Adding well-rotted manure to soil gives the plants a good start and to commercial growers we recommend an application of 600 to 800 pounds of commercial fertilizer (analyzing about 5 per cent ammonia, 7 per cent phosphoric acid, and 3 per cent potash) to the acre.
