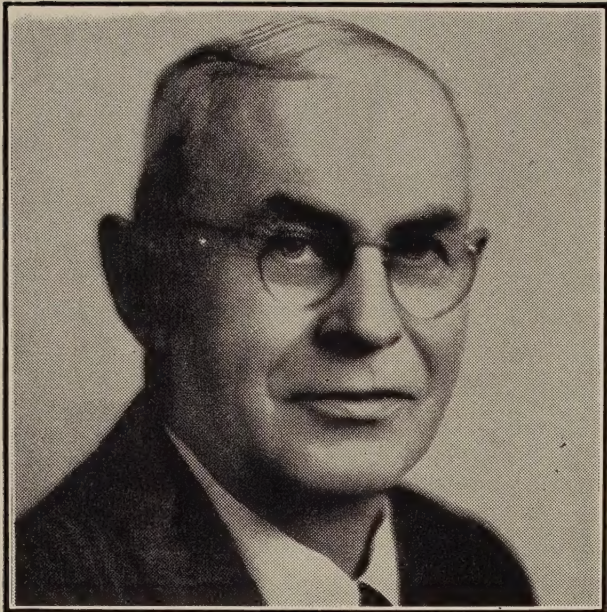

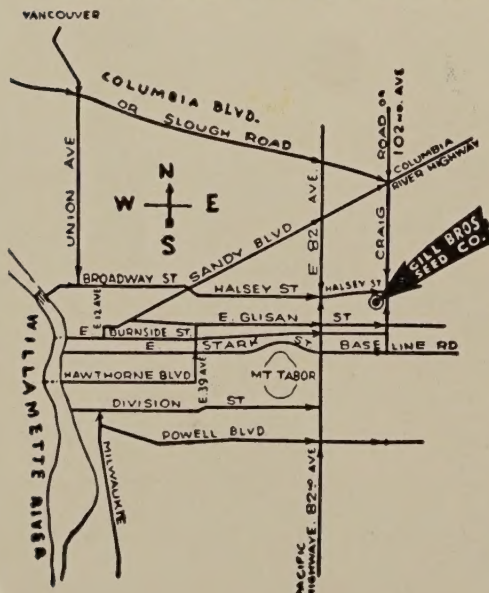

Our catalog has been prepared with the desire to have it sensible and free from exaggeration. The cuts used are mostly made from photographs taken from samples grown by ourselves and are reasonable illustrations of the results obtained from our seeds. We are opposed to filling our catalog with a long list of worthless novelties and are confining our list to the fewest possible varieties, and introducing only those new sorts which have some added value over other introductions. Order early, as there is a heavy demand on some stocks and they may be exhausted.

Remittance must accompany your order. Stamps are accepted up to \$1.00. Money Orders, Express Orders, Bank Drafts and Certified Checks are preferred, although other checks are accepted for collection. Be sure to check your extensions and totals before mailing your orders.

If your remittance should be short, we will send you in accordance with the amount paid and thus avoid delay. We can send Vegetable and Flower Seeds C.O.D., but please remember this costs you extra for C.O.D. charges.

Prices in this catalog marked "Not Prepaid" do not cover shipping expenses.

Except where noted (Not Prepaid) all prices are postpaid.

All prices up to and including one pound include shipping expenses and for more only when indicated. Give shipping instructions and write your name and address plainly on your order.

Write your correspondence on a separate sheet from your order. The seed season is a rush season.

MISTAKES

Like all human beings, we are apt to make mistakes in filling orders, and if an error occurs we will consider it a favor to be notified at once so that we can rectify the oversight.

If you have a complaint, tell us first. In the rush of spring business, mistakes may happen; if so, tell us pleasantly about it and be assured of courteous treatment.

SUBSTITUTION

IN VIEW OF THE FACT THAT SOME KINDS OF SEEDS ARE SHORT THIS YEAR, we would suggest that customers give as much as possible their permission for us to substitute the nearest variety to the one ordered in case we should be sold out. On items of small importance, or during the rush of planting season, when time is precious, we may send other sorts if out of the ones ordered, but such substitutions may be returned for credit if unsatisfactorily to the purchaser.

