## We make a great Speciality of Tulips

Tulips belong to the most beautiful of Spring Flowers. Graceful and of impressive beauty they provide a brilliant color display in the garden for at least two months in succession. Tulips are of easy culture as they are quite hardy and free flowering in either a sunny or shady situation.

A careful selection of varieties is advised to ensure a continuous flowering period. Kaufmanniana Tulips and other Rare Tulip Species bring a gay color riot in the Rockery or border when Narcissi are almost over. Early in April, the Single Early Tulips are in bloom, celebrating with fine colors the arrival of a new season. A little later the Early Double Tulips attract the attention with their colorful and peony-like flowers. Mendel and Triumph Tulips with their long stems, vigorous habit and wonderful shades are the finishing touch of April. In a wide range of shades, self-colors and bi-colors, they give brilliancy to the Garden when flowers are needed to bridge the interval until May.

All through May, Darwin, Cottage, Lily-Flowering, Parrot, Breeder and Double Late Tulips are in bloom at almost the same time or in this succession. They give a parade of brilliant colors from pure white to almost black, from softest pink to deepest purple, all on splendid stems and with great alterations in form.

All Tulips are extremely useful for the garden and bring gaiety, pleasure and satisfaction.
Collections of Tulips: Of all different sections of Tulips, we offer in this catalog very fine Collections which are carefully chosen and assembled to give entire satisfaction in your garden, border or for plantings anywhere around your home. The easiest to grow, distinct and dependable varieties are selected to produce a harmonious display of balanced beauty in a full range of colors.

Each variety is separately packaged and correctly labelled. All bulbs are choice selected varieties of top size.

Anyone not familiar with names of Tulips may order de Jager's Collections with every confidence and which are offered at a pretty saving too.

Outdoor Planting: Plant Tulips in groups of 6 or 12 to make a good display in the border or bed, 6 in . apart and 4 in . deep. They can be planted in Autumn until severe frosts set in. Tulips thrive well in any type of soil but if heavy, add some sand. Well cultivated and well drained soil is important. Dig soil before planting and do not have Tulips in the same location some years in succession, unless the soil has been removed and replaced with fresh at a depth of at least one foot. Inattention to this matter is often the cause of failure with Tulips. It is advised never to allow any part of the dead foliage or flower to drop on the ground. These parts carry diseases and infect the soil. Only use well decayed and old manure.

For Forcing: Early Tulips (single and double) including Mendel Tulips are suitable for earliest forcing, while Darwin and Triumph Tulips are for late forcing. After planting and plunging the Tulips it will take at least 10-12 weeks, before the shoots and sprouts are high enough that they may be brought into a dark room at a temperature of $55-60^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. to allow the stems to lengthen. After 10 days to two weeks the Tulips can be removed into a light warm room. For a few days, the bulbs should be covered with some paper before exposing to the full light. Tulips should never be hurried and bottom heat and draught should be avoided. Generally speaking, Amateurs should never bring in the bulbs, until the shoots are 3 to 4 in . high and after the middle of January.

Origin: The first time Tulips were ever mentioned, was in 1554, when Busbequis found a few specimen near Constantinople. Six years later, Carolus Clusius brought some of these Tulips to Holland and in 1601 he described 19 varieties in full detail and added 5 pictures. Dodonaeus wrote about Tulips in his Kruydtboek in 1618 and made three different sections. Most of the Tulips had broken colors and this was considered very fashionable. In 1634-1637, during the Tulipmania, fantastic prices were paid for bulbs, e.g. 1 Semper Augustus $\$ 2200$.-., weight 200 aces, The bulbs were sold per 'ace', one ounce is 5900 aces, and a good tulip bulb weights now 7000 aces.

# Darwin Tulips <br> (May-flowering) 

We confidently recommend this late-flowering section of self colored Tulips, with their stately bearing and rich colors. They deserve universal attention and are wonderfully valuable for bedding, borders etc. on account of their brilliant colors and their long upright stems. The Darwins flower after the Triumph Tulips and are excellent for cutting, just at the time when the spring flowers are over and there is scarcity of flowers in the open ground. As cut-flowers they are beautiful for decoration in vases and last a long time in water.

Origin: A collection of Tulips imported from the North of France by Messrs. Krelage \& Son at Haarlem. The actual origin is not known, but they were offered and brought into circulation in 1889, when they caused a real sensation, because of their long stems and fine colors.

