Specimen Evergreens

These trees have all been transplanted from two to five times Dug with earth ball on roots, wrapped in burlap and tied double with 2 ply sisal twine, at no extra cost.

COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE, "Shiners" (Silver Blue Color)—
 These blue shiners are the very best obtainable in the seed trees. We price them according to form and height. About \$2.25 per foot of height.

THUJA OCCIDENTALIS PYRAMDALIS—We have a few Pyramidal Arborvitae well grown good bushy trees. Matched pairs at \$9.00 or single trees at \$5.00 each. They run about 3 to 4 feet tall.

Asparagus Roots

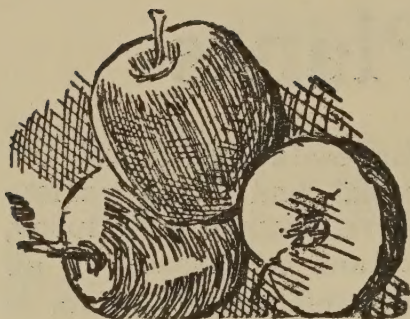
In preparing the bed for asparagus roots, the soil should be worked up at least 12 inches deep and a very heavy application of well-rotted manure or commercial fertilizer should be given. Make furrows ten inches deep and spread roots 18 inches apart in row and cover with two inches of soil, gradually filling as shoots appear until surface is level. Do not cut any later than June 20th until the third or fourth year.

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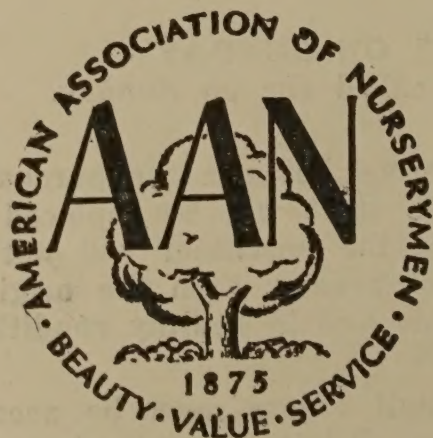
