When the white men arrived, the forests, prairies and bogs were luxuriant with flowering plants and shrubs. Few, if any, of these pioneers saw this wealth of ornamental material, but came to cut the forests, dig the iron ore, plow the prairies and drain the bogs, forcing the native plants to more and more inaccessible places. We bring these plants to you for your pleasure and enjoyment and for their perpetuation. We are willing and happy to answer any questions you may have regarding any plant we list.

Our specialty is native plants of all kinds. If we do not list the plant you want, we will try to get it for you, if possible.

To help you successfully grow these native plants, we are using the following symbols to denote their general requirements: A, acid soil; M, moist soil; L, leafmold; S, shade; O, open or sunny situation.

Terms and Conditions of Sale: Our terms are cash. All orders of \$1.00 and over will be shipped prepaid. On orders under \$1.00, please add 25c to cover packing, shipping, etc. We send out good stock and guarantee that it will reach you in good condition. WILDFLOWERS

Acorus calamus. Sweetflag. OM. Brownish yellow in short spikes on heavy grass-like stems. Root very fragrant. Will grow in shallow water. 3 to 5 ft.

Actaea alba. White Baneberry. SL. Fluffy white blossoms in June, white berries in late summer. 18 to 24 inches.

Actaea rubra. Red Baneberry. SL. Same as above, except berries, which are red.

Anaphalis margaritacea. Pearly Everlasting. O. Any good soil. White with brownish center. May be dried for winter bouquets. July. 12 to 18 inches.

Anemone canadensis. Canada Anemone. O or S. Any good soil. White flowers. June. 8 to 18 in.

Anemone quinquefolia. Wood Anemone. SL.

Best in light shade. White or light rose blossoms above a whorl of leaves in early spring. Plant entirely disappears in late summer. 4 to 8 inches.

Aquilegia canadensis. American Columbine. O or S. Any good soil. Long-spurred bright red flowers, yellow inside. May and June. 1 to 3 ft.

Aralia hispida. Bristly Sarsaparilla. L. Light shade. Clusters of dull white flowers in June, black berries in fall. 18 to 30 inches.

Aralia nudicaulis. Wild Sarsaparilla. SML. Clusters of greenish white flowers in June, purple-black berries in fall. Flower stems 8 to 12 inches, leaf stems to 2 ft.

Aralia racemosa. American Spikenard. SML. Greenish white blossoms in June, red berries

in fall. Massive and showy. 2 to 5 ft. 50c each, \$5.00 per 12.

Arisaema triphyllum. Jack-in-the-Pulpit. SML. Brownish green-striped flower, red berries in fall. May. 12 to 18 inches.

Asarum canadense. Wild Ginger. SL. Heart-shaped fuzzy gray-green leaves. Small maroon flowers resting on the ground. Ground cover. April and May. 3 to 4 inches.

Asclepias incarnata. Swamp Milkweed. OM. Loamy soil. Deep rosy red flowers. June and July. 3 to 5 ft.

Aster lateriflorus. Calico Aster. O or S. Any good soil. Multitudes of small white blossoms in August. 2 to 3 ft.

Aster puniceus. Purple-stemmed Aster. OM or slight shade. Flowers light to dark violet. August-September. 3 to 5 ft.

Calla palustris. Wild Calla. O or S; M. Rich soil. Waxy white miniature "callas" in June. Red berries in late summer. Fine for pool. 5 to 10 inches.

Caltha palustris. Marsh Marigold. OM. Bright yellow flowers, glossy green leaves. May and June. 6 to 18 inches.

Caulophyllum thalictroides. Blue Cohosh. SL. Small yellow flowers. Intensely blue berries in late summer. June. 18 to 30 inches.

Chelone glabra. Turtlehead. S or O; M. Rich soil. Spike of white flowers. July. 2 to 3 ft.

Chiogenes hispidula. Creeping Snowberry. SLAM. Evergreen creeper. Small white flowers in May or June followed by shining white berries. 50c each, \$5.00 for 12.

