



FIFTY WEARS OF SERVICE



N an industry where hundred-year-old firms are common (several European seed companies have been operating over 200 years) a golden anniversary is not highly significant. But we are fifty years old only once! And what an opportunity it affords to look back a few years and also to think about the future!

The story of the Ball Company is largely the personal history of George J. Ball, father of the present generation of Ball brothers. Born in 1874 near Lebanon (Warren Co.), Ohio, he had a considerable family background in agriculture.

Here is a family story told about the immigration of George J. Ball's grandfather to the United States from Germany.

"He was a native of Mannheim, Germany and had six sons. In order to keep these boys well occupied he leased a plot of ground in the country to grow vegetables.

"When harvest time came the government authorities proposed to levy a tax on his produce. He refused, and since he was a six-footer and of powerful build, so the story goes, the officers let things 'ride along' for a time.

"However, they did eventually lay down the law to him. So, resentfully, he paid the tax, determining then and there to come to America, 'the land of the free and the home of the brave'."

Working in Galloway's Greenhouse near Cincinnati at the age of 14, George Ball was attracted to the flower business early in life. Both before and after a tour of military service which took him around the world, his life was devoted to horticulture. In the service he took part in the Cuban campaign under Teddy Roosevelt, for whom he always had great admiration, and a year after completion of this campaign he re-enlisted for a term of duty

which included the Philippine campaign.

In the early years he kept a diary—acquiring this habit during his military tour when long sea voyages and drawn-out military campaigns allowed time for such things.

It seems fitting to quote some entries from this diary which give a word picture of those early days.

FIRST, SOME NOTES ON GREENHOUSE OPERATIONS

(At this time he was foreman of Mr. Brod's greenhouse at Niles Center, Illinois.)

"April 6, 1903. Day foreman leaves today because of poor pay. He received \$38.00 per month. The teamsters will probably strike for \$45.00 instead of \$40.00. The propagator got a lot of carnation cuttings mixed up. There is surely a lot of worrying and thinking to keep a place of this kind going.

(Editor's Note: We know a number of growers who might say things haven't changed much!)

"June 21, 1903. Rode up to Poehlman's today, visiting both places. The range going up at the new place is no doubt the most modern one about Chicago. Putting up separated houses seems to

be out of favor among modern builders, all the new houses here being together. Detached houses occupy too much space and require too many walls, which is no small item in modern building."

A HISTORICAL ENTRY

"Dec. 30, 1903. Started putting in carnation cuttings today. Was called to the city this P.M. and got down in time to see wagon load after wagon load of burned women and children carried away from the New Iroquois Theatre that caught fire about 3:30 during a matinee performance. Last night the estimated dead was over 700. It was a gruesome sight to see on the streets of a great city."

DESCRIBING AN EARLY ASTER CROP ON LAND LEASED BY HIM IN NORTHWEST CHICAGO

"April 25, 1904. Sowed an ounce of late branching aster seed received today from Dreer in place of an ounce recently received of them that did not come up.

"June 3, 1904. Finished planting asters today, being just two weeks in getting out what we believe to be about 45,000, at least.


"July 5, 1904. A lot of our asters are beginning to look awful sick and prospects are looking cloudy. The trouble with all the affected ones is stem rot.

"July 26, 1904. The following appeared in The Florist Review of 7-21 Chicago Notes. It was probably

put up by my wholesaler, Mr. Benthey. At least it is an exaggeration.

'George J. Ball, who has the Harms Park Floral Company place, is growing two acres of asters which are giving indications of a very fine large crop next month. There is no sign of disease in the field.'

"Sept. 5, 1904. Labor Day, and it has been one of labor for me, cutting asters as hard as I could until 6:00 this evening. Where they are plentiful can cut 500 per hour but that is the limit. Our asters are selling at 1c each, and that is considered a good price. The perfect whites bring 1½c. (See illustration.)

"Dec. 10, 1904. Gathered some aster seed today of a patch of selected white. It is too late to do this to advantage, most of the seed being blown away."


