

By communication 3/20/69, San Antonio requested Bareau authority to write a letter to the President of the University of Texas (UT) under San Antonio's Bureau-approved fictitious name and T. O. Box complimenting the President of the University for taking such a firm stand in barring the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) from holding a meeting on the campus. It was pointed out pressure was being exerted against UT President to back down and change his decision regarding the SDS's use of UT facilities.

By communication 3/28/69 Bureau denied authority for mailing this letter.

By communication 4/17/69 the Bureau and Memphis were advised that information had been received from the THE PROPERTY OF THE PARTY OF TH

that the Southern Student Organizing committee (SSUC) had mailed, from Nashville, Tennessee, a publication which the school officials of the Northside Independent School District felt was obscene. It was further learned that the mailing of this publication was done under non-profit organization postal permit

This matter was referred to the Memphis Office to contact Postal Inspectors in an attempt to ascertain whether or not there was a violation of postal regulations. San Antonio felt that this was a golden opportunity to institute a counterintelligence program to hamper SSOC in its mailings.

San Antonio has not received any information regarding this suggestion.

By communication 5/9/69 the Bureau was advised that the established source at the UT, a retired FBI Agent, and who has been extremely helpful under this program, advised he was endeavoring to have the school regulations changed which requires that a request for the use of a facility at UT be submitted 6 days prior to the now required 3∕days.

The thought behind this matter was that this would give the established source additional time to do some checking on the individual or organization seeking the use of UT facilities prior to granting authority to use same. Such a tactic would prevent New Left and other such organizations from using facilities at the UT.

San Antonio feels that this tactic has some merit.

By communication 5/21/69 San Antonic advised Columbia and Kansas City that an investigation was being conducted regarding a coffeehouse near Ft. Hood, Texas. San Antonio desired information from Columbia and Kansas City as to the successes they might have had under this program in closing down such coffeehouses.

It was learned from Kansas City, by communication 6/5/69, that a coffeehouse near Tt. Leonardwood at Waynesville, Missouri, went out of business when this establishment's insurance was canceled following numerous minor acts of destruction caused at this establishment reportedly by members of the U. S. Army and local residents who opposed this establishment.

San Antonio is looking into this matter as it pertains to the coffeehouse near Ft. Hood, Texas.

By communication 6/4/69 San Antonio furnished the Bureau and Houston a document issued by the Texas Manufacturers Association which was a document directed at published reports regarding SDS plans for a work-in at manufacturing plants. San Antonio felt that this document could be effectively used under this program.

By communication 6/9/69 the Houston Office advised their indices contained no information which would preclude the use of this document under the COINTELPRO.

San Antonio is considering the use of this document to be mailed to selective employers in the San Antonio, Texas, area; however, no action will be taken prior to obtaining Bureau authority.

2. PENDING COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

Relet pointed out that Bureau authority had been sought to prepare anonymous letters to be mailed to the parents of and to the parents of and to the parents of It is to be noted that these 2 individuals were living together without benefit of marriage in the Ft. Hood, Texas, area and were involved with the coffeehouse near Ft. Hood.

By communication 3/24/69 the Bureau approved the preparation and mailing of these letters which was done.

It has recently been learned that these 2 individuals have moved to the West Coast and leads are presently outstanding to verify this information.

If investigation verifies that these 2 individuals have moved to the West Coast, this will have been most successful.

By communication 4/14/69 it was reported that 12 Cornell University students had been arrested on 4/3/69 by the Cameron County Sheriff's Office at Brownsville, Texas, swimming in the nude after they had attended an SDS Conference in Austin, Texas. Photographs of the 12 persons arrested have been obtained and have been forwarded to Albany who is conducting investigation regarding some of these subjects. These photographs were furnished to Albany to be used in a possible COINTELPPO of the Albany Office.

By communication 6/5/69 San Antonio requested Bureau authority to use a Bureau-approved fictitious name and Post Office Box in writing a letter to the Editor of the Daily Texan. UT daily newspaper. The contents of

this letter had to do with an article that appeared in the Daily World regarding a recent SDS Conference held in Austin, Texas.

Bureau approval is pending the sending of this letter.

