## PREPARATION AND CARE OF ROSEBEDS AND ROSES

Excavate $2 \mathbb{1} / 2$ feet, take away all poor soil, refill with 8 inches of light clay, 8 inches of old manure and sod and the rest with good heavy soil. Fill with water 2 or 3 times to settle.

If the bed can be prepared in the fall it will be so much better as the ground will settle during the winter.

Plant the roses about 2-3 inches below where they were grafted or budded. Roses need plenty water especially during the flowering period. Water thoroughly once or twice a week according to the weather and the soil condition.


This diagram shows how your specimen-plant rose bushes should be planted. Note how the canes are cut back and mounded over with soil. Note how far below the surface of the soil the crown of the plant is set. Plant your roses just as this diagram shows, and they will be sure to grow and blossom freely.
The real secret of success when planting roses is First to cut back severely; Second, to water the plants thoroughly; and Third, to cover the newly set plants with a mound of soil. (This latter does not apply to pot grown roses.)

Prune all of the canes so that not more than four (4) 'buds remain on a cane. This is very important.

Shorten the roots a little, making a smooth cut at the end of each root.

Dig the hole at least six inches wider than the widest spread of the roots, prepare the same as for rose bed.

Put in the plant and fill the hole two-thirds with top soil, then fill up hole with water.

After water has seeped away finish filling the hole.
Next, draw up a mound of soil over the bush fully 6-10 inches high. This will bury the bush completely and protect the canes from dying out before the growth begins.

Allow the mound of soil to remain until the new growth starts, then hoe the mound down gradually. This is best done on a cloudy day. If the new growth is long and white the plants should be shaded for a few days with heavy burlap and the burlap should be sprinkled occasionally.
