

Polyanthus Plants

Shipped anywhere. In bloom from March to July. Out of bloom July to October.

PASTELS—Delicate shades of suffused rose, lavender, and orchid.

YELLOWS-Deep golden, medium, and lemon.

RED SHADES-From cherry to ruby.

PURPLES—Light to royal.

FLAMES—Warm and brilliant shades of suffused yellow and red.

BLUES-Light, medium, and navy.

COWICHAN—A strain with dark velvety flowers on black stalks with very small eyes.

PINKS-Everyone loves the Pinks.

Juliana Hybrids

Hardiest of all the evergreen Primroses. They creep by stoloniferous roots and form large patches if left to roam.

Cushion Type 2 to 4 inches

P. JULIAE—This is the species, the ancestor of the hybrids, smaller in all its parts with wine colored blooms in profusion.

WANDA — Best known hybrid, very vigorous with about the same color bloom as the species.

SCHNEEKISSEN—Pure frosty white.
ROBERTA—Lavender, sometimes with short stalks.

GLORIA—Sparkling burgundy.

Culture

Primroses are hardy perennials and will thrive in any soil if given drainage, humus and some protection from the hottest sun. Drainage is the most important. More Primroses die from crown rot, which means poor drainage, than are ever killed by the cold.

Primroses require less sun and more water than most perennials, though well established plantings will take considerable sun. Humus (in the form of peat), dug into the top six inches of soil will keep the plants moist at all times with less watering. Planting on the north or east side of the house, in the shade of large shrubs or under trees will provide shade and cause the bloom to last longer. A shaded rockery is an ideal situation, except for the woodland types and the tall growing candelabras.

If ground is heavy, old horse manure will lighten it and if very heavy such as clay or hard-pan, sharp sand should also be added. Cow manure will bind a light, sandy soil.

Mulch during summer with peat, leaf-mold or spent horse manure, and dress down in spring with cow manure or good compost. Never use chemical fertilizers.

Snow is the best winter protection. If freezing occurs before snow, a gentle spray with the hose will cover the plants with ice and prevent them from drying out.

Divide Polyanthus every two years or when clumps become crowded and the flowers diminish.
