

The prisoners who were staying in the cell with have several saws concealed in the cell and have sawed through all but two of the bars in the cell leading to the outside window of their cell. They also have cut a hole in the mesh screen covering the window and haul material from the outside through this hole by lowering a rope. These prisoners have requested members of the Little Rock SSOC (APIC) who have visited in his cell to bring them additional saws since they claim their saws are almost worn Several APIC members have indicated they may do this.

Rock. It subsequently advised that he had pulled a bed check in this cell and had found some saws and had also found that all of the bars in the cell but two had been sawed through. It ctated that the bars have now been soldered. It stated that the information furnished had definitely averted a planned jail break. He also advised he had instructed deputies to remain alert for any individuals outside for the next several nights at the jail.

The Arkansas Gazette, Little Rock, Ark., daily newspaper, carried an article in the Saturday, 2/1/69, edition reporting that two individuals, one of whom gave an address of the APIC, were arrested by officers of the Pulaski County SO on the night of 1/31/69 outside the jail near a rope that was hanging from an inside cell. These individuals were charged with vagrancy according to news reports. This article identified those two as DARLENE TAYLOR, aged 21, 1609 South Park, Little Rock, and PRESTON DAVIS, aged 18, 3317 West Markham.

I very regretfully sit down and write this letter to you since I have always made it a practice never to interfere in the lives of others, but I feel that I would not be fulfilling my obligation to you as a friend if I did not bring this information to your attention.

I am sure that you have long been aware that your daughter as been running around with a group of "beatniks," many of whom have been arrested for possession of marijuana and for involvement in illicit drug traffic. I felt this was none of my business and it was so well known by everyone that you were probably doing the best you could with an uncontrollable child.

It has come to my attention that your daughter and are living at your home and have told you are married and, yet, have been going around Little Rock openly bragging about the fact that they are not married and are lying to you about the fact that they are. I feel that you would want to know about this sinful and immoral behavior on their part and so I am writing this letter to bring it to your attention. The enclosed LHM's constitute all of the "New Left activity" in the Little Rock Division. No local dissemination has been made of these LHM's.

In order to set forth the requested information under the format prescribed by the Bureau in relet, no attempt has been made to attribute the information set forth to specific sources; however, all of the information contained in these LHM's is properly documented in the Little Rock files.

As noted in the LHM's, the only "New Left activity" in Arkansas consists of SSOC chapters at Little Rock University, Little Rock, Ark., and the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Ark. The Little Rock Office has member informant coverage in both of these chapters, specifically in the member informants, there are previously-developed established

member informants, there are previously-developed established sources at both Little Rock University and the University of Arkansas who are well aware of the Bureau's interest and responsibilities in this field and these sources can and have volunteered information concerning this activity to the Little Rock Office. It is felt that the present coverage of these two chapters is adequate at this time.



SOUTHERN CONFERENCE EDUCATIONAL FUND, INC. (SCEF)

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare (SCHW) was cited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 592, June 12, 1947. In the same house report, "The Southern Patriot" was cited as an "organ" of the SCHW.

An amendment to the charter of the SCHW dated April 26, 1946, changed its name to the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, (SCEF) and stated its purpose to be to improve the educational and cultural stands of the Southern people in accordance with the highest American democratic institutions, traditions, and ideals.

The masthead of the April, 1967, issue of "The Southern Patrict" indicated that it is the publication of SCEF, editorial and business offices of which are located at 3210 West Broadway, Louisville, Kentucky, Eastern office of which is located at Suite 412, 799 Broadway, New York City, New York. "The Southern Patriot" is published once each month, except July. SCEF is stated to be dedicated to ending discrimination based on race, creed, color, sex, national origin, or economic condition.

The SCEF is self-described as having deep roots in the South where it began as the educational wing of the SCHW, organized in 1938 to work for economic and political reform. When the SCHW disbanded in the late 1940's, SCEF continued as

an independent organization, rallying support for integration and democracy and helping to stimulate and nurture new movements of the early 1960's. The SCEF maintained headquarters in Louisiana for twenty years, but in 1966 moved its headquarters to Louisville, Kentucky.


A source advised on March 2, 1961, that a Communist Farty functionary, stated at a meeting of the Communist Party in Baltimore, Maryland, on Pebruary 25, 1961, that the Communist Party is not connected with any progressive movement but indirectly they do have some influence in the SCEF.

A second source, who is familiar with some phases of Communist Party activity in the New Orleans area, advised on June 3, 1966, that during the time that the SCHW was in existence, members of the Communist Party were members of and worked actively in the SCHW; however, since the formation of the SCEF, Communist Party members have not been encouraged to work in the SCEF. The source stated that the SCEF is a progressive, liberal organization, which he considers a Communist Party front organization because it has gone along with the Communist Party on certain issues, particularly on the racial issue.

A third source advised on May 25, 1965, that a Communist Party functionary, expressed great admiration for and and the SCEF, with which they are affiliated, and expressed the view that the SCEF is the best organization in South as far as doing effective work is concerned and that they have a better idea of what they are going, where they are heading, and influence other organizations for the better.

The second source also advised on June 3, 1966, that many people who are officials and supporters of the SCEF, while liberal in their views, are by no means Communists.

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication cf SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

M., members of the SSOC and Black Students for Democracy, along with sympathizers totaling approximately twenty students, at one time blockaded the entrance to Hill Hall at the University of Arkansas where the daily newspaper "The Arkansas Traveler" ig published.

