## TWO-TONE FAVORITES

AUTUMN. A remarkable combination of gold, burnt orange and red that will linger long in your memory of the beautiful roses you have seen. Bush produces long stems with a foliage that is dark green and glossy. $21 / 2-3 \mathrm{ft}$.

COUNTESS VANDAL. This is an old standby with us. An excellent performer in any garden. Color combination can hardly be described: Pink, copper, gold and salmon. 3 ft .
DUQUESSA DE PENARANDA. One of the few roses that has the "Peace" foliage. Almost pure orange flowers that we like very much but the foliage is what takes our eye. Foliage is definitely a part of what it takes to make a good rose. Peace, Fred Edmunds, and this rose have that very desirable foliage.
BRIGHT WINGS. Beautiful buds of rosy burnt orange opening to coral-pink and showing golden antlers in the center. Very glossy foliage that can't be beat. 2 $1 / 2-3 \mathrm{ft}$.

MRS. SAM McGREDY. An exhibition rose that will be a winner in any rose show. Scarlet-orange that changes to copper as the bloom matures. Very delicately perfumed. About $21 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$.
PRESIDENT HOOVER. Another consistent show winner. A very large flower of flaming scarlet and yellow in the bud, opening to soft creamy yellow and red. Very vigorous plant. $31 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$.
TALISMAN. This is perhaps the best known and most widely planted rose in America. We don't like it too much but then everybody does not have the same taste. Rich scarlet and gold to deep rose and pale yellow. Fragrant and at its best when in the bud. About $21 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. Illustrated back cover.

## WHITE FAVORITES

FRAU KARL DRUSCHKI. Magnificent snow-white blooms with a touch of pink in the center. This is our largest selling white rose and we still think it is the best of all whites. 3-6 ft .

McGREDY'S IVORY. Long ivory white buds, perfectly shaped blossoms, delicate perfume. Raised considerably for exhibition purposes. $2-21 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$.


ALOHA. Deep rose-pink blooms of enormous size that defies description. We believe this climber to be far more superior in both bloom and climbing habits than the old rose, Dr. J. H. Nicolas. One of our few good everblooming climbers. Pat. No. 948. $\$ 2.50$ each.

CL. SUMMER SNOW. Clusters of pure white cover the plant like a mountain of snow. Easy to care for Hardy and everblooming. Pat. No. 400. \$2.00 each.
PAUL'S LEMON PILLAR. Pale lemon yellow buds with large full blooms of sulphur yellow to almost white. Very fragrant and used extensively for exhibition purposes. Very nice long strong stems. This rose has perhaps won more rose show honors than any other rose, including Peace. $\$ 1.75$ each.

## HARD Y!

CL. PINKIE. A new Cl. floribunda with the same type blooms as the bush. A very compact 6-8 ft . climber that no doubt will find a place in your yard where the ordinary climber would be too rampant. The glossy green luxuriant is almost hidden completely by the clouds of pink bloom. Best of all it doesn't stop with the first blooms but keeps producing cluster after cluster of bloom throughout the season. P.A.F. \$2.75 each.
CL. TALISMAN. Same as bush rose. Red, gold and yellow. $\$ 1.50$ each.
CL. PEACE. Cl. sport of the ever-popular Peace bush rose. Most people report finer blooms on the climber. Pat. 932. \$2.50 each.

## RED FAVORITES

BRAVO. Listed again this year by request. You won't find a red rose that is more brilliant, nor one that holds its color so well during the hot weather. Not too large a grower and not much fragrance but this is made up by the nice plump buds that open to a sparkling cardinal red. Very wavy petals that are arranged in perfect symmetry. Pat No. 983 . $\$ 2.25$ each.

> CHARLES MALLERIN. Because of difficulties last year, we had to disappoint a lot of people on this particular rose. We want them to know we are sorry and try to make up for it this year by having enough. We believe this is the best real dark red rose to date and no further description is necessary if you will take all the good qualities of other dark red roses and put it into one. Pat. No. $933 . \$ 2.50$ each.

CHARLOTTE ARMSTRONG. The originators of this rose, calls it "Queen of Them All," and well it may be. Winner of the sole 1941 AARS award. Its long, slender, cerise buds and magnificent open flowers make it very popular. Fine for cutting and a consistent show winner. Pat. 455. \$2.00 each. Illustrated inside back cover.
CRIMSON GLORY. Always listed in any " 10 Most Popular Roses in America" survey, Crimson Glory is a deep, vivid crimson flower that stands erect on vigorous bushes. It really has the fragrance and has been selected by the American Rose Society as one of the sweetest smelling of all roses. Pat. 105. \$1.75 each.


