## Acidanthera

MURIELAE. One of the most delightful of summerflowering bulbs for outdoor gardens. The large blossoms are three to four inches across, sweetly scented, pure white with starry throat blotches of crimson maroon. A mass of six or more of these showy flowers suspended on strong graceful stems is most distinctive. They are excellent for cutting, blossom through most of August and September, and are rarely damaged by wind or rain. Height - $21 / 2$ to 3 feet. A recent introduction from western Abyssinia. Handle much the same as Gladiolus, but should not be planted in spring until ground warms up. Extra choice.

Ideal for the conservatory, window garden, living room, terrace, or set in protected places in the open. Will continue to bloom freely every summer, year after year, if given large enough pot, plenty of food and water. Usually grown in large pots or tubs, but may be bedded outdoors in southern regions. Though this is best known and most popular as a cut flower offered by the florist, it is equally as fine a plant for the summer garden. In the south and west it is winterhardy, but in the north and east it must be handled as a tender bulb much like Gladiolus. It is of easy culture, preferring rich moist soil and plenty of water during the growing season. Solitary flowers are borne 12 to 18 inches high in colorful profusion over dainty fern-like foliage for a long period of time. Plant early as possible in the spring. Also a worthy subject for the small greenhouse or conservatory.

ELEGANS. Dainty "Mexican Coral Drops" that will bring much charm to the summer garden. The flowers are clear coral-red on the outside, while the interior is orange splashed with broad creamy stripes. A striking addition to the garden, suggesting as it does the burst of miniature rockets. Loose bell-shaped umbels of 5 to 10 blossoms are borne on 20 -inch stems - excellent for cutting. ## Gloriosa

ROTHSCHILDIANA. An extremely unusual low climbing vine attaining a height of about 3 feet. Though considered a novelty in northern gardens it is actually easy to grow in a sheltered sunny spot if potted and started indoors in March or April. The petals of the gorgeous Lilylike blossoms are recurved and waved, opening bright golden yellow and crimson, and changing to a deep scarlet. In bloom throughout the summer and autumn months, it is truly eye-catching, and individual blooms create exquisite table decorations. Dig and store tubers like Gladiolus. This is a fine plant to try in the small greenhouse.

## Montbictias

A gay striking colorful race of plants from South Africa that are much like graceful miniature Gladiolus. Each bulb produces several wiry spikes with individual blooms measuring $21 / 2$ to 3 inches across. One of the finest of cut flowers blooming throughout late summer and autumn. Hardy in the north under a good straw mulch. Prefers a rich soil with liberal amounts of water.
If you revel in sunset colors and autumn foliage you will like Montbretias. In August, September and October they splash the garden with bright apricot, fiery red, tawny crimson and gold.

## Ramunculus

## (CROWFOOT OR BUTTERCUP)

Showy, colorful plants for the spring garden, or for greenhouse forcing. Planted outdoors in very early spring while weather is cool and moist, they will blossom about the last week of May or first week of June. A well grown mass of these charming flowers in full bloom is a sight not soon forgotten. Although not winter-hardy in Northern states, they can be grown and handled like Gladiolus. Plant as soon as the frost is out of the ground in spring, about $2^{\prime \prime}$ deep and about $6^{\prime \prime}$ apart; making the soil very sandy on top so the leaves will push through readily without heaving the soil. They prefer a damp location, where they will receive some shade during warmer part of the day, and plenty of moisture at the roots during the growing season. When foliage ripens off in late August, dig and store in a cool room.
A successful indoor pot plant where conditions are cool and moist.

## Tigidia Pavonia

Few more brilliantly colored flowers are to be found in the Iris family than these "Shell Flowers," undoubtedly named for the iridescent beauty of the large, bizarrely formed blossoms.
The foliage is short and sabre-like, with stems rising to $21 / 2$ feet bearing unique triangular flowers of three outer long petals and three inner short. Center petals are gayly spotted and banded thus giving the plant one of its common names "Tiger Flower". When this plant is set to a depth of 4 inches in rich moist soil in a sunny location it is very free flowering, filling the dull summer period with many weeks of gay, cooling colors. It is most effective when clumped, preferably with a low foreground planting. Culture is the same as for Gladiolus.
Of these charming and uncommon tuberous-rooted plants we grow a large stock, and can supply strong, healthy corms.

