

Our blooming season generally begins about the first of June. We will be glad to notify you when our fields attain their peak bloom. Just request that your name be added to our VISITORS' LIST. We will give you ample notice plus a map and full instructions for locating our farm. Feel free to drop in at any time, however. We are certain that you will be pleased with the way we grow our stock.

OUR GUARANTEE. We make just one guarantee-your complete satisfaction. If the service or stock doesn't prove satisfactory, let us know, and we will do whatever is necessary to make you more than satisfied.

## Please Read Before Ordering

CANADIAN ORDERS. There is a simple procedure which residents of Canada must follow in order to import Iris or other plant material. Make out a duplicate order, listing each item and quantity, plus our name and address, then send this to the Plant Import Division of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. The Department will send you a permit number and labels. Send your order, together with the permit labels, to BEDFORD GARDENS, Bedford, Michigan, U.S.A.

SHIPPING SEASON. We start shipping Iris about mid-July and continue through the summer and fall.

TERMS. Cash with order, check, bank draft, or money order. We must caution you against the enclosure of currency with your order. Please, no stamps or C.O.D.

ORDER EARLY AND AVOID DISAPPOINTMENT. The increasing popularity of modern Iris often causes the demand to exceed the supply. Many varieties are sold out by midseason, some early in the season.

#### DESCRIPTIVE TERMS

AMOENA. White or tinted white standards with dark colored falls.

BEARD. Hair-like growth located near the top of the falls.

BLEND. Combination of colors blended together.

FALLS. The three lower petals of the Iris.

PLICATA. A white or light colored Iris with a border of a darker

SELF. Standards and falls of uniform color.

STANDARDS. The three upper petals of the Iris.

STYLE ARM. The claw-shaped flower part found above the beard near the center of the blossom.

VARIEGATA. Yellow or yellow-toned standards and falls of darker color, ranging from red-brown to red-purple.

#### **AWARDS**

Every season accredited judges of the American Iris Society visit gardens and nurseries throughout the country to appraise the performance, technical characteristics, and aesthetic values of new and old Iris. On the basis of their observations, awards are voted to outstanding varieties.

Occasionally a few Iris worthy of acclaim are overlooked due to sparse distribution, but these awards are helpful indicators for choosing Iris of merit for your garden.

The following Iris awards are listed in the order of their importance:

- D.M. Dykes Medal. The highest award that an Iris can win. Given each year to one outstanding Iris.
- A.M. Award of Merit
- H.M. Honorable Mention.
- H.C. Highly Commended. This is awarded to seedlings that are judged to be sufficiently outstanding to merit introduction.

# BLUE RIBBON ----IRIS

**AL BORAK** (DeForest, 1952). The large brown flowers have horizontal falls which measure 3 inches across. H.M., 1953.

ARAB CHIEF (Whiting, 1944). A large, bold, glowing blend of gold, copper and red. The general effect is burnt orange. H.M., 1946.

ARGUS PHEASANT (DeForest, 1948). A Dykes Medal winner which achieved instant popularity after it was introduced. The rich brown flowers have a bright golden glow. H.M., 1948; A.M., 1950.


BALLERINA (Hall, 1951). One of the largest flamingo-pinks. The falls and standards are so wide that they form imposing, well proportioned, massive flowers. H.M., 1951; A.M., 1953.


**BANDMASTER** (Hall, 1944). A tall, large powder-blue. Immense flowers on well branched stalks. A vigorous grower with deep green foliage. H.M., 1944. **Each 75c** 

**BLACK DIAMOND** (Schreiner, 1951). One of the darkest Iris, almost black. The entire flower, including the beard, is blueblack, and it has the sheen of rich black silk. **Each \$2.50** 

**BLACK HILLS** (Fay, 1951). The blossoms, which are well spaced on stately stalks, are a rich, glowing near approach to black. H.C., 1950. **Each \$5.00**

**BLACK ORCHID** (DeForest, 1950). Large, flaring, dark purple, almost black flower on tall stalk. **Each \$2.00** 

**BLUEBIRD BLUE** (Fay, 1953). Large, full, round and tailored flowers of a clear shade of medium blue. Does not fade. H.C., 1950. **Each \$7.50** 

**BLUE BLAZES** (Welch, 1950). Appropriately named, because this clear blue with wide flaring falls and orange beard is not only one of the brightest blues, but one of the largest. H.C., 1949; H.M., 1951.

