6-1/2" and larger No. 1



HOW TO GROW ORCHIDS IN YOUR HOME

- LOCATION Try to give the plants a northern exposure near a window. If that is not convenient, provide protection against any direct midday sun, possibly with Venetian blinds.
- WATERING Water once a week with one cup of water for a six-inch pot, and proportionately more for larger pots. During summer heat spells, watering can be increased.
- TEMPERATURE Cattleyas like the usual, comfortable living, home temperatures.
- Odontoglossums do well in the cooler rooms, in the cool conservatory or sheltered porch.
- Phalaenopsis should be kept in the warmest room or conservatory. They like a higher temperature than any of the other orchids.
- Cymbidiums can stand more cold than any orchid. In the San Francisco area, Cymbidiums flourish in shady or protected gardens, in large pots in protected patios, or in unheated glasshouses.
- Seedlings like the added humidity of our plastic case or humidifier in the home's warmest room.
- CLEANLINESS The orchid plant can be kept clean by occasionally wiping all surfaces lightly with a damp cloth. DDT garden spray is all the plants would ever need, if at all, for control of thrip or scale.
- HUMIDITY Plants can be set in an ordinary tray or flat bowl, or on wetted gravel or white crushed rock placed in the tray or bowl. This rock helps to give added humidity or the jungle atmosphere by the evaporation of water kept about the rock in the tray or bowl. At least one inch should be allowed between the level of water about the rock, and the bottom of the pot.
- Caution: Orchid plants need no plant food or fertilizer!
- BLOOMING From 5 to 7 days after flowers open, they are ready for picking. You can cut your own orchid corsage at this time without injury to plant or flower. On the plant they will last from 2 to 6 weeks without additional attention.

Care should be exercised to insure proper care of seed in transit and that it is not too old to germinate. It should be as free as possible from spores that cannot be destroyed by sterilizing.

December was a quiet month when it came to birthday cakes, but we surely enjoyed the three-decker celebrating Jaime Sandoval's anniversary.

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