## Vallota

Named after Pierre Vallot, the famous French botanist. Popularly called the "Scarborough Lily" it has been cultivated by rich and poor for over a century. Its popular name is supposed to have been derived in the same way as the Guernsey Lily . . . a Dutch bark was wrecked off the coast of England, some bulbs washed ashore and became established as garden plants.
A South African amaryllid of exquisite beauty. The leaves are long, ever-green, and dark green stained purple at the base. A well-grown plant will produce from 30 to 40 spikes of from 3 to 8 flowers each.
They are usually grown in the open in California and the South. Excellent for the window garden in the north.
PURPUREA MAJOR. Rich scarlet flowers to 3 inches across of lily-like appearance borne on stems up to 3 feet in rounded clusters.

## Jophyranthes

The dainty little "Zephyr Lily" or more poetically, "Flower of the West Wind". A beautiful and interesting plant that should become very popular with every gardener who appreciates flowers of gay and subtle beauty. Flowers are borne in great profusion throughout the summer on slender graceful stems 6 to $12^{\prime \prime}$ high. It is most effective for massing, or in little clusters sprinkled throughout the perennial border and shrub border and rock garden. Lift bulbs like Gladiolus and store in fall.

They are equally at home indoors, and pots of them may be brought into bloom several times each year by alternately drying them off and then forcing into growth.
ROBUSTA. (Habranthus Robusta). White, tinged with delicate pink, and green throated. A large and beautiful variety from South America. Flowers are 2 to $3^{\prime \prime}$ across, borne on tall $10^{\prime \prime}$ stems. Usually have one blooming period each month from June to September, and often more frequently when there is ample moisture.

The culture of our Fancy-Leaved Caladiums is exceptionally easy, and we sincerely feel everyone should grow at least a few every year because of their unusual charm and coloring. Unlike plants that have to depend on blooms for display value, Caladiums always create a beautiful effect, even if growing conditions are not perfect, or you cannot give them proper care. What is most important, they provide color during the hottest part of summer when other plants are languishing.

To develop beautiful pot plants, for either indoor or outdoor display we suggest starting the tubers indoors in

April or May . . . or even as late as the end of June.
For garden planting we prefer to set the dormant tubers directly outdoors in their permanent location... after the ground has thoroughly warmed up. This will be April and May in warmer parts of the United States . . . May and June in northern sections. Of tropical origin they thrive on warmth and too early planting will cause them to decay in the cold ground. As they progress most rapidly the first few weeks of hot weather after planting, too early planting is of no value.

Full cultural instructions . . . very carefully written in easy to follow steps . . . are included with every shipment of bulbs.

# Magnificent NEW Varieties Introduced During The Past Few Years Which Are Rapidly Hecoming Exceptionally Popular. 

CRIMSON WAVE. Large green leaf with crinkled, transparent crimson or scarlet center and many crimson spots towards edge. A strong vigorous grower.

FIRE NYMPH. Rich rose color mottled with shades of bright pink and delicate straw color. Large leaves and sturdy plant. One of the best.
PINK CLOUD. Large, crinkly well opened leaves of splashed pink with a cloud like effect in the coloring. One of the most spectacular and beautiful varieties.
RED ENSIGN. A rather dwarf growing type with many leaves of beautiful metallic red; narrow green border. A very bright and fine new variety.

Conducted by the Biological Field Station of Western Reserve University, and the Garden Center of Greater Cleveland.


#### Abstract

The Valleevue Test Garden Trials are the most comprehensive, exacting and authoritative Gladiolus Trials in America, and we have found their ratings to be so reliable that every variety we list (American or Dutch) is checked against full detailed trial reports. In this way we are absolutely sure of performance and quality under average American climatic conditions, and the relationship of quality compared with all other varieties on the market.


The following information is quoted direct from the Test Garden Report for 1950. It will serve to emphasize the thoroughness and extensiveness of the entire program.

