Again it is a privilege to express our heartfelt thanks for your patronage and your many kind letters. It's a pleasure to know that our efforts are so kindly received and it's an incentive to greater effort in the production of the finest in gladiolus.

The past season has been very wet, with three hurricanes and an overabundance of rain. Our bulb crop while not up to last year's, is very satisfactory, but did not size up as usual due to excessive moisture and an early freeze. We believe there will be a shortage of large bulbs in the commercial varieties and early ordering is advised. We exhibited in twelve shows and won our usual number of blue ribbons including Champion Spike of the show with Tan Glow and White Sails.

We have added more than the usual number of new varieties to this year's list, many of which are real additions to our already long list. We refer you to our "Variety Comments" for more about them, and I am sure you will agree, when you grow some of them, that they are improvements on existing varieties.

Our trial garden contains several varieties and added to those varieties seen at the shows and in other gardens it is our privilege to review quite a parade of new ones each year. However only a fraction of those seen are ever added to our catalog list. We do not claim to grow all of the meritorious varieties, but I am sure you will find our catalog contains a most comprehensive listing of the show winners, the most popular commercials, and the most promising novelties. Our motto has always been—only the best is good enough.

Please Read Carefully Before Ordering

TERMS FOR ORDERING — All orders are cash with order or, 25% down payment, balance C.O.D. All C.O.D. orders require a down payment. All orders from the retail list will be sent postage prepaid. Orders from the wholesale list will be F.O.B., Springfield, Mass. If bulbs from both lists are ordered they will be sent F.O.B. and we will include enough extra bulbs to more than offset the express charges. All orders accepted subject to prior sale.

Orders for bulblets cannot be accepted after April 15th, for small bulbs (sizes 4, 5 & 6) after May 1st, and for large bulbs after June 15th. Orders for assortments can be accepted until July 1st.

DISCOUNTS — On all cash orders from the retail descriptive list — \$5.00 to \$10.00 — you may select 10% discount in bulbs of your own choice. \$10.00 to \$20.00 — you may select 15% discount in bulbs of your own choice. Over \$20.00 — you may select 20% discount in bulbs of your own choice.

Discounts do not apply to new introductions, collections, or wholesale prices.

On cash orders from the wholesale list — 5% discount on orders from \$25 to \$100. 10% discount on orders over \$100.00.

EXTRAS AND OVERCOUNT — We give extras with all orders varying with the size of the order. Just mention some of the varieties you would like to buy and we will do our best to please you. We are noted for our generous overcount of number, quality, and size.

GUARANTEE — We guarantee satisfaction in every way possible. We attempt to send out only clean, healthy, true to name stock, and if in any way you are not satisfied let us know immediately and we will do our utmost to please you. Also if you are pleased we are always glad to hear from you.

SHIPPING DATES — Unless otherwise requested retail orders will be sent out between March 15 and April 15 in the order received. Wholesale orders will be shipped as soon as possible after receiving them. Order early so as to be sure we are not sold out of the varieties you want. This also gives us more time to fill your order with less chance of error and less overtime.

BULB SIZES — The retail list contains three sizes — Large, 1½" up Medium, ¾" - 1½" Small, ¾" - ¾"

Large size bulbs give the largest bloom. However, medium sized bulbs will give excellent spikes about 75% as large. Most small bulbs will bloom and at the same time grow fine bulbs for the following year.

VARIETY LISTING — In the descriptive list the variety name is given first, followed by the originator's name, its show classification and the approximate number of days needed for it to bloom. We have attempted to give a description of the varieties as we see them, listing important faults as well as good points.

Appraising The New Ones



Even though we had three hurricanes and an unusually wet season we saw many interesting and worthwhile new things in our Trial Garden and in the twelve shows in which we exhibited. Let's pull up a chair and review the big parade and perhaps dream and scheme for an even better glad garden for next summer. Only little mention will be made of the older varities as they are usually well known and need no comment.

