

INTRODUCTION

The citations in this bibliography, The Protection of Wildlife, are selected from the AGRICOLA database and limited to those produced by North American authors. They cover articles or monographic publications added to the database from 1979 to April 1989.

This is the 31st bibliography in a series of commodity-oriented listings of citations from AGRICOLA jointly sponsored by the National Agricultural Library, U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA-NAL), and the Office of Pesticide Programs, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA-OPP). Additional volumes issued recently are Plant Growth Regulators for Higher Plants, The Protection of Sugarcane and Sugar Beets, The Protection of Turf Grasses, The Protection of Hays, The Protection of Citrus, The Protection of Leaf Vegetables, The Protection of Root Vegetables, and The Protection of Corn.