## GLADIOLUS TRIALS

"The Valleevue Trial Gardens tested 485 varieties of gladiolus during the past season, well over twice as many as in 1949.
"About 100 standard and best previously tested varieties were grown along side for comparison purposes, including Boldface, Circe, Connecticut Yankee, Cotillion, Evangeline, Firebrand, Florence Nightingale, Leading Lady, Mid-America, Mighty Monarch, Patrol, Polynesie, Prof. Goudriaan, Ravel, Red Charm, Salman's Glory, Strathnaver, Sun Spot, Trivoli, White Goddess, World Beater, Etc.
"The pages for recording data on each variety provide 109 blanks, most of which ultimately get answered. 28 deal with name, source, stock, soil, fertilizer, etc., 57 deal with foliate, flower head, stem, floret, etc., 15 deal with color, 3 with propagation, 3 with disease rsistance tests by U. S. Dept. of Agriculture at Beltsville, Maryland, and 3 deal with ratings.
"Some light should be given on the enormity of the task the Trial Garden has in fulfilling its obligations to those who submit material each season. Further memos have been kept to check the various man-hours required to grow these plants, tabulate their characteristics, and judge them and prepare the records for printing to apprise the industry, its members submitting varieties for trial and the public interested in gladiolus. Over 2500 man hours were required. Plainly, it is an enormous task and the expense likely well beyond the means of any gladiolus society. The volunteer contribution of much time by various members of the Ohio State Gladiolus Society is deeply appreciated.
"Varieties from 59 hybridizers in the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Germany, Holland, and England were rated for color value, exhibition and commercial value.
"In checking over the varieties submitted, certain colors predominate, indicating present trends in hybridization. There were 48 yellow, 45 lavendar, 41 light pink but only 6 light violet, 4 deep violet, 2 smoky, and 2 A.O.C. (any other color.) The yellow group had in it the finest yellows ever displayed. They certainly spell doom for many of our present yellows.
"Of the 485 varieties tested, a total of 55 rated at least one A, 13 or more of them secured A or AA in both Exhibition and Commercial, 27 of them one $\mathbf{A}$ and one $B$, the remaining 15 secured one $A$ and one $C$. Further, 31 rated BB, 54 rated one B, the other a C or D, and the entire balance of 345 rated assorted C's and D's. They contain the names of many currently well publicized sorts.
"To a very limited extent, where it is known that unhealthy bulbs were supplied, or the hybridizer feels that the performance was inconsistent due to condition on arrival of stocks supplied, a further test will be made if a new stock of sound bulbs is supplied. However, if the rating appears based substantially on low color value, a further test would be close to hopeless.
"Gladiolus persist because they are beautiful. Since a variety with an unattractive color is relatively worthless, regardless of how many other growing and exhibition characteristics are good, the first fundamental in rating gladiolus is its color appeal. If it fails there, our advice is to abandon it, the sooner the better, and try again.
"Fortunately, the color of a gladiolus is relatively stable, regardless of the geographical location where bloomed. The season was relatively cool, with plenty of soil moisture, included a hot spell and a wet soggy, watersoaking spell, all of which gave wide opportunity to check for inclement weather damage to color and petal substance.
"Several of the foremost color judges in America live close by, all members of the Ohio Gladiolus Society which is currently foremost in influencing exhibition judges to give full measure of consideration of the scoring points awarded to color. With color relatively stable, though variably subject to damage by adverse weather, with competent judges, this Test Garden is able, on one year test in one location to give relatively accurate color ratings."

## Cultwial Information

These Cultural Directions are compiled as a Barnes' service for the convenience of our many gardening friends. This valuable data is the latest, most authoritative information available, and has been prepared by our staff and horticultural associates.

## ACIDANTHERA

A very choice subject for the flower border and for cutting. Flowers from mid-August through September.
PLANTING. In the spring after ground warms up. Set corms 4 inches deep, and about 8 to 10 inches apart in informal groupings.

SOIL. A deep rich garden loam containing plenty of humus.
WINTER CARE. Before first freeze in the fall dig and dry corms thoroughly. If not well dried before storing they will tend to decay. Store in loose dry Buckwheat hulls (Mul-Tex) in a temperature of 55 to 60 degrees F.
SPECIAL NOTES. Ample and continuous moisture must be provided during entire growing season or results will be poor. But soil must be well drained.
Do not plant too early in the Spring before ground is warm as the plants develop better and quicker in warm soil.

