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



BOTANICAL or SPECIES TULIPS

These comprise such a beautiful, interesting variation of flower form, size, coloring and time of bloom as to warrant their more general use. Originating in southeastern Europe and in Asia, they like any dry, sunny spot among creeping plants in the rock garden or small colonies in the border. They come up year after year without care and extend their colorful greeting to you at a very welcome time in early spring.

- Biflora. 8 in. Several small, cream flowers on a stem, tinged outside with rose and green. Early March.
- Chrysantha. 6 in. Fragrant and dainty with light yellow inside; rose outside. The smallest of all. April.
- Clusiana. 14 in. Small flowers, inside cream-white, outside cherry. Plant 9 in. deep in light soil. Early April.
- Eichleri. 11 in. Large lily flower with pointed, crimsonscarlet petals backed gold-bronze; black center. May 10.
- Marjoletti. 16 in. Medium-sized, cream-white flowers, with side edges of petals rosy red. May 15. Sylvestris. (Florentina). 16 in. Fragrant, small, nodding,
- butter yellow flowers, often paired. Early May.
- Turkestanica. 10 in. Several small, yellow-centered, white flowers to a stem. Lovely for rock gardens. April.

- Acuminata. 15 in. Slim, long-pointed, 4-inch flowers, 1/2-inch wide, of light yellow streaked with red. Mid-May.

- Fosteriana cantate. 12 in. Large vermilion-red, lily-shaped flowers with glossy deep green foliage. May 1.
- Fosteriana Red Emperor. 16 in. Huge, very long, vermilion-scarlet flowers of unusual brilliance. Mid-April.

- Hageri. 6 in. Small, globe-shaped flowers of coppery red with darker base; inside dusky copper. Early April.
- Kaufmanniana, The First. 8 in. Pretty cream-yellow flowers with outside of carmine-rose. Late March.
- Kaufmanniana, Vivaldi. 10 in. Pale vellow inside; outside of petals cherry. Foliage dotted brown. Early April.
- Kaufmanniana Hybrids. 8 in. Inside yellow shades; outside rose shades. Early April. Very attractive.

- Fosteriana Princeps. 12 in. Very large, robust scarlet like Red Emperor but a week later. Late April. Saxatilis. 12 in. Lilac flowers with yellow centers, often

SINGLE EARLY TULIPS

Few spring flowers rival these for brilliancy of bloom or ease of culture. They are excellent for beds in the lawn, for garden borders and for cutting. While they lack the larger bloom and stem length of the Darwin and Cottage Tulips they are used where earlier blooms are desired as they are at their best from April 10 to May 1.

- Couleur Cardinal. 13 in. Brilliant crimson-scarlet with Bel Ami. 30 in. Beautiful, vivid rose-pink flowers held deeper flush outside, on strong stems.
- golden yellow flower flushed with deep orange.
- held erect on strong stems.
- Rose Beauty. 15 in. Attractive, medium-large, fine deep rose flowers, tinged cherry. Thomas Edison. 12 in. Medium large flowers of vivid
- orange-red with yellow-orange border.

DOUBLE EARLY TULIPS

From April 10 to May 1 these provide masses of color for attractive beds. They are splendid for cutting.

Dante. 12 in. A greatly improved variety with large flower heads of bright blood-red.

COTTAGE TULIPS

These embrace a great variety in form and are rich in the more delicate and artistic shades of color. They are best of all for cutting as the graceful flowers are mostly long and oval, with long, slender, often curved stems. They come into bloom from May 5 to 15 and will last for many years. Plant in color groups.

- **Columbus.** 24 in. Medium-sized, long, golden yellow flower with vermilion blotches. Unusual.
- **Conde Nast.** 26 in. A beautifully formed flower of creamy yellow shaded with rose.
- Golden Measure. 26 in. Handsome golden yellow flower with a faint reddish tone on the petal edge.
- G. W. Leak. 28 in. A brilliant cup-shaped flower of vivid orange-red. Superb among evergreens.
- Marshall Haig. 28 in. A very striking, well-formed flower of brilliant scarlet-red. Very attractive.
- Mongolia. 28 in. Enormous globe-shaped flowers of distinct chrome-yellow.
- Pride of Holland. 24 in. Medium-sized, well formed flower of glossy canary-yellow flamed with blood red.
- White City. 28 in. A superb pure white flower of large size held high on a long stem.
- Mixed Cottage Tulips. Including the above colors in a well-proportioned color mixture.