FIFTY YEARS BACK

In 1905 at the age of 31 George Ball started continuous growing operations in a leased establishment in northwest Chicago. This included some seed saving and a limited amount of carnation plant shipping in addition to spring sale of bedding plants. These early years of flower growing were years of struggle of the sort familiar to many tradesmen. However, each year's operation seemed to become more successful, and in 1909 an important move was made to land which was purchased at Glen Ellyn, Illinois.

In 1908, a year before this move, he married a young Chicago school teacher, Anna Kruse.

In Glen Ellyn, what is now the firm's principal line of business—growing and selling flower seeds—was established with Asters, Sweet Peas, and Calendulas.


It was shortly after the move to Glen Ellyn that he got into the seed business by being approached for seed by growers who had seen his cut flower strains at the wholesale markets. Limited seed sales were made during the years preceding World War I. Many seed varieties which appear in this catalog were originated from selections out of commercial crops grown during this period. His first printed price list or "catalog" was published in 1918. One of the first lists which we have on record contains reprints of testimonial letters from a number of growers including Fred A. Danker, Albany, New York; Christian B. Groff, Lancaster, Pa.; Dale Estate, Brampton, Ontario; A. Washburn & Sons, Bloomington, Ill.; J. W. Davis Co., Terre Haute, Ind.; Joy Floral Co., Nash-

ville, Tenn.; and Wolfe the Florist, Waco, Texas.

It was in these early years of the seed business that policies of the firm were established which still control company operations today. As his seed business developed, he established numerous contacts throughout the world by personal inspection of flower seed production areas in Europe, America, and the Far East. He retained control of his own developed "Ball Strains" of

important cut flower and bedding plant seed varieties by either producing the seed himself in the firm's greenhouses or shipping greenhouse-grown "planting stock" to commercial seed growers

who would return the seed crop.

These policies are still followed by our firm. Where the required quality of seed is unobtainable from commercial sources we grow it in our greenhouse (examples: Coleus, Begonia, Hybrid Snap, some Stocks).

This technique of quality control which has made Ball seeds well known throughout the world is also furthered by extensive trialing of our own as well as other "strains" of important seed varieties, both under glass and outdoors.

The firm remained in the Glen Ellyn location until 1927, when several greenhouses and an office building were erected at West Chicago, ten miles away. Also, it was during this period that he wrote "Better Sweet Peas", describing the culture of this crop. This book was widely circulated among commercial Sweet Pea growers of that day.

In spite of the great depression, good sales gains were made in the seed business in the 1930's. George K., oldest son of Mr. Ball and now Company President, joined the staff in 1931. To help his grower customers keep informed about the latest and best growing practices, George J. Ball began publication of the magazine, "Grower Talks", in 1937. This grower magazine has been published each month continuously since that date and is being carried on under the editorship of son Victor Ball, who became affiliated with the firm after completing the curriculum in floriculture at the University of Illinois in 1936. Vic is also manager of the company greenhouses, and is especially interested in the latest developments in Mum growing. One year later, Robert Ball, third son of George J., came to work. He is now in charge of Bulb and Supply Warehouse and Shipping.

Apart from writing, travel provided George Ball considerable recreation. He made several trips to Europe and one to Japan in the thirties, establishing valuable contacts with seed suppliers. Column Stocks were introduced to this country as a result of travels in the early thirties in Germany, where they were being grown commercially.

A modern, fireproof, two-story, air-conditioned office and seed warehouse was constructed at West Chicago in 1933. An addition was added in 1938 and another in 1950 to accommodate an in-

creased volume of business in seeds. Also, additional space was needed during the late thirties and forties for new lines of merchandise, including rooted Mum cuttings, plants, bulbs, and certain supplies.

Certainly one af the high points of George J's career was reached when at Toronto, Canada, in 1938, he was elected president of the Society of American Florists.

