We cordially invite you to visit our Nurseries at West Newbury and Newburyport and see the fine quality of nursery stock that we are growing. Both Nurseries are located on improved roads easily accessible the year around.

If impossible to visit the nursery, we invite you to order by telephone or mail. We use the greatest possible care in the selection of all stock and we will gladly pay return charges and replace any stock not satisfactory if notified within five days after arrival of goods.

We are always glad to have customers order stock at the nursery where it can be seen, but we cannot dig orders while the customer waits to take them. We will gladly tag and reserve special plants if the type and size wanted is other than the usual nursery run, but as orders through the spring are promised several days in advance most of the time, it will be necessary to dig them in rotation as ordered and either hold them to be called for or to be delivered by our trucks. This is necessary as it is hardly fair to delay orders taken at an earlier date.

The above does not apply to Roses, Fruit trees or any of the various shrubs or evergreens that we often have dug ahead and ready to ship.

During the spring planting season, our Nurseries are open from 7:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. every weekday. Closed Sundays. The balance of the year from 8:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M., closing at noon Saturday.

## Toreword

For over one hundred years the Cherry Hill Nurseries have been engaged in the growing of fine trees and plants. This long experience enables us to supply you with strong hardy plants that are sure to thrive in our rugged New England climate.

All stock is freshly dug on orders and this insures all stock being in the best possible shape when delivered to you.

We guarantee all our stock to be true to name and will replace any that proves other than represented or refund the purchase price. Beyond that, we can give no further warranty, as we cannot control planting conditions, weather and aftercare.

All prices for stock are here at the Nursery, and packing on large plants will be charged at cost. We are equipped to make truck delivery on full loads throughout New England and the surrounding territory at a cost which in most cases is not greater than the combined cost of packing, freight or express. This is a very satisfactory method as plants are delivered fresh, directly to the planting site. On smaller orders, less than a full truck load, we can usually make combination load deliveries within a radius of 40 miles of the nursery, the cost being divided depending on the size of the order. These, of course, cannot be delivered on any specified date. All plants, however, not balled will be packaged or wrapped so that if the customer is not there on arrival, they will keep safely for several days.

Due to modern methods of handling, the transplanting season has been greatly extended. Our spring season usually commences the last of March or early April and continues through June during which time almost all plants may be safely moved. Our fall season starts with the planting of evergreens and perennials in late July and deciduous material from October until the ground freezes. Large trees are economically moved in winter with frozen balls of earth.

One to four plants of a single size and variety at the each rate; five to twenty-four at the ten rate; twenty-five or more at the hundred rate when such rate is given. These prices apply to our usual first grade stock, but when a tree or plant of outstanding quality is selected, a special price is charged.

Terms: charge accounts for thirty days' credit may be opened by new customers giving satisfactory bank or trade references, but to those unknown to us, we ask for cash with order.

Owing to the uncertainty of supplies, we reserve the right to change prices without notice.

## RHODODENDRON HYBRIDS

With their large heads of flowers, varying in shades of bright crimson, pink or white, these are among our most striking of flowering shrubs. When not in bloom, the dark evergreen leaves give pleasing foliage effects. Many of the hybrids are not suitable as far north as this and we have selected and grown those of Rhododendron catawbiense parentage which have proved hardy. In planting, mix the soil with peat or leafmold, which has an acid reaction and is retentive of moisture during the summer. ## Roses

In our northern climate, roses must be selected with a thought for hardiness and vigor as well as the bright color effects desired in the garden. Our list covers a wide range of color and we have found these to be vigorous. In this latitude the plants should be protected for the winter by heaping earth around them and then covering with a mulch so that they are covered six inches deep. In the spring prune back to live wood.

All our Hybrid Tea Roses are potted in generous-sized containers. These will be available after May 10th. In planting, slit the paper pot leaving the earth intact and plant about three inches deeper. They will then be well established to grow rapidly for bloom in June and throughout the summer.

As roses need more aftercare than flowering shrubs, we cannot be responsible for their growth after they leave the nursery and any complaints must be made within ten days after being received.

We may be out of certain kinds and will substitute varieties similar in color unless otherwise directed. Please advise us if you do not wish substitutes.

We do not recommend fall planting of roses for this latitude.

## HYBRID TEA ROSES

These will give an abundance of bloom from June until frost. They should be liberally fertilized every year and given some protection from the sun and frost during the winter.

## Peonies

For hardiness and vigor and for sheer loveliness, Peonies are among our most useful perennials. When once established, the plants increase in size and quality for many years and the rich coloring of the flowers adds much to the beauty of the border or garden. They do well from Georgia to Saskatchewan and give pleasure in gardens where many other perennials fail to grow.

Peonies are especially decorative as cut flowers and many amateur enthusiasts give thousands every year to churches and hospitals.

We have endeavored to consistently maintain our freeblooming Cherry Hill Strain by selective propagation and the large vigorous plants which we furnish give satisfactory results.

## Culture of $P_{\text {eonies }}$

Peonies will grow in almost any location, but do best when not planted too near large trees. However, where they are given some shade from the hot afternoon sun, the delicate colors may be retained. A good garden soil of loamy texture, where there is drainage, will produce satisfactory roots and flowers. In this type of soil, no especial preparation is necessary except to loosen and break up any lumps.

You may use any garden fertilizer available or bone meal. Wood ashes containing lime and potash have proved very satisfactory. The amount will be determined by the size of the plant, but a good handful is a rough measure. Too much rain may cause botrytis, a fungus which causes the stems to wilt and turn black. We find that ground limestone is one of the best correctives and this may be used freely. The diseased stems should be burned.

The roots should be planted so that the buds are about two inches below the surface when the ground is settled around them. 'Too deep planting will result in good foliage but no blooms. This is usually the cause for lack of blooms. Do not attempt to replant Peonies in soil where they have grown before, and if the same location is desired, the earth should be removed and replaced by fresh earth from another part of the garden. When the buds attain about an inch in size, they exude a sticky honey which is attractive to ants, but these seldom do harm and will disappear in a short time.


Peonies may be successfully planted at almost any time of the year, but are most easily handled in the fall from September to November, and early in the spring before the buds have pushed through the ground. The first season will not produce large and often not typical blooms. They should be treated as permanent plants and will grow and thrive from ten to twenty years in one location.

## SHIPPING CHARGES

When shipping Peonies, we cut off the tops leaving compact plants. Except in large quantities these may usually be sent by parcel post more cheaply than by express. If you wish your order shipped in this way, please include 20 cents for the first root and 5 cents for each additional root. We will pack the plants securely with moist material so that they will arrive in a fresh condition ready to be put in your garden. Larger shipments may be sent by express collect.

## Ohlox

For masses of color in the garden or border in summer and early fall, there is nothing more satisfactory than Phlox. Phlox should be planted in well-drained, fertile soil and thinned every three or four years. This allows more air drainage and overcomes the tendency for the lower leaves to mildew. Dusting the foliage with sulphur is also one of the best methods of prevention. Pick off the faded blooms
before the seed ripens. This allows the plant to make a second flowering and prevents seedlings springing up and choking the parent plants. Seedlings are usually inferior in color and cause much confusion.

## MAINTENANCE AND CARE

Evergreens and shrubs, when planted near the house, will in a few years, grow too large for the space assigned them and will mar the effect which was originally intended. Instead of waiting until they are too large and then pruning them drastically, it is much better to give them a light pruning every year. By this method no large branches are cut and the planting will continue for many years improving in value and appearance. We have men available in the summer and winter months and the cost is slight when compared with the results obtained.

Especially near the house, the soil is often dry and lacking in plant food, and it is better to make a light application of fertilizer every year rather than too much at one time.

## LARGE TREES

Large specimen trees may be moved with safety at almost any time of the year. The modern method of digging with a large ball of earth on the roots ensures the continuous flow of sap through the fine feeding roots. Trees handled in this manner usually continue to grow without any check and make immediate landscape effects. They may be planted with our special tree moving equipment even when the ground is frozen in the winter. If arranged for earlier this is an economical time.

The use of a few large specimens with the smaller plants gives very pleasing and satisfactory effects. We have growing a large variety of specimens which we can furnish, and are prepared to give you estimates on your needs without obligation on your part.
