

# Foreword

Hardy's Nursery, specializing in MODERN HEMEROCALLIS, moved during the fall of 1954, from within the city of Birmingham, Alabama, to Mount Olive, Alabama. This fast growing community is located 12 miles north of Birmingham, just off Highway, #31 north. (See map on inside cover) we chose this location for its wonderful sandy, loamy soil, excellent water supply and adequate acreage for future growth.

Organize and plan we did, but our catalogue has been delayed because we found we needed both 1955 and 1956 blooming seasons to complete the check of all varieties. We know there are no errors in our field and bed plantings, we hope there will be no errors in the packing room. However, should there be, we want you to know we are bigger than any mistake we make, all we ask is that you let us know.

We are pleased to be able to offer such an excellent selection of daylilies. The most outstanding daylilies, both old and new, from the leading hybridizers are grown and tested in our zero winters and scorching 100 degree summers. For ten years we have been growing Hemerrocallis hybrids from our own crosses. Recognizing that we "cannot see all and know all" has made us hestitate to name and introduce our own hybrids. Many garden visitors have wanted some of our seedlingsthey were always the ones we had considered too good to compost. So, we have decided to make available to other gardeners, our own named and registered varieties. The three varieties offered in 1956 have been observed for several years, have drawn many favorable comments from garden visitors and definitely contributed to the Hemerocallis season in our own garden. We hope you will like them. The introductory year of our daylilies, we plan to tell you how or why it came to be given its name. After the introductory year, only its description will appear in our regular list.

The peak of the blooming period here in June 1-10. This peak season varies a little each year, according to the earliness or lateness of spring. We invite and welcome you to visit us and see our planting. You should visit us several times to see the varieties that bloom at different periods. It is suggested that if you are planning to visit us, and live many miles away, that you be sure to let us know. Many times we have been disappointed because of missing visitors who came while we were away visiting other daylily gardens.

We submit our 1956 list to you, both humbly and proudly, with hopes that we have produced some daylilies that you will want to enjoy in your own garden, and that we are worthy of the favor of your order. To our old friends, we say—THANK YOU, you have helped make us what we are. To our new friends—we look forward to knowing you, serving you and sharing our Hemerocallis pleasures with you. And again to all flower lovers everywhere—IT IS WONDERFUL TO KNOW YOU.

# Introducing

BELINDA, a fresh looking pink that might also be placed in the melon class. It is from a cross of Afterglow and a very light pastel seedling; a mid-season and late mid-season bloomer, 30 inches tall and dormant. The flower is medium size and of heavy substance. This variety produces strong erect scapes with good branching. The foliage is narrow and slightly arched. We know there are not enough day-lilies in this color class. Named BELINDA for a lady in the poem, The Rape of the Lock by Alexander Pope. A line written to describe her will describe the daylilies also. "BELINDA smiled and all the world was gay."

MISS JESSIE, a mid-season and late mid-season bloomer, is 40" tall and dormant. When this mauve-orchid bi-color blooms, we have nothing else of the same type in bloom. The flowers are large, wide open and of graceful form. Garden visitors have insisted that we name this and let them enjoy it also. So—here it is. The orchid petals are medium wide, the sepals are a clear yellow, very light, with no markings. The scapes are strong, well branched and carry up to 40 buds. It is a good grower, a moderate multiplier and an excellent pod parent. Named MISS JESSIE as a tribute to my husband's mother, Mrs. Jessie T. Hardy, who now at 84 years young has children, grand-children and great grand-children who walk in and greet her with, "Hello—MISS JESSIE."

TICK TOCK, a gold minature to go along with Ringlets, Lidice and Babette. The flowers are evenly placed and unifomly shaped and give a rhythmical effect to the clump—hence the name. This variety blooms mid-season to late. It is 26" tall and dormant. Small three inch flowers on stiff stems, gives the entire plant of compactness. Be sure not to judge this one before it is two years old. The divisions are small. It is a good grower and a good multiplier.