**BLUE PARAKEET** (Waters, 1950). When visitors saw Blue Parakeet last year some of them remarked: "It's just the color of my parakeet," which is a good description. Extraordinarily vigorous and free blooming. H.M., 1953. **Each \$2.00** 

**BLUE RHYTHM** (Whiting, 1945). A large cornflower-blue with a silvery sheen. One of the most free blooming, vigorous and rapid multipliers. A 1950 Dykes Medal winner. Does well even under adverse conditions. There is no better blue at the price. H.M., 1945; A.M., 1947.

**BLUE SHIMMER** (J. Sass, 1943). One of the all time great Iris. The large white flowers have a heavy blue border and are also dotted with the same color. H.M., 1942; A.M., 1944.

- CAROLINE JANE (DeForest, 1951). A beautiful clean flower of glistening white, delicately stitched and flushed with blue-violet. The flowers are large, ruffled, flaring, supported on sturdy well branched, tall stalks. The blossoms have an enamel-like finish and aristocratic air. A superb plicata in great genand and very scarce. H.M., 1951.
- CASA MORENA (DeForest, 1943). This glowing brown is one of the best in this class, and at a modest price. H.M., 1945; A.M., 1946.
- CASCADE SPLENDOR (Kleinsorge, 1945). A blend of pink, apricot and tan. Many blossoms on tall stalks. H.M., 1945; A.M., 1947.
- CASTLE ROCK (Loomis, 1953). Fine large white, bordered blue.

- CHANTILLY (Hall, 1945). The standards and falls of this unique orchid-pink are so heavily ruffled and frilled that they appear to be edged with lace. H.M., 1945; A.M., 1947. Each \$1.00

**DAZZELIER** (Hall-Bloese, 1952). There are many yellows, but there are none superior to Dazzelier. The large golden flowers are overlaid with bright orange. The blue-green fountain-like leaves are attractive after the blossoms are gone. **Each \$3.50** 

**DESERT SONG** (Fay, 1946). Delectable cream colored, tinged with butterscotch flowers, which have unusually good form, heavy substance and great size. **Each \$1.00** 

DISTANCE (Cook, 1946). A cool light blue with a silvery cast. It is devoid of coarse veinings and has almost no marking at the haft. H.M., 1946; A.M., 1949.

**DOLLY VARDEN** (Hall, 1950). One of the largest flamingo-pinks thus far produced. The huge blossoms are overlaid with salmon. Still scarce. H.M., 1950. **Each \$5.00** 

DREAMCASTLE (Cook, 1943). Pure orchid-pink with large, domed standards and wide falls.

ENCHANTRESS (Hall, 1954). One of Mr. Hall's latest masterpieces—parchment color, delicately flushed with pink with an enamel-like finish. Each \$10.00

ENVOY (DeForest, 1948). This large dark Iris, with wide, nearly black falls, is really difficult to describe. It has an attractive personality.

**EXTRAVAGANZA** (Douglas, 1944). Cream-white standards and falls a medley of copper, red, lavender and deep violet, with a violet flush down the center. H.M., 1944; A.M., 1947.

FIREDANCE (Fay, 1947). Similar to Firecracker, but somewhat darker and taller. The blossoms, which are well rounded and have an enamel-like finish, are well placed on stately, tall stalks. H.M., 1947.

FIRST VIOLET (DeForest, 1952). Large, ruffled flowers of clean, sparkling manganese-violet with blue undertone, perfectly spaced on sturdy stalks. Scarce and in great demand. H.M., 1953.

**FORWARD** (Marx, 1952). A pure lemon-yellow self throughout the entire flower. Even the beard is of similar color.

**GALA FINALE** (DeForest, 1950). The yellow ground color is heavily edged and peppered with rich Indian red. The large flowers are well spaced on sturdy stalks. H.M., 1952.







#### POTLUCK COLLECTION

After the plants from a block are dug, the land is put into cover crops. Some blocks are a long distance from the packing shed. We go to the fields with a list which gives the number of each variety needed. If the list calls for, say 97 plants of Heroique, we do not dig 97 but 100 to compensate for any error in making up the chart. This is done to avoid the necessity of traveling perhaps a half mile to get a few rhizomes that may be short.

The result is that in our effort to play safe there are always some rhizomes left in the bins after we get out several hundred orders. Rather than plant these Iris back, a time-consuming job right at our busiest season, we have decided to offer them at moneysaving prices.