3. TANGIBLE RESULTS

By communication 3/20/69 the Bureau was furnished a copy of a bill passed by the Texas Legislature regarding disruptive activities in connection with public schools. This document was furnished the San Antonio Office by a retired FBI Agent who is an established source at the UT. It is believed that information furnished by the San Antonio Office to this source at the UT was in no small measure responsible for this legislation.

By communication 3/26/69 Bureau authority was requested to mail a letter to the Editor of the Daily Texan pointing out that the University of Missouri had withdrawn official recognition of the SDS Chapter at that school and that the UT should follow the University of Missouri's example.

Bureau, by communication 4/9/69, approved the mailing of this letter which was published in the Daily Texan of 4/17/69.

By communication 5/1/69 Bureau authority was requested to submit a letter to the Daily Texan using San Antonio's fictitious name and Post Office Box for this program, pointing out some true facts left out of an American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) letter that was printed in the Daily Texan dealing with the banning of SDS from the UT. The Bureau approved the writing of this letter and the letter appeared in the 5/15/69 issue of the Daily Texan.

On 4/11/69 it was learned that The Eag, an SDS underground newspaper, published in Austin, Texas, had been printed in the past by a printer in Seguin, Texas.

It was further learned that the printer in Seguin, Texas, had refused to publish any editions of this paper.

It is believed that the refusal by the printer to publish this newspaper was the result of a Bureau investigation on another matter in conjunction with the local police at Seguin, Texas.

4. MISCELLANEOUS

As relet pointed out, the bold and sophisticated operation launched under this program in having the SDS blocked from holding their meeting at the UT shows that this program is an effective weapon in counteracting the New Left. As the Bureau was advised by San Antonio letter of 4/3/69

the University's stand in barring SDS, University officials have been praised for taking such a stand. Among other things, the Texas Legislature has passed resolution commending the University for their action.

As it was rointed out in San Antonio's letter of 4/3/69, Mr. advised confidentially that prior to the University board of Regents meeting in which the board backed the UT's present stand on this matter. had a private conversation with

the Board of Regents met in Executive Session and agreed to come out publicly and back the President of UT in his stand. This type of activity, San Antonio strongly feels, must be utilized to make this program effective.

By communication dated 11/5/69, San Francisco furnished public source information to San Antonio.

By communication dated 11/7/69, Bureau granted authority to furnish such information to which was done.

Even though some of this information appeared in the news media regarding states background, nevertheless spoke as advertised and it is not known just what effect this had on his audience.

Prior to the November 15th Vietnam Moratorium March held in San Antonio, the Moratorium Committee announced that part of the November 15th activity in San Antonio would be at the termination of a march to read the names of the Bexar County war dead that were killed in Vietnam. This activity was to take place at the National Cemetery at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. There are approximately

300 names that the Moratorium Committee indicated would be read.

The source of these names by the Moratorium Committee is not definitely known but is believed that they were gleaned from the public press. As a result of the above announcement, military authorities forbade the marchers to actually enter the Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery but they would be permitted to gather outside the cemetery.

In addition, as a result of the above announcement, a highly placed source within the Veterans Administration was contacted in an attempt to secure the 300 names of young Americans from Bexar County, Texas, that have died in Vietnam for their country. This list was obtained.

The list was turned over to the American Legion, Post No. 2, of San Antonio, Texas, who prepared a letter to the next of kin of the 300 individuals who had been killed in Vietnam from Bexar County. The letter pointed out to the next of kin that the next of kin may or may not agree with the use of the names of their departed relatives. In the event that they object, the news media should be so advised as well as the American Legion.

In addition, a copy of this letter was furnished to a reporter on the <u>San Antonio Evening News</u>, a daily newspaper. This reporter, who was a member of the U. S. Army, "moonlights" as a reporter.


As a result of the American Legion's letter and the contact with the reporter, a considerable amount of publicity was received by the public in San Antonio prior to the march.

In addition to the news publicity on the press, radio and television, the manager of one of the leading television stations in San Antonio went on the air to criticize the protesters for using the 300 names without checking with the next of kin.