Of recent years we need add little. An I.B.M. system was installed after the war in the firm's order-writing and billing operations, making for more rapid processing of orders, even improving the "same day service" on seed orders which had become a policy of the firm at its inception. Carl, youngest son of George Ball, joined the firm in 1947 after completion of a war-interrupted college course at the University of Illinois, and is now in charge of the firm's seed business.

While attempting to realize a long-time ambition to circle the globe a second time (first during the Spanish-American War), George Ball suffered a heart attack while crossing the Pacific. He returned home, and several months later in September, 1949, passed away at the age of 75.

The Ball Brothers and the entire Ball organization wish to take this opportunity to thank the trade for their generous support of their efforts to serve the florist industry. To be able to look back upon several decades of a cordial and mutually profitable relationship with many firms throughout the country is, indeed, one of the real pleasures of doing business. And in these times of important developments in our industry, we regard the future as a challenge and an opportunity to carry on the Ball reputation for "All the Best—Nothing Else".





CULTURAL SUGGESTIONS

Doubles must be sown earlier than ordinary Petunias to bloom at the same time. We recommend (Chicago, 50°) January 1 sowing for strong 3-inch for bedding plant sales in late May. For Mother's Day combinations, heavy 3-inch should be sown December 15—no later. For 4- or 5-inch for April and May potted plant sales, a well shaped plant with several blooms needs a November 15 sowing. Doubles, like other Petunias, need good drainage, and cool temperatures—they will lose their dwarf habit of growth if temperatures are run up above 55° (unless there is an abundance of sunshine to offset this).

Certain varieties need one pinch to retain suitable shape for finished plants. They all break very readily. Sonata, Snowball, and Minuet are especially responsive to a pinch.

VICTORIOUS (Japanese) STRAINS

Gaiety. The blotched or variegated flowers combine bright rose-pink with contrasting pure white to produce the "Strawberries in cream" effect. The blooms are medium large, well doubled and fringed, and are carried on dwarf, base-branching plants—qualities which go to make an excellent Petunia for pots. The most popular Victorious variety. Pictured above.

Illumination. The deepest, brightest rose in double Petunias.

Orchid Beauty, Improved. Orchid, heavily veined deep violet.

Fantasy. (Purple and White.) Striped purple and white.

Flowers are moderately fringed and ruffled, and are freely produced. Makes a fine pot plant and is equally good for bedding. Most popular F₁ Hybrid Grandiflora.

1. They bloom very early in pots or flats.

the year.

Part of our Petunia breeding work in recent years has been aimed at developing more satisfactory varieties in this class. Robin is an outstanding example.

POT PLANT TYPES

The past several years' breeding work has yielded several new Petunia varieties which seem admirably adapted to pot plant growth, but are not so universally useful for outdoor planting. Outdoors in an ideal environment these varieties will be quite attractive: but where conditions are not ideal they will appear somewhat inferior to their stronger growing brothers, such as F1 Hybrids, Doubles, California Giants, Ruffled Grandifloras, etc. So we have taken the liberty of listing the following varieties separately to indicate a special adaptability to growth in pots in the greenhouse in spring. Since germination, vigor, and reaction to different climatic conditions vary with varieties, it is difficult to make a formula mixture which will perform with uniform satisfaction everywhere. Some varieties are naturally more vigorous, while others tend to be "drowned out" by the stronger growers; and the resultant color balance is not always entirely satisfactory. For this reason, where you need substantial quantities, we recommend that you buy separate colors, mixing the seedlings when transplanting to get special color combinations.

GENERAL CULTURE

"Resistance" to Aster wilt does not mean complete "immunity"! While the degree of resistance offered by these strains may vary somewhat in different localities, there is no doubt that they are far more satisfactory than non-resistant strains. Our past experience indicates that changing the location of the Aster planting regularly (or steam sterilizing) is a worth-while safety precaution. We sow them 6 weeks before planting out date. Three weeks after sowing, the seedlings go into 21/2-inch plant bands; three weeks later we plant them without removing bands, which helps minimize transplanting losses. We space them a foot apart each way in beds so that conventional wire and string may be used for supports. We find cloth house protection a necessity if superior quality is wanted.

