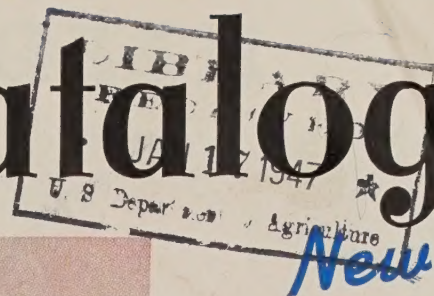

TEXAS CENTENNIAL (Pat. No. 152)

TEXAS CENTENNIAL (Pat. No. 162)—Magnificent large pointed garnet red buds on strong stems open to perfectly formed blooms of deep vermilion red flushed with gold with lighter red centers. Flowers deepen in color in cool weather. A vigorous, healthy plant with desirable free-flowering habit. Perfect for bouquets. Foliage is handsome and profuse. Each, \$1.50.

MARY MARGARET McBRIDE (Pat. No. 537)—A.A.R.S. This exquisite flower, admired particularly for its perfect form, is the most alluring, shining, coral-pink variety of recent years. The long firm buds have a golden base and open slowly to large 45-petal blooms which are double and high centered. Long, strong stems; hardy, vigorous plants. Luxuriant, smooth, leathery, deep green foliage. Aromatic. Very generous in heavy spring bloom and continuing all summer and fall. Exceptionally easy to grow. See illustration on front page. Each, \$1.50.

PEACE (Pat. No. 591)—A.A.R.S. A gigantic yellow rose with flushed edges which deepen with age to watermelon tones as the yellow grows lighter and is overcast with a lovely pink sunrise suffusion. The dark green, glossy foliage right up to the neck of the bloom is disease-resistant. Strong grower with long stems. Each, \$2.50.

SIGNORA (Pat. No. 201)—A great improvement over the well-known Pres. Herbert Hoover. Slender buds are a warm burnt orange, opening to lighter mandarin and salmon. Foliage is rich, glossy, dark green. Tall, vigorous growth with strong stems. Very fragrant. Ideal for cutting. Each, \$1.50.

THE DOCTOR—Long pointed buds of exquisite silvery pink open to enormous double blooms of finest substance. A heavy damask fragrance characterizes this striking rose. An excellent cut flower. Each, \$1.50.

McGREDY'S SUNSET (Pat. No. 317)—The outside of the petals is a clear buttercup yellow, tipped orange, and the inside is chrome yellow flushed with scarlet as it opens. Large, very fragrant, color intensifies as the flower ages. An excellent cut flower, prolific bloomer. Shiny foliage. Very sun-resistant. Each, \$1.50.

CHARLOTTE ARMSTRONG (Pat. No. 455)—A.A.R.S. The long buds are a bright shade of carmine which open to cerise in hot weather and to spectrum-red in cool weather. Double, high-centered fragrant blooms are supported on long, strong vigorous stems with deep green, leathery foliage that is highly resistant to mildew. Each, \$1.50.

COUNTESS VANDAL (Pat. No. 38)—Coppery bronze and pink, flooded with gold; reflex petals with silvery sheen. Well formed blooms produced freely. Most widely used exhibition rose. Strikingly artistic and breath-taking. Especially effective in table arrangements. Grows 24 to 30 inches high. D. s. ease resistant. Each, \$1.50.

ECLIPSE (Pat. No. 172)—Long, streamlined bud of rich golden yellow. One of the finest newer yellow roses. A vigorous, prolific bloomer and tall grower with dark green, disease-resistant foliage. An excellent cut flower with long stems. Mildly fragrant but continuously in bloom. Excellent for boutonnières. Each, \$1.50.

REX ANDERSON (Pat. No. 335)—Ivory colored tapering buds open to handsome creamy white blooms, turning pure white. Perfectly formed, slow opening, one of the very few successful whites. Exceptionally free blooming and vigorous with abundant grey green foliage. Fragrant. Each, \$1.50.

HEART'S DESIRE (Pat. No. 501)—A.A.R.S. Luminous long-pointed buds of bright red open to large flowers of deep velvety red with broad heavy petals. When fully out the exquisite double flowers retain their rich color until the petals fall. Rich, truly old-time rose fragrance. Long stems. Bushes are vigorous with handsome dark green leathery foliage. Very disease resistant. Keeps well when cut. Each, \$1.50.

MANDALAY (Pat. Pending)—Gigantic golden yellow roses against a background of heavy, very dark green foliage. This largest of all yellow roses unfolds from a long pointed bud into a tremendous high centered bloom of clear, pure gold which does not dim with age. A hardy prolific grower, long stemmed. 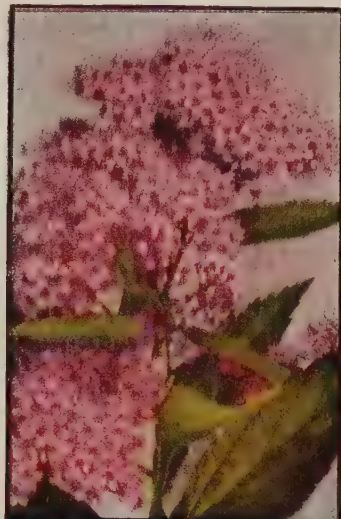