As of 11/14/69, three telegrams and at least letters from the next of kin of these 300 men had been sent to the American Legion as a result of the letter. In addition, a delegation from the Marine Corps League visited the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) Office (the guiding force behind the Moratorium activity) to protest the use of the names of deceased Marine Corps personnel. In addition to this, Master Sergeant MACARIO CASTILLO, who had lost a son in Vietnam and who was a member of the U.S. Marine Corps, was interviewed on T.V. while standing near his son's grave at the Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery. He repeated as he had done in the newspapers his displeasure with his son's name being used by the protesters.

As of 11/16/69, it was learned through sources that at least 150 next of kin of the 300 servicemen that died in Vietnam had registered their objection with the AFSC. These 150 names were not read during the demonstration.



On the afternoon of November 13, 1969, a source advised that a rally sponsored by the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) was held on the Main Mall of the University of Texas at Austin (UT), Austin, Texas, and that the fourth speaker was mose speech covered the

1. History of the Vietnam War

2. U. S. Foreign Policy, particularing in relationship to Latin America and Cuba

3. Defense Functions at the universities and colleges

4. The Military - Industrial Complex from a Profit-Making Standpoint

5. Campus Unrest, with mention being made to People's Park, University of California at Berkeley, California, the Chicago demonstration at the Democratic National Convention with comments about the "Chicago 8". In connection with the violence that erupted at the Democratic National Convention, stated that the demonstrators who were picketing were attacked by the police with tear gas; that they reacted by throwing stones: and that he advocated reacting to police actions such as tear gas with viclence.

On November 14, 1969, a second source, a representative of another Government agency which conducts security investigations, advised as follows:

The YAF participants were Major General Thomas Lane, U. S. Army Retired, and Reverend Raymond DeJaeger, who had served ten years in the Republic of Vietnam as a Catholic missionary. Participants for the SMC were Doctor David Edwards, Assistant Professor of Government at UT, and Robert Scheer, former editor of Rampart's magazine and a past instructor at City College of New York, New York City, and the University of California at Berkeley.

Only the remarks of the SMC sponsored speakers are set forth hereafter.

The first speaker for the SMC was Doctor Edwards. Edwards began his remarks by stating that if we are not aware of the position of the United States and Vietnam and aware of the cost of American dollars, American lives and Vietnamese lives, then there is no need for debate. Edwards further stated the main cause in our failure in Vietnam is a faultly attitude emanating from the foreign policy of the United States Government. This faulty policy, he stated, includes the United States' wish to determine the fate of people in the entire world, and the thought that the only device determining the fate of the people is in military force. Edwards further elaborated on these points for approximately five minutes, terminating his viewpoint with the statement that there is no need to consider communism as a worldwide ideal; that attempts to crush all forms of governments with communism is a truism. He further stated that the United States should not interfere with communism as communism is not antithetic to democracy; it is, however, the next logical step toward total placation of the people; that it is democracy socialism - communism, in that order. He further stated that the goals of the U.S. in Vietnam is primarily and unequivocally the propagation of a democratic nation.

This, stated Edwards, is erroneous in substance because the government of South Vietnam is not a democracy but a dictatorship similar to that of Germany's Hitler. Edwards terminated his statement by stating that the only sensible objective of the United States should be "to bring all the boys home now."

The next SMC speaker was Robert Scheer, past editor of Rampart's magazine. In opening his remarks he stated that self-determination is the major factor in the debate over Vietnam. Scheer followed this with a defense of President Kennedy, stating that President Kennedy did not want to follow the war in Vietnam, did not want to deploy troops and quoted President Kennedy as follows:

"If the Vietnam War becomes an American war, it is lost for this is the essence of colonialism."

He further stated that the American press had lead the American public to believe that communists are savage murderers. He stated in a tongue-and-cheek position, "If this is true, why didn't the South Vietnamese believe this?". At this remark the partisan crowd became ostentatiously boisterous. Scheer stated that in no * way would a communist Vietnam interfere with United States foreign policy or United States otonomy. He stated that he does not believe that communism is a monolithic ideology. In Scheer's summation, he said that Vietnam should be allowed to have self-determination to determine their own freedom. He further stated that the only aggression in Vietnam is by the United States; that their are no Russian or communist Chinese troops within the country of Vietnam whereas there are American troops and allied troops including the Australians, New Zealanders, South Koreans, and a few sorted other countries. Scheer terminated his remarks by stating that we, the United States, had made a mess of the lives of the Vietnamese and we should quit.

