During our fifty-eight years of service to American garden lovers, we have always maintained a reputation for seed of superior quality. The success of our many customers in growing superior plants has strengthened our conviction that we shall supply only those varieties and strains of finest quality.

In the pages that follow, all of our Flower Seeds are arranged alphabetically. The annuals, biennials, and perennials are carefully marked so that those who are not familiar with the different kinds of plants will not be confused.

Annuals. These grow to maturity, bloom, ripen their seed, and die the same year. Asters, Poppies, Sweet Peas, Morning-Glories, and Zinnias are typical examples. Some of these Annuals are sown in a sunny window indoors, or in a hotbed or coldframe from March to May in order to get an early start. Seed of practically all Annuals can be sown in the open ground after danger of frost has passed.

Biennials. These are raised from seed started in early summer, flowering the second year, after which they die. Typical examples are Pansies, English Daisies, and Canterbury Bells.

Perennials. These plants live on from year to year, increasing in size and in beauty with age. Typical examples are Aquilegia, Delphinium, and Hardy Phlox. Many Perennials may be grown from seed, which is usually planted outdoors from June to September. The young plants may be carried over the first winter in a coldframe or they may be set in their permanent places in early autumn and given a light protective mulch the first season. Some Perennials are known as halfhardy and require winter protection each season, and those known as Tender Perennials require greenhouse protection over winter.

Special Note. While this lovely fall flower is very easily grown from seed, the greatest possible care should be exercised with the seed-bed. Old soil and boxes should never be used the second time without thoroughly sterilizing, to avoid the numerous diseases to which Asters are so susceptible. Barnyard manure should never be employed as a fertilizer; we recommend the use of fine-ground bonemeal. Asters should not be grown in the same location two years in succession.







How to Sow Double Petunia Seed


The seed of Double Petunias is very fine and should be sown inside in flats or pots, using a mixture of finely sifted soil, with the addition of some sand. Thoroughly water the soil and then lightly scatter the seed on the surface. Do not cover the seed with soil. The receptacle should be covered with a sheet of newspaper and a pane of glass, and kept in a warm location until the seedlings start to grow. It is important not to discard the small seedlings, as these usually produce the best double flowers.

CULTURE. Dahlias are at their best during the latter part of September or early in October. To get exhibition blooms, disbud plants up to August 1. Spade or plow the soil 1 to 1½ feet deep; fertilize with manure or Hyper-Humus; scatter about ¼ pound of bonemeal around each hill when planting. If soil is very heavy, incorporate a liberal quantity of granulated peat moss. About August 1, apply about ½ pound bonemeal to each plant and work in thoroughly; sheep manure or potato fertilizer can be substituted for bonemeal at this time to good advantage.

How to Keep Dahlia Tubers After They Are Shipped to You If Too Early to Plant

Open package and allow tubers to remain in packing material. Do not expose to air or moisture too much; keep in a cool place, but not where they will freeze.



- 1. Dig the hole large enough to accommodate the root system without crowding. Remove any bruised or broken roots.
- 2. Spread out the root system and adjust the height so that the bud-union will be slightly below the natural ground level. Work the pulverized soil carefully around the roots so that no air spaces are left.
- 3. Fill in soil to cover the roots and firm. Fill the hole with water and allow to drain away before filling in with the remainder of the soil.
- 4. Mount soil high around the stems for protection until growth starts; then remove carefully.

ON GROWING CLEMATIS

Soil. A rich well-drained loam, loosened by the addition of sand or peat-moss, is best. Make certain that the collar of the plant is set 2 to 3 inches below the surface of the soil. Firm the soil well around the roots. Water frequently in dry weather.

Location. A partially shaded location with 5 to 6 hours' sunshine is ideal. If planted in full sun provide a cool root-run by a good summer mulch of some loose material such as peat, straw, rotted manure, etc.

Fertilizing. Well-rotted manure is preferred with any well-balanced plant-food as a good second. Work it well into the soil without disturbing the roots. Use a little lime occasionally.

Trellis. Provide a support at once—a trellis, wire netting, old stumps, low shrubs, or stone walls.

Winter Mulch. With fall planting of Clematis use a mulch of straw, leaves, or peat moss for the first winter to prevent the soil from freezing and thawing, which sometimes damages the stems if they are unprotected.
