CULTURAL HINTS


The Rex is strictly a shade plant; northern exposure is best. Our potting soil is two-thirds compost, one-third old sod soil; add a liberal amount of bone meal, a sprinkling of wood ashes and charcoal. They suffer from overwatering so good drainage is important. If desired, they can be treated as a seasonal plant by keeping the root-stock on the dry side during the winter bringing them into life in spring by adding water and plant food. Don't discard because a plant has dropped its leaves because it can become a beautiful specimen in season.

Spaghum Moss makes an excellent growing medium for all begonias and other house plants. (See article No-



Cultural Hints

Wax Begonias grow best in a well-drained soil. Do not over-water. They require more plant food and more light than other begonias. To develop a more shapely plant, pinch the tips.

Mite occasionally damage begonias causing stunted growth and curling of new leaves. Spray infested plant with one teaspoon of Lysol to one guart of water.