OFF-SEASON ASTERS (UNDER GLASS)

Many growers have written us the past season to say that their

spring greenhouse Aster crops were the best paying crops that they had on their place. While Asters can be flowered any month of the year, the spring and early summer months seem to be the most profitable. The only important requirements are: 50° night temperatures and additional lighting, which must be supplied continuously from the seedling stage until plants are 20 to 24 inches tall. The only exception is the period from May 1 to September 1, during which day length is long enough. 60-watt bulbs with reflectors, spaced 5 feet apart, or the lighting set-up you use for Mums is satisfactory. Lights must be turned on from sundown to 10 P. M. daily.

Spacing may be anywhere from 8x8 to 10x10 inches—we use the latter for somewhat better quality. White Ball, Pink Ball and Rose Ball are especially fine for off-season culture. Azure Ball and Purple Ball do equally well, but these colors will be wanted in lesser quantity. Use sterilized soil for best results.

The following schedule worked out at Ohio State checks closely with our own experience where a 50° night temperature was used.

For Early Summer Cut Flowers Outdoors: If you failed to make an outdoor sowing last fall, good results can be had from a spring sowing—if you get your seed in the ground just as soon as the frost is out of it. Figure on 2 lbs. of seed to sow an acre or 1 oz. for 600 to 700 ft. of row, if seeds are sown about 1 inch apart. Height outdoors 2 to 3 ft.

Under Glass—Spring Flowering: For indoor growing, Larkspur is a nice crop to follow late Mums. Well started 3-inch banded or potted plants should be ready, and are produced by a December or January sowing. Space at least 12x12 in. on ground; 10x10 in. on raised beds should be ample. The after-Mum planting is generally started out cool, 45° nights, increasing to 50° or more with spring weather. Height indoors 4 to 5 ft.

Varieties: The newer Regals, Supremes and Super Majestics have largely improved most of the older Giant Imperials, being stronger growers with better flower spikes. If you're not familiar with them, we suggest that you confine the bulk of your planting to the "7 Best" listed below.

This list is based on our greenhouse flowering trials. Generally strains which are found best under glass seem also best adapted to outdoor culture.

Midwinter Sowing in December or January. After they have germinated carry them along as cool as possible till spring—transplant them into frames in March (Chicago latitude) for May sales. Carl Hellgren, Glenbard Gardens, Lombard, Ill., sows early December, transplants 30 to a "half flat", and carries them in a cold house 35.40° till March 1. Then he sets them out in frames where they start to bloom early May and are sold for \$1.50 per flat.

Summer Sowing. (Early August.) This is the most popular time for establishing plants which are spaced about 4 x 6 in. in frames, given some protection over winter-loose straw, perhaps. Plants should be well established before winter sets in-even budded so that blooms will be available early in the spring to help sell the



ABOUT FLOWERING DATES. In describing the many Snap varieties which we list, we have designated each as early (E), midseason (M) or late (L). This is an arbitrary classification based on our own West Chicago greenhouse trials over a period of years.

From a sowing made August 1, grown on a raised bench as a pinched crop and run 50° nights, those varieties which normally flower by December 15 we classify as early. Those which flower

between December 15 and January 10 we call midseason; while the remainder that flower after January 10 we consider late. Locality and amount of sunshine, of course, have a bearing on flowering dates, too.

It should be borne in mind that while many of the early and midseason varieties are excellent for late flowering if sown later, late varieties cannot be flowered early unless sown in June in our locality.

BRIEFS ON SNAP CULTURE

Soils

Good Snaps can be grown in a wide variety of soils. As a general rule any soil that will grow good Mums will grow good Snaps. The really important point is that it contain plenty of organic matter. While this may take the form of manure, be sure it is well rotted. As a matter of fact, peat is generally preferred because the bacteria which are necessary to decay manure rob the soil of essential plant nutrients.