In the white class three new ones looked very promising: Snowdrift, a beautiful very ruffled white, occasionally misplaces, but unbeatable when well grown; King Cotton ruffled pure white of average height; and Snowclad, which will win blues on the show table. Still winning at the shows and hard to beat are Sierra Snow, Mother Fischer, and Florence

Nightingale — the last two are also tops for commercial purposes. Silver Court is the whitest white. Heavily ruffled whites which many prefer are Cathedral, White Goddess, White Symphony, and Florentine. One cannot go wrong in making several plantings of Florence Nightingale for cut flowers. Of the blotched whites the new Good Morning and Sparkling Eyes looked very good. White Sails won a Grand Championship besides several blues for us. White Tower is a frequent winner in this class. Crusader, with its large purple blotch is a most striking orchid throated variety and is ideal for arrangements.

Leif Erikson continues to lead the parade in the cream class and is tops for both exhibition and commercial use. Prof. Goudriaan together with Columbia rank a close second although there is some question of health on the latter variety. Connie "G" can make beautiful extra long spikes of very ruffled blooms with the handle on the short side. We think La Valle and Sincerity the best of the blotched varities.

The new Catriona opens 8 on a tall plant and should make a fine all purpose glad H. V. Wright and PeaceLight are both very good light yellows and are probably the best in this shade. In the deep yellows Gold is without a doubt the most beautiful and with its ruffling and great substance is a valuable cut flower. For exhibition Sundance is still tops with its long flowerhead and 8-10 open. Golden Diana and Gelber Hercules performed exceptionally well this past summer as did Terrific, a sure winner in the 300 class.

In the buff class A. B. Coutts is a welcome addition with its clear color, large blooms and tall growth. Patrol goes on winning Grand Championships with its fine color and long perfectly placed flowerheads, closely followed by Quiberon, its only fault being an occasional crooking of stem. Incidentally, Patrol leads all other buff varieties in the Symposium for both exhibition and commercial by a ratio of 2 to 1.

The light orange class has two outstanding varieties: Display, a tall strong grower with yellow throat; and Sunny Chip, a buffy orange with large distinctive blooms on a tall spike. Many claim that Regina is the same as Sunny Chip and our experience confirms the fact that if not the same, it certainly has the same coloring and strong growth. Both are excellent and very much worthwhile. In the deep orange class we haven't found anything to beat well grown spikes of Circe and Boccherini. The new Fire Opal is a ruffled deep orange with yellow throat good placement, and of pleasing color contrast.

The light salmon class is dominated by two giants, King Size and Pink Pride. We find King Size must be grown from large bulbs to attain its large blooms with up to 10 open on a 5 ft. spike. Pink Pride does not grow quite as high but has an equally long flowerhead with flowers as large in a lighter shade of salmon. These two should interest the giant glad fans. For real beauty of coloring we recommend Carmen Corliss although it is a short grower. Polynesie is the symposium leader in this class.

In the deep salmon class these still lead as they performed this past summer; Broadway Melody, a beautiful clean salmon with light yellow throat and Coral Ace, a ruffled coral salmon Burma sport. Of course, Baldface remains as the leading exhibition winner. If you are looking for something different try Boise Belle, truly beautiful and distinctive. Dolly Vardon and Majestic can easily grow 7" blooms and 3 spikes of either make a bouquet.

Last Monday I received my order of gladiolus. I hastened to open the package and behold what beautiful bulbs I found, large for their size, very clean, and healthy. It seems that no-one in that Arenius family has learned to count — extras and over-count. You all are so generous. I am more than pleased. — Mr. F. W. L.

In the Symposium *Red Wing* easily leads the scarlet class for both exhibition and commercial use. However, we were impressed this summer with the early ruffled varieties *David Warr* and *Red Skin*, both of which should go far as commercials. The new *Tomahawk* performed well but does not grow too tall. The older *Esquire* and *Harold K* grow the largest florets.

The light pink class continues to grow and of the new ones that did well for us this past season are: Pink Diamond, beautifully ruffled and of perfect placement. Pall Mall, a Tivoli seedling which so far has been healthy and should be a great commercial prospect; Look a very tall glad in the Evangeline shade but with better placement; Pink Chiffon, an orchid pink valuable for its color appeal, earliness and nice clean growth; Clarence D. Fortnam, another tall, ruffled beauty; Susan K, an improved Heart's Desire; and Pennant, with its soft pink and up to 10-12 open in perfect formal placement. We like the contrasting throat blotches of Contrast, Manon and Sheherazade.