Both sides opposed the Nixon administration's current policies in Vietnam, with SMC speakers espousing immediate, unilateral withdrawal and YAF epeakers advocating a military victory. Dr. Edwards, the opening peaker, said, "If the U.S. is

Gen. Lane stated that the "bingest lie in the U.S. today is that the U.S. cannot win this war." We have not had a president who wanted to win the war." he said.

Scheer, 100 C S enthusiastically accepted speaker of the evening, said that when the war became an American war it was already dost. "The only nationalistic movement in Vietnam has been led by the communists We've made a mess of their lives and we should quit," Sheer told the crowd.

Rev. DeJacger a Catholic priest of Dutch nationality, stated that the U.S. is winning in Vietnam.

YAF Debates SMC

The Young Americans for Freedom countered the Student Mobilization Committee in a debate which turned into a yelling, clapping and stomping questionanswer period Thursday night before a packed Texas Union Main Ballroom.

The program began with comedy when YAF Chairman Mary Kay Davis introduced the debaters saying YAF speakers the Rev. Raymond DeJaegher and Maj. Gen. Thomas A. Lane were on her left and SMC speakers Dr. David Edwards and Robert Scheer were on her right.

The audience howled.

IT WAS an unusual exchange, the old against the young, right against the left, long hairs against the short and balding. After an hour of preliminary addresses, the debaters and autience launched into two hours of question asking, answering and adodging.

When Miss David tried to ring down the curtain at 10 p.m., SMC spokesmen and supporters yelled, clapped and stomped and the questions continued until 10:20 p.m.

Edwards, a University assistant professor of government, began the debate saying the application of military force to influence other nations is disgraceful. He said the United States is trying to police the world, especially Southeast Asia, to prevent communism and enforce the American economic system on other governments.

"THE REASON there is so much violence in the world today is that the major powers have taken it upon themselves to teach other states to behave as the major powers wish," Edwards said.

Lane agreed with Edwards that lives are being spent unnecessarily in Vietnam, but felt the solution is to launch an allout attack on North Vietnam, then leave. "The United States can win this war, and win it to-morrow," he said.


"If the United States will use its military power for peace," Lane said, "there will be no more war."

"Why Vietnam? Why not Yugeslavia, Spain, Brazil or Greece?" asked Scheer, former editor of Ramparts magazine. "Obviously the United States isn't interested in a worldwide campaign for freedom, We have no right, no competence, to be missionaries around the world. Leave the choice up to the people of the world," he said.

REV. MR. DeJAEGHER, a Catholic priest who returned from Vietnam 15 days ago, said the South Vietnamese people have always fought for freedom and never accepted slavery. "They won't accept communism," he said.

Last year, DeJaegher said, two-thirds of the American and South Vietnamese forces were used for pacification by rehabilitating villages and one-third of the combined forces was used for fighting.

The questions ended with the outnumbered YAFs submitting to SMC demands that the debate continue a little longer, but Miss Davis finally cut off questions threatening to end the debate without final remarks.

National Student Mobilization Committee

A source advised on May 16, 1969, that the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) originally grew out of the National Student Strike for Peace conference held in Chicago, Illinois, on December 28 + 29, 1966, which resulted in a call for massive antiwar demonstrations in New York City and San Francisco, California, on April 15, 1967. The National Student Strike for Peace was originally called by the Communist Party (CP). Division arose between elements of the CP and the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), culminating in a takeover by the SWP element in the Summer of 1968 and the CP element withdrawing. Source further advised the SMC locally and nationally is controlled by the SWP and its youth arm, Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) as evidenced by their participation in SMC functions and their leadership role played in the SMC.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A report by the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, Ninetieth Congress, First Session, dated March 31, 1967, entitled, "Communist Origin And Manipulation of Vietnam Week (April 8 - 15, 1967)" stated that the SMC and the April 15, 1967, antiwar demonstrations were communist dominated and inspired.