- Yuki San. 20 in. A very distinctive variety with madderred petals edged with chrome.

GIANT DARWIN TULIPS

The stately form and wonderful colorings of the Darwin Tulips are matchless. They are most effective when planted against foliage backgrounds or in groups of solid colors in the perennial borders. In mid-May, their hues provide endless contrasts and color harmonies; their varied forms add a charm not found in other flowers.

Scotch Lassie. 26 in. A large, pure deep lavender with slightly reflexed petals. Long lasting. Sunkist. 28 in. Long, medium-sized, deep golden yellow

flowers of extra fine substance, lasting a long time.

The Peach. 27 in. Large rose and peach-red flowers, fine with bleeding-heart and Mertensia virginica.

Most of these are the little flowers which serve so well to brighten up small corners, here and there, and to supplement the larger flowers. If you have never grown them you have missed many garden thrills.

Anemones

Plant bulbs on edge 6 inches deep in sheltered, well-drained soil for May-June bloom. Protect well over winter. St. Brigid Mixed. Semi-double and double; bright blue,

Ranunculus

Plant bulbs with claws downward, 3 inches deep and 6 inches apart in a sheltered spot. Protect heavily.

Giant Claremont Hybrids. Double and semi-double, turban flowers, over 2 in. across in brilliant shades of yellow, orange, pink and red. They are superb for cutting. Ht. 15 in. Doz. \$1; \$7 per 100.

Snowdrops

The Galanthus, the first flowers of spring, thrive anywhere but prefer cool moist soil. Plant 2 inches deep.

BULBS FOR GROWING INDOORS

Scillas

These may be used very effectively for groups along the border margins or in masses under shrubs or trees.

- Campanulata. The Wood Hyacinth in late May is fine under evergreens. Plant 5 inches deep in half or full shade. Spikes of bell-flowers on 15-inch stems. Blue, Rose or White. Each, doz. 55c; \$3.50 per 100.

These are easily grown at home if they have the moisture and the cooler temperatures they need.

Amaryllis

Pot the bulbs singly in 6-inch pots with neck fully exposed, in loam enriched with bone-meal. Water slightly and keep in a dark place at 50 to 60° F. for about a month until well rooted, then expose to full sun and water regularly. It is essential for good bloom that the roots become pot-bound.

Giant-flowered Hybrids. Trumpet-like blooms in pairs on 18-in. stems in rose, red, and crimson, some on white. Extra large bulbs, 85c each; \$8.50 per doz.

Anemones

Neat, compact, 12-inch plants with flowers in pure colors. St. Brigid Mixed. Plant bulbs on edge in pots. (For culture see Indoor Ranunculus.) Doz. 90c; \$6 per 100.

Callas

These bloom easily in warm room temperature through the winter. After plants are grown give warm water weekly.

- **Pink Calla** (Rehmannii). A dwarf plant with 12-inch, bright green, lanced leaves. The small flowers are rose-pink. Pot 3 bulbs in a 7-inch bulb pan. Use same culture as for Yellow Calla. 60c each; doz. \$6.

Plant 8 to 10 bulbs, one inch deep, in a 6-inch bulb pan of light, sandy soil enriched with bonemeal. Water well and place in cool, darkened cellar for 6 weeks. Freesias

Sweetly scented and easily raised. In September plant 12 bulbs in an 8-inch bulb pan just covered with a good loamy soil. Place the pans outdoors and water regularly. Before frost place pans in the window of a cool room.

Tecolote. The finest strain of all. Blue, Lavender, Pink, White, Yellow or Mixed. Each, doz. 90c; \$6 per 100.

Exhibition Hyacinths

To get best results in indoor growing use the very large bulbs shown below. During October and November, plant one bulb in a 5-inch pot or four of one variety in an 8-inch bulb pan, with the top just above the soil, peat moss, or pebble surface. Set in a dark, cool (50° F.), airy place to root for 8 to 10 weeks and keep moist. After some top growth is made bring gradually to three-quarter sun and warmth (not over 70° F.). The easiest culture is to fill a Hyacinth Glass with water, place the bulb so that its base is just im-mersed, and put in a cool dark place as above. When top grows 4 inches remove to a living-room north window. Add water when needed to barely immerse bottom of bulb.