Among the deep pink glads *Spic and Span* is almost too well known to discuss but is still tops in every respect. For color value we rate *Sweet 16* high as do our florists. Of course, *Friendships* is the one for early cut flowers — or all season long for that matter, *Silcherlied* and *Jessie Mae* can give excellent spikes and are well liked commercially although they have to be exceptional to touch *Spic and Span* on the show table. *Painted Lady* is one of the truly different glads with its color combination of pink and white and scarlet.

For show purposes Mid America, Poinsettia, and Leah Gorham lead the light red glads in the order named while the last two are excellent for cut flower use. Early Red gave us near perfect spikes of unusual beauty at a time when no other red glads were in bloom.

Once again Harrisburger stood out in the field with its tall spikes of a smooth deep red and nice ruffling. The giants in this color are Festival with its consistently huge spikes of a rich deep red; Red Feather which is rapidly gaining friends for exhibition purposes; and Big Joe which can reach 6 ft. in height. We still think Dee Twelve has the finest color among the red glads and along with Birch Red, Red Charm and Nancy are the ones we use for cutting in quantity.

The black red class has so many topnotchers in it now that it is hard to choose among them. However, Black Cherry leads for exhibition purposes with up to 10 open florets — only wish it had more stretch in the flowerhead. Close behind follows Dark David with its massive $5\frac{1}{2}$ spikes and Ace of Spades with its beautiful individual florets and long flowerhead. We have seen Negus with 14 open blooms and it easily overpowers the 300 group on the show table. Thunderbolt gave us impressive flowerheads with 9 ruffled blooms open but often the first one is only a foot off the ground. Menilik seems to lack strong attachment for its large heavy blooms. Ruffled Ebony has the most lovely individual florets. Black Phantom, Jo Wagenaar, Mrs. R. G. Errey and Uncle Tom are the favorites among the older varieties in this popular color.

Among the pleasant surprises of the summer were Edgewood with its tall near perfect spikes of clean light rose, Celestial Rose which looks like a topnotcher for cut flower use, and Julia Mae with tall slender spikes of a smooth delicate light rose. Rosario continues to give nice medium sized spikes with its pronounced dark throat blotch. Touchdown impresses us as a good local cut flower. Macushla, Miss Holland and Andrena we grow in quantity for cut flowers the last named is one of the favorites of the whole Arenius family for all uses.

The medium rose group has many distinctive varieties such as Seneca, with its perfect exhibition spikes, Brier, one of the most beautiful of all glads, Lynne Hill with up to 9 large florets of an unusual shade of rose, and Glad Tidings, a clear self-color with tall formal type spikes in an American Beauty rose color. Folklore, Madeline Hefty and Elmer's Rose are good commericals that we grow for cutting and they can give a good account of themselves on the show table as well. Not to be left out in this class are Rosita with its tall spikes of crinkled and ruffled soft rose, Burma Rose, a sport of Burma but with a softer color, Mallow, with its tall cuttable spikes, and Margery, the highly regarded commercial prospect.

The deep rose varieties are still led by the grand old-timer, Burma, in spite of the many worthwhile new ones. Others that we like in this popular color are Cherbourg, a topnotch florist's variety, Lila Wallace, a first early in a beautiful shade of rose, Modern Times, a must have for the cut flower man, New York, a huge exhibition type variety, and Rosy Future, one of the best for color.

A customer from Staatsburg, N. Y. reports:

Bulbs arrived last week. You have the largest bulbs and are more generous with your over-count and extras than any other firm with which I deal. — Mr. P. R. B.

