Pyramidal Arborvitae
There are no more beautiful things in nature than well grown, well cared for evergreens. They are gracious and cool lookins in summer and cozy and comfortable in winter.

There is no end to their uses. The owner of a small place will find best use for the dwarf slow growing types, which he can nestle around foundations of his home, or group artistically at the corners of his steps or in front of the porch. There are other types for enclosins private portions of the grounds, for windbreaks, or for formal treatment of various parts of his garden.

We grow evergreens in quantities and have them in sizes ranging from small, for the modest purse, to very large trees for those who want immediate effect.

All evergreens are dug, balled and burlapped $(B \& B)$ at no additional charge.

## JUNIPERUS-Juniper

Cannart Juniper. Compact form with tufted foliage. Very deep green color; natural growth is informal, but can easily be trimmed to formal shape. Produces light blue berries in the summer.

## THE STORY OF THE PASSION VINE

There are many different varieties, but most of them climb by means of tendrils. They are natives of tropical America. The peculiar charm of these plants, lies in the odd flowers, the parts of which according to early Spanish and Italian travelers, represent the implements of the crucifixion. The flower is made up of five petals that are arranged in a whorl; there is also present five petal-like lobes. These ten parts of the floral envelope or pod were thought to represent the ten apostles present at the crucifixion. Peter and Judas being absent. Inside this envelope or pod is a showy crown with colored fringes; this was taken to represent the crown of thorns. There are five stamens, which is the pollen bearing organ of the flower. This suggests to some the five wounds, to others it is thought to be emblematic of the hammers which were used to drive the three nails. These nails being represented by three styles, which is the stalk inside the Hlowers, between the ovary and the stigma, on which the pollen falls to fertilizer the flower. The stamens that protrude from the center of the flower are branched so as to resemble a cross.
