Plant Heuchera Brizoides and it will furnish its soft misty pink color from iris time on into midseason.

Echinops Taplow Blue, a fine background plant, will display its steel-blue balls for a long time in midsummer, and then if cut back, will bloom again in September.
Doubloon Daylilies, when established, keeps sending up bloom stalks here from July until September, and sometimes until cut down by frost.

Daylily Blanche Hooker blooms as profusely here in September as it does in early June. Others that can usually be depended upon for second bloom are Zouave, Dominion, Potentate, Bountiful and Oneita. Queen Esther and Papagaio are bright daylilies with exceptionally long bloom seasons.

## Daylilies - (Hemerocallis)

The Daylily is the most versatile of perennials, and can be used in all parts of your garden, for bloom all through the growing season. They can furnish shades of yellow, orange and brown with your Iris in late spring. They can be planted all through the perennial border to furnish shades of cream and gold, the sunshine colors, during the entire season. They can make bold splashes of orange, flame and shades of red against evergreens or shrubbery where you wish to make an accent point. Or you may have a garilen of Daylilies by themselves, in all their lovely shades.

CULTURE: The Daylilies will grow in any good garden soil and are very drought resistant. However, they do appreciate plenty of moisture and nourishment. They will grow and bloom in partial shade, but should have sun for half a day, as too deep shade will cause weak stems and fewer blooms. They should be left undisturbed over a period of years, as they do not give their best performance until the second or third year. So they should be spaced from two to three feet apart to permit increase in size of clumps. Spread the roots out well when planting, and firm the soil down well. Well-rotted manure or compost with bone meal will be appreciated if incorporated in the soil while planting, and peat moss is also found to be beneficial.
