered with the bright scarlet flowers. In comparison with S. A. Nutt it is superior in every way, freer in bloom, more brilliant in color and the habit of the plant is more compact. During the past Summer it has been tried out in all parts of the country and as a bedder has done remarkably well, giving universal satisfaction, and the general verdict is that it is the coming scarlet bedding Geranium.

Descriptive Geranium Catalogue

ALPHA (ROZAIN-BOUCHARLAT, 1912)

This is a bronze hybrid of a *Pelargonium peltatum* (ivy-leaved), and a golden bronze *Pelargonium Zonal* (Geranium). The foliage is finely denticulated. The center of the leaf is greenish maize with a

broad dark zone edged golden yellow; free-growing Ivy Geranium growth. The flowers are of a rich shade of scarlet red, a striking contrast to the bronze foliage; individual flowers are single, of medium size, abundantly produced in

fair-sized trusses.

A most attractive plant for hanging

baskets and window boxes and a striking bedder where it can be so used.



HELEN MICHELL

When Henry F. Helen Michell is a cross of Jean Viaud and Alphonse Ricard and the introducers claim for it supremacy in brilliancy of color, in size of bloom, in vigor and strength, in earliness of bloom, in constancy of bloom, in propagating qualities, in the number of trusses to the individual plant, in its wonderful ability to retain its brilliancy of color in the hottest of weather. It is semi-double and of the clearest possible shade of scarlet. Its growth is compact, semi-dwarf, with lustrous green foliage. The flowers are borne in gigantic trusses.

During the past year it has won enthusiastic admiration from all who have seen it and won a Certificate of Merit at the International Flower Show in New York.

EDMOND BLANC

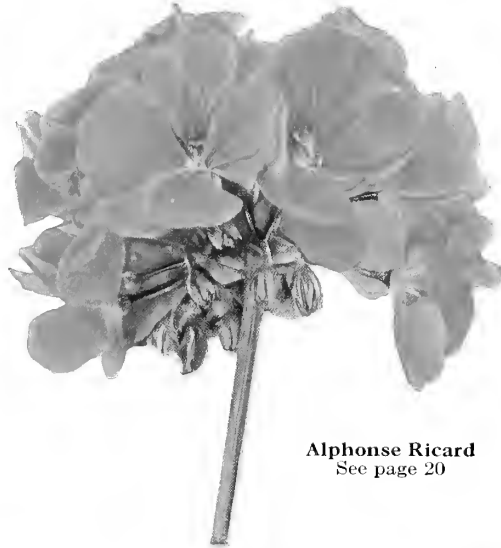

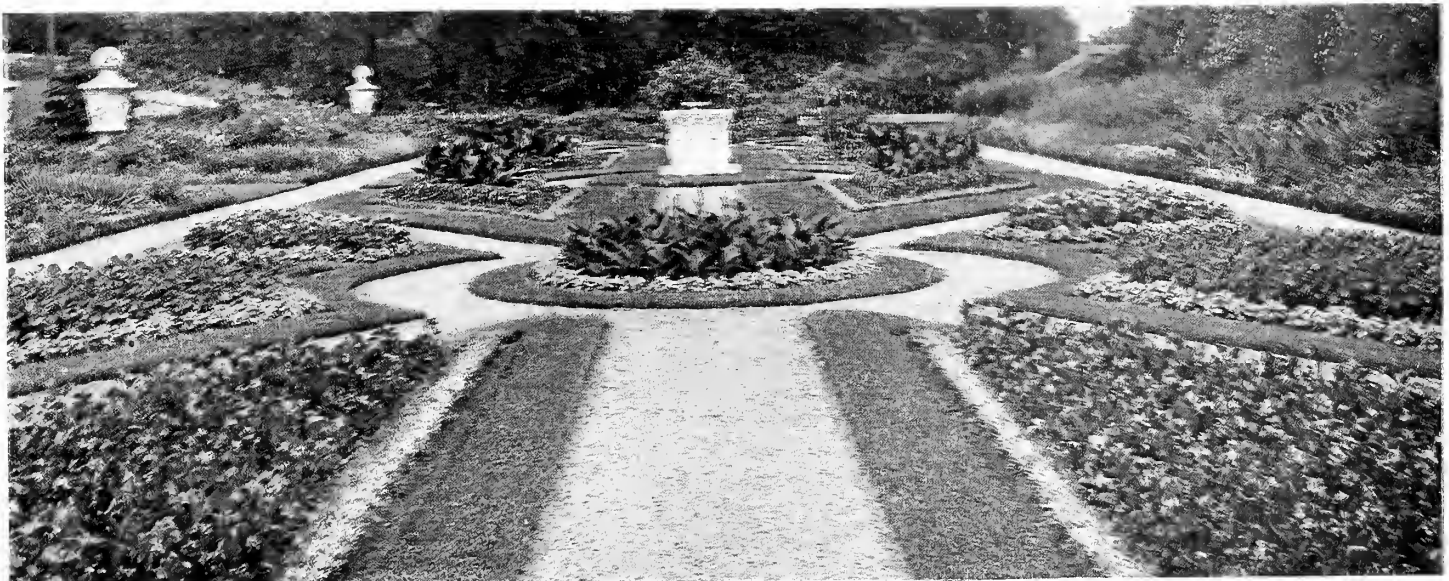

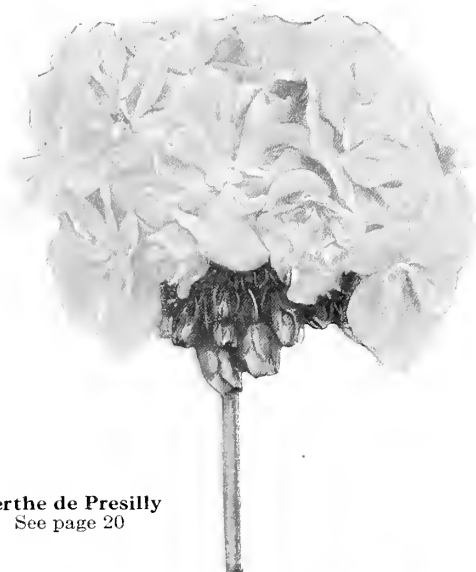

- Kleios.** Dwarf and robust variety; flowers crimson, shading to violet center, white eye, two upper petals stained nasturtium; fine coloring and free flowering habit are distinguishing features in this variety.