## AGAPANTHUS

A very showy conservatory plant, used extensively in tubs on outdoor terraces. Summer flowering. In warm climates they may be treated as outdoor subjects year around.

PLANTING. As soon as received. Cover with 2 to 3 inches of soil. Use large tubs as the vigorous roots may burst pots.
SOIL. A good rich garden loam, with enough sand and humus added to make a rough porous mixture. Humus may be in the form of leaf-mold, well rotted cow manure, or peat moss-preferably manure if available.
FEEDING. Are gross feeders. Feed regularly every 2 or 3 weeks with a balanced liquid fertilizer (Ra-Pid-Gro). Twice each year apply a top dressing of old well-rotted cow manure-first scraping away a bit of the top soil so tub is not filled to edge.
GENERAL CARE. Keep exceptionally well watered from the very beginning (Tubs of course should be well drained). In full growth or in flower they require exceptionally large quantities of water.
WINTER CARE. Any time in autumn begin to reduce water supply (but do not permit them to dry up entirely), and in a few weeks move tubs into a light cellar or conservatory. Keep dormant, but maintain just enough moisture to keep the evergreen leaves from falling.
SPECIAL NOTES. Will produce a magnificent display of blooms year after year if given large enough tub to prevent overcrowding, and kept properly fed during the growing season.

## ANEMONE CORONARIA

## (Including all of its numerous varieties and types)

Very colorful interesting subjects for the hardy flower border or for greenhouse forcing.
PLANTING. As soon as possible in the spring-the earlier the better. Set about 3 to 4 inches deep and about 4 to 5 inches apart. Locate in full sun.
SOIL. Prefer good loamy well worked soil, but are not too fussy. Of course, drainage must be good.
WINTER CARE. Before freezing weather dig and dry corms. Store the same as Glads in a cool dry place.
SPECIAL NOTES. Bloom best when the weather is cool and moist, and when ground is moist. This is usually mid to late spring, so plant early.
Freshly harvested corms may be planted in October and covered with a heavy straw mulch. Will then bloom early in the spring, and for a longer period of time.

## BEGONIA-TUBEROUS ROOTED

An increasingly popular group of plants, of unusual variety and merit. Spectacularly beautiful, adaptable to many purposes, and particularly valuable for their shade-loving habits.
PLANTING. In most parts of the country they are best started indoors about 7 to 9 weeks before usual date of last killing frost in the locality. Under no circumstances start them before early March as they follow a definite schedule of rest and growth which should not be tampered with. Also, if grown more than 10 to 12 weeks in the dry atmosphere of the house, plants will become weak and spindly.
METHOD OF STARTING. May be planted individually in pots or collectively in open flats. Use a good porous humusy soil. A reliable mixture is made of equal parts rich garden loam and peat moss, plus a little sand and well rotted cow manure if available. However, accurate proportions are not important at this stage.
Do not firm soil too much. Then gently press tuber into soil until covered with about $1 / 2$ inch of soil. Bottom of tuber is rounded, whereas top is usually indented and has a small rough scar at point of last year's stem.
Now thoroughly moisten soil and place container in a temperature of 60 to 70 degrees. Do not allow soil to become dry, but at the same time do not permit it to become soaking wet. At this stage tubers will rot if over watered. Keep away from cool windows. Gentle bottom heat is very beneficial.
When growth begins and foliage is well started move container to a lighted window. A cooler temperature is preferable now so the plants will develop sturdy and well formed.