For Forcing: Some varieties marked with an asterisk (*) are suitable for late forcing. They should never be forced in too high a temperature and should be syringed moderately. Darwin Tulips cannot be had in flower much before February, with the exception of the varieties Wm. Copeland, and Rose Copeland, which may be brought into the greenhouse after December 25 th.

## Mendel Tulips (Mid-Season)

This type owes its particular value to the fact that it has contracted the glorious colors and the astounding value for the garden of the Darwin Tulips and the earliness of Duc van Tholl. They are of excellent habit and beauty and flower in the garden 10 to 14 days earlier than Darwins, thus bridging the interval between Single Early and Triumph Tulips. Most varieties can be forced quite easily, early and in a short time and this adds considerably to their value. In the description of each variety, the approximate forcing date is mentioned.

Origin: The name of this race was given to a group of varieties obtained from cross-pollination between Duc van Tholl and Darwin Tulips by Messrs. E. H. Krelage \& Son of Haarlem, Holland, These seedlings flowered for the first time in 1915 and were introduced at Haarlem in 1921. They caused a real sensation and fancy prices were paid for the stocks.

Forcing: They may at once be exposed to the full light contrary to all other Tulips which should be started in the dark. If for some unforeseen reason the height is not obtained and the bulbs are found to be lazy, they should be left in the dark for a few days and thus encourage the sprouts to lengthen. See information on page 2.

## Daffodils and Narcissi

The beauty of Daffodils and Narcissi is unquestioned and these flowers now form a leading feature in almost every Spring garden. Every Gardener should realize the enormous amount of intense pleasure that can so easily be obtained from the cultivation of a batch of Daffodils or Narcissi.

Indication and origin of the name Daffodil and Narcissus. The use of the terms Narcissus and Daffodils is being confused a great many times. There is a tendency to apply "Daffodil" to varieties of which the trumpet or cup is as large or larger than the perianth, while the name Narcissus indicates varieties having small cups. The term Narcissus however, is correct for all different types of Daffodils and Narcissi.

The name Daffodil is from an interesting origin. In the fifteenth century, the words affadile and affodylle applied for asphodel, a Narcissus with a large cup. In 1538, Turner writes about affadyll and daffadilly. Ten years later he says in his "Names of Herbes" that an English whyte affodil is a Duche Daffodil. He uses the forms affodil and daffodil in 1551. The name Daffodil was then used by Gerarde, when he used this term in his Herbal.

Other forms of Daffodil have been: aphrodillus, affodillus, daffodilly, daffadyl affodyll, daffodyll, pseudo-narcissus and bastarde-narcissus.

The origin of the term Narcissus has not been connected with so much variance. It is accepted that the name has been deduced from the Greek verb Narkaoo, (lat. obtorpesco), which means to narcotize, as the flower was considered to do so. There is also a Greek mythe that accounts for the name, in which Narkissos is the chief character.

Naturalizing Daffodils and Narcissi in Grass etc. All Daffodils and Narcissi are suitable for naturalizing but in very heavy soils, preference should be given to stronger growing sorts i.e. Trumpet varieties and many Large Cupped sorts. They are all admirably adapted for grassy slopes and banks, where they should be freely planted. A splendid effect is obtained when Trumpet and other varieties are grouped separately, scattered on the ground and planted where they fall.

Soil and its Treatment. Daffodils and Narcissi will thrive in any well cultivated and drained garden soil. In preparing the ground for planting, dig deeply and if well rotted stable or cow manure is available this may advantageously be dug in 18 to 20 inches deep so as not to come into immediate contact with the bulbs. Never use fresh manure of any kind at planting time. On poor and dry sandy soils we recommend a dressing of sulphate of potash at a rate of about 1 oz . per square yard to be sprinkled over the surface of the ground after planting.

Growing Daffodils in the greenhouse or indoors. All types of Daffodils and Narcissi are suitable for this purpose. Pot up the bulbs on arrival and if ordinary pots are used take a good loamy soil, adding sufficient sand and peat to keep the mixture open. A light dusting of bone meal is also useful. Pot firmly in well crocked pots. For bowls without drainage holes use a good fibre. Plunge the pots and/or bowls in the coolest place of your garden and in the absence of garden space the pots may be placed in a cool airy cellar ( $35-40^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$.) where watering from time to time is necessary. When the shoots are about 4 inches long and the flower buds well out of the neck of the bulbs, the pots may be removed into a warm room. Heat should be gradually increased from $50^{\circ}$ to max. $60^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$.