Light lavender has long been one of our favorite colors and we are pleased to see so many superior glads in this class now. The most publicized variety has been Heirloom and in spite of some short spikes, it continues to give us some of the best exhibition spikes in our fields. Princess has come to the front as the leading exhibition lavender and to us is an outstanding commercial with its reliable spike production, vigorous growth, and ability to open in water. Tyrone has the height so frequently lacking in this color while Fransesca not only has good height but is one of the most beautiful of all glads. Other good ones are Attraction, massive flowerheads of a delicate pale lavender, Crown Jewel with its bold throat blotch, Elizabeth The Queen, tops in every way, Lavender Lace, most reliable in growth, Orchid Fantasy, the first to bloom, and Sunday Best, with its lovely shade of rosy lavender. Not to be left out is Wedgwood with its crisp ruffled florets of unsurpassed beauty.

The deep lavender leaders continu to be Noweta Rose and Parthiena on the show table while Benjamin Britten and Lavender Prince are the ones to grow for cut flower use. Two new ones are Mother Anne a good commercial prospect and Pirate Chief which looks like a fine one for all purposes. Parade we grow for its earliness and clear bright color while Col. Atkinson gives tall husky spikes after the others have finished blooming.

The purple class is headed by King David both for exhibition and commercial use although we prefer The Rajah for our own cut flower growing. The new Times Square impressed us with its big spikes of rich magenta purple while Wonder Boy has an interesting color with its flecking on the edges of its petals. For ruffling and richness of color Kashmir is without peer and Royal Scot is the most consistent spikemaker of all the purple glads. We grow quantities of Dorothy Armstrong for our florists all season long while Sherwood gives us nice spikes of medium height in a nice shade of reddish purple.

The weak light blue class has been greatly strengthened by the addition of *Violet Charm* which should lead for both show and commercial purposes. *Blue Beauty* continues to be widely grown and *High Life*, *Blue Bonnett* and *Libretto* are other popular varieties of this group.

In the deep "blues", Salman's Sensation has taken over with its extra tall spikes of a rich medium "blue". It is the largest "blue" we have ever grown and seems healthy as well. Pfitzer's Sensation is a much larger edition of Abu Hassan with the same deep color. Indigo and Crater Lake are two fine additions to this class that we look forward to viewing again. Gustav Mabler has a grayish blue color that is most appealing and we like Parma Violet as the best "blue" miniature.

We are certainly pleased with the fine reception given to our own Tan Glo. It is most gratifying to find it leading all other 1954 introductions in the Symposium. Also rating high for exhibition are Stormy Weather, Southern Belle and Mesa Mist. In no other color group as the smoky class are opinions so varied and divided and are such distinctive varieties found. Such varieties are Adagio, Alzada, Dusty Miller, Gray Summit, High Finance, Uhu, Oklahoma, Persian Beauty, Persian Rug, and Voodoo.

The A. O. C. Class also contains many striking and unusual glads such as Butterfly, a heavily ruffled multicolor glad of lavender, reddish pink, and yellow. Cherokee is a clear reddish bronze while Salamanca is a huge grayish buff. Other well liked varieties are Buckeye Bronze, Choctaw, R. B., Robinson Crusoe, Tunias Elite, and Vagabond Prince.

We like this one for its exciting color—a most brilliant shade of true red. Tall and strong plants with up to 9 open blooms at once. Is very popular for all uses. Good florists color.

DIEPPE (Hassell '45) (436) 80

Glistening salmon scarlet that is truly outstanding. 6-8 lightly ruffled florets on $4\frac{1}{2}$ tall spikes with good flowerheads.

DOROTHY ARMSTRONG

(Beardmore '48) (470) 80

With us this is the best purple cut flower. A tall strong grower with good attachment and placement and it opens well in water. One of the first to bloom and takes wet weather well.

DUSTY MILLER (Elliot '45) (486) 85

Dusty old rose with white pencilling on a red throat. We have had 11 florets open at once on 5' spikes. Most reliable of the smokies.

ELIZABETH THE QUEEN

(White '41) (566) 80

For years this has been the leader of the lavender glads for all purposes. Tho it likes plenty of water for exhibition spikes, it is one of the most widely grown and liked glads today. Nice ruffling on this lovely glad.

ESQUIRE (Ficht '50) (536) 85

Clear scarlet that can make simply gigantic spikes. As many as 9 6" florets open at once on husky $5\frac{1}{2}$ ' spikes.

EVANGELINE (Palmer '48) (540) 90

Beautiful shade of delicate rosy pink. One that misplaces its blooms a lot but still wins grand championships and is widely grown commercially. Does well from smaller sized bulbs.

