Less than 5 plants of one variety and size must be figured at the single rate, 25 of the same variety and size, or 50 of the same class as peach, apple, etc. will be furnished at the 100 rate, 250 at the thousand rates if quoted.

TERMS—Cash or satisfactory reference.

PARCEL POST—Most small parcels can be sent by mail cheaper than by express. Postage charges must be paid by the purchaser. Unless postage is included with order it will be sent by Express.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS — Always give full name and address and state how the shipment is to be sent. All small packages should be sent by express or mail and berry plants should never be sent by freight.