# AN INVITATION

Do plan to attend the 10th Anniversary meeting of the American Hemerocallis Society in Omaha, Nebraska, July 17-21, 1956. We look forward each year to meeting those we know only by letter. The convention attendance is getting larger each year and always time seems so limited. So we are going to ask a favor—if we miss seeing you—PLEASE, you try to see us. Remember—we will be looking for you.

## DAYLILY CULTURE

Hemerocallis (Daylilies) are now the most important and preferred summer perennial. If you garden, once you grow a daylily—you will always grow DAYLILIES. The desire to acquire an excellent collection of daylilies may be attributed to the following: (1) There are so many beautiful colors, different forms, types, sizes and seasons of blooms; (2) The culture of the daylily is simple. It might be summed in one short sentence: Give the daylily ample garden space, good garden soil, several light feedings a year and adequate water at blooming time. (3) The daylily is practically desease free. (4) The daylily, once planted, becomes an excellent investment, increasing in beauty and value each year—decreasing in maintenance cost.

- WHEN should daylilies be planted? The general answer would be, anytime the ground is not frozen and you do not anticipate a freeze for 30 days. We prefer to plant them from April 1st to November 1st. However, those south of us will lengthen this transplanting period; north of us, the period will be shortened.
- HOW should daylilies be planted? Plant shallow, is the most important suggestion. One inch of soil over the spread out roots is sufficient for spring planting, two inches when planted in the fall. Be sure to water well when first planted, then, give adequate water to keep in good growing condition. For immediate display, plant 1½ feet apart, at the end of the second blooming season, remove every other plant, transplanting these to a new location. The remaining plants will then be approximately three feet apart and may be left undisturbed as long as the clumps produce representative flowers.
- WHERE should daylilies be planted? If the soil is properly prepared, anywhere except in dense shade. Suggested locations are: Flower bed borders; perennial flower beds; rock gardens; low hedges; in front of foundation plantings; around the patio; near pools; accent plants near gates and entrances; use on terraces; use on banks and in washes to prevent erosion; plant with other garden subjects; plant alone in display beds.
- WHAT type of soil is best for daylilies? Any type of soil is suitable for daylilies as long as it is well drained. We have grown them in clay, sand, loam, ashed and in varying combinations of all these. They will thrive in soil that is either acid or alkaline. It is the condition of the soil that is most important. Clay should be conditioned with sand or sifted ashed. All types of soil need plenty of humus which may be added in the form of peat, manure and compost. If you do not now maintain a compost bed—begin one. It is a necessity for good gardening.

- WHAT kind of fertilizer does the daylily require? Any well balanced fertilizer in which the nitrogen is not too high. Suggested are: 5-10-5; 0-14-14; a combination of one pint of bone meal and one peck of manure; daylilies prefer several light feedings to one heavy feeding. We have found liquid fertilizer gives excellent results—just follow the directions on the package.
- WHAT kind of mulch is best? Almost any material that will not become soggy is usable. We have used pine straw, excelsior, leaves, peanut hulls, straw, rotted sawdust, compost, manure, peat, sphagnum moss and ground corn cobs. But DO mulch. It protects in winter and prevents evaporation in summer. And mulching is always an aid in the control of weeds.

# FROM MY GARDEN NOTE BOOK

Be sure your daylilies receive a minimum of four hours of sun a day. This may be morning sun and afternoon shade; morning shade and afternoon sun; shifting or passing sunlight resulting from high shade.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

For the finest blooms, water well during the blooming period. Plenty of water helps he daylily hold its color and substance.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

Try to plant your daylilies where you know you want them to remain. They do not reach their peak of perfection until the second or third year—you cannot hurry their maturity. If it is necessary to transplant your daylilies, do NOT move them in clumps. Make plants of the clumps. The plants may contain 2-4 divisions for better display the first year. Be sure to prune the roots and the tops.