FLAME GIRL (Lins '50) (536) 80

Intense flame scarlet that makes fine spikes with 9 well placed 5½" blooms on 4' spikes. Robust in growth and good for all uses.

FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE

(Harris '47) (400) 85

Lightly ruffled pure white with a creamy throat. A "must have" for all, with 6-8 large florets of perfect placement on straight 5' spikes. We think this is the best white glad we have ever grown and recommend it unhesitantly.

FLORENTINE (Fischer '50) (500) 80

Tall ruffled white with a creamy throat. A strong grower opening up to 8 blooms on a long flowerhead. Very good for us this summer.

FLYING FORTRESS (Wilson '43) (586) 90 Huge slate gray smoky with a small red throat. Tho it makes some short spikes the good ones are exceptionally outstanding.

FOLKLORE (Butt '49) (462) 75

Bright shade of rose pink with a large creamy throat. A fine cut flower with good handling and keeping qualities. Up to 8 wide open 5" florets on a 5' spike. Appealing color.

FRIENDSHIP (Fischer '49) (442) 70

One of the most popular of the newer glads. Glistening true pink that opens 6-7 5" beautifully ruffled florets on a tall slender spike. A first early that is useful all season long for all purposes.

GENE (Farrington '49) (410) 75

Very heavily ruffled light yellow. Looks like yellow crepe paper. Very vigorous and healthy in growth with 6-7 43/4" blooms on a 4' spike.

GEN. EISENHOWER

(Salman '48) (544) 85

A huge rosy salmon with 6-8 6" florets open on 5' spikes with long flowerhead. Makes good spikes from all size bulbs.

GORGEOUS DEB (Wilson '49) (530) 95

Gorgeously ruffled light salmon blending to a cream throat. Tho placement and attachment are only fair this is one of the most beautiful varieties. Up to 9 open on 4' spikes.

GRAY SUMMITT (Butt '50) (486) 80

Clear silvery gray with a white throat. Husky in growth with 7-8 5" blooms on a $4\frac{1}{2}$ spike. Different in color from most smokies.

HANS VAN MEEGREN

(Europe '50) (412) 80

A true buttercup yellow with topnotch cut flower qualities. One of our favorite cutters and our florists really go for it. 6-8 5" plain petalled florets on 4' spikes.

HAPPY END (K & M) (436) 70

Very early deep salmon with a light yellow throat. A husky spikemaker with 6-9 5" blooms on 4' spikes with long flowerheads but rather short stems. A valuable early cut flower.

Beautifully clear light blue with a deeper reddish blue throat. A healthy grower with 7-8 4" blooms open at once. A good early cut flower.

INVICTUS (Owens '42) (441) 70

Early flowering blush rose with a bright rose throat. 6-7 5" florets on a $4^{1}/_{2}$ ' spike. Fine florists variety.

JO WAGENAAR (K & M '49) (545) 88 Rich deep red with a white throat line. Opens 7-8 always well placed 5½" blooms on 4½' spikes. Very vigorous and one of the most reliable spikemakers.

KASHMIR (Allen '50) (470) 85

At the top for beauty with its heavily textured and ruffled rich royal purple florets on tall graceful spikes. 8-9 5" blooms open at once. A good grower that is best for home garden and exhibition use.

KING ALFRED (Hobbs '45) (532) 90

Tall deep salmon with a cream throat. A fine exhibition and cut flower variety with up to 9 6" triangular shaped florets open at once on good flowerheads.

KING LEAR (Palmer '38) (570) 75
Standard deep purple opening 6-8 lightly ruffled blooms on tall wiry plants. Most reliable in growth and widely grown for all uses.

KING WILLIAM (Schnetsky '40) (530) 85 Light salmon with a cream throat. Like a softer colored Picardy. Wonderful cut flower.

LADY ANNE (Buchanan '47) (400) 70 A tall, early, and large flowered creamy white. 7-8 5½" blooms on 5' spikes. Extra good as an early commercial and useful all summer long.