Considering the many added costs of doing business our prices are reasonable. Parcel post has been increased. We hope to be able to maintain these prices, but they are subject to change in extreme cases.

LARGE GREEN GLOBE—They stand considerable cold but should be mulched with straw against severe freezing. Plant three feet apart in the row and six feet between rows. The green buds are used. Start in hotbeds. They can be grown successfully in the Pacific Northwest. **Postpaid. Pkt. 20c; oz. 75c.**

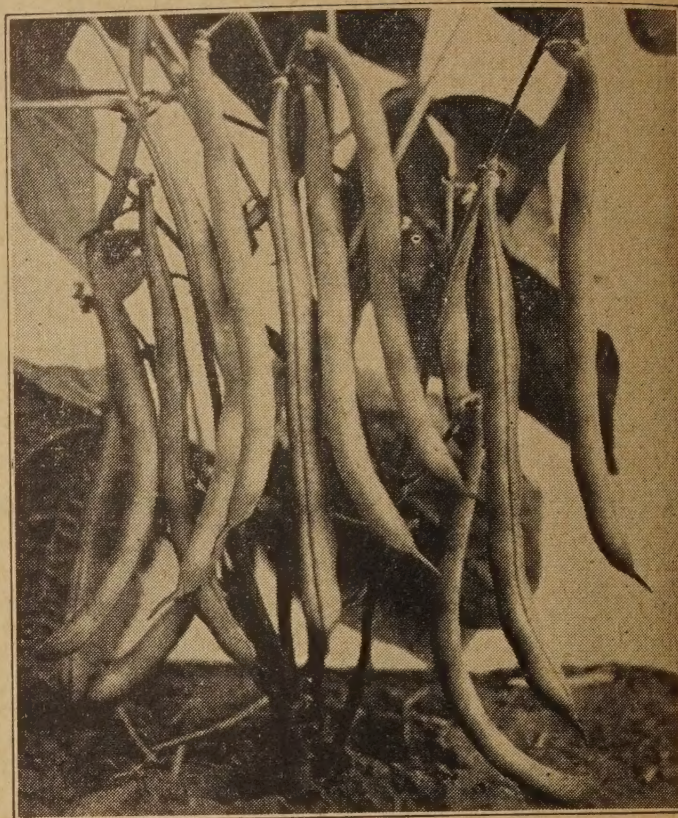

BUSH BEANS

CULTURE—Plant about May 1st for early beans, or as soon as the ground becomes warm, in rows 2½ to 3 feet apart except pole beans, 3½ to 4 feet. Cover from 1½ to 3 inches deep according to weather conditions. Large seeded beans require warmer weather to germinate than small beans. Never cultivate or hoe beans when the foliage is wet from dew or rains, as it will cause rust. Where beans have not previously been grown on the land it is valuable to use NITRAGIN. Our radio talk on beans sent free upon request. All white seeded beans need careful planting for early crops as they do not stand cold ground like colored beans. Early bush beans can be planted up to August 1st in the western parts of Pacific Coast states.

Our sales now exceed the popular Oregon Giant for home gardens. Crop very short. **Pkt. 15c; ½ lb. 45c.**

***BLUE VICTOR**—A very popular bean. The pods are large, long and somewhat flat in shape. The meat is thick, of finest quality, and stringless. The pods are reddish purple but when cooked the color changes to light green. One of the finest high quality beans. You will like this. Crop very short. **Pkts. only @ 15c.**

***OREGON GIANT**—Giant pods a foot long; light green striped carmine. This wonderful bean is now sold by market gardeners at high prices. The quality is good even in the largest beans. In the shell stage they are sweet as though they had been sugared lightly. In either dry or shell stage the skin is thin and tender. We have tested many lima varieties but none equals this for high quality and production so we believe it is the best for our Pacific Northwest states where cool Summer nights usually prevail during the growing season. The seeds are very flat but quite large and every seed is white, striped with deep crimson as shown in the illustration. Vigorous vines 7 to 9 feet tall, foliage rather thin and of medium size. Pods 5 to 5½ inches long and about one inch wide, usually carrying 3 beans to the pod. We urge our home garden customers to try this grand lima. Commercial gardeners who contact their customers at roadside stands or public markets should introduce it to their trade.

