CUSHION CHRYSANTHEMUMS

A group of low growing 'Mums, forming mounds of blooms reminding one of the old-fashioned Azalea. The plants grow about ten to twelve inches high and spread two feet or more. They start to bloom quite early, and are in full bloom in September, being literally covered with hundreds of flowers which last over a long period. With a little straw protection the plants are quite hardy. They all originated from Chrysanthemum Amelia, better known as Pink Cushion 'Mum.

Always in Flower**

Indeed, Esther Reed possesses more good points than any herbaceous plant in existence. Its pure white flowers are full double, very large, long lasting and of enormous substance. When the flower is just out, its center is compact and slightly green, but gradually the center broadens out and develops into pure white.

When the first flowers appear in June their diameter is as much as 4 inches, while later in the season the flowers become a little smaller. It is impossible to give an idea of the quantity of flowers one plant can produce, for every time the flowers are cut, fresh flower stems shoot up again.

The plants begin to bloom about the third week in June, and keep flowering until late in the season. Even in the beginning of November when Dahlias and other plants are cut down by frost, there are still some Esther Reeds in flower. Although these flowers are smaller and shorter than earlier in the season, they are still very useful.

The best time for planting is early in the spring. If planted in April they will produce an abundance of flowers the same season. Planting in August or early September will also give good results. Generally speaking they are easy growing plants, impartial as to soil, although best results are obtained on land that is well cultivated.

One can improve the size of the flowers and length of the stems considerably by disbudding some of the side shoots. It is, furthermore, advisable to lift and divide the plants every two years. The flowers that are bloomed out should always be cut. Double Shasta Daisy, Esther Reed, has been tried in many parts of the world, and has proved satisfactory everywhere. We have produced it on 18- to 24-inch stems.

Iris Kaempferi

These are among the most gorgeous of the entire Iris family. There is nothing more showy, and as they blossom after the entire Iris family has finished flowering, they prolong the Iris season by several weeks. There are giant singles and doubles, self colors, mottled, striped, and blended effects, subtle soft tints and intense deep colors in a most comprehensive range. Planted in a mass, or as a border, they are ideal. Not the least of their fine points is the graceful foliage, a thing of beauty after the blooms are past. They are different in form from all other Irises. Many are as large as a dinner plate.

Culture. Late plantings should be protected by a light covering of straw or leaves after the ground is permanently frozen, to prevent roots from being heaved out of the ground by frost. Plant in spring, and apply manure as heavily as possible, for these plantings produce best results. Avoid all lime. Once established, they flower profusely year after year.

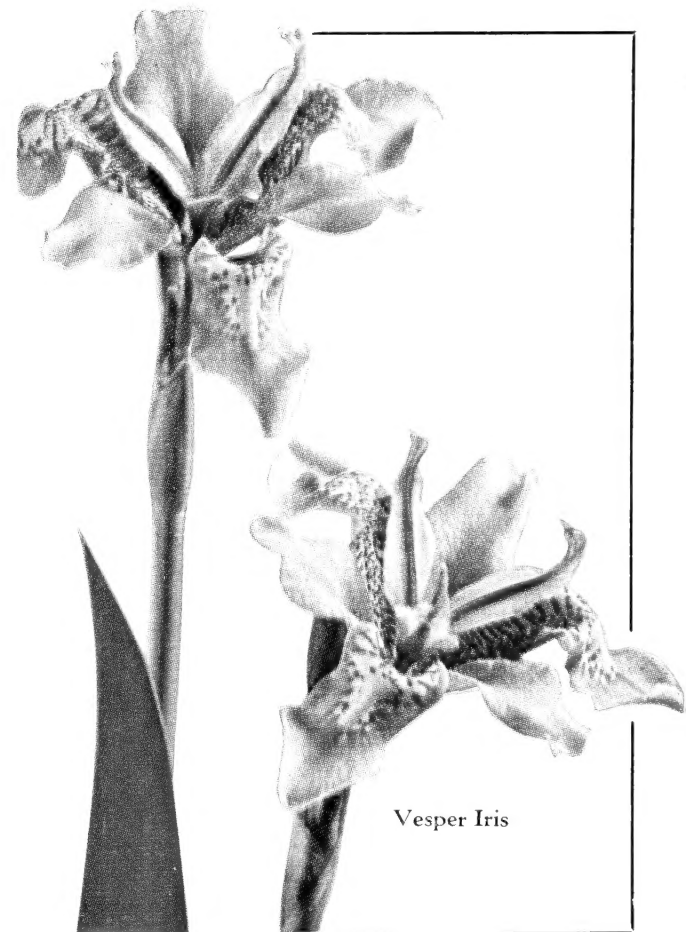

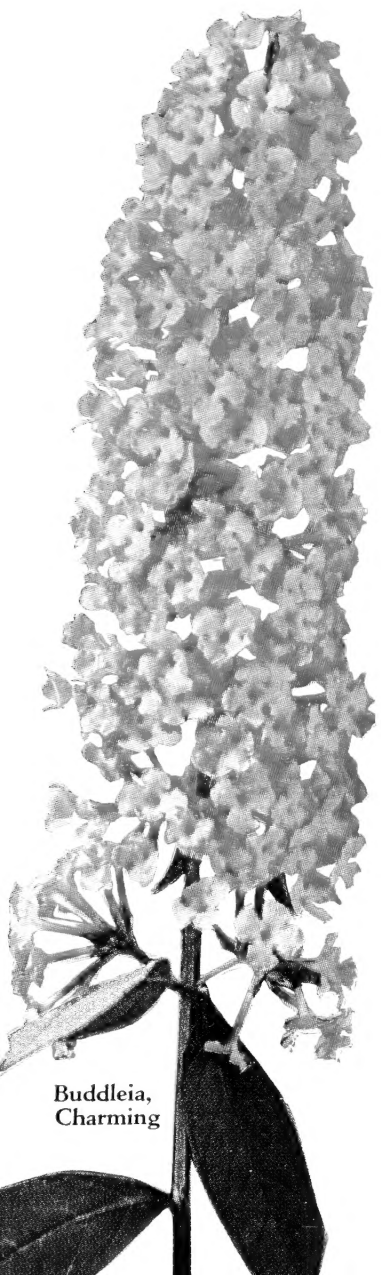