*LaVALLE (Lines '49) (507) 85

Clear light ivory cream with a showy orange scarlet blotch. An exceptionally vigorous grower that gets better each year we grow it. 7-8 ruffled 6" florets on 51/2' spikes. Makes striking baskets.

Heavy textured light lavender with a large cream throat. With its 6-8 lightly ruffled round blooms open at once, it is a fine cut flower that can also win grand championships.

LAVENDER PRINCE

(La Salle '44) (468) 80

Tall deep lavender commercial. 6-8 lightly ruffled and heavy textured blooms on tall plants with good flowerheads. Opens well in water and is a strong reliable grower.

For years the queen of the cream colored glads and still one of the best. 6-8 6" florets on 5' spikes. Widely grown.

LIEF ERIKSON (K & M '52) (506) 85

Outstanding lovely deep cream that opens 8-11 lightly ruffled florets on husky $5\frac{1}{2}$ spikes. Makes good spikes from even the smallest bulbs. In great demand as a cut flower and rates as the best in its color as an exhibition variety. One that everyone will grow sooner or later.

Beautifully ruffled deep rose that is an excellent early cut flower. 8 open on $4\frac{1}{2}$ tall spikes. One of the prettiest glads and is very good for home arrangements.

LUXURY (Evans '51) (530) 85

Exhibition type light salmon. Up to 8 very formally placed blooms on $4\frac{1}{2}$ spikes. One of the better show glads.

MACUSHLA (Paul '50) (460) 85

Clear bengal rose with a deeper throat — a different and appealing shade. A strong grower with 6-8 5" plain petalled blooms on $4\frac{1}{2}$ ' spikes.

Exotic blend of red and yellow on very tall strong spikes. A striking and attractive variety that is always a sellout.

MAPLE LEAF (Pletcher '46) (590) 90

A giant in the glad world. A reddish brown exhibition type variety with florets that can be grown to 7 or 8" across.

MARGARET BEATON

(Twomey '37) (501) 85

A fine old-timer that is still one of the best, 6-8 snow white blooms with a bright cherry throat. Tall and strong grower.

MID AMERICA (Knierim '47) (550) 85

The best light red exhibition variety. Makes massive spikes with up to 9 6½" smooth petalled florets open on 3' flowerheads and 5½' plants. A must have for the exhibitor.

MISS HOLLAND (K & M) (560) 80

Beautiful shade of clear venitian pink. A vigorous grower opening 7-8 round plain pettaled florets on $4\frac{1}{2}$ spikes. A good cutter in a color that florists like.

MODERN TIMES (Salman '48) (464) 75

Reddish rose self color that is a "must have" for the cut flower grower. A vigorous and sturdy glad with 6-7 5" blooms open at once on tall plants.

MRS. R. G. ERREY (Errey '48) (554) 85 Glistening tall dark red that is one of the best of the Australian varieties. Has a massive head of bloom on very tall slender spikes that sometime bend when in full bloom. Very popular and for many the best of the dark reds.

MT. BAKER (Cave '50) (540) 100

Late blooming blush white with up to 8 open florets on tall plants. Makes fine spikes from all size bulbs and is becoming widely grown.

MT. INDEX (Miller '42) (401) 70

Very early tall white with a yellow throat. For early cut flowers it is unusually good with its straight 5½' spikes holding 6-8 5" blooms open at once.

ORANGE GOLD (Marshall '45) (422) 80
Bright true orange with a small golden throat. Very tall healthy grower with 6-7 5" florets open at once. A widely grown cut flower.

PACTOLUS (K & M '47) (417) 80

Vivid combination of yellow and red. Opens 8-10 5" blooms on a 4' spike. A popular variety and one of the most consistent growers.

PALETTE (Kooy '51) (437) 85

Clear scarlet with a bluish purple throat. 6-8 5" smooth petalled blooms on 4' spikes. A good grower. One of the most novel color combinations in glads.

Huge deep mauve lavender with an impressive show record. 8-10 6" blooms will open at once on husky 4' spikes. Attachment is only fair for such large blooms but it is a good commercial and home garden glad. Very nicely ruffled.

