


The Iris Rainbow

Our garden is located on 22nd Street between Ogden and Rose Avenues. It is at the west end of Ogden Avenue and is just one block from Shelbourne Towers. You are invited to visit it at blooming time. We grow for sale only the new varieties of tall bearded iris. The normal Knoxville blooming period for this branch of the iris family is from April 20th to June 1st. These varieties have a color range unsurpassed by any other flower. By planned planting you can paint your garden with a bold splash of color that can be seen a block away, or you can give the garden a refined pastel effect that will stand the closest inspection. For this job of color landscaping with iris you can pick a color that dazzles, such as Indian red or the pure white of snow, or select a hue or tint that is soft and pleasing to the eye, such as the blue of the sky, or the red, gold or bronze of an autumn leaf, or the clear light pink of shrimp, or a rich forest brown. The bearded iris is a perennial that is easy to grow and fascinating to study. It is good as a garden clump, for cutting, and for exhibition. A single plant usually increases fourfold each year and soon makes a good clump. Plant vigor and hardiness depend far more upon the hereditary characteristics of the particular variety than upon the locality in which the particular plant is grown. Nearly all of the progress in the breeding of most of the other flowers is due to the work of a relatively few floriculturists. The mechanics of hybridizing iris can be learned in a few minutes. Most of the recent progress in the iris world is due to the activities of a large number of amateurs who make a hobby of hybridizing iris.

Extra Plants at no Additional Cost

If you care enough to buy the best varieties, this price list is a good place to do your buying. It contains a higher percentage of the finest varieties introduced within the last five years than will be found in any of the colored catalogs. Prompted by a desire to market nothing but the best, we have eliminated 60 of the varieties which were on our 1956 list and have added to our 1957 list 36 new varieties. Some of these new additions to our list are currently at the top of their color classifications. Extra plants are added at no additional cost on all orders except the special collections. Customers may select their own extras provided their selections are confined to varieties indicated by an asterisk, such as for example, *Happy Birthday. The larger the order, the greater the percentage of value allowed in extra plants. Our sliding scale for fixing the value in extras on orders shipped or delivered to one address follows: \$6 to \$20 - 20%, \$20 to \$40 - 25%, upward of \$40 - 30%. The name of the originator, the year of introduction, the height of the bloom stalk and the price of one plant are listed for each variety.

The three inner petals of an iris flower that are upright in position are called standards. The other three petals that are lower on the flower are the falls. A plicata has both standards and falls of a comparatively light color, overlaid with stitching, stipplings or mottlings of a darker color. An amoena has white or near white standards and colored falls. A variegata has yellow standards and reddish falls. A neglecta has standards of light blue and falls of dark blue. The varieties listed on the preceding pages are grouped below according to color and price. If we are unable to supply a variety ordered and have not been otherwise directed, we usually substitute, without additional cost, the next higher priced variety in the same color classification.

Permanent alumitags will be put on every variety shipped. Any plant that proves untrue to label will be replaced. Every plant is guaranteed to start growing in your garden. Any plant that dies before September will be replaced, provided we are notified before September 1, 1957. Make checks and money orders payable to William H. Wicker or to Wicker's Iris Garden. Planting instructions will be put in each package of plants. Customers may select extras from the varieties indicated by asterisks. No extras are given on an order for any of the money-saving collections. The value of any other order in extra plants is determined by the scale set forth on page 1.