KING OF THE GARDEN—A large, flat lima of great vigor and heavy production. Seed white in dry stage but creamy green in shell condition. This variety also produces well in the Pacific Northwest. A splendid sort for canning or freezing. Vines 7 to 9 feet, pods 5½ to 6 inches long with 4 to 5 thick, flat seeds.

OREGON LIMA (White Seeded Runner)—A large pole lima, extra early and suited for Pacific Northwest culture. It ripens in about 75 days from planting. Excellent used as a shell bean or stored dry for winter use. Extra large, plump, pure white seed. In the milder climates it often lives through the winter and produces a crop the second year. Swiss Chard

RHUBARB CHARD—Large, wide and tall leaves with fairly large ribs of deep crimson color. Foliage heavily toned red with purple tints. Very productive and of rapid growth. Brilliant foliage of high quality. Many home gardeners have rated this as the best of Swiss Chards. **Postpaid. Pkt. 15c; oz. 40c; ¼ lb. 95c; lb. \$2.90.**

FORDHOOK GIANT—Larger, darker green with more clinkled leaves than Lucullus. Stalks white. Outstanding for size and quality. **Postpaid. Pkt. 10c; oz. 30c; ¼ lb. 70c; lb. \$1.60.**

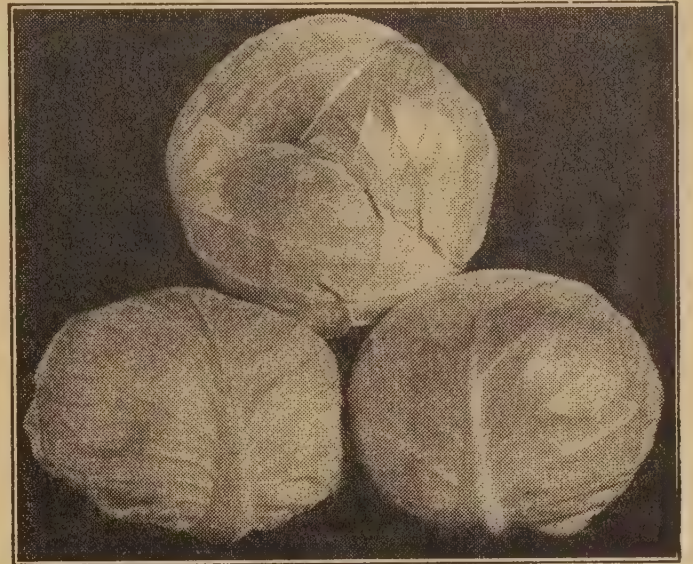

CULTURE—For early cauliflower, start in cold frames. For Fall cutting, Green Broccoli and all Snowball types should be planted June 1st to 20th and transplanted July 15th to August 10th. Late cauliflower and Winter cauliflower can be planted the first week in May, transplanted July 1st to 25th. For Winter cauliflower plant the first week in May, transplanting July 20th to August 10th. Cauliflower and broccoli do best in a rich, loamy soil, not a cold, wet location. Plant 2½ to 3 feet in rows and 3½ feet between rows. Before the heads are large enough to be exposed to the light, tie or break the leaves carefully over the head to keep out the light. Great care should be used in growing plants of any of the Snowball type that they receive no severe check in their growth, as this will cause them to produce premature heads.