CHRYSLER IMPERIAL. Illustrated on our cover this year. Spokane residents are now fortunate in having a start of a test garden now located in our own Manito Park. We say they are fortunate because they can now view the new roses a year prior to the time they are placed on the market. Chrysler Imperial was one of the new roses that occupied a prominent spot in the garden. Here is a truly red rose with such a lively glowing color and such good form that it will bring joy to the heart of any exhibitor or just plain ordinary rose grower. The 50 petals have a lot of substance which makes any rose last so much longer. In growth the plant is vigorous, compact and produces a bountiful amount of green half glossy foliage. Good strong stems hold erect the very perfect blooms. Excellent rich foliage. We destine this rose to become just as popular as its proud parent, Charlotte Armstrong. Originated by W. E. Lammerts, one of America's top hybridizers, and introduced by Germain's of California. P.A.F. $\$ 3.00$ each.

NEW YORKER. Illustrated inside back cover. Called by the originator as "The Best Red Rose of all Time." While we don't exactly agree with him, New Yorker is worth a place in any garden-even two or three of them if you like an enormous red rose that stays red until the last petals wither and fall. 3 ft . Pat. 823. $\$ 2.00$ each.
VOLCANO. A very strong and bushy plant that produces enormous size cherry-red blooms of 6 to 7 inches across. Our smeller thinks this rose is just about tops for fragrance. Pat. 951. \$2.00 each.

## PINK FAVORITES

CAPISTRANO. Capistrano is a magnificent pink rose, and when you bring it into bloom in your own garden you readily see why it won All-American honors for 1950. Clear rose-pink buds that do not change until the last petal drops. Long straight stems with very attractive leathery foliage. Pat. 922. $3 \mathrm{ft} . \$ 2.25$ each.
FIRST LOVE. This is sure to be the "First Love" in your garden if you enjoy sensational buds-and who doesn't. Urn-shaped, long and slender dawn pink buds that simply steal your heart. HELEN TRAUBEL. Easily the outstanding new rose of 1952. We do not recall of one complaint to reach us on this rose. In all the people we have talked to and the letters we have received, it has been highly praised. This new Armstrong rose is the best since Charlotte Armstrong. Pat. No. 1028. $\$ 2.75$ each. SHOW GIRL. Another rose that we are again listing because of popular demand. Large, deep pink flowers that are excellent for cutting. Everybody will notice it in your garden. Pat. 646. \$1.75 each. Illustrated inside back cover.
JUNO. In no other pink rose will you find such large size, clear color, perfection of form and long lasting substance. It will give you magnificent individual flowers for cutting that are exhibition quality. Clear pink without other shadings. Lacks fragrance but perfect otherwise. Pat. 895. 4 ft . $\$ 2.00$ each.

## WHITE FAVORITES

SLEIGH BELLS. A new white rose that seems to be gaining in popularity. Lemon at the base with just a touch of pink sometimes. A good vigorous plant and plenty of clean foliage. Pat. 1004. \$2.00 each.
WHITE SWAN. There is nothing any prettier or purer than a white rose nestled in dark green foliage. White Swan is pure white and has the dark green foliage. The form is so perfect that it could easily give McGredy's Ivory a run for the money in any rose show. Our quantities will be limited. Pat. 1115. \$2.25 each.
WHITE WINGS. Somebody once said that simplicity is perfection in art. In White Wings, a single white, we have that simplicity. Lots of people call this the "White Dainty Bess". A most unusual rose for flower arrangements. Pat. 850. \$1.50 each.


## yellow Favorites

## NEW! NEW!

BUCCANEER. While we still like Lowell Thomas for yellow, we will have to admit that it wouldn't take much encouragement to change our minds in favor of Buccaneer. Buccaneer is just about as bright and clear a yellow as you would want. It has two qualities not found in Lowell Thomas, strong stems and tall grower. We have watched it for two years and this season it is well over 5 ft . tall so advise you to plant it in the background. Very good foliage that covers the plant from top to bottom which is unusual for a tall grower. Very moderate fragrance and does not fade. Pat. 1119. Illustrated inside front cover. $\$ 2.75$ each.