PLANTING OUTDOORS. When all danger of frost is past the well established plants should be removed from pot or flat (disturbing the roots as little as possible) and planted directly into a permanent bed for the summer; or into window boxes and hanging baskets if the pendulous types are being used.
Keep in mind there is a front to all Begonia plants, indicated by the leaves which always point forward. So face accordingly, otherwise flowers may all open to the rear.
LOCATION. All types (except Mulliflora) require almost complete shade. Open shade is best, so do not plant under trees with low hanging branches. Area should be protected from strong drying winds.
A few hours of early morning sun will not be harmful, but the hot afternoon sun at any stage is very detrimental.
Multiflora Begonias will tolerate as much as a full morning of sun.
SOIL. Should be well drained, thoroughly and deeply spaded and worked. Prepare with generous quantities of peat moss, coarse sand, and well rotted manure. An ideal soil is composed of about $50 \%$ humus.
A few weeks before planting time apply a well balanced commercial fertilizer, plus Superphosphate, at the rate of 4 lbs . per 100 square feet, and work in well.
GENERAL OUTDOOR CARE. Require constant and plentiful moisture and regular feeding. While they will produce fair results under normal garden conditions, they will produce spectacular results if careful attention is given to feeding and watering.
Water very regularly and deeply (be sure drainage is good), and never permit soil to completely dry out. Judgment will have to be used, however, as soil should not become water-logged.
During warm weather spray foliage of plants a couple of times a day with a gentle spray. During exceptionally hot weather spray more frequently.
FEEDING. Regularly every two weeks with a well balanced liquid fertilizer (Ra-Pid-Gro).
As Tuberous Begonias are shallow rooting, mulch surface of soil with 1 or 2 inches of Peat Moss or Buckwheat hulls (Mul-Tex). This will conserve moisture and keep soil cool, as well as protect surface roots.
WINTER CARE. A short while before danger of freezing in the fall, as flower production declines, withhold water gradually and permit foliage to ripen and yellow. Then dig entire plant retaining most of the roots. Store in a cool room until the soil and fleshly tuber has dried well (a month or more).
When stalk will easily part from top of tuber, remove it and clean tuber carefully of all adhering soil. Store in dry sand or Buckwheat Hulls (Mul-Tex) in a temperature between 35 and 50 degrees.
SPECIAL NOTE. For a very thorough and complete discussion of Tuberous Begonias and their care we recommend without reservation the new book TUBEROUS BEGONIAS by Worth Brown. Available through us for $\$ 2.75$, as listed in our catalog.

## BESSERA

Of very simple culture, needing only light well drained soil, and a sunny location. Plant in late spring, setting the bulbs about $11 / 2$ to 2 inches deep. In fall before the first freeze dig bulbs, dry for a short period, and store in a cool dry room.

## CHILDANTHUS

Prefers a good rich garden loam in a very sunny situation. Prepare the soil well by digging deeply and thoroughly. If not light and porous work in a quantity of sharp sand and humus.
As the bulbs sprout early, plant just as soon as ground begins to warm in the spring. Cover to a depth of 3 inches. Keep well watered during dry spells.
This beautiful plant is completely hardy in the deep south and other allied regions. Very recommendable for pot culture in a sunny greenhouse.

## EUCHARIS

A very popular greenhouse and pot plant. Occasionally grown outdoors in California and Southern Florida. Of great beauty, and deliciously fragrant. Free-flowering.
PLANTING. Set same depth as diameter of bulb. Three Bulbs may be placed in a 6 to 8 inch pot, or 1 bulb to a 4 to 5 inch pot. Plant as soon as received.
SOIL. Should be course and fibrous. The best mixture is well rotted sod with about $1 / 4$ old dry cow manure, and a sprinkling of Superphosphate. Add enough sand to keep the mixture porous.
FEEDING. Start after foliage becomes well developed and continue every few weeks until flowers begin to open. Then withhold food until flowering period is over. When flowers are finished and flower stalks are removed a new set of leaves will begin pushing up. Feed until these leaves are fully developed.
TEMPERATURE. Eucharis is essentially a warm house plant. During the active growing season it should have a minimum night temperature of 65 to 70 degrees. During the day it may be kept as hot as 80 or 85 degrees; but give light shade during the middle of the day in summer.
GENERAL CARE. Requires large quantities of water during growing season. Dry off during the dormant season but never so much that foliage disappears. This would greatly weaken the bulh. Reacts very unfavorably to disturbance, so repotting should be done only when necessary.
SPECIAL NOTES. Propagation is by offsets-but bear in mind the plants do not like disturbing, and require considerable time to recover from the process of separating offsets or dividing. Spring is the best time to perform this operation.
If you wish, you can follow the same growth and blooming cycle of Amaryllis-rest period in the winter, bloom in late spring or summer, etc. However, if bulbs are strong and healthy they can be made to bloom several times each season without detrimental effect. Directions are as follows:-
When leaves have fully matured cease watering until signs of flagging foliage are noticed. Water thoroughly and permit foliage to freshen. Then withhold water again. Keep up this alternate treatment for about a month, during which time the minimum night temperature can be about 5 degrees lower.
Start plants into full growth again by thorough soaking and raise temperature to not less than 65 degrees at night. Start feeding regularly as mentioned previously and continue same cycle.

