## WHO WE ARE



The Starks have been with us for some sixteen years. Both had previous thorough training in ornamental horticulture. Both have a wide knowledge of plants and flowers that extends to the many newer and rarer kinds we are trying to make available to American gardens.

## 1 GOLDEN BLEEDING HEART

It is DICENTRA CHRYSANTHA, known, too, as Golden Ear-drop. The blossoms are clusters of inverted, golden hearts, carried high over slashed and silvered foliage. It can be rather spectacular. Give it full sun, and well drained soil. It will need careful winter protection in the colder areas. It does not transplant easily, so seeds are best sown where the plants are desired. kt(3)50. Pkt. 25c; 3 pkts. for 70c.

## 2 TULBAGHIA VIOLACEA 1

Clusters of starry flowers like mini-ature Agapanthus blossoms, in melting lilac, a lavender with hint of pink. It has been called "Pink Agapanthus". A splendid house plant, near to ever-blooming. At Philadelphia, and likely in considerably colder areas, it is winter-hardy in the garden, and may be grown in the perennial border, giv-ing continuous flowers from early spring until late autumn. #### 1 CALIFORNIA ROSE

Not really a rose, but often called so, from the rose-like blossoms. Lovely double flowers in the purest of pinks, appear all summer long. A hardy perennial trailer that will add delight to the rock garden, carpet a bank or terrace, or revel in any odd corner. Calystegia pubescens fl. pl. *Illustrated on front cover*. #### 2 THE KANGAROO PAW

Here is an oddly decorative plant for pot culture, ANIGO-ZANTHOS MANGLESI, from Australia, called there Kangaroo Paw from the dense downiness of its strangely formed flowers, and of the crimson stems below them. Minimum size acceptable order for plants and bulbs, for forwarding at one time, is three dollars.

KEY LETTER EXPLANATION—The letters and numerals after the variety names in the description, tell when and how to sow, the season of bloom, and the height of the plant. They are there to help you, both in growing the plants, and in making your original choice of kinds. The meanings of the key letters and numerals are explained on page 66. Please turn to that page now.

#### PLANT FINDER

To help you in picking out plants suited to particular uses we put key numerals before the names, meanings as here.

- -Plants winter-hardy outside at Philadelphia, stems not woody. The hardy herbaceous perennials.
- 2-Frost-tender plants for pot culture in window or greenhouse, or for temporary outdoor planting in summer.
- 3-Bulbs and bulb-like plants. Degree of hardiness, with uses and needs usually given in description.
- Shrubs, trees or woody vines. Use and relative hardiness given in description.
- 5-Annual plants. Here are the quick annual flowers that come into bloom within a few weeks of sowing.

#### THE YEAR-ROUND CATALOG

Here is a catalog for every week of the year, for there is no time that is not the right time to sow some kinds of seeds. Perennial plants may be put out either spring or fall; indeed some of them, as Irises and Oriental Poppies during the summer, too. And of course the window plants, and their seeds, are ready at every season, year-through.

#### BELAMCANDA AVALON HYBRIDS



This strain of Hybrid Blackberry Lilies can hardly be praised too highly as a garden perennial. Flowers may be soft, unmarked yellow, or golden, or yellow with orange or crimson dottings; again, orange alone, or roseate apricot with darker spottings, or orange with crimson splashings, with sometimes a plant with background coloring that approaches red. Height may be anywhere from 12 (one parent species being dwarf) to 50 inches. The flowers are followed by the typical "blackberry" fruiting clusters. Long in bloom, and exceedingly showy. Fully hardy. Sun or shade. Often gives some blooms first year. B. flabellata

#### 3 THE BLUE AMARYLLIS

The flower coloring of this rare species, AMARYLLIS PROCERA, is a delightful lilac-lavender that at times approaches rather closely to blue. Several of the pretty blossoms, each 3 to 5 inches across, are carried to a stem. The petals are crisped and undulate, giving an informal grace to the flowers. Seeds, 3 for 35c; 12 seeds for \$1.00; 27 seeds for \$2.00.

#### FASCINATING PASSIFLORA

The Passion Flowers are easy vines with most handsome, intricately formed blossoms. P. incarnata winters outside at Philadelphia.