These cover unsightly objects and screen undesirable views, serve as backgrounds for other flowers, and outline property lines. Plant 6 feet apart and, after they finish blooming, prune out only the old wornout wood and trim back the side shoots.

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HOW TO GROW DAFFODILS

OUTDOORS. Daffodils like a moist, humusy soil but should have good drainage. They do well in both sunny and half-shaded places and are very hardy. The depth of planting depends on the size of the bulb but a good rule is to cover the noses of the bulbs with 3 or 4 inches of soil. Plant them in groups of one kind for best effect, which permits forking out the soil to the proper depth, layering the leveled bottom of the area with an inch of sand for drainage, placing the bulbs irregularly from 6 to 10 inches apart, depending upon the size of the bulbs and of the variety, and back-filling with the soil, enriched with bonemeal. Avoid the use of rotted manure. Leave the bulbs in to bloom year after year. Daffodils increase rapidly, each year you'll find an increased number of flowers, up to the time when they become too crowded, after which the flowers will get smaller each year. When this occurs fork out the bulbs right after blooming and immediately replant the larger bulbs, properly spaced out. They are great feeders and a liberal application of bonemeal in December will help them retain their quality. After blooming, allow the leaves to become vellowed before you cut them off. Plant your annual plants right among them.

INDOORS. Plant the bulbs, the number depending on their size and the size of the container, so that they have one inch or more between bulbs and with the nose of the bulb barely under the surface. Use a mixture of good garden soil and some humus to which has been added a little bonemeal. After thoroughly watering, plunge in a coldframe; or dig a hole in the garden for each pot, line each hole with leaves and, after putting in the pots, cover with 6 inches of coarse leaves or salt hay. Leave them undisturbed for 8 to 10 weeks until well rooted, then bring pots indoors to a cool temperature, later to living room temperature to bloom. All hardy Daffodil-Narcissus types may be used.

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HOW TO GROW TULIPS

OUTDOORS. Tulips like lots of water but the soil must be welldrained. Avoid places where water stands. Enrich the soil with bonemeal or old, well-rotted manure but avoid fresh manure. They will bloom very nicely if bulbs are planted only 4 inches deep but for continued bloom through several years, plant the bulbs 8 or more inches deep, placing an inch of sand below the bulbs. Leave them undisturbed until the bulbs throw several stems and small flowers after which they should be replaced. Tulips must have a sunny location to be at their best. They are most attractive in groups of one variety, which simplifies planting as the soil can be forked out for the entire group, the even bottom of the area sanded, the bulbs placed in irregularly, 5 to 8 inches apart, and the enriched soil back-filled. For individual planting use a trowel to make the openings at a uniform depth and drop in some sand before planting the bulbs. Water thoroughly when completed. Don't mulch as it may harbor field mice. After blooming, as soon as the flower petals fall, snap off the seed pod at the top of the stem. Two days later cut off the stems just above the foliage but don't cut off the foliage until the bottom leaves show brown on the under side. By this delay you permit the leaves to store up food for the next year and the sap to flow back into the bulb. For the same reason, when cutting the flowers avoid cutting the leaves where possible. If you find it necessary to move Tulips, dig them up after blooming and plant them at once in the new location. If this is not possible, trench them until they dry back. cure the bulbs in the shade, store them, and plant them the next October.

INDOORS. Plant 6 bulbs of one variety in a 6-inch bulb pan, covering with one inch of a mixture of two-thirds garden soil and one-third leafmould or humus to which a tablespoonful of bonemeal has been added. After thoroughly watering, plunge the pots in a coldframe, or dig a hole in the garden for each pot, line each hole with leaves and put in the pots. Cover each with 6 inches of coarse leaves or salt hay and leave undisturbed for 8 to 10 weeks until well rooted. Then bring pots indoors to a cool location, later to living-room temperature to bloom. The Single and Double Early Tulips are the best for indoor culture.

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