\* \_ \* \_ \*

We prefer to cut the tops of daylilies similiar to those of Iris—fan shaped. The growth of the newly transplanted daylily comes first from within the center of the division. Too much and too long outside foilage is "excess baggage" and causes the loss of time in the establishment of a new plant.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

Be sure to pollinate all blooms on a few scapes of some good parent plant—LADY BOUNTIFUL, for example. Allow to mature and then dry them for flower arrangements. The green pods are lovely also.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

If is it necessary to transplant your daylilies, distribute this transplanting over three years, moving about one third of your plants each year. You will then have some lovely clumps at all times.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

The foliage of some daylilies looks "weary" when the blooming period is over. DOROTHEA, for example. Pull off a few of the outer blades and cut the remainder back to 12 inches of the ground. This serves as a stimulant and in 2-3 weeks you will have a lovely mound of greenery for the remainder of the season.

# FROM MY GARDEN NOTE BOOK

If you are just beginning to grow daylilies, purchase daylilies \$3 or less until you have at least 25 varieties. Many excellent daylilies are reasonably priced. DAUNTLESS or TARUGA well grown would be worth \$25 if only a few were available. The high price tag often indicates the quality of the daylily, but not always; in most cases it does indicate the amount of stock available.

\* \_ \* \_ \*

Remove dead foliage or dormant varieties in early spring when danger of hard freezing is over. Remove unsightly foliage at any time during the growing season.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

When the blooming period is over, cut all scapes just above the ground. Save only those on which you wish to mature seed.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

Remember, daylilies lean towards the strongest light. So place them for maximum display. Planted in front of an evergreen foundation planting, they are always lovely. They face outward at all times.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

Very seldom is the first season of daylily blooms representative in size, color or branching. The first year, when there is not much branching and not many buds, the flowers will be large than they will be when maximum branching is produced. Size of flowers should always be measured on mature clumps.

\* \_\_ \* \_\_ \*

Have you ever gone into your garden in the early morning and watched the daylilies open? If you have not, you have missed a treat, If you have done so, here is a question for you. AT WHAT TIME OF DAY DO YOU CONSIDER THE FLOWER AT PERFECTION PEAK? The flower is different every hour of the day! So much is said about flowers fading that we would like to go on record as follows: Since the flower varies every hours, or perhaps every fifteen minutes with the sun, if at the end of the day it has not, wilted, melted, curled, burned or bleached, the degree of variation in color from morning to evening should not be called fading—but shading, The same sun will lighted the coloring of PINK BOWKNOT and will deepen the coloring of SWEET MYSTERY. Both are lovelier at the end of the day.

# TERMS AND INSTRUCTIONS

#### SHIPPING SEASON

Fall shipping begins August 1st and continues to November 1st. Due to the flickelness of our spring weather (freezing some seasons as late as the last week in April) we do not have a spring shipping season. Those who live north of us will certainly want their plants in August and September. We have found the middle of September and October the best transplanting time for the south and we suggest that if you live in this area, that you allow us to ship your plants during this period.

#### ORDER EARLY

We have an excellent stock of daylilies to back this catalogue. However, the stock of many of the newer varieties is somewhat limited, in view of the demand for them. We suggest that YOU ORDER EARLY. This is advantageous to both shipper and purchaser. Every effort will be made to fill orders in sequence received with one exception: orders for some of the newer varieties of which the stock is very limited (RUTH LEHMAN, for example) will be shipped to all purchasers at the same time, thus making the maximum number of fresh plants available. We do not ship recently transplanted plants.

#### GUARANTEE

A state Etomologist Certificate is attached to every shipment. We ship freshly dug plants, blooming size plants, properly packed to reach you in good condition. All stock is guaranteed true to name, if error should occur, replacement or refund will be made promptly. In no case shall our liability be more than the original cost of the plant.

#### TERMS

Full remittance should accompany all orders. For your own protection, do not send cash or stamps. A personal check or a Postal Money order is much safer. No C. O. D. shipments will be made. Due to the large size of our plants and the increase in postage rates the minimum order accepted is \$5. All orders will be shipped prepaid parcel post.

#### FREE PLANTS

In appreciation of your business, we send a gift plant with every order. Our selection is based upon the size of your order, stock supply and your suggestions. We recognize a gift daylily loses its value if we duplicate something you already have, so do not fail to mention several from which we may choose.