Clintonia borealis. Bluebeads. SAL. Yellow flowers in May, blue berries in fall. 5 to 8 in.

Coptis trifolia. Goldthread. SLAM. Evergreen creeper, small white blossoms in midsummer.

Cornus canadensis. Bunchberry. SAL. White flowers in May and June, red berries in fall. An excellent ground cover. 3 to 6 inches.

Cypripedium acaule. Pink Mocassin Flower. SAL. May and June. Large pink "slippers". 6 to 12 inches. 40c each, \$4.00 for 12.

Cypripedium parviflorum. Small Yellow Lady-slipper. SLM. Small yellow "slippers". June. 6 to 12 inches.

Cypripedium pubescens. Large Yellow Lady-

slipper. SL. Large yellow "slippers". June. 18 to 24 inches. 40c each, \$4.00 for 12.

Cypripedium spectabile. Showy Ladyslipper. SLM. Considered the most beautiful of the Ladyslippers. Large white "slippers" flushed with deep pink. Likes shade and plenty of leafmold in not too dry situation. July. 50c each, \$5.00 for 12.

Dodecatheon meadia. Shooting Star. O or light shade. Well drained garden soil. Clusters of cyclamen-like flowers on 6 to 12 inch stems above a rosette of leaves. White to purple. June.

Epilobium angustifolium. Fireweed. O or light shade. Any good soil. Showy spikes of light magenta flowers on 3 to 5 ft. plants in July or August.

Eupatorium perfoliatum. Thoroughwort. OM. Loamy soil. Dusky white blossoms on 3 to 4 foot stems. July-August.

Eupatorium purpureum. Joe-Pye Weed. OM. Loamy soil. Wine purple flowers. 3 to 5 ft. July-Sept.

Gaultheria procumbens. Wintergreen. AL; O or S. Thick glossy evergreen leaves on 3 to 4 inch plant. White bell-like flowers followed by red berries in fall.

Gentiana Andrewsii. Blind or Bottle Gentian. OM or light shade. Rich soil. Deep blue flowers that do not fully open. 12 to 18 in. August.

Geranium maculatum. Wild Geranium. O or light shade. Good garden soil. Deep lavender. 12 to 18 in. May and June.

Habenaria fimbriata. Large Purple Fringe-Orchid. OLM or light shade. Fragrant lavender-pink flowers. 18 to 24 in. August. 50c each, \$5.00 for 12.

Hepatica triloba. Round-lobe Hepatica. SAL. White to bright blue. 2 to 6 in. April.

Hypericum ascyron. Giant St. John's-wort. O or light shade in any good soil. 3 to 5 ft. Bright yellow flowers in late July.

Iris versicolor. Blueflag. OM. Rich light blue. 2 to 3 ft. June.

Liatris scariosa. Gayfeather. O. Any garden soil. Spike of lavender purple blossoms in August. 2 to 4 ft.

Linnaea americana. Twinflower. SAL. Trailing evergreen, round leaves. Two fragrant pink bells on 3 in. stems nearly all summer.

Lysimachia terrestris. Swampcandle. OML. Rather showy little spikes of yellow flowers on 12 to 18 in. plants in July or August.

Lysimachia thyrsiflorus. Loosestrife. OM. Muck or peat. 1 to 3 ft. Little spikes or clusters of yellow flowers grow from the lower leaf axils in June.

Maianthemum canadensis. Canada Mayflower. SAL. Small, fluffy white flower clusters on 3 to 4 in. stems in May.

Mimulus ringens. Monkey-Flower. OM. Snapdragon-like violet blue flowers. 1 to 2 ft. June to August.

Mitella diphylla. Mitrewort. SL. Exceedingly slender spikes of white flowers. 8 to 12 in. May.

Parnassia caroliniana. Grass of Parnassus. One solitary white Buttercup-like flower on each 8 to 12 in. stem. August. Moist, boggy soil.

Polygonatum biflorum. Solomon's-Seal. SL. Small green bells. Black berries in fall. 8 to 18 in. May.