A second source on April 3, 1969, made available a copy of "The Student Mobilizer" dated April 5, 1969, which was self-described as being published by the National Office of the SMC to End the War in Vietnam, 857 Broadway, Room 307 New York, New York 10003. In this issue the aims of the SMC were set forth as: Bring the GIs home from Vietnam now; end campus complicity with the war; and win self-determination for Vietnam and Black America.

APPENDIX

In this issue of the publication, the SMC pledged itself to organize high school students, college students, future draftees, GIs and all young people to fight until every last GI is brought home.

A third source on August 5, 1969, advised that the SMC currently occupies Room 307 at 857 Broadway, New York, New York.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE (YSA)

The May, 1960, issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), page 1, column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA macognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only exhaum; political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity, with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

On March 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The National Headquarters of the YSA are located in Room 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.


On October 31, 1987, a second source advised that at the 22nd National Convention of the SWP held in New York City from October 26, 1967, to October 29, 1967, it was stated that the YSA remained as the main recruiting group for new SWP members.



Lawyer Suggesis Judicial Changes

Louis Nizer, noted attorney and author, said Sabirday night at the forty-eighth annual Texas Law Review banquet that the Chicago conspiracy trial was a conspiracy between the defendants and their attorneys to bring a challenge to the American judicial system.

About 500 people, mostly former editors of the Texas Law Review, lawyers, judges and law students, hetened to Nizer compare the Chicago 7 Trial to the Nazi sedition trial of 1944 and to the Communist trials . of 1943. In both there trials there was a conspiracy, according to Nizer, to undermine the judicial system.

"I talk of treason to the judicial system and about a calculated plan to challenge It by the counsel and defendants of the Chicago trial," explained Nizer in an emotional voice.

He went on to outline six changes he said should be implemented to meet this challenge, saying that the right to dissent is precious, but discent, itself, can be foolish or 1752.

The six proposed changes are:

6 "When a defendant, in a criminal trini, reputitelly and ofter several warnings disrupts the proceedings in a courtroom, the july should clap him into jail. The defendant should have access to the minutes of his trial, and if necessary a closedcircuit television but he should rot in fail, until he agrees to behave in the courtroom."

o "A lawyer is a prince of the court and if he violates, continuously and calculatingly, the rules of the courtroom he should be hanished from the courtroom, in addition to being held in contempt of ccurt."

C "The powers given to a federal court to cut down or eliminate useless testimony should be recognized by the upper courts, so that judges may act without fear of reversible error."

 "Judges should have the right to dismiss from the courtreom all the veciferous achierents of the defendants, and in order to make it a public trial, agencies such as the Civil Liberties Union, should be notified, so that they may send representatives to the trial.

o "Bor associations should have immoliate disbarment against the few who dishoner our profession.

o "We should pass state and federal legislation to make obstruction of justice, in the courtroom, a felony."



Response 'Overwhelms' Flag

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — A husky football star who stood alone between the U.S. flag and 150 campus demonstrators for three hours says he can't believe the favorable public response to what he did.

"I'm overwhelmed," Bill Pierson said Thursday.

Since the incident Monday, Pierson says he has received hundreds of telephone calls, letters and telegrams from across the United States, commending him.

Typical, he said, was one from a woman whose two sons died in Vietnam: "God bless you."

The school's athletic department reported many favorable

calls, including offers of financial help if Pierson needed any.

Pierson, a senior marketing student, was walking from
class when he spotted militants lowering the flag at San Diego

State College to half-staff in support of their stand.

The 6-foot-3, 250-pound ex-sailor raised it back to the top

and stood his ground while being threatened with fire hoses and chemical sprays.

"I was born under that flag," Pierson told the demonstra-

tors.
"I fought for that flag, and I am going to college because of what it stands for."

Although he was never attacked, he said later: "I wouldn't have moved if they had."

Pierson, 23, of Arlington, Tex., all All-West Coast center, joins the New York Jets professional football camp July 14. He has a wife and a 3-year-old daughter.

The American Legion, in a "Citation for Meritorious Service," said Pierson's comments in defense of his flag "should forever be the watchword of every red-blooded American."

"This community, yes this nation, owes Bill Pierson a debt of deep gratitude," the citation said.

TROTSKYISTS WELCOMED AT CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY!