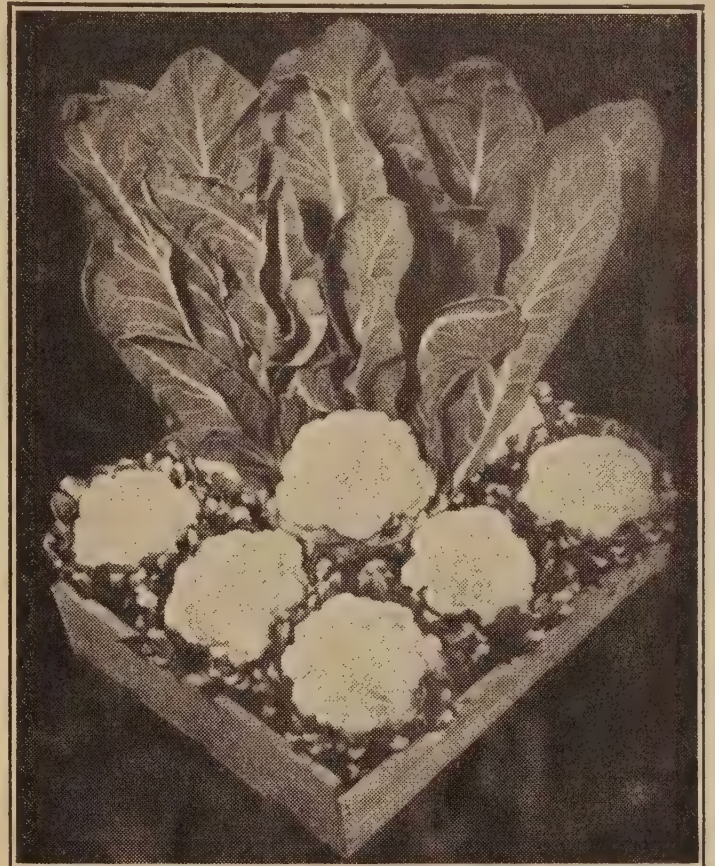

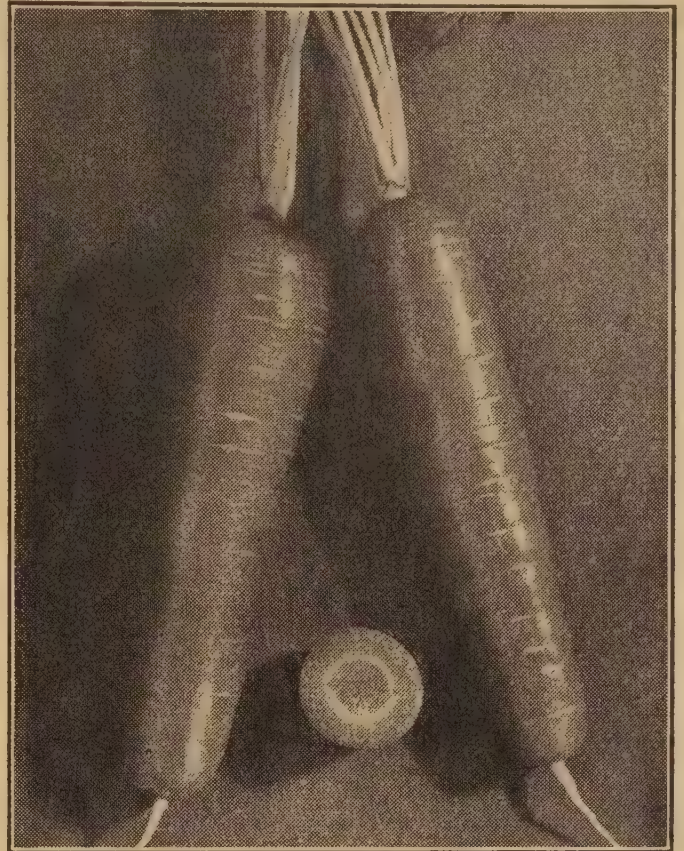

