Hemerocallis (Daylilies) are receiving more attention each year. They are fast becoming the most important and preferred perennial. This increased popularity is due to the many beautiful colors and characteristics now available. The color range has been so widened that it includes the palest yellows and deepest golds; pink, rose, maroon and purple. Much interest and variety is found in the size of the bloom which ranges from 2 to 9 inches and each variety displays its own particular characteristic form. The culture of Hemerocallis is simple: ample growing space, good garden soil with one yearly feeding and adequate water at blooming time. If you are not familiar with this "old flower with a new dress", grow them and you will be more than pleased.