Prunella vulgaris. Self-Heal or Blue Curls. Full sun in any soil. Blue flowers. July-August 6 to 12 in.

Rudbeckia newmanni. Western Black-Eyed Susan. Orange petals with black centers. Any dry sunny situation. 12 to 24 in.

Rubus arcticus. Arctic Bramble. SLM. Leaves similar to small strawberries. Fragrant rosy pink blossoms in May, similar to a single rose. Edible berries somewhat like raspberries sparingly in August. Rock garden. 50c each, \$5.00 for 12. Not shipped to Oregon.

Sagittaria latifolia. Arrowhead. OM. Leaves shaped like arrowheads. White flowers, yellow centered on a 12 to 18 inch spike in July. Will grow in shallow water.

Sanguinaria canadensis. Bloodroot. SL. Snow-white petals, yellow center. 5 to 8 in. May.

Sarracenia purpurea. Pitcher-Plant. AM; O or S. Reddish green flowers. Pitcher-shaped leaves. 1 to 2 ft. July.

Saxifraga pennsylvanica. Swamp Saxifrage. LM. O or light shade. Loose spike of greenish white blossoms on 3 ft. stems. Late May.

Steironema ciliata. Fringed Loosestrife. SLM. Wide open drooping yellow bells for nearly a month. July-August. 18 to 24 in.

Streptopus amplexifolium. Twisted Stalk and S. roseum; Rosy Twisted Stalk. SL. The former

has small white bells, the latter rose colored bells in May, but as the red berries in autumn are the showy part of the plant we are grouping them together. The plants resemble Solomon's-Seal. 12 to 18 in.

Taxus canadensis. Canada Yew. SLM. To 2 ft. Dwarf evergreen with soft silky needles. Scattered small red berries in late summer. Shipped with ball of earth. 50c ea., \$5.00 for 12.

Thalictrum dioicum. Early Meadowrue. SL. Misty purple flowers in May. 2 ft.

Thalictrum polygamum. Tall Meadowrue. O. or S. Any good soil. Feathery white flowers. Good cut flower. 4 to 6 ft. July and August.

Trillium cernuum. Nodding Trillium. SL. Nodding white blossom beneath the three leaves in early June. 8 to 12 inches.

Trillium grandiflorum. Snow Trillium. SL. 8 to 16 inches. Large white blossom above the leaves in early June.

Typha latifolia. Cat-tail. Everyone knows the cat-tails. To 6 ft. Moist loam. Will grow in shallow water.

Uvularia perfoliata. Merrybells. SL. Drooping yellow bells in May. 6 to 12 in.

Uvularia sessilifolia. Bellwort. L. Light shade. Pale yellow bells in May. 6 to 8 in.

Viola blanda. Sweet White Violet. M; O or S. Fragrant small white violets. May.

Viola canadensis. Canada Violet. SL. Lavender and white. June-July. 6 to 12 in.

Viola pubescens. Downy Yellow Violet. SL. Yellow violets in May. 6 to 8 in.

Mixed Violets. The above and others in mixture, not labeled. 20c ea., 3 for 50c, \$2.00 per 12.

FERNS

Adiantum pedatum. Maidenhair Fern. SL. One of the most beautiful native ferns. 12 to 18 in. Spreading fronds at the top of slender, wiry, black stems. 40c ea. \$4.00 per 12.

Athyrium felixfaemina. Lady Fern. SL. A graceful species, growing from two to three feet tall. Plant the roots just below the surface.

Botrychium virginianum. Rattlesnake Fern. SL. 1 to 2 ft. A broad triangular frond with a spore cluster above it.

Cystopteris bulbifera. Berry Bladderfern. SLM.

Graceful rather weak fronds to 30 in. Rock garden.

Cystopteris fragilis. Brittle Fern. 6 to 12 in. Delicate little fern. Fine for shady rock garden.

Dryopteris cristata. Crested Woodfern 12 to 18 inches. LM, O or S. Nearly evergreen. Upright, rather narrow fronds. One of the most beautiful ferns.