PATRICIAN (Scheer '47) (566) 90

Beautiful shade of clear light lavender. 6-8 6" smooth petalled florets on tall husky plants. Fast propagator and fine grower.

Large, 2 for .25, 10 for \$1.00; Medium, 3 for .25, 10 for .65; Small, 10 for .35; Bulblets .25 pkg.

PATROL (Palmer '46) (416) 80

Lovely light orange buff. Opens up to 10 or more blooms in perfect placement on 5' spikes. Always a contender for top show awards and also is a wonderful commercial.

PERSIAN BEAUTY (Kneirim '48) (586) 90 Smoky old rose with lighter colored red veining. Makes huge spikes with up to 8 6½" blooms on 5½' plants. An unusual color effect on a fine exhibition variety.

PHANTOM BEAUTY

(Bastian '47) (440) 85

Soft shade of shell pink. Up to 12 43/4" florets on tall slender spikes. Can make superb exhibition spikes and won at least 2 grand championships this past summer.

PICARDY (Palmer '31) (530) 90

Almost too well known to describe, Picardy is still one of the best glads. Tops for all uses and continues enjoying wide demand for cut flower use.

POLYNESIE (K & M '50) (430) 90

A tall clear salmon with a small white throat that is considered by many to be the best in its color. Up to 10 5" florets open at once. Good grower and an excellent cut flower.

PROF. GOUDRIAAN

(K & M '50) (500) 80

Wonderful new commercial creamy white that we consider the equal of any on the market. Very healthy and prolific giving 5' tall ramrod type spikes. It holds 8-9 51/2" blooms on a good flowerhead. Has good attachment and placement and opens well in water.

QUIBERON (Errey '49) (410) 85

Very tall orange buff variety. Tho it misplaces often it can make superior exhibition spikes with up to 10-12 5" florets open on 24 bud flowerhead.

R. B. (Upton '40) (590) 90

Rusty brown toned smokey. Makes gigantic spikes with as many as 8-9 6½" blooms open at once. Good grower.

RED CHARM (Butt '39) (452) 80

An old timer that is still near the top for either exhibition or cut flower use. This charming red always sells out before the season ends.

RED CHERRY (Roberts '46) (436) 70

Very early bright cherry red cut flower variety. A reliable grower with 7-8 saucer shaped florets on slender 4' plants. Valuable for early blooms.

RED WING (Knight '48) (436) 85

Outstanding scarlet red that tops its color for both commercial and show use. Opens up to 12 5" blooms with long flowerheads on 5' plants.

ROSY FUTURE (Pletcher '51) (464) 85

Deep cerise rose opening 6-8 blooms on slender $4\frac{1}{2}$ spikes. Unusually lovely color and a strong grower.

SALMAN'S GLORY

(Salman '47) (507) 80

Large creamy white with a showy red throat. An early variety that opens 7-8 6" florets on tall slender spikes. One of the best of the Holland varieties.

SANS SOUCI (K & M '51) (436) 85

Tall strong clear scarlet red with a narrow white line on the lower petal. 7-8 5" petalled blooms open at once. An excellent grower that is in much demand in the flower market.

SHEHERAZADE (K & M '51) (541) 80

Large creamy pink with a bold rose red throat blotch. Consistently gives sturdy $4\frac{1}{2}$ spikes with 7-8 big heavy textured florets open at a time. A favorite variety with our florists.

TROCADERO (Lins '46) (422) 87 Clear carrot orange. 6-8 plain petalled blooms open at once on tall 5' spikes. Good cut flower and opens well in water.

TRUELOVE (Klein '45) (440) 70 Lovely and very early clear shell pink. 6-8 5" blooms on straight 4' spikes. Wonderful early cut flower. TUNIAS ELITE (Both '47) (590) 80

A huge bronzy orange smoky offset by a bright red throat. A vigorous variety with up to 7 6" florets open at once. Bold coloring.

TUNIAS MOHAMET (Both '43) (586) 75 One of the finest smokies. About 7 large blooms of a smooth plum rose with a scarlet throat. Stock limited.

UHU (K & M '46) (482) 85

A tall growing variety with about 8 nicely placed blooms open. A smooth shade of light brown with a yellow throat. Our florists like this in the fall.