- Caruso.** Robust habit of growth; grand, semi-double flowers of a beautiful shade of yellowish orange.
- Cecile Idora.** Immense rose-mauve, semi-double flowers, upper petals maculated white; very large trusses, supported by long flower stalks well above the foliage.
- Jeanne Bouet.** Clear orange-rose flowers with white center; large and semi-double flowers produced in enormous trusses. Very attractive variety.
- Jeanne Girard.** Semi-double flowers, clear orange-rose, white center; strong trusses.
- Leon Dupont.** Beautiful clear orange-red, semi-double flowers; continual bloomer; fine habit of growth.
- Marguerite Bastien.** Profuse bloomer of bright madder carmine, sometimes spotted white at edge; trusses held well above the foliage; good habit; continues in bloom.
- Maxence.** An excellent variety; robust habit; free flowering; immense trusses, produced on long flower stalks; large, semi-double flowers of a beautiful shade of ruby scarlet, marked with orange at base of petals.
- Milcendeau.** Large, round, semi-double; attractive shade of crimson red, white eye, upper petals light fiery red toward center; immense trusses held well above foliage.

Colonel Darde. Immense semi-double flowers of clear cerise, large white center; good habit; strong trusses held well above the foliage.

Marcienne. Grand, round florets; beautiful shade of light lilac purple, shading to large white center, upper petals maculated white; strong grower; enormous trusses, which almost cover the plant.

Petitjean. Flowers of a remarkable clear solferino violet, petals marked orange at base; dwarf habit; strong trusses.

Anna Morstadt. A very distinct and striking shade of orange red, semi-double flowers; large trusses; dwarf, robust habit.

Baron Albert von Loo. Large, round, semi-double flowers; intense ruby-violet, upper petals spotted nasturtium; robust growth; good trusses.

- Ontario.** Immense trusses and flowers of a clear, poppy red, held well above the beautiful foliage by strong stems.
- Tangara.** Large, open flowers of a rich cochineal and carmine color, upper petals shaded darker.
- Thais.** Immense, perfectly formed flowers of a pure mauve shade, with white eye, borne in large trusses; ideal habit.
- Villa Laurenti.** Brilliant shade of lilac rose; large, handsome flowers held vertically on long stems; large trusses.
- Vittorio Mussi.** Perfectly formed flowers of a very rich, cardinal red, shaded purple.

We have listed only those sorts which years of experience in growing and selling Geraniums has taught us are the very best in their different classes, such as can be depended on to produce the most satisfactory results and which represent the highest standard of development yet obtained in their special class or color.

In keeping our list up to this high standard we are constantly adding many of the newer varieties and discarding some of the old sorts which have been favorites but are now superseded by others which are more beautiful in form, greater in substance, more exquisite in color and more satisfactory in growth.

DOUBLE VARIETIES

Abbie Schafer. (Hill.) A beautiful, soft, pleasing crimson scarlet—in fact, one of the finest and most dependable reds we have; splendid semi-double flowers; magnificent trusses, abundantly produced; excellent, semi-dwarf habit. A variety that is good everywhere.

Alphonse Ricard. (Brt. 1894.) A Geranium of such perfect habit that it has become the standard by which all other Geraniums are judged. The handsome, perfectly formed, semi-double flowers of bright vermilion scarlet are produced in profusion, and the foliage is a handsome luxuriant, bright green slightly zoned. - Achievement.** Distinct and pleasing shade of soft cerise pink; immense, semi-double flowers, freely produced in large trusses; capable of withstanding inclement weather because of hardness and strength, the result of a cross with a zonal.
- Alliance.** A French hybrid between a zonal and Ivy. Its color is a most exquisite shade of delicate lilac white, upper petals feathered and blotched bright crimson rose; flowers semi-double, abundantly produced in fine, large trusses; foliage beautiful, clean, and of splendid leathery texture; habit excellent, robust, strong, close jointed.
- Ballade.** (Lemoine 1905.) Large, semi-double flowers and splendid trusses; color tender lilac, upper petals feathered with crimson maroon; a strong, dwarf, steady grower, of splendid habit; a fine pot variety.
- Bettina.** (1905.) Superior, semi-double flowers and trusses of a magnificent shade of tender lilac white, center of flowers and petals being blotched with Tyrian rose; remarkably beautiful as a pot plant; dwarf, compact habit.
- Cæsar Franck.** One of the most popular Ivy Geraniums yet introduced; the color is an attractive shade of soft, rich crimson, with an exquisite shading of tender rose at base of petals; habit vigorous, quick growing and pleasing; strong constitution.
- Colonel Baden Powell.** Flowers of enormous size, one of the largest among the Ivies, abundantly produced in good-sized trusses; semi-double, of elegant showy form; color varies at times from pearl white to soft blush.
- Corden's Glory.** Flowers of good quality and large size; pleasing and attractive for fancy baskets or vases; a profuse bearer of a beautiful, bright scarlet flower, which is considered to be one of the best of this type.