P. EDULIS—w. Passion-fruit. Rather showy purple-and-white flowers are followed by purple, egg-sized fruits. Edible, with a refreshing, somewhat acid pulp. P. INCARNATA—kt. Large, showy blossoms of blue-and-white, followed by egg-size, edible fruits. A quick-growing, handsome, herbaceous perennial vine, dying back to roots each year. #### A SPECTACULAR FOXGLOVE

This oddest of Foxgloves, Digitalis purpurea monstrosa, illustrated opposite, carries down-pointing glovebells in the usual, and pleasing, Foxglove form and color range, but each spike is, in addition, topped with an immense, widely opened blossom that seems built of many unrolled, smaller blossoms amalgamated into one greater flower. #### RARE BEGONIAS

BEGONIA DICHROA—Makes handsome plants, rather low and wide in habit. Dense, pendulous clusters of particularly large, orange flowers, varying, since hybrids are included, into salmon and pink. Very large leaves of rich green, white-spotted when young. Pkt. 40c; 3 for \$1.10.

#### 1 SHOWY DWARF HYPERICUMS



Here is treasure for the sunny garden, for the low Hypericums bloom long and freely, in a glossy golden showiness that

few other flowers approach. Then, too, the foliage is attractive, for the fine-leafed, mat-like or low decumbent plants are all of a silvery sheen, or sometimes with a hint of blue to the silver. #### **DELIGHTFUL AZALEAS**

THE KURUME AZALEAS—Splendid strain of rather dwarf, evergreen Azaleas, immensely color-varied, and often with semi-double flowers. Fully winter-hardy at Philadelphia, but in

semi-double flowers. Fully winter-much colder areas, give sheltered position. The Kurume Azaleas also make excellent pot plants for window or greenhouse. Illustrated opposite. THE INDICA AZALEAS—Particularly large flowers in a range of lovely colorings not equalled by any other Azalea, mantle the compact, bushy plants. Evergreen. They make splendid pot plants, having a rather long blooming season, and it is as window or greenhouse plants that they should be handled in

In mild climates they are used for outdoor planting, and it is mostly the Indica Azaleas that make up the gorgeous color masses in famous Azalea gardens of the South, and of California. ## 3 FREESIAS FROM SEED

## 3 THE GLORY LILY

In GLORIOSA PLANTI we offer a Glory Lily of size and habit that make it particularly desirable for growing as a window or greenhouse pot plant, or for use in summer bedding outdoors. The plants are of more dwarf, branching, but compact growth than are those of the other Gloriosas, and the foliage is of an unusual attractiveness in its graceful form and rich, green glossiness. The blossoms, carried well out beyond the foliage, are recurved and undulate in form, orange-yellow at petal base, deepening to orange scarlet at tip. Blooms in less than six months from seed. The coloring is a rich, deep purple, although salmon pink or lilac forms do appear at times. The many-stemmed, airy plants are blossom-filled from June into November. ## 5 THE MONARCH DAISY



Charming annual flower, in bloom from late June until hard autumn freezes. The handsome, daisy-like flowers are rather large, to sometimes four-inch diameters, and are carried on 20 to 24 inch stems. There are two thick rows of petals about a dark center. The flowers may be white, pale primrose, lemon, golden or orange, the petals always with brown or violet band at base. The attractive, deeply lobed foliage seems covered with gleaming, silver gossamer. A showy garden plant, and wonderful, too, as cut flowers, long-lasting and beautiful. ## THE GAY DWARF POMEGRANATE

You can grow them from seed without too much difficulty. Just sow on a mixture of sand and peat (the method we use here in the nursery), or on sifted sphagnum, or even on vermiculite, always covering very lightly. Water from below if you can, by partial immersion of the pot or flat. Shade a bit. Sowings may be made in the winter months under glass; a sunny window will do. Adequate results are also often obtained from cold-frame sowings, or from sowings made in shaded outdoor seed-beds in early spring. Transplant the seedlings into soil that is on the cold-



into soil that is on the acid side. You can make it so by treating with sulphur, or by adding decayed oak leaves, peat or old sawdust.