Following in the wake of the bombshell indictments of Catholic priests and nuns in connection with the alleged plot to kidnap a Government official and sabotage Federal buildings in Washington, D. C., it is now reported that Catholic University (CU) will host a national conference of the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (SMC) in Washington, D. C., during February. Has the Catholic church been duped again? It is almost inconceivable that responsible CU officials or high level officials of the Roman Catholic church would allow themselves to be thrust into the position of providing a sanctuary and planning base for a group of students whose sole purpose in meeting is undoubtedly to draw up battle lines and strategy for massive antiwar demonstrations to be held in Washington, D. C., and San Francisco, California, during April.

The invitation by CU is more puzzling, even appalling, when you consider the established fact that the SMC is communist controlled at every national office level by members of the Trotskyist Socialist Workers Party or its youth affiliate, the Young Socialist Alliance. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the TBI, made this point perfectly clear in testimony before the House of Representatives Subcommittee on Appropriations during March, 1970. New York tends to indicate a fait accompli complex. However New York should be aware that there is a great number of Catholics, both religious and laymen, who do not subscribe to this radical philosophy.

It is strongly felt that at the emergence of the so-called permissive attitude that if effective counterintelligence actions had been taken, the Bureau's investigation in New Left and other such matters would not have been as great as it is today.

For additional information of New York, through counterintelligence efforts of the San Antonio Office, we were successful several years ago in preventing the establishment of a Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) group at San Antonio College (SAC) in San Antonio. More recently, through a counterintelligence program with established sources at St. Mary's University in San Antonio (a Catholic University), the appearance of certain nationally-known radicals in the New Left Novement have been prevented. In addition to this. through counterintelligence efforts San Antonio has been able to minimize and perhaps stifle attempts by the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) to establish a foothold at SAC.

As a result of the above, at the present time institutions of learning in San Antonio proper are free of any radical elements and organizations.

In addition to this, through these established sources in the Chancellery Office of the archdiocese of San Antonio, San Antonio was able to resolve a highly delicate situation which indicated that espionage was involved.

New York is requested to furnish San Antonio with any acceptable public source information regarding the conference at Catholic University so that it may be disseminated as authorized by the Bureau.



Enclosed to the Bureau is a xerox copy of an article appearing in the Daily World of 8/11/70, and a xerox copy of a portion of an article from PAUL THOMPSON's column of 8/19/70, in the San Antonio Evening News, both dealing with

For information of the Bureau, PAUL RHOMPSON is a "gossip columnist" of the San Antonio Evening News. He is very controversial but appears to have a large following in San Antonio. He has been described by some as a "mini" JACK ANDERSON or HERB CAEN.

There has been a widely held suspicion that many articles appearing in his column are furnished to him anonymously or through other reporters.

In order to test this theory, a xerox copy of the enclosed article from the <u>Daily World</u> was anonymously mailed to THOMPSON with a typewritten note which indicated to the effect that STANFORD apparently has reached the "big time."

Bureau will note that the enclosed article of THOMPSON's column of 8/19/70, was the lead story of this column.

This article caused some concern among Communist Party (CP) members and during a CP Club meeting there was some concern expressed where THOMPSON might have obtained this information. STANFORD stated that undoubtedly THOMPSON obtained it from the Daily World.

San Antonio feels that this article was important due to the fact that while STANFORD is publicly known as a CP member there has been gone indication that many persons feel that he is "just a Gocal commis."



The following is the current status of this program in the San Antonio Division:

I. POTENTIAL COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

STANFORD, a dominant figure of the CP of Texas, has been asked to serve on the Steering Committee of the AFSC in San Antonio. This request was by Peace Education of the American reference service Committee (AFSC). It is probably the most anti-Vietnam War activist and organizer in the San Antonio area. Inasmuch as the AFSC is funded in part by members of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) and since it is publicly known that President NIXON is a Quaker, San Antonio proposed under the CPUSA Counterintelligence Program (San Antonio letter 3/3/71) that this information, through the Bureau's "INLET" (Bufile 65-73268) Program, be made available to the White House.

Bureau, by communication 3/12/71, felt that this suggestion was impractical and no action should be taken regarding it.

II. PENDING COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION
