EPIPHYLLUMS

These exotic beauties are, by their very daring and unusualness, destined to a place of prominence in our decorative scheme.

Although native to Brazil, Mexico, the Argentine and other tropical countries, many of the newer and finer types comprising our large collection have been developed in Europe.

One could imagine nothing more congenial to Southern California climate and modern day architecture than these streamlined plants bearing a profusion of strikingly beautiful flowers from 6 to 10 inches in diameter, in all the colors of the rainbow. There are white kinds fringed in lime yellow and soft brown, pinks in monotone or iridescent tints, purples with flame and chartreuse, molten gold with vermillion, bronze with scarlet, blood-red with violet and others too numerous to mention.

Some types are effective in wall or hanging baskets, but the majority display their charms to best advantage when trained against a trellis or wall.

Our "Jewelled Corridor" during May and June presents a spectacle of dazzling beauty that you cannot soon forget.

| AMBER QUEEN | Amber petals margined in rich wine red. |
| ARGUS | Soft salmon with deeper tone at throat. |
| BELLA | A clear light rose that deepens with age. |
| BRILLIANT | Glowing red with purple throat. |
| CATHAY | Cerise, orchid and chartreuse. Very Chinese. |
| CLOISTER | A lovely, large white outlined in canary and beige. |
| DESERT SUNRISE | Outer petals bronzy-scarlet. Center orange red and violet. |
| DEUTSCHE KAISERIN | Dainty flowers of silvery pink. Makes charming baskets. |
| DRAGON'S EYES | Orange-scarlet overcast with violet. |
| EDEN | Of purest white with bronze and sulphur outer petals. |
| FLOR DEL SOL | A beautiful glowing orange-henna. |
| GEN. GARIBALDI | Brilliant scarlet blooming profusely over a long period. |
| GLORIA | Soft chamois-amber. A very large and prodigious bloomer. |
| HELIOCEREUS SPECIOSUS | Cup-shaped blooms of scarlet and vibrant purple. |
| HERMOSSISSIMUS | A very large and spectacular flower in purple and flame. |
| KINCHINJUNGA | Snowy white with lime yellow and brown margin petals. |
| KERMESINUS MAGNUS | Similar to Hermosissimus but with wider petals. |
| LATONA | Violet and vermilion suffused with bronze. |
| LILACINUS | Soft lilac-pink with chartreuse throat. |
| LOTUS LANTERN | Chamois-coral shadowed with cinnabar. |
| MARIA VAN HOORDE | Clear lavender-pink with deeper shadings. Luscious. |
| MONTEZUMA | Amber and faint pink. Violet center. |
| NIOBE | Deep bronze-red with purple center. |
| ORION | Very large bronze and pink with purple throat. |
| PADRE | A very dainty flower in softest pink. |
| PEACOCKII | Violet and cerise with lime yellow center. Huge. |
| PINK CHARM | A most attractive shell-pink. Basket type. |
| SACUNTALE | Bronze-orange overcast with plum. Violet-rose eye. |
| SCARLET GIANT | Orange tinged with scarlet. White stigma anthers. |
| SCHEHERAZADE | Rosy-lavender deepening to violet with age. Magnificent. |
| SILVER DAUGHTER | Clear silvery rose-lilac. |
| SUN GODDESS | A glorious flower of molten-gold and violet. Vermillion throat. |
| TULIP | Bright red with small purple eye. Suggests tulip in form. |
| VIVE ROUGE | Of crepe-like texture—scarlet with purple eye. |
| WANDA | A salmon-coral climber with deeper throat. |
| YOUNG NUN | A very large and sparkling white with yellow and brown margin petals. |

CULTURE

For best results, plant your Epiphyllums in a semi-shady location in a mixture of 1/3 good sandy loam and 2/3 well rotted oak leafmold.

Give them a heavy dressing of steer fertilizer in February and a light top-dressing of a good commercial fertilizer in August.

Keep them moderately moist and be sure that their drainage is good.