The blockade was instituted as "The Arkansas Traveler" had failed to publish a letter written by a Negro student, which had been submitted on April 10, 1968, in reply to a printed letter reportedly attacking the had contacted the Traveler Office five times and on two occasions made suggested changes with the understanding it would be published; however, as of May 14, 1968, it had not been published. Too, the demonstrators indicated the blockade had been set up as the Board of Publications at the University had failed to allow a hearing on the article and they desired to stop publication of "The Arkansas Traveler" in an effort to call attention to the discriminatory practices of the paper for failure to publish the article.

When the blockade was first instituted, no one was allowed to enter Hill Hall where journalism classes and the printing shop are located; however, by 8:30 A. M. students not connected with "The Arkansas Traveler" were allowed to enter the building.

A number of the demonstrators met with Dr. PALMER PILCHER, Vice President for Academic Affairs, which resulted in the above action at 8:30 A. M. At 9:00 A. M. a meeting was held of the Board of Publications concerning the allegation against "The Arkansas Traveler."

Areas of agreement were made with SSOC and Black Americans for a Democracy at 1:30 P. M. the same day and the blockade ceased at 1:30 P. M.; however, no publication of "The Arkansas Traveler" was put out May 14, 1968.

Since the blockade, Dr. PILCHER has held a number of meetings with SSOC and Black Americans for a Democracy, and there has not been further action taken by them against "The Arkansas Traveler."





SOUTHERN CONFERENCE EDUCATIONAL FUND, INC. (SCEF)

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare (SCHW) was dited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 592, June 12, 1947. In the same house report, "The Southern Patriot" was cited as an "Corgan" of the SCHW.

An amendment to the charter of the SCHW dated April 26, 1946, changed its name to the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, (SCEF) and stated its purpose to be to improve the educational and cultural stands of the Southern people in accordance with the highest American democratic institutions, traditions, and ideals.

The masthead of the April, 1967, issue of "The Southern Patrict" indicated that it is the publication of SCEF, editorial and business offices of which are located at 3210 West Broadway, Louisville, Kentucky, Eastern office of which is located at Suite 412, 799 Broadway, New York City, New York. "The Southern Patriot" is published once each month, except July. SCEF is stated to be dedicated to ending discrimination based on race, creed, color, sex, national origin, or economic condition.

The SCEF is self-described as having deep roots in the South where it began as the educational wing of the SCHW, organized in 1938 to work for economic and political reform. When the SCHW disbanded in the late 1940's, SCEF continued, as

an independent organization, rallying support for integration and idemocracy and helping to stimulate and nurture new movements of the early 1960's. The SCEF maintained headquarters in Louisiana for twenty years, but in 1966 moved its headquarters to Louisville, Kentucky.

A source advised on March 2, 1961, that a Communist Farty functionary, stated at a meeting of the Communist Party in Baltimore, Maryland, on February 25, 1961, that the Communist Party is not connected with any progressive movement but indirectly they do have some influence in the SCEF.

A second source, who is familiar with some phases of Communist Party activity in the New Orleans area, advised on June 3, 1966, that during the time that the SCHW was in existence, members of the Communist Party were members of and worked actively in the SCHW; however, since the formation of the SCEF, Communist Party members have not been encouraged to work in the SCEF. The source stated that the SCEF is a progressive, liberal organization, which he considers a Communist Party front organization because it has gone along with the Communist Party on certain issues, particularly on the racial issue.

A third source advised on May 25, 1965, that a Communist Party functionary, expressed great admiration and and the SCEF, with which they are affiliated, and expressed the view that the SCEF is the best organization in South as far as doing effective work is concerned and that they have a better idea of what they are going, where they are heading, and influence other organizations for the better.

The second source also advised on June 3, 1966, that many people who are officials and supporters of the SCEF, while liberal in their views, are by no means Communists.

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

No information has been received to date indicating that either of these SSOC chapters has made any false allegations of police brutality.

No information has been received to date concerning the individuals active in the two SSOC chapters in Arkansas which would be pertinent to this caption.

(3) Action by College Administrators

There has only been one confrontation in the Little Rock Division between "New Left" groups and college officials and this was an incident that occurred on 5/14/68 at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, when between 25-30 students blocked passage to Hill Hall in an attempt to disrupt and stop the running of the Arkansas Traveler, the campus news-This action was taken by a group calling themselves Black Americans for Democracy and the SSOC chapter at the There was no militancy in connection University of Arkansas. with this demonstration and, although the entrances to this building were blocked for the greater portion of one day, no information can be furnished to show the value of administrators taking a firm stand in resisting these elements since school officials promptly agreed to meet with representatives of the groups involved to discuss their grievances and the demonstration was canceled on the same day that it began. matter has not been officially resolved to date. There has been no repetition of the incident.



The only "New Left" organizations in the Little Rock Division are chapters of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) formed in February, 1968, at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Arkansas, and during April, 1968, by students of Little Rock University (LRU) at Little Rock, Arkansas. The University of Arkansas SSOC chapter in reported to currently have approximately 30 members and the LRU SSOC chapter has approximately 10 to 12 members.

Neither of these organizations appear to have received any wide acceptance among the students at their respective universities and the members, for the most part, are considered "oddballs" and students who are not in the main stream of the student activity. In view of this, Little Rock Division does not recommend any specific counterintelligence action be taken against either of these chapters at this time.

On a national basis, it is felt that the most effective form of counterintelligence activity against these New Left groups would be for the Bureau to utilize all possible news sources in an attempt to ridicule the New Left and their activist leaders through cartoons and cooperative syndicated writers who specialize in satire since this type of humor is easily understood and accepted by the majority of college students. It has been the experience of the Little Rock Office that most college students do not want to become identified with these individuals involved in New Left type activities.