Dryopteris dilatata. Spreading Shield-Fern or Mountain Fancy Fern. SLM. 2 to 3 ft. Broad fronds of a rather light green. Nearly evergreen. For edges of pools or bog garden.

Dryopteris Linneana. Oakfern. LS. A very tiny attractive 6 in. fern with branched fronds.

Dryopteris phegopteris. Narrow Beechfern. SL. Fronds borne at top of the 6 to 8 in. stems and are shaped like arrowheads.

Dryopteris thelypteris. Marshfern. 12 to 18 inches. One for moist places.

Onoclea Sensibilis. Sensitive Fern. S or OM. Species with broad fronds, growing from a few inches to three feet tall.

Osmunda cinnamomea. Cinnamon Fern. S or O. While at its best in wet locations, this fern may also be grown in dry soil. It varies in height from 2 to 6 ft. depending on the moisture available.

Osmunda Claytoniana. Interrupted Fern. Light S or O. Possibly the largest of our native ferns, attaining a height of 6 ft.

Pteridium aquilinum. Bracken or Eagle Fern. 2 to 3 ft. A rather coarse fern growing from creeping rootstalks. Will grow most anywhere in sun or light shade.

Pteritis nodulosa. Ostrich Plume Fern. 2 to 5 ft. A very graceful plummy species, 2 to 5 ft. in favorable locations. At its best in a shady spot, but will do quite well in full sun.

VINES

Ampelopsis Quinquefolia. Virginia Creeper. Well known vine for porches and walls. 50c ea. \$5.00 per 12.

Celastrus Scandens. Bittersweet. Inconspicuous flowers. Scarlet berries in fall. Makes a fine winter bouquet. 50c ea. \$5.00 per 12.

Clematis verticillaris. Purple Virgin's Bower. Light shade. Rich, slightly acid soil, with good

drainage. Purple flowers to 3 inches across in June. Fluffy seed-clusters. 75c ea. \$7.50 per 12.

Lonicera hirsuta. Downy Honeysuckle. Trailing vine. Dark green leaves. Yellow flowers. Scarlet berries.

Smilax herbacea. Carrion-flower. Annual woody vine to 6 ft., growing from perennial root. Greenish flowers, rather ill-smelling, followed by bluish-black berries.

HARDY PERENNIALS

Achillea. The Pearl. White blooms from June to Sept. 2 to 3 ft. Sun or light shade in any soil.

Aquilegia. Columbine. 18 to 24 in. Mixed colors.

Campanula Carpatica. Harebell. 6 to 12 in. Sun or shade. Large bright blue upright bells. June to frost.

Campanula rapunculoides. Bellflower. 2 to 3 ft. Large purple hanging bells.

Delphinium. Pacific Giant. Mixed colors. 40c ea. \$4.00 per 12.

Euphorbia cyparissias. 8 to 12 inches. Looks like miniature fir tree. Has yellowish leaflets at tips of stems at flowering time. Flowers insignificant.

Golden Glow. The old fashioned tall perennial with double yellow flowers in August. 40c ea. \$4.00 per 12.

Hemerocallis. Day Lily. Large yellow hybrids. July-August.

Lily of the Valley. 8 to 12 in. Best in shade. Small fragrant white bells in May. Pips 10c ea. \$1.00 per 12.

Lychnis Chalcedonica. 3 to 4 ft. June - August. Bright red flowers in clusters.

Phlox. We have this year only a pure white variety which grows 2 to 3 ft. tall.

Saponaria officinalis. Bouncing Betty. 2 ft. Bright pink.

Sedum tectorum. Hen and chickens. Rosettes of green leaves, red-tipped.

Swiss Giant Pansy Plants. 75c per doz.

Gladiolus Bulbs. Mixed assortment, all named varieties, medium size bulbs. 50c per 12, \$1.00 per 25, \$3.75 per 100.

COLLECTED BROAD-LEAF EVERGREENS

We dig these carefully and pack well in damp moss. A mixture of half acid peat and sand is good soil for these little shrubs. Mulch them to hold the moisture. We consider these items among the choicest we offer.

