It has a unsaid that there is no classification as regards national security Ithis simitted "official use only" classification, which, the Air Force rays, is to protect the names of witnesses who do not wish to be publicly listed.

Sints the CIA document is said not to list witnesses names but to discuss the general problem, there is no reason apparent way it should not be declassified, as requested.

Dispite the published emplusions of the 1953 scientists group, we have found that there is an increasing public bolief that the WFO2 may possibly be unfriendly. We have absolubely no evanuate to prove that they are heatily and I eits this only to prove the danger of the present secrecy policy. Secrecy breeds ignorence of the subject and it could be to hysterisfor even panicular contain conditions. I believe that an open discussion of the problem would serve the best interests of the country.

In addition to requesting a copy of the formal report drawn up by the scientists in 1955, NICAP requests an interview with an official of the Central Intelligence Agency who is quilified to speak for the GIA on this subject. It is our belief that a frenk discussion of the problems will be of mutual benefit.

In my provious letters, I gave you the name of some of our Board members, including Vice Admiral R. H. Hillenkoetter, USY (Ret.) who formerly was director of the Central Intelligence Agency. I am sure that Admiral Hillenkoetter, as well as all the members of our Board and our Special Advisers would tell you, if questions that they directe with the present secrecy about unidentified flying objects.

With a membership covering all 49 states and many foreign countries except those in the USSR, NICAP has, by its serious, factual at proach wan the attention of many important citizens here and nor Our factual press releases have been given serious attention by the press and by newcasters. We are in a position to help citizens in America, and elsewhere, for the facts which eventually will to be made public. We hope the Control Intelligence Agency will agree to a conformace or at least an interview on the various expects of this problem.
