SUNSHINE ROSES

SUNSHINE ROSES are a product of our own and made strictly for the South where they are long-lived, hardly reaching a decline in life under 12 to 15 years of age. While they are extremely hardy and prolific in the South, they are not constituted to withstand the rigors of winter in the far North where the Multiflora understock is ideal for that climate but NOT suited to the South like the McKee understock is NOT suited to the North. The people of the South are just now learning that roses grown on the Multiflora understock are short-lived—hardly surviving our climate more than 3 to 5 years, and they are a complete failure in the valley, in Florida and the entire Gulf and sea coast. Unfortunate for the rose-lovers of the South, about all of the roses grown here are on the Multiflora understock and it is because practically all that are grown—something like ten million plants—are sold to the northern nurserymen and dealers.

The McKees introduced the budding method of growing roses in 1874, and this method has now covered the nation and everybody calls for BUDDED roses and NOT roses on their own roots, and we are glad and delighted with what we have done in making BUDDED roses, the Queen of Flowers, popular throughout the nation, and gladder still, that suitable understocks have been found for both South and North.

At the present time, the South's supply of McKee understock is confined to the S. R. McKee Nurseries & Rose Gardens.

Very unfavorable weather conditions for the past three years, along with the shortage of labor, has cut down rose production very materially and, as a consequence, there will not be anything like enough plants to go around, so try to be content to do on fewer plants—say not over ten plants to a customer, until we can do better.

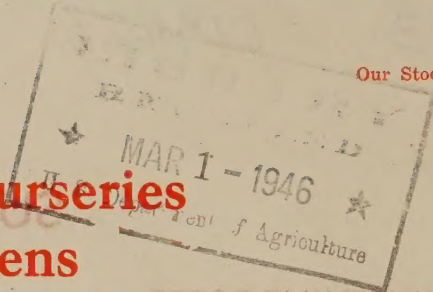

BY THEIR FRUITS YOU KNOW THEM

Two years ago the Texas State Department of Agriculture made some thorough investigations covering the nurseries and orchards over the greater part of the fruit-growing sections of the state, with a view of trying to determine the cause of so many dead and dying orchards, and the lack of interest manifested in fruit-tree-planting and commercial orcharding. Hundreds of orchards were visited and inspected in the presence of the owners, and they would invariably say that the orchards had proven to be unprofitable because of so many drones and off-type trees, and that they could not afford to give them further care and attention. Investigations were then made in the nurseries, and it was discovered that not more than 10 per cent of them maintained experimental and trial orchards, or orchards of any kind, from which to secure their propagating buds and scions, but relied altogether on getting them from the nursery stock, and in many instances, this practice has been kept up for many years. And the result is, the stock has run out and is unfit for planting.

"Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire.

"A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can any corrupt tree bring forth good fruit.

"Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them."
