Enclosed herewith are Xerox copies of two articles which appeared in the "Hartford Courant," a daily newspaper published at Hartford, Conn., in its issues of 9/12/68 and 9/13/68.

The articles relate to a new system adopted by Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., authorizing the college's new president, Dr. THEODORE A. LOCKWOOD, to "take immediate and firm steps" if there is a student sit-in similar to one last April. According to the article of 9/12/68, the proposal, endorsed by the faculty, gives the president authority to act swiftly if the operation of the college "is seriously threatened or impared." The president would warn the offenders; give them reasonable time to disperse, and suspend them if they failed to disperse. If necessary the president would call on civil authorities to end the disorder. Lockwood

The article of 9/13/68 reported that Dr. addressed about 1200 students and faculty members Thursday. 9/12/68, and referred specifically to a student demonstration last spring in which trustees were imprisoned in a college said, "No responsible body can deliberate under such conditions nor can the college tolerate such a direct violation of freedom of action and movement."

LOCKWOOD reportedly said that the college must have an established code of behavior and must set standards on what is and is not acceptable within the community. On April 22, 1968, at 5 p.m., about 200 Trinity College students led by members of Trinity Association of Negroes (TAN) and now known as Trinity Coalition of Negroes, blocked the exit of a meeting room in Williams Memorial Hall on the Trinity campus and prevented members of the Board of Trustees of the college from leaving the room at the termination of a meeting of the board. The group demanded approval of a demand for funds for additional scholarships for Negro students.

The trustees announced that they would make no decision under pressure and the demonstrators refused to leave the building without receiving assurance of the trustees acceptance of the scholarship program. It was decided about 8:30 p.m. to permit the trustees to leave. The students, however, remained in the building overnight. The occupation of the building ended early in the morning on April 24, 1968.

NH T-l advised on June 18, 1968, that almost all of the membership of the Trinity College Chapter of SDS participated in the above affair and that furthermore, it was strongly suspected and in fact, generally believed on the Trinity campus that SDS was almost entirely responsible for the affair.

A committee composed of administration officials, faculty and students reached a determination that those involved in the above incident should be punished by being required to raise \$400 each toward a scholarship fund for needy Negro students at the college. The Board of Trustees, the highest administrative body of the college, overruled the above decision and ruled that each of the 168 students who had admitted participation in the demonstration should have entered on their college records a notation of disciplinary probation to remain in effect until their graduations from the college.

NH T-1 advised that reaction on the part of the student body and also a segment of the faculty to the above decision was hostile and might generate further disturbance on the campus when classes are resumed in September, 1968.

The Resident Agents at Hartford, Connecticut, have had a close and confidential relationship with the members of the Internal Security Staff of the Pratt and Whitney Division over an extended period of years and the confidentiality of this relationship has always been maintained. It is believed that concern about the activities of SDS presents an excellent opportunity to institute counterintelligence action in accordance with the provisions of referenced Bureau letter.

It is believed that the compilation of the numerous articles pertaining to SDS activity at Trinity College would have a far greater impact on and as trustee of the college he would be in a position to recommend administrative action against SDS and its activities at Trinity College.

The New Haven Office is closely following the activities of the various SDS chapters and related groups, and every effort will be made to capitalize upon any and all opportunities for counterintelligence action.

The following is submitted in accordance with instructions in referenced Bureau letter:

### 1) False Allegations of Police Brutality

To date the New Haven Division has received no information concerning allegations of police brutality arising from student-police encounters in connection with demonstrations involving the New Left movement.

### 2) Immorality

No information has come to the attention of this division reflecting on the morality or unsavory habits and living conditions of individuals associated with the New Left.

### 3) Action by College Administrators

The "Hartford Times", a daily newspaper published in Hartford, Connecticut, in its edition of June 12, 1968, contained an article captioned: "Faculty at Arms Over Trinity Move". The article disclosed that the records of 168 Trinity College students who sat-in April 22-23 have been tagged with a "DISCIPLINARY PROBATION" notation and the action has aroused faculty tempers. The action was a result of student demands for more Negro rights which touched off a 32 hour sit-in of the Administration Building where eight trustees and two college administrators were virtual prisoners, who have a sit-in of the Administrators were virtual prisoners.

One unnamed faculty member was quoted as saying, "Unless this is changed over the summer, we are bound for a much more radical confrontation when the students return." He added that Peace Corps headquarters in Washington had told him that such an entry on a student record "would be highly prejudicial" to the students chances for joining the Corps. He said, "this is the only college in the country we know of where the trustees can enter such an item on a student's record."

According to the article, President ALBERT C. JACOBS in a memo to the faculty and administration said "DISCIPLINARY PROBATION" was entered on the student records because, in effect, that's what the trustees wanted. According to the memo, the students were being punished for "restricting the right of free access and exit of eight trustees and two college administrators in or around the Trustees' Room of Trinity College between 4:30 PM and 8:30 PM, Monday, April 22, 1968."

The article indicated that students tagged with a "DISCIPLINARY PROBATION" may appeal the punishment to the Faculty Committee on Academic Standing and Discipline anytime after January 15, 1969.
