

Versatile Double Petunias

Soil out of pots—3's and 4's and even 5's finished sell on sight. The recommended new strains are dwarf, compact, branching, which gives them ideal pot plant habit. Sow in December for 4's for April and May. For larger sizes sow late November. Need good drainage, cool temperatures.

Use in combinations—pots or boxes. A mid-December sowing will give levely 3's for use in combinations for Mother's Day.

Note: Read variety descriptions carefully. For super-dwarf strains try Pink Perfection and Gaiety. All others have satisfactory dwarf habit except Sonata, Minuet, Burpee Orchid, and several Victorious strains which need a pinch to produce ideal potted plant habit.

Ample spacing builds quality and desirable growth habit into any plant—double Petunias included.

Double Petunias are ideal used in combinations and pots for spring sales. In the above combination box we used the following sowing dates: Double Petunias, Giant Petunias and Salvia were sown mid-December, around 50° during most of the growing season; Begonias, the same date carried 60° ; Coleus January 1, grown 60° ; Ageratum, January 1, and Marigolds, February 1, cool temperatures.



REGARDING PETUNIA "FORMULA MIXTURES"

Since germination, vigor, and reaction to different climatic conditions vary with varieties, it is difficult to make a formula mixture which will perform with uniform satisfaction everywhere. Some varieties are naturally more vigorous, while others tend to be "drowned out" by the stronger growers; and the resultant color balance is not always entirely satisfactory. For this reason, where you need substantial quantities, we recommend that you buy separate colors, mixing the seedlings when transplanting to get special color combinations.

The past several years' breeding work has yielded several new Petunia varieties which seem admirably adapted to pot plant growth, but are not so universally useful for outdoor planting. Outdoors in an ideal environment these varieties will be quite attractive; but where conditions are not ideal they will appear somewhat inferior to their stronger-growing brothers, such as F₁ Hybrids, Doubles, California Giants, Ruffled Grandifloras, etc. So we have taken the liberty of listing the following varieties separately to indicate a special adaptability to growth in pots in the greenhouse in spring. 

NOTES ON ASTER CULTURE

"Resistance" to Aster Wilt does not mean complete "immunity!" While it is entirely true that these so-called "resistant" Asters have been bred to a high degree of resistance to the Wilt organisms existing in the originator's soil, there is considerable evidence to indicate similar but none-the-less different forms of Wilt may exist in other soils. The degree of resistance offered by these strains is therefore variable; however, there is no doubt that they are far more satisfactory than non-resistant strains. Our past experience indicates that changing the location of the Aster planting regularly (or steam sterilizing) is a worth-while safety precaution. We sow them 6 weeks before planting out date. Three weeks after sowing, the seedlings go into $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch plant bands; three weeks later we plant them without removing bands, which helps minimize transplanting losses. We space them a

foot apart each way in beds so that conventional wire and string may be used for supports. We find cloth house protection a necessity if good quality is wanted.

Spring Greenhouse Asters (Under Glass)

Asters can be flowered in spring or early summer through use of lights. Spider control is assured with Parathion bombs. Wilt losses may be almost eliminated with steaming. We flowered a fine crop early July from a February 4 sowing. They were transplanted to $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch bands February 25, benched 12×12 in. on May 2, lighted from sowing till benching. 60-watt bulbs were used 5 ft. apart. A December sowing lighted from sowing date will bloom in May. Run them $50-55^{\circ}$ nights.




Ball Begonias





Under Glass-Spring Flowering: For indoor growing, Larkspur is a nice crop to follow late Mums. Well started 3-inch banded or potted plants should be ready, and are produced by a December or January sowing. Space at least 12x12 in. on ground; 10x10 in. on raised beds should be ample. The after-Mum planting is generally started out cool, 40° to 45° nights, increasing to 50° or more with spring weather.

We've tried all of them, and have made up our "7 Best" list based on our observations. If you're not familiar with the newer sorts we suggest that you confine the bulk of your planting to the "7 Best."

ABOUT FLOWERING DATES. In describing the many Snap varieties which we list, we have designated each as early (E), midseason (M) or late (L). This is an arbitrary classification based on our own West Chicago greenhouse trials over a period of years.

From a sowing made August 1, grown on a raised bench as a pinched crop and run 50° nights, those varieties which normally flower by December 15 we classify as early. Those which flower

between December 15 and January 10 we call midseason; while the remainder that flower after January 10 we consider late. Locality and amount of sunshine, of course, have a bearing on flowering dates, too.

It should be borne in mind that while many of the early and midseason varieties are excellent for late flowering if sown later, late varieties cannot be flowered early unless sown in May or June in our locality.

BRIEFS ON SNAP CULTURE

DIRECT BENCHING

... of seedlings is **the** way in our experience. Definitely superior growth, much less labor. It will work, even in hot weather if care is used.

PINCHING

Wait till breaks show in leaf axils—plant usually 6-8 inches high—then pinch to leave 3 pairs of leaves.

SOWING DATES

The dates given here are intended as suggestions only—based on our experience here in the Midwest. Many things can throw them off. Examples:

- 1. Hot, dry, bright fall-will bring Christmas crops in early.
- 2. Dark, cloudy fall-winter delays late winter crops.
- 3. The tables are based on raised benches, 50° night temperatures most of the winter, at least. 45° nights or ground beds will take longer.
- 4. Your local climate. Where winters are warm and sunny, winter Snaps will bloom faster.
- 5. Varieties differ in blooming dates.

SUMMER-FALL SNAPS

... were a dollar-maker again last year. Direct planted, single stemmed, they flower in less than 3 months from benching, are in good demand. Make several sowings so they will keep coming in.

SINGLE STEM

No-pinch growing seems to be accepted more each year. Reasons: A. A quicker crop—gets in up to 2-3 weeks sooner. Bench cuts out faster, more evenly.

B. Fewer culls-more uniformity.

C. Controlled flowering date—by making a succession of properly scheduled sowings, you can be in cut when you want them—or steadily from January to June, as we do.

We recommend sowing perennials in spring. Germination will be better than during the heat of midsummer and the larger plants produced will winter over more satisfactorily. In addition, if sowing is done in January or early February, quite a few will bloom the first season.




