As a result of the action taken by the IAC on 4 December 1952 (IAC-M-90, Paragraph 3a), a Scientific Intelligence Advisory Panel vas convened 14-18 January 1953. The panel-consisted of the following scientists: - R. - Robertson, Luis W. Alvarez, Lloyd V. Berkner, S. A. Goudsait, and Taornica Page. The panel concerned itself with the evaluation of any possible threat to National Security by unidentified flying objects. The panel-issued a report dated 17 January 1953. This report was classified Secret. 2. The letters from Leon Davidson and Donald Keyhoe to the .--DCI concerned themselves primerily with Edward J. Ruppelt's book on Unidentified Flying Cojects. At the time that the scientific ... panel met, Ruppelt was a Captain in the Air Force and attended the panel meetings. His book, however, is concerned with the identification of unidentified flying objects. Ruppelt's statements regarding the mission of the penel are in error. He has led the reader to believe the penel's mission was to identify the flying objects and to make recommendations on methods to further identify such cojects. This is the basis for the apparent contradictions which arose during the Mike Wallece television interview. This is also the basis for Mr. Keyhoe's misgivings. 3. In late October 1957, Major James F. Byrne of AFCHI-XLA requested a declassified version of the panel report. This office contacted each member of the panel and an agreed upon, declessified version was written end sent to the Assistant Chief of Staff, Intelligence, Department of the Air Force on 20 December 1957. It was the decision of all the panel members and the CIA that while no member of the panel objected to the use of his name in connection with the declassified version, they desired that no connection of the panel members with CIA be disclosed.

1. As a result of the action taken by the IAC on 4 December 1952 (IAC-M-90, Paragraph 3a), a Scientific Intelligence Advisory Panel vas convened 14-18 January 1953. The panel consisted of the following scientists: H. P. Robertson, Luis W. Alvarez, Lloyd V. Berkner, S. A. Goudanit, and Thornton Page. The panel concerned itself with the evaluation of any possible threat to National Security by unidentified flying objects. The panel issued a report dated 17 January 1953. This report was classified Secret.

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4. It is apparent from reading Mr. Davidson's letter that Mike Wallace had a copy of the scientific panel report. In addition, the association of CIA with the US Air Force in the selection of the panel was revealed during the television interview. Therefore, the panel members have been associated with CIA, contrary to their wishes and contrary to CIA's desires.

5. The real intent of the referenced letters is to obtain a copy of the panel report. In view of this, and of the above, it would be most expedient to send them the declassified version. In order to not reveal an association between the panel members and CIA, either the Air Force should ensuer the letters or we should make it plain to the recipients that we obtained the panel report from the Air Force.

6. Attached are copies of the declassified panel report.

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NEPORT OF THE SCIENTIFIC PANEL ON UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

17 Jamary 1953

2. As a result of its considerations, the Panel concludes:

That the evidence presented on Unidentified Flying _______ Objects shows no indication that these phenomena constitute -

a direct physical threat to national security.

We firsty believe that there is no residence of cases which indicates phenomena which are attributable to foreign artifects capable of hostile acts, and that there is no evidence that the phenomena indicate a need for the revision of current scientific concepts.

3. In the light of this conclusion, the Fanel recommends: That the national security agencies take immediate steps to strip the Unidentified Flying Objects of the special statusthey have been given and the aura of mystery they have unfortunately acquired. We suggest that this aim may be achieved by an integrated program designed to reassure the public of the total lack of evidence of inimical forces behind the phenomena.
