

NEW HAMPSHIRE'S GREAT BAY was released by the Agricultural Experiment Station in 1949. It is a very large late berry produced on giant plants. In tests here it outyielded both Catskill and Howard 17. Plants have tremendous root systems capable of ripening big crops. It looks like a great commercial. Try Great Bay. Stock still scarce.

GEMZATA is an everbearer that has remarkably clean foliage and the plants are rugged. Grow in the hill system for the fall crop. Plants also bear a good spring crop. Berries are large, light colored, good.

SPARKLE is a bright red berry of good quality and excellent for freezing. Sparkle and Great Bay are the two best late berries we have seen.

New and Better Everbearing Raspberries

DURHAM EVERBEARING raspberry, a new introduction of the University of New Hampshire is the earliest good fallbearer available today. It ripens here about September 1 on the new canes and bears until freezing weather. It is a good sized berry of good quality and the only really satisfactory fall bearer where seasons are short. We highly recommend it for the home garden and for sale on roadside markets. It will bear on new canes the same year plants are set.

SEPTEMBER EVERBEARING raspberry is a New York Station release. This variety is sweet, large and meaty. But it is about 10 days later, starting here about September 10. Should be excellent on frost free locations here and in states farther south. We actually picked individual berries weighing at the rate of 80 to the pound.

No garden is complete without our new early hardy chrysanthemums. Here in southern New Hampshire we have varieties in bloom for over 12 weeks — from about August 10 until well into November. For your convenience we are listing varieties by color and in order of blooming. Include some of these fine early varieties to insure a long blooming season. We have made careful selections from the nation's leading hybridizers.

Our chrysanthemums serve many purposes, they give a wealth of cut flowers, make gorgeous perennial gardens with the variety of size (8"-40"), and colors and forms; make excellent pot plants, and the cushion types make beautiful blooming hedges.

Each year we start many plants by rooting cuttings in the green house and transferring them into 2½" bands. We offer these as "pot" plants which can be set out about the time you set tomato plants. We also offer field divisions which are taken from plants that have wintered over outside. The old portion of the plant is thrown away and a large enough new section is taken to produce a fine blooming plant later this year. These have two advantages, namely that they ship well and that they can be planted early while the weather is cool. The varieties we list are available as rooted cuttings, pot plants, field divisions, and field clumps. Prices in right column are for field divisions except as noted (items marked* are priced and available only as pot plants and after late May as field transplants. All are guaranteed to give you satisfactory performance this year.