Andromeda glaucophylla. Bog Rosemary or Downy Andromeda. Sun or light shade. 12 to 18 inches. Grayish green leaves. Little pink bells in June.

Chamaedaphne calyculata. Leatherleaf. Sun or light shade. 12 to 30 inches. Glistening green leaves. Multitudes of light pink bells in April.

Kalmia polifolia. Bog Laurel. Light shade. 12 to 24 inches. Glistening green leaves, gray beneath. Nodding pink flowers in June.

Ledum groenlandicum. Labrador Tea. Sun or light shade, 12 to 24 inches. Leaves green above, rusty brown beneath. Umbels of white flowers in May.

One of each the above evergreens, separately labeled, \$1.00; 3 of each \$2.85.

NATIVE TREES AND SHRUBS

Abies balsamaea. Balsam Fir. Evergreen tree to 75 ft. 2 to 3 ft., 75c ea., 3 for \$2.00; 3 to 4 ft., \$1.25 ea., 3 for \$3.50.

Acer saccharum. Hard or Sugar Maple. To 75 ft. Long lived shade tree. 2 to 3 ft., 50c ea., 3 for \$1.25; 3 to 4 ft., \$1.00 ea., 3 for \$2.50.

Acer spicatum. Mountain Maple. To 15 ft. Dwarf maple. Spikes of flowers in June, followed by drooping seed clusters in fall. 2 to 3 ft., 50c ea., 3 for \$1.25; 3 to 4 ft. 75c ea., 3 for \$2.00

Amelanchier canadensis. Juneberry. To 25 ft. White flowers in April and May. Unfolding buds are like white wool. Edible sweet berries in July. 2 to 3 ft., 50c ea., 3 for \$1.25; 3 to 4 ft., 75c ea., 3 for \$2.00.

Aronia melanocarpa. Black Chokeberry. To 5 ft. Many white flowers in June, almost black berries in fall. Brilliant autumn foliage. 12 to 18 in. 30c, \$3.00 per 12.

Betula pumila. Dwarf Birch. To 10 ft. A slender-stemmed bright-foliaged shrub. 2 to 3 ft. 75c ea., 3 for \$2.00; 3 to 4 ft., \$1.00 ea., 3 for \$2.50.

Cornus alternifolia. Pagoda Dogwood. To 8 ft. Deep reddish bark. Yellowish flowers in June, bluish berries in late summer. 6 to 8 in. seedlings only. 25c each. 3 for 70c, \$2.50 per 12.

Cornus stolonifera. Red Osier Dogwood. To 6 ft. Red bark. White blossoms in June, white berries in late summer. Clumps with 2 to 5 stems, 12 to 18 in., 35c each. \$3.50 per 12.

Crataegus rotundifolia. Hawthorn. White flowers in May, red berries in September. Will grow to 20 ft., or may be pruned to a tall thorny hedge. 2 to 3 ft., 50c ea., 3 for \$1.25.

Dirca canadensis. Moosewood. To 6 ft. Small bright yellow flowers before the leaves in spring. Attractive pale green leaves. Requires shade. 4

to 6 in. seedlings, 25c each, 3 for 70c, \$2.50 per 12.

Ilex verticillata. Winterberry. To 8 ft. Small white flowers in June. Red holly berries in fall. 18 to 30 in., 50c each, \$5.00 per 12.

Rhamnus alnifolia. Alder-leaved Buckthorn. To 2 ft. Forms a clump of erect stems with fine foliage. Small yellow flowers followed by black berries. 12 to 18 in., 50c ea., 3 for \$1.25.

Rhus typhina. Staghorn Sumach. To 15 ft. Of value for its brilliant autumn leaves and red berries. 3 to 4 ft., 50c ea., 3 for \$1.25.

Spirea salicifolia. Meadowsweet. 4 ft. White to pale pink flower spikes in June-July. 24 to 30 inch. 50c ea. \$5.00 per 12.

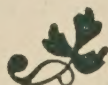