## GLADIOLUS

## Large Flowered Types and Primulinus Hybrids

 Though Gladiclus are well known and can be grown by anyone on almost any type of soil, they do produce much finer results if planted in good loamy soil containing generous quantities of sand and humus, and attention is paid to watering during the dry months. It is best to plant the corms a bit deep (about 5 or 6 inches) as so to provide additional support for the tall stems. A well drained location in full sun is best, though they will tolerate a small amount of shade.Plant in early spring as soon as the ground is warm, and at one or two week intervals until early summer. Latest date they may be planted can be determined for any locality by figuring 75 to 90 days to bring into bloom, and planting accordingly in relation to early killing frosts in the fall.
Before ground freezes in the fall dig corms and cut off tops about $1 / 2$ inch above top of corm. Remove excess soil and place in flats to dry. When sufficiently cured so remains of old corm will pull off they can be stored in a cool dry room in large paper bags containing a small spoonful of pure napthalene flakes for the control of Thrips. In January remove from treated bags and store on open shelves in same cool dry room.
Thrips may also be controlled by the use of DDT. Use a $5 \%$ preparation, placing a spoonful in a bag partly full of corms. Shake vigorously until corms are well powdered. A little experience will soon tell you how many corms to place in a bag and how much powder to use. Store treated corms in a warm temperature for a couple of weeks. This will activate Thrips so the DDT can take effect. Then store on open shelves in a cool dry room.
Full Cultural Instructions will be included with Every Shipment.

## GLORIOSA

This spectacular plant can be very successfully grown in almost any part of the country if culture is varied according to climate. It is, of course, more at home in the warm climate of the deep south and Florida, where it attains a height of 7 to 8 feet.
PLANTING. In the North where growing season is relatively short it is best to start them indoors in late March or early April. Place in a flat of fine peat moss or Vermiculite, laying the long tubers horizontally. Cover about $1 / 2$ inch deep. Keep well moistened and warm.
TRANSPLANTING OUTDOORS. In a few weeks when sprouts appear the tubers are ready for planting-either in pots or tubs, or directly outdoors (if danger of frost is past). Place 1 tuber in a 5 to 7 inch pot, or 3 to 4 tubers in a tub. In beds, place any distance apart as desired. Place tubers horizontally and cover with about 2 or 3 inches of soil.
SOIL. Should be rough and humusy, and well drained. Be very generous with peat moss, sharp sand, and well rotted manure.
WATERING. Very important. Lack of attention to this is frequently the cause of no blooms. When watering during dry spells water deeply and well. Apply a thick mulch of peat moss or Buckwheat hulls to conserve moisture and keep the soil cool. Good drainage is a must in conjunction with plentiful watering. Feed once or twice during the growing season.

SPECIAL NOTES. Locate in full sun in the northern part of the country. Provide increasing amounts of shade the farther south planting is done. Will often bloom within 8 to 9 weeks after first sprouts appear. Attains a height of 2 to 4 feet in most sections.
After blooming period keep plants well watered, and feed well so as'to fatten the new tubers for next year.
Provide some support during the growing season.
WINTER CARE. Before the first freeze dig tubers (use extreme care as they are brittle and will break easily). Dry thoroughly in basement. Store in box of dry peat moss, dry sand, or dry Buckwheat hulls (Mul-Tex). Temperature of 45 to 55 degrees.
GLORIOSA is an excellent subject for the small greenhouse or conservatory, and may be brought into flower at almost any time.

## MILLA BIFLORA

Same general culture as Bessera Elegans. Excellent for cutting. Blooms readily in pots under glass in late winter or early spring.