CHIEF SEATTLE. Buff apricot in color, the petals are fluted or ruffled. The bed of this variety in Manito Park didn't have to take a back seat to any other rose. A much better rose than Fred Howard which won the 1952 AARS award, we couldn't understand how the AllAmerica Rose Selections could choose Fred Howard over Chief Seattle. Chief Seattle is borne on long straight stems with perfect olive green foliage. Does very well in both hot and cool weather. $3-4 \mathrm{ft}$. Pat. 1030. $\$ 2.50$ each.
ECLIPSE. This rose, in our estimation, has the nicest buds of any rose. Long-pointed, deep yellow with a fairly large semi-double flower. 3 ft . Pat. 172. \$1.75 each.
FRED HOWARD. Golden yellow and very double. One of the three All-American winners of 1952. Very slight fragrance but a huge grower, sometimes to 5 ft . 3-5 ft. Pat. No. 1006. \$2.75 each.
GOLDEN SCEPTER. Last year our supply of this rose was limited and we were sold out early. One of our good yellow roses that seems to stand up real well without fading. We hadn't noticed this rose in bloom till this past summer and was somewhat impressed by the dozens of golden yellow buds and blooms to each plant. Not too tall a grower, about 3 ft . Pat. 910. $\$ 2.00$ each.
LOWELL THOMAS. We still keep this rose as our favorite pure yellow that does not fade too much. It seems to do well in all parts of the country. The only complaint that we had is the weak plant but this can easily be remedied by a little Sunny Spokane Plant Food. Good stems that have excellent foliage. $21 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. Pat. 595. \$2.00 each.

PEACE. If you were to have one rose in your garden, we would say that this was it. A consistent prize-winner. Perhaps the chief beauty of this rose is the great range of colors through which it passes. The large ovoid shape bud emerges to a fully 5 inch bloom with shades of canary yellow, pale gold, cream, pearly white and apple blossom pink. The color also varies with the season. It seems that no two plants produce the same color of blooms-each one a little different. The very best of foliage on a very strong plant. Pat. 591. 3-4 ft. \$2.50 each. Illustrated inside back cover.
SUTTER'S GOLD. This rose has won about every award, both on the Continent and U.S. Long pointed yellow buds which are richly shaded with orange and red. The open flower is golden yellow with a very rich fragrance. Foliage is excellent. Sometimes mistaken in the fading flower for Peace. We like this rose very much and recommend it. 3 ft . Pat. 885. \$2.25 each:

## TWO-TONE FAVORITES

FORTY-NINER. One of the most brilliant of all bicolor roses and certainly one of the most attractive. Vivid red with straw yellow on the reverse. Vigorous plants with very nice foliage. Pat. 792. \$2.00 each.
FRED EDMUNDS. Beautifully shaped orange colored buds open to apricot orange flowers. Green glossy foliage. $21 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. $\$ 1.75$.
MISSION BELLS. An All-American winner for 1950. To get top honors in the rose world today, a rose must have vigor and Mission Bells qualifies in every respect with a strong heavily branched plant, attractively foliaged, nearly always in bloom. Its pointed well-shaped buds are a deep glowing salmon-pink, opening to full high-centered flowers of clear shrimp pink. Richly fragrant. 3 ft . Pat. 923. $\$ 2.25$ each.
MME. HENRI GUILLOT. Don't let the name trip you up; just call it "Madam Henry" like we do. Foliage very leathery like Peace. Blooms of watermelon to raspberry pink with a gold base. Pat. 337. $\$ 1.75$ each.
OPERA. Another new French rose that we are listing for the first time. Slender buds of gold at the base and scarlet on the top open to a large flower of 6 inches across of light scarlet red with a buff yellow on the reverse. Very good foliage that is seemingly mildewresistant. Pat. 1017. \$2.00 each.
SATURNIA. Back again after being out of our catalog for several years. Many people have asked for it and we will have it for them again this year. Scarlet and gold and good form in both flower and bush. This writer will long remember a rose show on the Coast several years back when he bet a good steak dinner on this particular variety and won. Pat. No. 349. \$1.75 each.
TAFFETA. Like most two-toned roses, this one somewhat variable according to the season, the soil and the climate. The predominate colors are orange, begonia and carmine with some yellow and gold at the base. Foliage is a very dark green that turns to mahogany red at maturity. $21 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. Pat. 716. $\$ 1.75$ each.

GOLDILOCKS. Our best yellow floribunda. Quite low in growing habits-about 2 ft . tall. Buds are ovoid with a reddish tinge. Bloom of sulphur yellow that lasts well when cut. Pat. 672. $\$ 1.50$ each.

FASHION. One of the top floribundas being planted today. We do not know of anybody that is not enthralled by its fascination. Oriental red buds that are just waiting to burst out into exquisitely formed blooms in a sparkling new coral-pink that is suffused with gold. Very fragrant and a nice growth of about 3 ft . If you have one, you will want more. No illustration of this rose can do it justice.