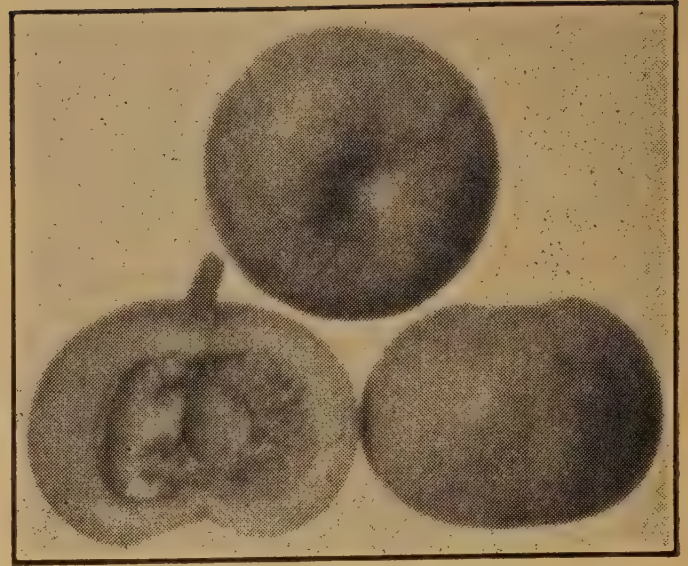

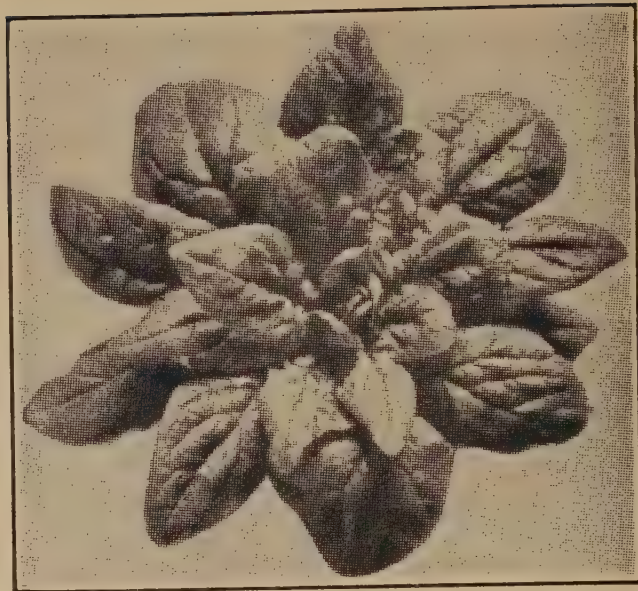

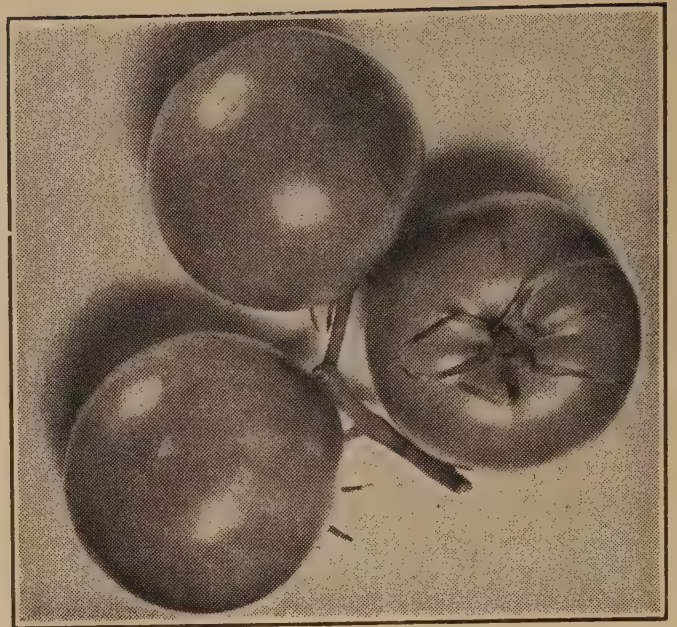