The amount of organic matter which a soil needs depends upon its basic structure. Heavy, clay-like soils will need more than loose, sandy sorts. If an average good garden or field soil is to be used, one part of organic matter should be incorporated with each two or three parts of soil. To this should be added three pounds of 20% superphosphate per 100 square feet of bench area before steaming. Other than this we prefer to depend upon regular feedings as soil tests indicate their need rather than to load the soil with too much fertilizer to start with.

Sterilizing

We like to steam sterilize our soil before benching, too. It cleans up disease organisms, kills soil-borne weed seeds and insects and tends to improve the soil's physical condition. Low (8 to 10 lbs.) steam pressure does the job for us. Holding soil temperatures at 180° for half an hour after this temperature has been reached is all it takes. After sterilizing, a heavy leaching with clear water will tend to prevent an excessive build-up of nitrates which might injure Snap roots.

Seed Sowing

Vermiculite, peat, or soil and peat mixtures all make satisfactory materials for germinating Snap seed. We like to have the flats well watered before sowing, which may be done either broadcast or in shallow rows. We prefer the latter since it permits better aeration after the seedlings get started. No additional soil covering is needed for this fine seed-a light misting with a fine spray will settle it into the soil. If weather is hot or windy, flats should be protected with cheesecloth or paper shade until well up, then they will enjoy full light and a cooler, airy location. Seeds should germinate in 3 or 4 days in summer, 7 or 8 days in winter in a night temperature of 60°.

If bench space is available, we like to bench seedlings directless labor and better growth. It works nicely even in hot weather, if the soil is moist before benching, seedlings are planted shallow, and misted within minutes of benching and regularly until new roots show.

In regard to the matter of spacing, we believe 3 x 6 inches is the most economical and profitable for a winter single stem crop with 3 x 5 inches being enough for late spring and summer crops. We space our pinched crops 7 x 8 inches, finding this satisfactory for most varieties. If you are obliged to transplant, band or pot seedlings, do not pinch them until plants have been benched and have taken hold. To pinch before benching will usually result in only two top breaks rather than the four or so that each plant should produce. We like to pinch when plants are about 8 inches high, leaving 3 good pairs of leaves.

Summer-Fall Snaps



Sowing Dates

The dates given here are intended as suggestions only-based on our experience here in the Midwest. Various things can throw them off. Examples:

- Hot, dry, bright fall-will bring Christmas crops in early.
- Dark, cloudy fall-winter delays late winter crops.
- The tables are based on medium early varieties on raised benches, 50° night temperatures most of the winter, at least. 45° nights or ground beds will take longer. Your local climate. Where winters are warm and sunny,
- winter Snaps will bloom faster.
- Varieties differ in blooming dates.

several There are important advantages of germinating Snap seeds in rows, If you use soil as a germination medium, the soil can be thorough-ly "cultivoted" and ly "cultivated" and aerated by breaking the surface between the rows until the seedlings can be pricked off. Then, too, if damp-off be-comes a problem, it is less apt to spread through the seed flat, tending to run down to the end of a row and out. Another im-portant advantage is that when sown in that when sown in rows the soil may be rows the soil may be compressed to form the row and moisture is better controlled down in the small "trenches" — providing an ideal environment for seed germination. ination.




For Bedding: Always popular for their ease of culture and fine, vivid colors, Zinnias should account for a substantial part of your bedding plant sales.

Perennials

We recommend sowing perennials in spring. Germination will be better than during the heat of midsummer and the larger plants produced will winter over more satisfactorily. In addition, if sowing is done in January or early February, quite a few will bloom the first season.

We feel that every grower should include at least a few perennials in his outdoor planting. They get along admirably with little care, and many make really profitable cut flowers.







New Bedding Plant Containers

BY-THE-DOZEN "PAKS" VERSUS FLATS

"Why should I use these small containers when it lowers my unit of sale?" asks the alert bedding plant grower.