## MONTBRETIA

Of same easy culture as Gladiolus. Plant 4 inches deep in full sun, in rich well worked soil. They enjoy plentiful moisture, but good drainage. Dig and store in the fall as you would Gladiolus. With a good heavy mulch of straw many varieties have established themselves permanently as far north as New York and Massachusetts-though it is best to lift and store expensive varieties.

## RANUNCULUS

Similar culture as Anemone coronaria, except that they prefer a more moist (though well drained) location and will not tolerate periods of dryness. Particularly when the flower buds have formed, the surface of the soil should never become parched, and a daily soaking is necessary, not only for the sake of the flowers and leaves, but also to keep the roots (which are close to the surface) in sound plump condition.
Plant in early spring as soon as frost is well out of the ground. Press the claw-like extremities into the earth and cover with 2 inches of light sandy soil. Space about 6 inches apart. Does not grow or bloom well if planted too deep.
Persian and Turban varieties need a well enriched loose loamy soil, while the so-called French varieties are not as particular about the quality of the soil as long as it is loose and well dug. All delight in full sun or slight shade.
After foliage has well ripened (usually in late August or September) dig roots and dry well, storing for the winter in a cool room or cellar.

## TIGRIDIA

Plant as soon as possible in the spring when the ground has warmed up. Sunny, well drained location. Soil should be a well enriched loam, high in humus content, and deeply dug. Set corms 2 to 3 inches deep and 4 to 8 inches apart. Successive plantings may be made until late April or mid May so as to provide a longer period of bloom during July and August. Keep very well watered during blooming season and during dry spells. Lack of sufficient water will produce very poor results.

Very effective when planted throughout the flower border in informal groups.
Before first fall freeze dig and dry corms carefully. Store in dry sand, or Buckwheat hulls, in a cool dry room. If stored loose without any protective material such as the sand or Buckwheat hulls, the corms will dry out and become worthless.

## VALLOTA

This beautiful Amaryllid is generally rated as a greenhouse bulb, but can be successfully grown by the amateur without a glass house. A well lighted cellar for winter storage is necessary.
PLANTING. For the first potting use a very light soil mixture, and place a little sand at base of bulb. Set bulb same distance below surface as its diameter. Use as small a pot as possible.
When soil becomes well filled with roots shift to next size larger pot, being careful not to break roots or disturb the ball of soil. Continue this until size pot is attained in which you wish to keep the plant permanently.
The final potting is very important as the plant should not be disturbed for 3 or 4 years from this point on. Drainage must be perfect. The soil should be of a strong permanent nature and very rich in plant food. The best mixture is composed of a turfy loam with equal parts of peat moss and old cow manure-to which is added a little sand and charcoal.
GENERAL CARE. Keep in full sunshine at all times of year. Strongly resents root disturbance, so avoid reporting until there is danger of roots bursting the pot. Feed regularly during growing season with a well balanced liquid fertilizer (Ra-Pid-Gro).

Beware of overpotting. Better to have the bulbs crowd each other out of the pots. Always repot directly after a flowering period.
WINTER CARE. Toward end of growing season start withholding water and store in a well lighted cellar. Never dry off completely as the foliage is practically evergreen. Just keep roots moderately moist during the winter.
SPECIAL NOTES. Failure to flower is usually because plant is kept too dry during rest period. Several years are required to develop a truly magnificent specimen plant.

## ZEPHYRANTHES

In warmer sections of the country all varieties are reliably hardy, and equally so in the middle states if given adequate winter protection. In the north they must be treated as tender bulbs, such as Giadiolus, being planted in the spring and lifted and stored in the fall.
They prefer a soil rich in humus, and an adequate supply of moisture. Location should be sunny and well drained. As bulbs of various species vary in size the best general rule to follow for planting is 2 to 3 times as deep as the diameter of the bulb. Care must be taken when cultivating the smaller bulbs that they are not disturbed or pulled out. Smaller bulbs can be planted as close as 3 or 4 inches, and all should be planted in groups for best effect.
Dig in the fall before danger of freezing and store in a cool cellar in damp (not moist) soil or peat moss for the winter. Check occasionally to make sure that bulbs are not too damp nor too dry.

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