UNCLE TOM (Salman '49) (554) 90

Dark purplish maroon that is a shade by itself. Good grower and gaining popularity because of its distinctive color. Goes well in mixed bouquets.

Bizarre appearing bronzy plum colored smoky. 6-8 needle pointed and waved florets at once on slender 4' spikes.

WEDGWOOD (Fischer '47) (366) 75

Charming waxy appearing light lavender with a bluish tint and a creamy throat. Holds 6-7 crisp and ruffled 4" florets on a graceful 4' spike. A superior arrangement glad that our florists are beginning to demand in quantity.



Care and Culture

(Complete planting instructions will be included with each order)

SOIL AND FERTILIZATION

Glads do well on most any soil if they are planted in the open garden where there is plenty of sunshine. You may work well rotted manure into the soil in the Spring by putting it into the botton of your planting trench, then covering with an inch of soil; then planting your bulbs. Vigoro is also good. Two or three applications of commercial fertilizer may be made on the surface along the rows during the growing season before the plants bloom. Any fertilizer should be kept from direct contact with bulb or foliage. If you wish to grow immense spikes, your plants must have at least an inch of water every three days and good drainage.

PLANTING

Work soil to a depth of eight inches, or ten inches will be better. Large bulbs should be covered with about six inches of soil. The deeper planting helps keep them upright when blooming. Smaller bulbs should be planted not less than two inches. You may regulate your distance apart in the row by the space you have. Plant rows anywhere from 2 ft. to 3 ft. apart. Plant in rows from two to six inches apart, depending on space and number of bulbs. They do well planted close together, but require more water.

DIGGING AND STORAGE

Our early stock is taken up in early October. The bulbs should be taken up within six weeks to two months after blooming but before the tops begin to get brown. Even if the tops are green, bulbs should be taken up before the ground freezes deeply. After digging, cut off the tops close to bulb and put in screen bottomed trays to cure. They should have plenty of ventilation while curing and must not be put in containers more than three or four inches deep. At this time Napthalene flakes (procured from your druggist) may be safely scattered on the bulbs which are dormant. Use at the rate of an ordinary handful per 100 bulbs. A little more or less won't do any harm and it will drive away any thrip that may be harboring an idea of wintering on your bulbs. By the time you are ready to clean the bulbs most of the flakes will have evaporated. A note of warning! DO NOT use them in the Spring when root nodules appear at the base of the bulb, as they are harmful and prevent normal growth of the plant. Use them right after digging or early winter. Stir them every few days and keep dry. In four weeks they will be cured so that old bulbs may be removed from the bottoms. They may then be placed in storage. Proving very effective as a thrip control in storage is a light dusting of 5% DDT powder. This is very good if the bulbs do not have to be handled during storage as DDT powder is poisonous.

The storage temperature is best at 45 to 50 degrees. Your storage room should be dry, cool and ventilated and as near uniform as possible as to temperature. It is well to look at your bulbs every two or three weeks. If they show signs of too much moisture or look mouldy, dry them out and give better ventilation. Keep them in small containers and spread thin.

Jhrip And Disease Control



With the advent of DDT as a dust or spray for thrip on gladiolus the problem has become of minor importance. A few dustings or sprayings after the plants are about 8-10 inches high will eliminate all trouble from that source.

DDT Spray
2 rounded teaspoonful DDT (50% wettable). 1 teaspoonful Dreft. 2 gallons of water. Spray every 8-10 days till glads begin to bloom.
DDT Dust

Use 3 or 5% dust. Preferably use a dust also containing a good fungicide. Dust lightly every 8-10 days till glads begin to bloom.

BULB DIPS

As a disease preventative for bulbs. This is a recommended precaution both for your old bulbs and new bulbs no matter where obtained.

LYSOL — 1 tablespoonful of Lysol. 1 gallon of water. Soak 4 to 6 hours immediately

preceding planting.

NEW improved Ceresan — 1 oz. of N. I. Ceresan. 3 gallons of water. Weigh carefully and leave bulbs in solution 15 minutes. Do not leave bulbs in solution over 20 minutes and be sure to plant immediately after dipping.
