

TULIPS

(Darwin Tulips Long Stems)

SPECIALLY CONCERNING TULIPS

We should like to lay particular stress on one point in connection with their cultivation. This is the importance of lifting and ripening the bulbs each season. Some bulbs do not mind being left in the ground from year to year. Many are all the better for such treatment. But tulips are invariably poorer if they are allowed to remain. They should be lifted when the leaves have turned yellow, and laid out on the dry surface of the soil. Do not lift them when the weather is wet. Above all, do not put them out on the soil surface on a hot day when the sun is too strong. Hundreds of dollars worth of tulips have before now been completely spoiled by being allowed to 'bake" in too hot sunshine, when a little extra care would have saved them.

After lifting and drying, store the bulbs in a dry, cool, airy place until they are again wanted for planting. This will not be until the beginning of November, for unlike other bulbs, tulips do not gain by early planting. They are inclined to grow too quickly, and then to suffer from frosts, and for this reason planting is best delayed. When the bulbs are put in, be very careful to plant them deep enough. You can hardly plant too deeply they are sometimes put as deep as fifteen inches without any harm resulting. If treated in accordance with these instructions, tulips will increase from year to year instead of deteriorating.

Reminders for the Novice

Manure your soil adequately, but not at the time of planting. It injures bulbs, and some-times sets up disease, to put them in contact with fresh manure.

Water indoor grown bulbs regularly. More bulbs are spoiled by faulty watering than by any other trouble.

Bonemeal is an excellent artificial manure for bulb gardens. Cow manure, very well decayed, used on sandy soil makes a good bed for bulbs. Choose heavy, firm bulbs, in preference to

large, soft ones.



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