It is advisable to remove the foliage of the sideshoots, if these do not show a flower bud. Just before the buds are open, water can be spread lightly, when they are in bloom, less water should be applied.

Revision of the Classification of Daffodils. In this catalog we have adopted the revised system for the new R.H.S. classification of Daffodils and Narcissi formally approved by the General Bulb Growers Society of Haarlem (Holland) and the Daffodil Societies of America, Canada, Australia, Tasmania and New Zealand.

The principal changes on comparing the old system with the new one are as follows:
The former Leedsii, Incomparabilis and Barrii Divisions are transferred into two Divisions: viz. Division II Large-Cupped Narcissi with its sub-divisions a, b, c, d and Division III SmallCupped Narcissi with its sub-divisions a, b, c and d.

The whole Genus is now classified in eleven Divisions as follows:
Ia. Yellow Trumpets - Ib. Bicolor Trumpets - Ic. White Trumpets - IIa. Large-Cupped, yellow perianth, colored cup or corona - IIb. Large-Cupped, white perianth, colored cup or corona IIc. Large-Cupped, white perianth, white cup or corona - IId. Large-Cupped, nog falling in a, b, or c. - IIIa, Small-Cupped, yellow perianth, colored cup or corona - IIIb. Small-Cupped, white perianth, colored cup or corona - IIIc. Small-Cupped, white perianth, white cup or corona - IIId. Small-Cupped, not falling in a, b, or c - IV. Double varieties - V. Triandrus Narcissi - VI. Cyclamineus Narcissi - VII. Jonquilla Narcissi - VIII. Tazetta Hybrids (Poetaz etc.) - IX. Yoeticus Narcissi - X. Species and Wild forms and Hybrids - XI. Miscellaneous Narcissi not falling into any of the foregoing Divisions.

## GULTURE IN POTS

Hyacinths should be potted early in September for Christmas flowering and every fortnight after for succession.

After three or four months, remove to the forcing house as required, but care should always be taken that the bulbs are well rooted and the buds well out of the neck of the bulbs before beginning to force, as successful cultivation depends almost completely on these points. To keep the foliage dwarf and to assist the perfect coloring of the flowers, when growing, they should have occasionally a supply of liquid manure. Always use clean old pots or pans.

## HYACINTHS ON GLASSES

Fill the glass with water (rainwater preferred) so as almost to touch the base of the bulbs, a few pieces of charcoal should be put in the glass, as this is of service in keeping the water pure. The next proceeding is the simple one of place the glasses in any dark cool room, cellar or cupboard, until the sprouts are about 3 inch. high, then they may be brought gradually to the full light. Although this system of culture is very simple, it is of the first importance that suitable bulbs should be obtained.

## OUTDOOR GULTURE

For successful cultivation in the open air, Hyacinths may be planted any time from September to December. September and October being the best months; they like a light rich soil, the ground should be sufficiently drained to prevent it becoming too retentive of moisture; plant the bulbs at equal distances apart in circles or straight lines and about 5 inches deep. Never plant the bulbs when the ground is wet. They require a little covering of straw or a thin layer of leaves during the winter to protect them from frost.

When planted two or three inches apart in squares, the many flowers each bulb produces, will thickly cover the whole plot. In lawns and pleasure parks, planted in grass, they are extremely effective. They are also very fine for forcing but should be forced slowly in an airy situation. Crocuses should not be planted too deeply but only covered. We have discarded a great many varieties in favor of better ones.

## COLLECTIONS OF CROCUS

Something very outstanding to have in bloom in pots during winter, is a collection of our choice large flowered Crocus. Plant thickly in pots immediately on receipt and plunge the pots in peat fibre or ashes. Crocuses cannot stand artificial heat and should be grown as cool as possible and given water freely when removed from the plunging bed. If the temperature is too high they will go blind. These collections can, of course, also be used for more liberal plantings in the garden.

Keep the crowns shaded from the light, until the spikes are 5-6 in. high, when they can be placed in full light (never direct sun-light).
